No. 210½.

AN ORDINANCE establishing a public employment bureau in the Department of Licenses.

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:*

Section 1. There shall be a Public Employment Bureau in and for The City of New York, attached to the Department of Licenses, with the principal office in the Borough of Manhattan, and a branch office in such other boroughs as may be deemed necessary and designated by the Commissioner of Licenses for the purpose of aiding unemployed persons in securing employment and employers of labor in securing employees, but no fee shall be charged by said Bureau, or any officer or employee thereof for such purpose.

Section 2. The employees of said Public Employment Bureau shall consist of such Assistants and Clerks as may be found necessary for properly carrying on the work of said Bureau, and they shall be appointed and removed by the Commissioner of Licenses in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed and established pursuant to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter.

Section 3. There shall be kept in the principal office of said Bureau and in each and every branch office thereof such system of records as may be necessary properly to record and classify, according to trade or profession, (1) all applicants for positions; (2) all positions to be filled as reported to said Bureau; (3) all persons sent to those seeking employees; (4) all such persons who secure employment, and (5) such other records as the Commissioner of Licenses deems necessary. A report of the transactions of each branch office shall be transmitted each day to the principal office of the Public Employment Bureau in the Borough of Manhattan.

Section 4. The Public Employment Bureau shall, in so far as it is feasible, co-operate with such employment bureaus or intelligence offices as now exist, or which are now or may hereafter be established and conducted by the United States or the State of New York.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE relative to the abandonment of Fulton Market.

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:*

Section 1. All that lot, piece or parcel of land lying and being in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and bounded on the north by Beekman st., on the east by South st., on the south by Fulton st., and on the west by Front st., heretofore set aside by this Board as a public market and designated as "Fulton Market" is hereby declared to be no longer suitable for that purpose and such designation is hereby in all respects cancelled and revoked; and the President of the Borough of Manhattan is hereby authorized and directed to discontinue the maintenance thereof as such public market and surrender the said lands and buildings thereon erected to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for any other public purpose or for sale in the manner provided by law.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:*

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 20, 1914, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), to provide means for improving the grounds assigned to the College of The City of New York, and located at Convent and Amsterdam aves., between 136th and 138th sts., upon which the Lewisohn stadium is to be erected, and for equipping the pavilions of the stadium with shower baths and toilets, said improvement of site to include the removal of earth and rock, the drainage of the field, the excavation of trenches and other work necessary to make the field ready for use, also for building a retaining wall upon which to place the fence, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Provided, however, that no part of the proceeds of the corporate stock herein authorized shall be available until after the Board of Estimate has approved forms of contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of cost pertaining to the same and that no part of such proceeds shall be used for the payment of fees of any architect, engineer or expert until after a contract with such architect, engineer or expert has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no part of the proceeds of corporate stock herein authorized shall be used for payment of any salary or wage of departmental employees, except after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and in accordance with the schedules to be adopted by said Board; and be it further

Resolved, That the Trustees of the College are directed to submit to this Board for its approval forms of contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of cost, prior to advertising for bids for work chargeable to the proceeds of the corporate stock herein authorized, and the Trustees are also directed to submit to this Board for its approval all preliminary and final agreements with an architect or architects, engineer or engineers, expert or experts, whenever such agreements or contracts are chargeable against corporate stock herein authorized.

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:*

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 20, 1914, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of



corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), to provide additional means for the construction and equipment of a new County Court House at New Brighton, in the Borough of Richmond, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Richmond, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Richmond is directed to submit to this Board for its approval forms of contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of cost prior to advertising for bids for work chargeable to the proceeds of the corporate stock herein authorized, and said President is also directed to submit to this Board for its approval all preliminary and final agreements with an architect or architects, engineer or engineers, expert or experts, whenever such agreements or contracts are chargeable against corporate stock herein authorized.

## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING MAY 2, 1914.

### THREE MONTHS' PROGRESS.

At the request of the Mayor, a report has been prepared dealing with the activities of the Department of Health under the new administration. Inasmuch as this report gives such a good insight into the multifarious duties and problems confronting the Department, it is here reproduced in full.

*The Mayor of The City of New York:*

Sir—The following summary of administrative activities in this Department since February 1st is respectfully submitted:

#### Publicity.

In order to keep the public advised of the scope and effect of the activities of the Department the systematic preparation of "Publicity Notes" has been instituted. A series of popular weekly articles has been successfully inaugurated in the daily press on the subject of pure food. The co-operation of the newspapers is appreciated by the Department and is of distinct advantage to the public.

#### Monthly Requisitions.

To facilitate the systematic and periodic consideration of departmental needs, and for the purpose of economizing time, heads of bureaus have been directed to prepare requisitions monthly, except in unforeseeable emergencies.

#### Sale of Laboratory Products.

In view of the frequency of requests for the free distribution of laboratory products to municipalities and hospitals outside of The City of New York the Department has adopted the policy of using "all its resources for the protection of the health of the City," at the same time declaring its willingness "to co-operate with other municipalities and states in special emergencies." It has been ordered also that "services performed for other communities shall be duly compensated."

