#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

#### To the Honorable the Council:

I return herewith, without my approval, an ordinance adopted by you on February 27, 1900, entitled "An ordinance to regulate, etc., the roadway at the foot of Grand street, Borough of Brooklyn."

My objection to this ordinance is that the work therein provided for is to be paid from the proceeds of bonds, and that no issue of such bonds has yet been authorized.

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate, etc., the roadway at the foot of Grand street, Borough of Brooklyn. Be it Enacted by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 27th day of December, 1899, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, viz.:

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of section 527 and section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating, grading and paving with granite-block pavement on a concrete foundation of the roadway at the foot of Grand street, Borough of Brooklyn, and the setting and resetting of three hundred and fifty feet of new and old curb, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same is hereby authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing of the cost of the said work or improvement. The estimated cost of said work is ten thousand two hundred dollars, and is to be paid for by the issue of bonds, as provided in section 170, chapter 378, Laws of 1897.

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS—CITY OF NEW YORK,

#### To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

SIR—Under date of September 27, 1899, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn addressed a communication to this Board requesting that immediate steps be taken to grade and pave the foot of Grand street, Borough of Brooklyn, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 30 of the Laws of 1897. Subsequently the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to the proper method of procedure, and in his reply he advised that it would be necessary for the work to be authorized by the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly, under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter.

In accordance with this opinion a resolution was adopted by this Board on December 27, 1899, authorizing the regulating, grading and paving of said street, and the inclosed form of ordinance approving the resolution is forwarded herewith for the action of your Honorable Body.

I also inclose copy of the communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and copy of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, upon which the Board acted.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, September 27, 1899.

#### Board of Public Improvements:

GENTLEMEN—Provision was made by chapter 30 of the Laws of 1897 for acquiring property at the foot of Grand street, in this borough, so as to widen the approach to the ferries at the foot of said street. This property has been acquired, and I am informed that recently final payment was made by the City to the property-owners. The act provided that after the property had been acquired the Commissioner of City Works should cause the street as widened to be graded and paved, the said work to be done by contract to the lowest bidder.

I request that the matter be referred to the Department of Highways for report as to what steps are necessary to enable said department to proceed with the improvement as early as possible.

The directions of the statute are imperative.

#### To the Board of Public Improvements:

GENTLEMEN—I have received your communication of November 17, which reads as follows: "Under date of September 27, 1899, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn wrote to this Board requesting that the Department of Highways be asked to report as to what steps were necessary to enable said department to proceed with the work of grading and paving Grand street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 30, Laws of 1897. Under date of the 3d instant, the Commissioner of Highways reported, suggesting that the matter be referred to you, and at the meeting of this Board held on the 15th instant the matter was so referred."

"In accordance with this action I am directed to request that you will kindly investigate this matter, and advise the Board fully as to what steps should be taken to proceed with the grading and paving."

"Inclosed are (1) copy of communication from President of Brooklyn, and (2) copy of report of Commissioner of Highways."

In reply thereto I would say that by chapter 30 of the Laws of 1897, the Commissioner of City Works of the City of Brooklyn was authorized to grade, pave and otherwise improve the foot of Grand street in said city whenever the Common Council and the Mayor of said city should alter the Commissioner's map thereof by widening the approaches to the ferries at the foot of said street by including in said street certain property described in the act. The Commissioner of City Works was also authorized to purchase this property, and if no agreement could be reached as to the price to be paid therefor, the law provided that such property might be condemned under the provisions of the Condemnation Law.

Acting under this statute the Commissioner of City Works of the City of Brooklyn and the Mayor of said city altered the Commissioner's map thereof in the manner authorized by the act. It having been found impossible to agree with the owner of the property required, as to the price to be paid therefor, a condemnation proceeding was begun to acquire the same. The final order in this proceeding was confirmed by the Supreme Court on the 19th day of July, 1898. An appeal was taken from this order to the Appellate Division of that Court, which was argued and a decision was rendered affirming the order. No further appeal has been taken, and the amount awarded by the Commissioner has been duly paid to the persons entitled thereto and has been accepted by them. On the 15th day of August, 1899, the said City took possession of this property, and since that time has been receiving the rents therefor. There is now no legal obstacle to the carrying out of the improvement contemplated and authorized by the act above cited.

