MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting Held on Monday, October 10, 1910.

Present-President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh. The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided. On motion, the

minutes of the meeting held October 5 were approved.

The Commission then considered the request of the Supervisor of the City Record for an amendment of the classification by including in the exempt class the positions of Editor, Stationer and Inspector. After consideration of the matter the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Supervisor and state that the Commission was of the opinion that the positions should remain in the competitive class, but that owing to the reorganization of the office and the inception of certain important work, the first appointments might be made under the provisions of paragraph 5 of Rule XII., if persons possessing the requisite qualifications should be nominated.

James F. Conley, of 135 Keap st., Brooklyn, appeared before the Commission and requested that his application for the position of Attendance Officer be accepted. It appeared that Mr. Conley had been summoned before the Commission on August 3, but had failed to do so, whereupon his application had been rejected. On motion, it

Resolved, That the action of this Commission in rejecting the application of James F. Conley for the position of Attendance Officer be and the same hereby is rescinded. Samuel Finkelman, of 486 Sackman st., Brooklyn, having failed to appear, as directed, to supply certain information relative to an arrest mentioned in his application for the position of Attendance Officer, on motion, the application was ordered

Walter Pinkney, of Richmond terrace, Staten Island, appeared before the Commission relative to the statement of one Luke C. Chappell, of 118 Koe st., West Brighton, S. I., that it was necessary to secure the endorsement of a "district leader" in order to obtain an appointment in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond. Mr. Pinkney stated that he had never made any such assertion, did not believe the same to be true, and knew nothing whatever of the matter. The Secretary was directed to inform the Civil Service Reform Association (through whom

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the report to his Honor, the Mayor, in accordance with section 1544 of the Charter.

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 6, stating that the last ratings had been placed on the papers in the examination for Transitman. on October 13, 1910. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Transitman be and the same hereby is established as of October 13, 1910, the date on which the rating of the papers was completed

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 7, stating that the last ratings had been placed on the papers in the examination for Assistant Engineer, Bureau of Buildings, on October 7, 1910. On motion it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Assistant Engineer, Bureau of Buildings, be and the same hereby is promulgated as of October 7, 1910, the date on which the rating of the papers was completed.

Communications were presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 7 and 8, relative to the recommendation of the Commission that in examinations where experience was a factor, the experience paper should be rated before the remaining tests were given, so that all candidates who received less than 70 per cent, on that subject might be eliminated. After stating his objections to the plan proposed by the Commission, the Acting Chief Examiner repeated a few suggestions and recommendations made in previous reports. The matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 7, submitting, in accordance with the instructions of the Commission, an amended scheme of examination for the position of Patrolman. The matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 7, stating that Mr Richard H. Gillespie, who had been examined on August 29 for the position of Chief Engineer, Bureau of Highways and Sewers, Borough of The Bronx. had successfully passed his examination with a percentage of 80. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the requirement of competition be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the position of Chief Engineer of Highways and Sewers, Office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and the appointment of Mr. Richard H. Gillespie, to take effect October 1, be and the same hereby is approved under the provisions of paragraph 5, Rule XII.; it being the opinion of the Commission that competition at this time is not practicable, and that Mr. Gillespie is a person of high and recognized attainment in the desired qualities.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 10, recommending, after consultation with Commissioner Driscoll, the following subjects and weights for the examination for Inspector of Weights and Measures: A general paper (including a knowledge of duties, intelligence test and the writing of a report), 6; arithmetic (to include a knowledge of the metric system and a detailed knowledge of weights and measures), 4. On motion, the recommendation was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 7, recommending the following subjects and weights for the examination for Court Stenographer: General dictation (rating to be based on accuracy of transcription from notes taken at a given speed), 6: Special dictation (rating to be based on speed and on ability to read back notes at once), 4. The recommendation was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 7, recommending the following subjects and weights for the examination for Inspector of Carpentry and Masonry: Technical, 6; Experience, 4. 75 per cent to be required on the technical paper and 70 per cent. on all. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated October 8, recommending that Guy W. Culgin, of 165 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, be marked qualified upon the eligible list of Assistant Engineer, Bureau of Buildings. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated October 10, relative to the request of Mr. Raymond B. Fosdick, Commissioner of Accounts, that an examination be held as soon as possible for promotion to third grade Clerk in his office. The report stated that an examination had been requested to meet the requirements of an amended Budget schedule which made it necessary to fill at once, by promotion, a vacancy existing in the third grade, and recommended that the examination be ordered, in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 8a. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated October 6, relative to the eligibility for certification of the persons whose names appeared on the eligible list for promotion to Matron in the Department of Correction. The report stated that the following named persons appearing upon the eligible list were no longer in the Service: Workhouse—Marie Casey, Edith Fraquelli, Etta Hayes, Grace A. Keegan. Penitentiary—Sarah M. Leahy, Kate Downey. District Prisons—Marie T. Kelly. City Prison—Mary K. Merrifield. That the following, whose names appeared upon the eligible list, should not be certified, for the reason that their positions were included in the Non-Competitive Class at the time of the examination: Teresa M. Keaveney, Margaret Kendrick, Margaret Kerin, Minnie A. Bartels; and that the following named persons were the only ones eligible for certification under the rules: Workhouse—Annie Trainor, Mary Leahy. District Prisons—Elizabeth Kelly, Grace Hardy. City Prison—Mary L. M. Flattery, Mary E. Leahy.