#### Care of Contagious Diseases in Institutions.

A special inspection of each general and special hospital, home for incurables, orphan asylum, dispensary and similar institution in the City was undertaken for the purpose of ascertaining the manner in which these institutions are complying with section 140 of the Sanitary Code, which requires that in every public hospital and dispensary in The City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms for the temporary isolation of persons suffering from infectious diseases. On the basis of this study it is proposed to draft suitable regulations for the care of contagious diseases in all public and semi-public institutions in the City. Consideration will also be given to the transfer of such cases from private and public institutions to the hospitals of the Department of Health.

#### Physical Examination of Employees.

In order to safeguard and improve the health of the employees of the Department plans have been prepared for the physical examination of all the employees. In this way cases of unsuspected disease will be discovered, treatment will be begun and preventive measures inaugurated. All cases of absence on account of illness will be investigated, emergency treatment to employees taken ill while on duty will be administered and constant supervision exercised over the health of the employees.

The results of the examination will be tabulated and the statistics, with comments, will appear in one of the departmental publications.

Details of the plan were described in the *Weekly Bulletin* March 28, 1914.

#### Other Welfare Activities.

Another important feature of the welfare work is the establishment of a lunch room where the employees of the department will be furnished wholesome and well-cooked food at reasonable prices. The roof of the department's building is to be utilized for recreation during the noon hour. A course of lectures is being arranged to inform the employees concerning the activities of the various City departments. Arrangements are being made to supply proper facilities to the employees for cashing their monthly checks. It is also the intention of the department to provide convalescent care for its employees.

#### Bonding of Employees.

Instructions were issued to protect the City by bonding a number of department employees who handle considerable amounts of cash money.

#### Reorganization of the Board of Promotions.

As previously constituted the Board of Promotions consisted of three bureau chiefs. All bureau chiefs are now members of the Board of Promotions; sub-



committees representing two or more bureau chiefs are to deal as far as possible with advancements and promotions involving the interests of more than one bureau.

The plan of the reorganized Board of Promotions has been approved by the Civil Service Commission, which has adopted the scheme as a model for use by other City departments.

#### *Authorized Representative Named for Each Borough.*

The Assistant Sanitary Superintendents were named as the "local borough representatives of the Executive of the department" and were authorized to represent the department in dealing with matters of purely local or borough concern. Previously the borough officers of the department were without recognized heads.

#### *Control of Appropriations for Supplies Established.*

In order to show each chief of bureau precisely where his bureau stands in the matter of supplies, and whether in a given month goods have been consumed in excess of the available appropriation for any particular purpose, a form was inaugurated for monthly distribution showing the following facts:

1. Amount of annual appropriation for supplies (each appropriation item to be separately stated).
2. Amount of monthly appropriation calculated as one-twelfth of annual appropriation.
3. Amount of requisitions, item by item, during the month covered by the report.
4. Amount available for the period since the beginning of the fiscal year (on a pro rata basis).
5. Amount actually used since the beginning of the fiscal year.

#### *Circulation of Bulletins Increased.*

With the aid and approval of the Supervisor of the City Record the edition of the *Weekly Bulletin* of the department was increased from 2,000 to 10,000 copies. Since March 1st a copy of the *Bulletin* has been sent to every practicing physician in Greater New York and to all institutions with which the department has official relations.

#### *Advertisement of Exempt Positions.*

All medical positions in the Department, exempt from Civil Service regulations, are now advertised in the *Weekly Bulletin*, and no appointments in this class are to be made until such positions have been thoroughly advertised. Twenty-three applications were obtained for a recent vacancy.

#### *Better Control of Whooping Cough.*

A plan for the supervision and treatment of cases of whooping cough has been developed. A survey of available facilities was first made, and rules and regulations have since been promulgated, under which dispensaries, both public and private, may treat cases of whooping cough with due regard to sanitary requirements. Hospital facilities for a limited number of cases have been made available at Willard Parker Hospital.

#### *Distribution of Clinic Employees.*

A study has been inaugurated of the distribution of physicians and nurses among the various tuberculosis clinics, with relation to service required and performed.

#### *Uniform Medical Organization in Hospitals.*

The Medical Boards of Willard Parker and Kingston Avenue Hospitals have been requested to appoint a Conference Committee to consider and report upon a model form of medical organization, designed to meet the needs of the Department in its present and future hospitals for contagious diseases, recommendations to be submitted to the Board of Health not later than May 15th, 1914. The proposed recommendations are to include a number of specific recommendations designed to enhance the efficiency of the medical service.

#### *Accounting Control Over Sale of Laboratory Products.*

The Department has inaugurated a better system for controlling the sale of and the collection of money for laboratory products, inquiry having shown that a number of functions, which should have been entrusted to three or more men, were performed by a single individual, with the result that collections were not properly made.