In answer to your request that I advise the Board as to what steps should be taken to proceed with the grading and paving of this street, I would say that by section 527 of the Charter, all powers and duties conferred upon the corporation known as the City of Brooklyn, or upon any board or officer thereof in any way relating to the regulating, grading, regrading, curbing, flagging and guttering of streets, the laying of crosswalks, the constructing and repair of public roads, paving, repaving and repairing of all streets and the relaying of all pavements removed for any cause, the filling of lots and all matters directly relating thereto are vested in The City of New York as constituted by the Charter; and as matter of administration devolved upon the Commissioner of Highways to be executed pursuant to the provisions, directions and limitations of this act. A devolution of powers and duties upon The City of New York is in effect a devolution of such powers and duties upon the officers and departments upon whom is placed the exercise of said powers and duties. By section 413 of the Charter it is provided that "except as herein otherwise provided, any public work or improvement within the cognizance and control of any one or more of the departments of the commissioners who constitute the board of public improvements, that may be the subject of a contract must first be duly authorized and approved by a resolution of the board of public improvements and an ordinance or resolution of the municipal assembly. \* \* \* When a public work or improvement shall have been duly authorized as aforesaid, then, but not until then, it shall be lawful for the proper department to proceed in the execution thereof in accordance with the provisions and subject to the limitations of this act."

The Commissioner of Highways is one of the Commissioners who constitute the Board of Public Improvements.

I am of the opinion, then, that this improvement must first be authorized by the Board of Public Improvements and by the Municipal Assembly, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter just cited, and that upon such authorization the Commissioner of Highways shall proceed to carry out the improvement as other improvements of a like nature are now carried out in the city, pursuant to the provisions, directions and limitations of the Charter. The provision of the Law of 1897 as to the means of payment for the improvement is still effective (Charter, section 170), and the Comptroller may be called upon from time to time to issue the necessary amount of bonds to meet such payments.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Virgilio Amato to erect a barber pole on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of his premises, No. 5 Fulton avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

Whereas, The Honorable Lyman J. Gage, Secretary of the Treasury of the United States of America, has shown by petition submitted to the Municipal Assembly, dated April 3, 1900, "That in the preparation of the designs for the construction of the new custom-house to be erected on what is known as Bowling Green site, in the City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, said site being bounded by Bowling Green, Whitehall, Bridge and State streets, that the architectural form of the building can be more suitably embellished and of better proportions if certain projections beyond the now existing building lines are permitted"; therefore be it

Resolved, That permission and authority be and the same is hereby given to the United States of America to extend the said proposed new custom-house, to be erected on what is known as the Bowling Green site in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, said site being bounded by Bowling Green, Whitehall, Bridge and State streets, beyond the now existing building lines and within the area lines as shown upon the attached diagram marked "A," the work to be done at the expense of the United States of America, under the direction of the Department of Buildings of The City of New York.

By Councilman Murphy—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the David Jones Company to lay two pipes in the carriageway of Forty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, one pipe to be ten inches in diameter and the other to be three inches in diameter; the said ten-inch pipe to be used for the purpose of conducting salt water from the East river to their premises on Forty-fourth street, about one hundred feet west of the westerly side of First avenue, and the said three-inch pipe to be used for the purpose of conducting steam from their said premises to a pump at the foot of Forty-fourth street, East river; provided the said David Jones Company pay to The City of New York as compensation for the privilege hereby granted such amount as may be determined as an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and provided further, that the said David Jones Company shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Highways to save The City of New York harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said pipes, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

No. 932.