The Examiner stated further that in future promotion examinations in the Prison Service of the Department of Correction, one general list should be established for the Department, as a division into lists for separate institutions, in his opinion, could not be considered a division into separate Bureau lists. On motion it

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to certify Annie Trainor, Mary Leahy, Elizabeth Kelly, Grace Hardy, Mary L. M. Flattery and Mary E. Leahy as eligible for promotion to the position of Matron in the Department of Correction and to remove all other names from the said list, in view of the foregoing report of the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated October 8, relative to the contention of President Dooling, of the Board of Elections, that under the law that Bard was not required to keep efficiency records for its graded employees, as provided by Rule XV. of the Civil Service Rules, as it was not a City Department. The report stated that under the circumstances the Examiner could take no further action with reference to the installation of the Efficiecy Record System in the office of the Board of Elections until the question of jurisdiction had been definitely established. After careful consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to advise the Examiner that the Commission could find no provision in the law authorizing it to require the Heads of Departments to follow any fixed system for the keeping of efficiency records, but that if the President of the Board of Elections refused to keep a permanent record of the efficiency of his employees, it would be without power, under the law, to conduct any promotion examinations for his Department.

On motion, the Secretary was authorized to permit the following named candidates to amend their statements as to the dates of birth, to conform with the proof submitted: Arthur O'Leary, 311 E. 73d st., New York City, Clerk; Joseph C. Farley. 194 McDonough st., Brooklyn, N. Y., Rodman, Board of Water Supply.

Commission, dated October 10, stating that at a meeting of the said Board held on October 6, action upon the Commission's resolutions had been taken as follows:

1. Amending the classification by transferring from the competitive to the exempt class the position of Chief of the Bureau of Licenses; continued on the calendar. 2. Cleaning; approved. 4. Waiving the limitation of compensation fixed by paragraph 6 of Rule XII. in the case of John H. Gregory, and authorizing his employment as a Designing Engineer on sanitary works in the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission at a total compensation not to exceed \$6,000 in any one year; approved.

5. Authorizing the Department of Docks and Ferries to continue the services of Harold D. Force, Expert Accountant; approved.

The communication was ordered filed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII. Mr. Leonard Meyerson, of Valhalla, N. Y., be and he hereby is excepted from examination to render expert service as Stenographer in the Board of Water Supply, provided that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated October 4, notifying the Commission of the following appointments under the provisions of paragraph 7 of Rule XII.; John Walsh, Miner; Harold T. McCoy, Clerk, first grade; Alfred W. Still, Janitor. The appointments were approved.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated October 4, stating that on October 27, 1910, the action taken by the Board on July 12, 1910, dismissing Laurence J. 

The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual devolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the pur-chaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demoli-tion shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The ex-terior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

Where party walls are found to exist between

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board et or fraud, and that no member of the Board et Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or

the consent, in writing, of two householders of freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