#### *Substitution of Written for Oral Orders.*

Inquiry having indicated that in some of the divisions of the Department important instructions to groups of workers had been given orally, in so informal a manner that it would be impossible to prove conclusively when such instructions were issued, to whom issued and with what emphasis, heads of bureaus were instructed that all orders which are equivalent to rules and which affect groups of workers should invariably be reduced to writing and formally promulgated.

#### *Clean Glasses in Saloons and at Soda Fountains.*

A committee is at work upon a draft of an amendment to the Sanitary Code to insure the sanitary washing of glasses in saloons and in all stores where beverages are dispensed.

#### *Regular Inspection of Roof Tanks.*

The annual inspection of roof tanks has been substituted for irregular inspections; a card index record, with street addresses, has been inaugurated to show the actual performance of this work.

#### *Authority Fixed in Cases of Absence.*

Bureau heads have, as requested, designated subordinate officers to act as chiefs when prompt bureau action is required on such matters as may come up during the absence of the titular chief.

#### *Lodging House Inspection Increased.*

The number of inspections of lodging houses has been increased and the rules and regulations of the Department in relation thereto are being systematically enforced.

#### *Visits to Homes of Discharged Patients.*

Beginning April 1st 1914, all cases of scarlet fever, diphtheria and measles discharged from the hospitals of the Department of Health are being at once revisited by the District Nurse of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases to determine the condition of the patient on discharge (as to infectivity, etc.) and the home conditions of the family. Advice will be given as to care of convalescent patients and, if necessary, the family will be referred to the proper charitable organization for financial aid and other assistance. At least one additional visit will be made after the expiration of the incubation period of the disease in question to ascertain if any secondary cases have developed.

#### *Home and Hospital Treatment Compared.*

A study has been made to ascertain what proportion of secondary cases follow the various contagious diseases when the patients are treated at home and when they are removed to a hospital. The net results are here shown:

#### *Circular for School Children.*

The Department has prepared and is distributing 800,000 copies of a circular of information on "Advice and Instructions Regarding Contagious Diseases," so worded as to be suitable for distribution among the school children of the City.

#### *District Organization Study.*

A study is being made of the activities of the Department in the several boroughs of the City on a district basis. The object of the study is to construct an analytical report, showing all the functions performed by the Department of Health during a given period, in a typical City district, with a view to possible changes in the Department's administrative methods, and as a guide to schools and institutions which are interested in the training of public health officers.

#### *Post-Graduate Work in Hospitals.*

The organization of a society for clinical study has been ordered in each of the hospitals of the Department. Each member of the staff will hereafter be expected to devote himself, during his spare hours, to the pursuit of some special topic or branch of medicine, and will be granted leave of absence from the hospital during stated hours each week for the practical pursuit of the special subject assigned to him. A higher grade of medical service is expected to be the result of this post-graduate work.

#### *Social Betterment of Hospital Nurses.*

With the object of affording stimulation to the nursing staffs of the hospitals of the Department, a committee has been formed to institute lectures, courses of study, forms of entertainment and tours of observation for the Nurses employed in the several hospitals of the Department.

#### *Contagion Among Hospital Employees to be Analyzed and Checked.*

The Superintendent of Hospitals has been directed to report, month by month, the number of contagious disease infections occurring among the physicians, visiting physicians, resident physicians, nurses and other hospital employees of the Department, presumably from contact with hospital cases. These reports will represent a study in comparative efficiency.

#### *Volunteer Publicity Work.*

In advance of the organization of the proposed Bureau of Public Health Education, an effort is being made to increase the educational work and influence of the Department by enrolling employees in the several bureaus as volunteer assistants to the physician in charge of publication work. A number of articles have already been contributed by volunteers and published.

#### *Study of Applications for Working Papers.*

A study is under way of records made in connection with the applications of children for working papers; it is proposed to determine the heights and weights of children, particularly with respect to nationality, and to gather for publication such other available social data as the records may yield. This study is being made without expense to the Department.

#### *Standardization of Drugs and Chemicals.*

A committee has been appointed to pass on specifications for drugs and chemicals submitted by the Bureau of Standards and Supplies.

#### *Study of Pension Problem.*

A committee of employees has been named to study the pension problem and to submit suggestions to the Mayor's Pension Committee, from the standpoint of participants of the pension fund of the Department of Health. The preliminary reports show that, on the present basis, the early exhaustion of the pension fund is inevitable.

#### *Co-operation with Police Department to Be Extended.*

It is proposed to obtain the co-operation of the Police Department in the enforcement of certain sections of the Sanitary Code. It has been pointed out that the Police Department could assist either by making arrests for obvious violations or by reporting such violations to this department, and that each Patrolman might cover his present "beat" as an active and alert health officer. The Commissioner of Police having expressed his approval of the plan, a committee was appointed to prepare a form of "Extracts from the Sanitary Code with Instructions to Police Officers." This form, which is now in preparation, will be submitted to the Police Commissioner for approval, and will then be printed and distributed to the police force.

#### *Regulation of River Baths.*

The department has adopted a programme for the better sanitation of river baths. The floating baths will be supplied this summer with clean water in place of diluted sewage. Other City departments, as well as private bath owners, have co-operated in the preparation of proper rules and regulations for all floating baths which use river water.