By Councilman Goodwin—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Robert Bacon to erect, keep and maintain a covered stoop in front of his premises on the northeast corner of Park avenue and Thirty-fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, as shown upon the accompanying diagram, said stoop to be constructed of stone, metal and glass, and to be wholly within the stoop-line, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

By Councilman Murray—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mr. Garret Hopper to place a stepping-stone at curb on the sidewalk in front of his premises, No. 1136 Tinton avenue, the same to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

SIR—I have received the communication of March 15, 1900, signed by your Secretary, which reads as follows:

"I am directed by the Mayor to transmit to you herewith enclosed a Certificate of Tax Sale, issued by the Registrar of Arrears of the City of Brooklyn under date of July 28, 1886, being registered No. 6163, relating to a parcel of land described as Lot No. 1, Block 197, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of Brooklyn, and also a receipt of Edward Gilon, Collector of Assessments and Arrears, dated March 5, 1900, for \$220.62, paid upon application for assignment of said Certificate of Tax Sale.

"I am further directed by the Mayor to request your opinion as to whether his signature is necessary to an assignment or transfer of this certificate, and if so, whether the prerequisites to an assignment or transfer of the same have been complied with, and particularly whether the proposed assignment endorsed on the back of the certificate is correct and formal."

In reply thereto I would say that the assignment of the certificate under consideration seems to have been made in pursuance of the provisions of section 4 of Title VIII. of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn. This title provided among other things for the sale of lands for the non-payment of taxes and assessments, and section 4 provided partly as follows:

"The City of Brooklyn may be a purchaser at any sale of lands under the provisions of this title, and the same right, title and effect as any other purchaser, whenever the Mayor, Comptroller and Corporation Counsel, or a majority of them, shall so determine, and the certificates of such sale to said city shall be delivered to the Comptroller, who shall, in behalf of said city, cause a notice of said sale to be served on the owners and mortgagees of the land so purchased, as provided in section 5 of this title. And the Comptroller may, with the assent of the Mayor, assign and convey any of said certificates or the right and title of the City in any lands acquired under such sale on payment of a sum not less than the amount which would be required to redeem such lands under the provisions of this act."

It will be noticed that the assignment of certificates here authorized related only to certificates of such sales as were made under the provisions of Title VIII. of the Charter. The certificate of sale accompanying your communication, however, was made in pursuance of a sale had under chapter 114 of the Laws of 1883. This act was a special act relating to the arrears of taxes, assessments and water rates existing at the time of its passage in the City of Brooklyn, and provided a means of determining what proportion of such arrears should fairly be paid in order to cancel the whole indebtedness. For the non-payment of the amounts so fixed sales of the property affected were authorized. The benefits and penalties of this act were limited to the existing body of arrears. No such provisions as is found in Title VIII. above cited is to be found in this act. The only way in which an assignment of such a certificate as that now under consideration could have been made was by authority of the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn, and the only legal way in which it can now be made is under the authority of the Municipal Assembly as the successor of the Common Council in that respect.

I advise you, therefore, that no action is called for on your part in relation to this certificate.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR:—I have the honor to transmit herewith my estimate for New Stock (Bond Account) for the present year. In my opinion, the items enumerated will be necessary to supply and properly equip the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. I find that there is a sufficient surplus left over in the Bond Accounts for the other Boroughs to suffice for 1900, and therefore the estimate is confined to the two Boroughs named.

In submitting this estimate I earnestly desire that it may be allowed just as submitted, as I have gone over each of these items and find that the quantities and prices are both as low as the prevailing conditions will admit.

The sum total, as will be seen, amounts to \$144,649, and in this connection I desire to call attention to the fact that in my estimate for Bond Account for 1899, for the Borough of Queens, there was allowed four (4) crematories for the destruction of refuse at \$30,000 each, amounting to \$120,000, and for the Borough of Richmond three (3) crematories, also at \$30,000, amounting to \$90,000.

After these sums were allowed, it was for potent reasons considered inadvisable at the time to appropriate the money for the purpose indicated in these two Boroughs, consequently the money so allowed has not been used. It is quite within the possibilities that a portion of these amounts for crematories in these two Boroughs may be expended in the near future, but even if the contemplated amounts are expended, it will still leave a balance in those two accounts for the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond sufficient for the needs of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the present year.

