

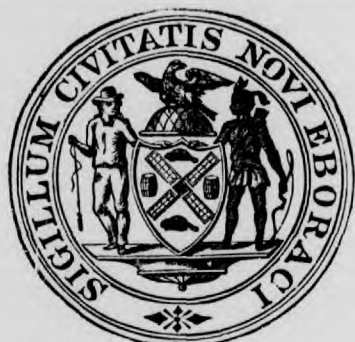

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending Saturday, February 22, 1879.

MEETINGS HELD FEBRUARY 19 and 21, 1879.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the plan presented by Superintending Architect for the drainage of Manhattan Square be and the same is hereby approved, and that he be directed to prepare the working drawings for the same, and that the work be commenced as soon as weather will permit.

Also, one ordering the filing of map of Central District, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, bounded on the west by Jerome or Central avenue, on the north by Woodlawn Cemetery and north side of Pelham avenue, on the east by the New York and Harlem Railroad, Hoffman street, Fordham, and Third avenues, and on the south by One Hundred and Sixty-first street, in Morrisania.

Also, one approving Plans and Specifications for constructing the following sewers and appurtenances: One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from 410 feet east of Willis avenue to Brook avenue, with branch in Brown place; One Hundred and Forty-first street, from Alexander avenue to Brook avenue, with branches in Alexander and Willis avenues; and One Hundred and Forty-second street, from Alexander avenue to Brook avenue, with branches in Alexander and Willis avenues.

Office rented at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Third avenue for use of engineers employed on sewers.

Daniel Mahoney found guilty of charges, and fined one day's pay.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the Holbrook Manufacturing Company to erect two (2) platforms on their premises on the southwest corner of Vestry and Washington streets; said platforms to be within the stoop line, and to remain during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen January 21, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, February 3, 1879.

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to cause the provisions of the ordinance entitled "An ordinance to regulate the use of snow ploughs and sweeping machines by railroad companies and others in the City of New York," passed February 26, 1875, to be rigidly enforced, particularly the provisions relating to the removal of snow from the streets in which the rails of every such company are laid.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 21, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company to extend its tracks to, upon, and across the Harlem Bridge, and on and along the Third avenue to a point at or near One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, and to operate said road so extended, and to run cars thereon, with such switches, turnouts, and tables as may be necessary, provided that said company shall run cars from said terminus until 1 A. M., and shall not charge any increased fares, by reason of such extension, provided that the said bridge be put into good repair after the laying of said tracks at the expense of said company, and that the said company keep said bridge in good repair between the tracks; and that this permission shall continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 22, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,344 as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 656 tenement-houses, 154 private dwellings, 24 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 5 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 34 slaughter-houses, 6 fat-rendering establishments, 1 lime-kiln, 1 lodging-house, 1 public sewer, 34 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 smoke house, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 1 stream, 1 roadway, 28 yards, courts, and areas, 73 cellars and basements, 62 waste-pipes and drains, 121 privies and water-closets, 1 street-gutter, 2 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 5 other nuisances, together with 74 cases of contagious disease visited by Sanitary Inspectors.

The number of reports thereon received from Inspectors was 331.

During the past week 72 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 36 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

26 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 130 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 114 houses, 114 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two persons sick with scarlet fever were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The certificates of 541 births, 37 still-births, 144 marriages, and 551 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 22, 1879, this shows an increase of 165 births, and a decrease of 10 still-births, 1 marriage, and 3 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 141 births, 23 marriages, and 27 deaths, and a decrease of 22 still-births, compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 19; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 3; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 9; bronchitis, 9; heart diseases, 5; aneurism, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 3; croup, 9; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 9; cancer, 5; pneumonia, 10; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 2; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; deaths by suicide, 2, and deaths by drowning, 1.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 100 were in institutions, 265 in tenement-houses, 174 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 133 on the first, 145 on the second, 90 on the third, 56 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 549 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents. 64 were stated to be single, 136 married, 76 widowed, and the condition of 274 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 551; still-births, 37; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 55 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 541 births; 144 marriages; 37 still-births; 551 deaths, 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 27 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 22, 1879, was 24.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.039, the mean humidity was 82, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,405, and the total amount of rain-fall was .51 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