#### *Food Inspection to Be Systematized.*

The inspection of candy and preserve manufactories, etc., is being systematized. Special inspection forms are to be prepared for each distinctive kind of establishment. In future there will be continuous records for each manufactory. Previously "reports of such inspections did not show in detail every condition found on the premises examined; but where unfit foodstuffs were discovered or unclean method were witnessed or structural deficiencies were found, the examining Inspector made an individual report on such conditions."

#### *Printed Codes for Field Workers.*

Many Inspectors and other field workers of the department are without comprehensive printed codes of instructions. Inspectors are expected to carry in their minds many of the instructions given them. It is recognized that this is not an effective way to bring about the enforcement of the Sanitary Code of the City nor to guarantee the proper application of the rules and regulations of the department; hence, under a recent order, each bureau chief is directed to formulate a code of instructions, applicable to the field workers of his particular bureau, and to submit the same for approval before June 1st. Booklets will then be printed and each Inspector or Nurse will be required to carry his or her book of instructions at all times. Blank pages will be included in the booklets in which there may be entered systematically, such amendments as are adopted by the Board from time to time.

#### *New Rules for Day Nurseries.*

The Bureau of Child Hygiene is preparing a set of rules requiring each day nursery to have a medical officer and to adopt a systematic procedure for the medical inspection of the children cared for in such institutions. The spread of gonorrhoeal vaginitis and of other infections is thus to be checked.

#### *Official Representation at Conventions, Etc.*

In order to meet the frequent requests from department employees for permission to attend conventions and conferences in this City and elsewhere in the department's time and at the expense of the department, a committee was appointed to prepare an official list of annual conventions and meetings representation at which is clearly desirable in the interest of the department.

#### *Prompt Answers to Correspondence.*

Ordered that "any inquiry addressed to the department by a citizen should be answered or at least tentatively acknowledged on the day of its receipt, that such acknowledgment should invariably be made within twenty-four hours and that all communications received from outside sources by the department or by any of its bureaus should receive prompt attention."

#### *Uniform System of Hospital Accounting.*

The auditor has been requested to confer with the Department of Finance concerning the possibility of adopting for use in this and other City departments the "Uniform System of Hospital Accounting," which is in general use by representative voluntary hospitals in this and other cities.

#### *Objectionable Legislation Opposed.*

A delegate was appointed to attend the hearing before the Governor in Albany on April 13th on the objectionable bills popularly known as the "Mental Healing" or "Christian Science" bill and the "Osteopath" bill which bills the Governor has since vetoed.

#### *Study of City Stables Inaugurated.*

An investigation is now under way to determine the probable cost of conducting the systematic inspection of City stables, and to show the probable value of such inspection of the City in improved sanitation. At the request of the Department of Health, the Bureau of Municipal Research has assigned a student to undertake this study. If the report indicates the desirability of further action, the Department will consider the licensing of all stables.

#### *Development of Medical Inspection.*

The Department aims to promote the development of a system of periodic medical inspection of workers in large establishments, similar to the system of medical inspection of school children, which is now universally recognized as an indispensable part of an effective public health program. Employers and workers will be urged to co-operate with the Department in the establishment of medical inspection systems in industries in which such inspection is specially important from the standpoint of communicable disease. A comprehensive program will soon be announced.

#### *Uniform Absence Rules.*

The Board of Promotions and Discipline is endeavoring to work out a uniform method dealing with requests for "leave of absence with pay."

#### *State Inspection of Dairy Farms.*

Steps have been taken to inaugurate a comprehensive State system for the inspection and scoring of dairy farms, to replace the present costly and unsatisfactory system of municipal inspection, which only partly protects the City, and does not protect the other parts of the State.

#### *More Space in Bulletins.*

The weekly printing of the departmental directory in the *Bulletin* has been discontinued, in order to make space for more important announcements. The directory will be printed often enough to serve its purpose.

#### *Cleaner Streets.*

Inspectors and field workers in the Sanitary Bureau have been instructed to co-operate with the Department of Street Cleaning in preventing the throwing of ashes, garbage and other refuse into the streets.

#### *Discontinuance of Transfer of Contagious Cases From Out of Town.*

The Department has discontinued the practice of transferring cases of contagious diseases from out-of-town institutions to the City, on the principle that such institutions should be provided with suitable facilities for the isolation of contagious cases.

#### *Advisory Council Organized.*

The reasons for the formation of an Advisory Council to the Department were announced in the following terms:



"It is the aim of the Department to enhance its usefulness to the community. To accomplish this end without contact with citizens of diverse views and interests, without the aid of stimulating suggestions from experts in public health matters, and without candid and well-informed criticism, is impossible. It is with the hope of bringing these elements of progress into the daily life of the Department that an Advisory Council has been organized. The efforts of sub-committees of the Council will be logically directed along the lines of thought and action corresponding to the special tasks of the several departmental bureaus."