Therefore if the \$144,649 could be transferred from the \$220,000 appropriated for crematories in Queens and Richmond, to the Bond Account of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in the following manner—\$80,000 from the \$120,000 in the Bond Account for Queens, and \$64,649 from the \$90,000 in the Bond Account for Richmond—it would provide the necessary \$144,649 in the Bond Account for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, thus obviating the necessity for a bond issue for that purpose.

This request is made subject to the action of the Board of Public Improvements and consent of the Municipal Assembly, if such action and consent are legal requirements.

The Commissioners of Public Charities and the Commissioner of Correction are hereby instructed and required to advertise in the City Record, on the day succeeding the death of any stranger or unknown person who may die in any of the institutions under their charge, a notice giving a full description of such person, and a statement of all the property found in his or her possession at the time such person became an inmate of any such institution, together with such other information as in the opinion of the officers in charge of any such institution would be most likely to lead to the identification of the person so dying.

Sec. 2. Hereafter all the interments in the city cemetery on Hart's Island shall be in trenches, to be numbered consecutively, commencing with number one; every such trench shall contain one hundred and fifty bodies and no more, and each coffin shall be numbered by figures to be made of iron or other metal, or branded into the lid or cover of said coffin so as to be indelible, in the manner shown in the annexed diagram, viz.: Each trench shall be constructed running in a direction from east to west; shall be of a size sufficient to contain the said number of one hundred and fifty bodies, which shall be laid therein in the order following, to wit: No. 1 at the northeast corner; No. 2 adjoining, and so on in regular order until No. 25 is deposited, when a layer of earth shall be placed on the twenty-five coffins thus deposited; No. 26 shall then be placed at the southeast corner, directly in the rear and in a line with No. 1; No. 27 adjoining, and so on until No. 50 is interred, which will be directly in the rear and on a straight line with No. 25; then covered with a layer of earth similar to those numbered from 1 to 25, thus completing the first stratum of coffins in the trench. No. 51 shall then be placed directly over No. 1, No. 52 over No. 2, and so on until No. 75 is interred over No. 25, then covered as before from 1 to 25; No. 76 being placed directly over No. 26, and so on in the regular order until No. 100 is interred directly over No. 50, thus completing the second stratum of coffins. No. 101 shall then be placed directly over Nos. 1 and 51, and so on in regular order until No. 125 is placed directly over No. 75. This half of the trench shall then be permanently covered. No. 126 shall then be placed directly over Nos. 26 and 76, and so on in regular order until No. 150 is placed directly over Nos. 50 and 100, when the trench shall be considered full and finally covered. A new trench, to be numbered trench No. 2, shall then be commenced and filled in the manner above described, and succeeded by trench No. 3, and so for the future in this and all other of the city cemeteries. At the head of each tier of coffins shall be placed a proper and durable board of stone, with the numbers corresponding with the numbers on such coffins placed therein, with figures made of iron or other durable metal, or branded thereon in such a manner as to be indelible. Each trench, when completed, and the number placed at the head of each tier of coffins, shall be inclosed by a substantial fence, leaving a space sufficient to pass between it and the head-boards, to admit of the passage of two persons, to afford an opportunity to inspect each head-board to ascertain the numbers thereon.

Sec. 3. A register of burials shall be kept by the superintendent or other persons in charge of the city cemetery, which shall be so arranged that the name of each person interred shall be numbered to correspond with the numbers on the head-boards of the tiers of coffins deposited in each trench, and shall be accessible at all reasonable times, for the inspection of the public or the use of any person desiring to ascertain the particular place in which any person may be buried. A duplicate copy of such register shall be kept in the offices of the Commissioners of Public Charities and the Commissioner of Correction.

Sec. 4. All ordinances of the former Municipal and Public Corporations consolidated in the City of New York inconsistent or conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 P. M., May 10, 1900, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

Present—President Haffen, Councilman Murray and Alderman McGrath.

## HEARINGS.

*Acquiring Title to Proposed Park Adjacent to Williamsbridge Reservoir.*  
The following communication was read:

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS,  
NO. 21 PARK ROW,  
April 21, 1900.

