Appeal No. 29 of 1902, matter of fireproof shutters, premises No. 841 Broadway, M. Eidlitz & Sons, architects and appellants, on motion, duly seconded.

Referred to Chief Croker for examination and report.

Appeal No. 30 of 1902, matter of fireproof shutters, premises No. 411 West Seventeenth street, Charles H. Pecksworth, owner and appellant.

Referred to W. A. Conover for examination and report.

Alteration 46 of 1902, Appeal No. 31 of 1902 (Queens), premises west side of Remington avenue, 50 feet from the southwest corner of Remington avenue and the Boulevard, in the Borough of Queens (Arverne), C. L. Witherby, architect and appellant.

Mr. T. C. McKenney, and Hon. Joseph L. Powers, Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Queens, appeared before the Board in explanation of the application.

It is proposed to raise up and alter a frame building on above location, said alteration making the structure four feet over the 35 foot limit. This is asked as the building rests on white sea sand, and for the reason that the extension on the rear of the proposed building is less than 40 feet 0 inches, according to section 146 of the Building Code.

Approved.

New Building 51 of 1902, Appeal No. 22 of 1902, premises Nos. 207 to 219 West Forty-first street and No. 214 West Forty-second street, Herts & Tallant, architects and appellants.

Mr. Tallant appeared in explanation of amended drawings submitted, as directed by the Board at the last meeting.

Denied.

New Building 22 of 1902, Appeal No. 32 of 1902, premises Nos. 110 to 114 East Fifty-eighth street, Cyrus L. W. Eidlitz, architect and appellant. "It is proposed to erect the rear wall of the pent house on the roof with 3-inch by 3-inch by 3/4-inch angle iron uprights placed 3 feet apart and lined with 4-inch hollow fireproof blocks and covered on the outside with copper."

Approved on condition that all the iron framing be plastered on the inside.

New Building 59 of 1902, Appeal No. 33 of 1902, premises north side of One

Hundred and Forty-ninth street, 230 feet east of bulkhead line of the Harlem river, Borough of The Bronx, Robt. Ellis, appellant. It is proposed to erect a frame shed (open), as a similar building on the south side of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, has been taken by the Rapid Transit right of way, and this change is thus forced by public requirements. Under the Code this shed cannot be moved without first obtaining a permit for new building; hence this appeal.

Approved.

New Building 1680 of 1901, Appeal No. 34 of 1902, premises No. 210 Fifth avenue, running though to No. 1132 Broadway; J. B. Snook & Son, architects and appellants; Mr. Weeks appeared in explanation before the Board. "It is proposed to omit an additional line of stairs; area of lot covered less area of open court above second story being 3,264 feet; section 75 of the Code, requiring additional line of stairs for excess of 2,500 up to 5,000 feet. The stairs from first story to roof are centrally located, and the greatest depth of building is 134 feet; fire escapes provided and access to roof.

Denied.

Alteration 73 of 1902, Appeal No. 35 of 1902, premises Nos. 32 to 42 East Forty-second street, and Nos. 45 and 47 East Forty-first street, W. B. Tubby, architect and appellant; it is asked that the permissible live load on the portion of the building fronting on Forty-first street, and designated on the filed drawings as "C," be reduced from 120 to 75 pounds per square foot. It is proposed to add only one floor to what at present exists in this portion of the building, for the purpose of bringing the whole building to one common level.

Laid over.

Alteration 130 of 1902, Appeal No. 36 of 1902, premises north side of East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, 567 feet from the northeast corner of Pleasant avenue, X. Charles Baxter, architect and appellant; it is desired to construct easterly wall of second story of frame, as follows: Retaining the brick piers as shown on plans at each end and filling in between the brick pier with frame work, laying a 4 by 16 inch Georgia pine sill on the brick wall at first story and set two 8 by 8 inch posts at girders, and two 4 by 8 inch centre posts, filling in between openings with 3 by 4 inch spruce joists * * * and covering the whole inside and outside with No. 26 sheet iron.

Denied.

Appeal No. 37 of 1902, Matter of iron shutters, premises No. 42 West Ninety-ninth street, H. F. Bindseil, appellant.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

During the week forty-three orders for repairs and supplies were issued, and an order to the American Ice Manufacturing Company for furnishing and delivering ice to various public buildings, from March 1, 1902, to December 31, 1902, the ice to be free from snow and other impurities, to be cut in proper sizes and placed in water coolers, to be delivered before 9 o'clock each day, except Sundays or holidays, at 22½ cents per 100 pounds, the only other bidder being the American Ice Company, the bid of which was at the rate of 25 cents per 100 pounds.

On February 24 the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, by word of mouth, and subsequently by written communication, served notices upon the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, Keady, Fitzgerald and Fleming, to vacate the quarters in the Borough Hall used as Special Sessions, Court Room, at once, this action being made necessary by the recently discovered unsafe condition of the building at the point underneath the room used by the Court referred to.

With the approval of Borough President J. Edward Swanstrom and Commissioner of Public Works William C. Redfield, the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, on February 24, transferred William B. Conklin, of No. 398 Twelfth street, a messenger in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, to duty in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, in the Borough Hall, the said transfer to take effect on March 1, 1902.

On February 27, James W. Irwin, a Mason in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, with the approval of Borough President J. Edward Swanstrom, the Commissioner of Public Works, William C. Redfield, was formally notified that in accordance with section 1543 of the City Charter, and an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, that because of the reduction of force in the particular class of work in which he—Irwin—had been engaged, his employment had been rendered unnecessary; that his name had been sent to the Municipal Civil Service Commission, that it might be placed on the list of suspended employees, in order that he might be afforded an opportunity for employment at the earliest practicable occasion, and that his services would be no longer required in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices after February 28, 1902.

On the written request of Comptroller Edward M. Grout, Borough President J. Edward Swanstrom and Commissioner of Public Works William C. Redfield, and the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices Frank J. Helmle, formally approved of the transfer of Edward M. G. Thompson, Inspector of Construction of Public Buildings, in this Bureau, to the Department of Finance, the said transfer to date from March 1, 1902.