The names of the chairmen of departmental activities of the Advisory Council, together with certain other details of the plans were mentioned in the *Weekly Bulletin* of April 11, 1914.

#### *Inspection of Subway Toilets.*

Following a special inspection of subway toilets, steps have been taken to improve their sanitary condition.

#### *Control Over Meals Served in Hospitals.*

A definite policy has been established for controlling the furnishing of meals in hospitals, to others than regular employees.

#### *Protection Against Contagion.*

A new procedure has been adopted for more adequate protection against contagion by the use of an official seal on coffins containing bodies dead from contagious disease.

#### *Efficiency Studies in Co-operation With the Commissioners of Accounts.*

Through the assignment of a representative of the Commissioners of Accounts to this Department, by request, several fruitful investigations have been made, among which are the following:

(a) It was discovered that in a number of instances physicians had obtained laboratory products from the Department ostensibly for use among the poor, but that such products had not been used for the purpose indicated. The Department was advised that the evidence obtained would not warrant legal action. Twenty physicians were, however, sharply warned.

Incidentally this investigation showed that diphtheria antitoxin had been used in many cases which had not been reported to the Department as cases of diphtheria. In future, systematic comparison will be made between antitoxin receipt stubs and the records of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases, in order to insure promptness and accuracy on the part of the medical profession in the reporting of diphtheria.

(b) A study was made of the telephone requirements in the various offices of the Department in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Some slight saving has resulted.

(c) It was discovered that condemned food supplies were being surreptitiously removed from the off dock. The Police Department will be asked to co-operate with this Department in its efforts to prevent this practice.

(d) Comparative studies have been made of the work performed by physicians, nurses, nurse's assistants and cleaners in a number of milk stations.

(e) The use of motor and horse-drawn vehicles in the Department has been studied and facts ascertained which will be of assistance to the Department.

(f) A report has been made upon the work of the Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds.

(g) A study was made of the work of all of the employees attached to The Bronx Borough office. In one Bureau, a top-heavy organization was revealed.

#### *New Hospital in Queens.*

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was appealed to by the Commissioner to authorize the beginning of the construction work on the Queens Hospital, using for this purpose the site known as the Haacke Farm, which the City has owned for more than ten years. The appeal was heard and granted, and the contract for the construction of the first building of the Queens group was promptly signed.

#### *Approval of The Bronx Hospital Site.*

The Commissioner's recommendation of the purchase of the so-called Seton Falls site for a hospital for contagious diseases in the Borough of The Bronx has been approved by both the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

#### *Useless Positions Abolished.*

A number of paid visiting physicians attached to the hospitals of the Department were found to be giving merely nominal services and were requested to resign, which they promptly did. The positions thus vacated will not be filled. The Commissioner has avoided filling any vacant position the continued need of which could not be demonstrated.

#### *Appointment of Dr. Emerson as Sanitary Superintendent.*

The Commissioner succeeded in enlisting the interest of Dr. Haven Emerson, a physician of marked attainments, in work of the Department, and the Civil Service Commission having sanctioned Dr. Emerson's appointment without competitive examination, under paragraph 5, Civil Service Rule XII, Dr. Emerson was appointed Sanitary Superintendent on April 1st. Dr. Emerson has since been designated by the Board of Health to act as Deputy Commissioner, the duties of a Deputy being among those assigned by the Charter to the Sanitary Superintendent.

#### *Additional Revenue from Fees for Transcripts.*

The Department has adopted a new schedule of fees for searches and transcripts of records, etc. Additional income will be derived from this source. The new schedule will constitute no hardship upon the poor for the reason that searches are made and records furnished gratuitously whenever the circumstances of an applicant warrant it.

#### *Co-Operation in Reporting Venereal Diseases Secured.*

The Department has secured the co-operation of many previously refractory institutions and a large number of private practitioners in the notification of venereal diseases.

#### *Publicity for Successful Prosecutions.*

The Department has begun to publish a weekly record of its successful prosecutions for violation of the Sanitary Code.

#### *Common Free Lunch Fork Forbidden.*

Following the precedent established in the prohibition of the common drinking cup, the Sanitary Code has been amended so as to prohibit the use of common forks at free lunch counters.

#### *Sale of Bichloride of Mercury Regulated.*

The Board of Health has adopted a resolution forbidding the sale at retail of bichloride of mercury, which has caused the loss of many lives, except under certain restrictions and safeguards.

#### *Charges Against Department Hospitals Refuted.*

Sensational charges having been made that children treated in the hospitals of the Department of Health were illegally and cruelly inoculated at these hospitals with loathsome diseases, and the charge having further been made that the children were being experimented on, and that the alleged infections were the result of such experimentation, the Department investigated the published allegations and on February 27th, in an open letter, completely refuted the charges in question.

#### *Open-air Employment for the Tuberculous.*

Arrangements were made with the Mayor's Bureau of Licenses for the examination at the tuberculosis clinics of the Department of all applicants for licenses to conduct newsstands and peddle from push carts. No applicant whose sputum contains tubercle bacilli will be recommended for a license. It is the intention to recommend for such licenses those who, by reason of illness, would be benefited by open-air employment.

