The 673 deaths represent a death-rate of 18.95, against 19.07 for the previous week, and 20.57 for the corresponding week of 1891.

There was an increase of 8 in the deaths from phthisis, of 10 from heart diseases, of 13 from diseases of the digestive organs, and of 13 from violence, and a decrease of 10 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 8 from pneumonia, and of 5 from Bright's disease, the total number of deaths varying little from that of the previous week.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, from scarlet fever in the Twelfth Ward, and from typhoid fever in the Nineteenth Ward.