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFEN, President, Borough of The Bronx:

DEAR SIR:—In accordance with the action taken by this Board at the meeting held on the 18th instant, I enclose herewith, for the action of the Local Board, copy of a communication from the Secretary of the Bedford Park Taxpayers' Association, requesting that the City acquire for park purposes certain lands adjacent to the Williamsbridge reservoir.

I also inclose sketch showing the property referred to, which kindly return to this office when it has served your purpose.

A number of property-owners appeared in favor of the proposed park, providing the cost thereof was paid for by the City.

Alderman McGrath inquired as to the probable cost of the improvement, whereupon Mr. D. A. McCormick stated that the petitioners had not given this question minute consideration.

President Haffen stated that the park would have to be first laid out on the final maps before title could be acquired, and on motion of Alderman McGrath it was,

Resolved, That the petition of D. A. McCormick, Secretary, Bedford Park Taxpayers' Association, dated April 13, 1900, be returned to the Board of Public Improvements to be sent back to the petitioners for an approximate statement of cost, and for an expression of their desire as to whether it shall be borne by the City, or paid for by assessment, in the event that the maps be altered to show the land as a park.

*Mohagan Avenue, Acquiring Title, from One Hundred and Eighty-second Street to Southern Boulevard.*

Petition of Henry Mahaken and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Murray, was laid over for one week.

*Maple Avenue, Acquiring Title, from Tremont Avenue to East One Hundred and Eighty-second Street.*

Petition of John W. Cornish and others was read, and on motion of Alderman McGrath, was laid over for one week.

*Tennings Street, Change of Line, from Edgewater Road to Bronx River.*

On motion of Alderman McGrath, the matter was laid over for one week.

*Moine Monument Site.*

Subject-matter ordered to be advertised for hearing.

*Improving Park at Franklin Avenue, Fulton Avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street.*

On motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Commissioners of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, that the small park at Franklin avenue, Fulton avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, be improved as soon as possible by having the same graded, sodded and trees planted thereon.

*Port Morris Railroad, Depression of Tracks, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Street and Whitlock Avenue.*

Councilman Murray urged that the above matter be again recommended to the Board of Public Improvements. The Secretary informed the Board that on November 1 last the Board of Public Improvements referred the matter to the Corporation Counsel, requesting the latter to conduct the necessary proceedings and to represent the city authorities before the State Board of Railroad Commissioners.

The Secretary was directed to inquire from the Corporation Counsel as to how far the matter had progressed.

*Court-house at Third Avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-first Street.*

Mr. Edgar Ketchum appeared and urged that some further action be taken toward having the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriate sufficient money for the construction, furnishing and equipment of the New Court-house at Third avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-first street. After some discussion, President Haffen appointed the Local Board a committee to call upon the Mayor and request him, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to hasten the appropriation for the above work.

*Cypress Avenue, Regulating and Grading, from the Bronx Kills to East One Hundred and Forty-first Street.*

Petition of H. B. Hall and others was read and, on motion of Councilman Murray, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Cypress avenue, from the Bronx Kills to East One Hundred and Forty-first street, be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built and fences erected, where necessary; and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*East One Hundred and Forty-first Street, Paving with Asphalt on Concrete Foundation, between Brook Avenue and Cypress (Trinity) Avenue.*

By Alderman McGrath—

Resolved, That, on petition of Stephen J. Egan and others, the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Forty-first street be paved with asphalt on concrete foundation; and be it further

Resolved, That the resolution for paving East One Hundred and Forty-first street with sheet asphalt, from Brook avenue to Concord avenue, and with vitrified brick, between Concord avenue and Southern Boulevard, adopted by this Board on December 21, 1899, be and the same is hereby rescinded, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Mount Hope Place, Paving with Telford Macadam, between Jerome Avenue and Anthony Avenue.*

Petition of F. A. Reis and others was read and, on motion of Councilman Murray, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Mount Hope place, between Jerome avenue and Anthony avenue, be paved with telford macadam, and that the cost thereof be assessed against the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Bridge on Line of Southern Boulevard over Tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad (Port Morris Branch).*

By Councilman Murray—