#### *Plan for Substituting Full Time for Part Time Service of Directors.*

One of the most important steps which the Department has taken with a view to increasing efficiency is the adoption of a plan for substituting full-time Chiefs for the part-time Chiefs in charge of the Bureaus of Child Hygiene, Infectious Diseases and Food Inspection. These bureaus have grown enormously in the last few years; their administration involves a vast amount of detail work, special scientific study, attendance at conferences, field work of a supervisory character, etc. It is my conviction that the work of these bureaus cannot properly be supervised or developed unless the bureau Chiefs are full-time workers, properly compensated, without distracting outside interests, and fully under control. This belief was expressed in a resolution submitted to and lately sanctioned by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the approval of which by the Board of Aldermen is confidently anticipated.

The additional expenditure involved in the change above referred to will be met by the use of funds already appropriated to the Department and heretofore used for the maintenance of unproductive positions which have been abolished.

#### *New Bureau of Public Health Education.*

Of equal importance to the changes just referred to is the inauguration of a

Bureau of Public Health Education. This bureau has been tentatively organized by the assignment of several qualified workers previously connected with other branches of the service. The Board of Estimate has approved the recommendation for the establishment of the new bureau. It is proposed to inaugurate this bureau without increasing the total Department Budget. The funds will be found, as in the case of the positions referred to in the preceding paragraph, by the abolition of unproductive positions. The establishment of the proposed Bureau of Public Health Education marks an important change in the attitude of the Department and in its relations to the public, and will serve to emphasize the educational side of the work of the Department.

#### *Regulations for Manufacture of Ice Cream, Etc.*

A comprehensive set of rules and regulations for the conduct of establishments which manufacture frozen products, such as ice cream, has been adopted by the Board with the advice of the Advisory Council and after conferences with representatives of the trade affected.

#### *Sanitary Control of Summer Camps.*

Rules formulated in relation to the maintenance of tents, camps and bungalows within the territory of the City provide, among other things, for adequate water supply, the proper disposal of waste liquids, privy accommodations and for garbage and refuse disposal.

#### *Regulation of Bathing Beaches.*

The Department has formally adopted and promulgated rules in relation to bathing beaches.

#### *Sanitary Control of City Cow Stables.*

Rules and regulations have been adopted by the Department for the sanitary control of cow stables in The City of New York.

#### *Sanitary Control of Cellar Stables.*

Rules and regulations have been adopted covering the operation of all cellar stables within the City limits.

#### *Standards for Midwifery Schools.*

The Department has adopted rules and regulations for the standardization of midwifery schools whose graduates are eligible for the midwife's license.

#### *Exposure of Foodstuffs Regulated.*

Rules and regulations have been formulated and adopted to prevent the improper and dangerous exposure of foodstuffs.

#### *Campaign for Vaccination.*

A careful survey was made to determine the need for vaccination in New York City. Information was obtained regarding typical sections of the population, such as tenement house dwellers, clerks, laborers, social workers, etc. As a result of this survey wholesale vaccination has been urged.

Two hundred thousand vaccination leaflets have been distributed and five hundred thousand more have been ordered.

Inmates of the Manhattan State Hospital (5,000 in number) were vaccinated by the Department of Health.

A number of large business houses and corporations have had or will have their employees vaccinated.

Physicians report an unprecedented demand for vaccination on the part of the well-to-do classes, who have apparently awakened to the need of self-protection.

#### *Co-Operation of Catholic School Board.*

The State law makes compulsory the vaccination of children attending public schools. This law does not apply to the parochial schools, which are under the jurisdiction of the Catholic School Board; the vaccination of the children attending these schools has hitherto been neglected. The great danger involved in this neglect was pointed out to the officials of the Catholic School Board, who promptly and cordially offered to co-operate with the Department. Arrangements have been made for the vaccination of one hundred and twenty-five thousand children attending the parochial schools in the five boroughs. This work will be completed before the end of May. The special staff employed in this work on school days will spend Saturday of each week vaccinating inmates of lodging houses.

#### *Department Express Service.*

A general express service, caring for the needs of the entire department, has been organized. It covers all boroughs, does all moving and delivers supplies to all offices, clinics, etc.

#### *Central List of Delinquent Physicians.*

A central delinquent list has been established of physicians who have failed to comply with the regulations of the Department of Health.

#### *New Registration Offices.*

New Branch Registration Offices have been opened for Infectious Diseases at 231 E. 57th st., Manhattan; 110 Broadway, Flushing, and 974 West st., Brooklyn.

#### *Control of Infectious Diseases in Hotels.*

Conferences have been held with the Association of Hotel Keepers, and a placard of information regarding infectious diseases has been prepared for use in hotels.

#### *Time of Diagnosticians Economized.*

The district Nurses now determine when cases of scarlet fever can be discharged from quarantine, thus making District Diagnosticians available for other and more important work.

#### *New Motor Ambulances.*

Arrangements have been made to replace the horse-drawn ambulances of the department by motor ambulances, two for Manhattan and Richmond, one for The Bronx and two for Brooklyn and Queens. These are almost ready for delivery.

#### *Placards for Institutional Guidance.*

Placards have been prepared to be posted in hospitals, institutions and dispensaries, giving full information regarding the management of infectious diseases and the requirements of the Department of Health. The Public Health Committee of the New York Academy of Medicine co-operated in the preparation of these placards.

#### *New Tuberculosis Clinics.*

New tuberculosis clinics have been opened in Flushing, L. I., Parkville, Brooklyn and Middle East Side, Manhattan.

#### *Appointment of Clinic Physicians.*

A uniform procedure for the appointment of clinic Physicians has been adopted, and all appointments are now made by the Board of Health.

#### *Control of Tuberculosis in Lodging Houses.*

Managers of lodging houses are now requested to notify this department of the removal of all cases of tuberculosis. Lodging house cases furnish one of the most difficult problems in the tuberculosis work of the department. This new procedure will make it possible to keep them under closer observation.

#### *Prompt Report and Investigation of Typhoid Cases.*

The system of personal assignment and report within twenty-four hours, which has given such good results in tuberculosis and contagious diseases, has been adopted in connection with the investigation of typhoid fever. All milk stores furnishing milk to families where a case of typhoid fever occurs, are now investigated by the Sanitary Police, with excellent results.

#### *Serological Laboratory Transferred.*

The Serological Laboratory, formerly located in the Carnegie Laboratory of the Bellevue University Medical School, has been removed to headquarters. Its work increases steadily, Wassermann examinations being made for a number of institutions, prisons, etc.

#### *Fight Against Quack Advertisements.*

The department has waged war against the advertisements of venereal quacks appearing in newspapers and in saloons. An advertisement offering free advice has been published in an afternoon paper, conferences have been held with representatives of the various liquor dealers' associations, their co-operation has been obtained, and advertising signs, similar to the advertisements above referred to, have been prepared, to be posted in the lavatories of saloons. The Evening Globe is assisting in this campaign. Steps have also been taken in support of bills for the suppression of publication of the advertisements of venereal quacks.

#### *Activities of the Bureau of Laboratories.*

The Bureau of Laboratories, since February 1st, has contributed an educational course to the men who are to collect milk samples for bacteriological and dirt testing; instructions to creamery managers in dirt testing; a preliminary report of experimental work on pertussis; recommendations in regard to the more efficient handling of infectious eye diseases in schools; experimental work on tetanus antitoxin, resulting in a more efficient handling of cases of tetanus or lockjaw; statistical studies for the purpose of aiding in the prevention of gonorrhoeal infections in the contagious disease hospitals.



**Co-operation of the Board of Education.**

Through the courtesy of the Board of Education, permission has been obtained to use, for any official business connected with this department, the telephones which are now being installed in all public schools of the City. All cases of acute contagion found in school or in absentee visit are now telephoned to the Borough offices and to the Inspectors on the day found.

**Examination of School Lunch Employees.**

Examination of attendants and student helpers engaged in the school lunch service has been instituted, with especial reference to tuberculosis, syphilis, diphtheria and typhoid carriers, or other infectious diseases.

**School Directory for Use of Inspectors.**

A printed directory of public, parochial and other free schools has been prepared, giving name, address, telephone number and registration of each school, to be used by Inspectors and Nurses in the Bureaus of Child Hygiene and Infectious Diseases.

**Vaccination Work Extended.**

Additional vaccination centres have been established without cost, by including all milk stations and children's clinics in addition to public schools.

**Co-operation With Department of Public Charities.**

Co-operation has been established between the authorities of institutions for dependent children, the Department of Health and the Department of Public Charities, to secure treatment for physical defects at Health Department and other clinics for children in these institutions. Information is currently given to the Department of Public Charities as to the result of physical examination of children in these institutions.

**Statistical and Other Studies in Child Hygiene.**

As a basis for more intelligent efforts to reduce infant mortality, detailed analyses of deaths under one year of age, by wards, age groups, disease groups and nationality groups have been inaugurated. Deaths from congenital diseases are tabulated and investigated to show reasons—social, medical or otherwise—for the high death rate from these causes. Experimental studies are being made in selected cases for physical examination, follow-up and treatment of children of pre-school age.

**Educational Activities of Child Hygiene Bureau.**

More extended instruction in the work of the Bureau of Child Hygiene is given to students and social workers from social and philanthropic organizations.

Lectures to supervising nurses have been expanded and now include social service work.

**Filing Birth Certificates.**

A campaign has been instituted against physicians and midwives for failure to comply with sections 1237 and 1239 of the Charter in filing certificates of birth.

**Office Congestion Avoided.**

An agreement has been made with the Department of Education, whereby children who seek admission into the public schools shall be entered temporarily on the rolls pending the receipt from the Department of Health of a certificate of birth in each case. This will do away with congestion at the Health Department offices in the City, especially at the time of opening of school.

**Study of Sanitation of Stores, Barber Shops, Etc.**

Fruitful special investigations have been made of premises where foodstuffs are prepared or sold in relation to sanitary conditions, and to insure compliance with section 46 of the Sanitary Code; of barber shops in relation to compliance with rules of the department; of department stores, in relation to compliance with sections 189 and 190; and of elevated railroad stations in relation to sanitary conditions.

**Evidence in Smoke Nuisance Cases.**

Photographs of violations of section 181 (smoke nuisance) by locomotives and railroads operating within the City limits, will hereafter be included in the evidence presented to the courts, and similar evidence will be obtained for violation of this section by factories, tugboats, etc.

**Mosquito Extermination.**

The "Mosquito Squad" has been placed under the direct supervision of the Sanitary Engineer and work by this squad, hitherto confined to Richmond, will hereafter be performed in all boroughs.

**Reorganization in Sanitary Bureau.**

In the Borough of Manhattan, the office of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent has been combined with that portion of the Sanitary Bureau under the supervision of the "Sanitary Inspector in Charge"; this combination will effect a considerable saving of effort and time, and will avoid the duplication of records.

**Unit Costs Ascertained.**

Statements have been completed showing the unit cost of functions and activities of the department; these figures will prove of value to the department. Departments of Health in other cities will be urged to follow suit, and valuable and instructive comparative data will, it is hoped, thus be obtained.

**Adulterated and Unfit Food.**

The efforts of the Food Division have been especially directed toward the suppression of adulteration of foodstuffs. Three hundred and forty-two samples have been obtained for analysis with a view to the suppression of the sale of adulterated food. Between February 1 and April 11, 1914, 268,100 pounds of meats have been seized and condemned as unfit for food; during the same time 2,375,694 pounds of food other than meats have been condemned and destroyed.

**Enforcing Milk Pasteurization.**

The active enforcement of the rules and regulations requiring pasteurization of all the raw milk excepting Grade "A" has been undertaken. Two hundred and fifty-two cases referred to the Corporation Counsel are now before the courts. As these cases are heard, it is found in almost every instance that the dealer is now complying with the regulations. The need for prosecution is almost at an end. At the present time scarcely three per cent. of the milk sold in this City is not pasteurized.

**Country Milk Inspection Districts.**

In order that the proper supervision and attention may be given to country pasteurizing plants and the necessary instruction imparted to those responsible for their maintenance and operation, the field has been laid in inspection districts (18 in number) and instructions have been given to Inspectors to visit each pasteurizing plant at least monthly. It is hoped that by this means the creamery employees who do not yet understand the principles and practice of pasteurization, may receive adequate instruction and that the desired results may be obtained.

**City Dairy Work.**

The constant inspection of City dairies has improved sanitary conditions at these places. Several of the dairies have earned permits for the production of "Grade A, Raw Milk."

**Control of City Pasteurizing Plants.**

The owners of City pasteurizing plants are required to keep records of the amount of milk pasteurized daily for each dairyman, and it is thus possible to ascertain if all of the milk produced by the City dairies is being pasteurized.

**Court Records of Violations of Pure Food Regulations.**

There has been installed in the Bureau of Food Inspection a system of records, known as "Previous Offenses and Dispositions," which records all criminal actions brought against persons who have violated sections of the Sanitary Code pertaining to foodstuffs. The information is taken from original court papers. This record shows the history of all cases instituted by Inspectors of foods in both Magistrates' Courts and Courts of Special Sessions. This record will not only serve as ready reference, but will prove valuable for statistical and legal purposes. Hereafter, when a dealer is charged with an offense, his "Previous Record of Arrests and Dispositions," together with the original court papers, from the file, will be sent to the prosecuting Inspector, so that he may be in possession of all necessary data for the proper presentation of the case to the Court. In this way, adequate punishment may be secured for the persistent violation of the law.

**Lectures for Milk Inspectors.**

Monthly lectures have been instituted for the instruction of Inspectors attached to the division of country milk inspection.

**New Kitchen Buildings for Kingston Avenue Hospital.**

The plans of the proposed kitchen building for the Kingston Avenue Hospital were modified so as to bring the cost of the building within the available appropriation. Contracts for the erection of the building have been let.

In the foregoing report no reference is made to the routine administrative work of the department. The purpose of this report is to indicate the departmental progress since February 1st. Respectfully submitted.

**REGULATIONS CONCERNING TENTS, CAMPS AND BUNGALOWS.**

In order to protect the health of those spending the summer in tents, camps

or bungalows within The City of New York, the Board of Health recently passed rules and regulations providing for the observance of certain minimum sanitary requirements. This includes the adequate supply of pure drinking water, sanitary privy accommodations, disposal of liquid wastes and all garbage and refuse.

**BETTER PROVISION FOR CASES OF WHOOPING COUGH.**

A plan has been developed for the supervision and the treatment of cases of whooping cough by the hospitals and dispensaries of this City. A survey has recently been completed of the institutions, hospitals and dispensaries of New York City, with a view to determining what institutions treat whooping cough at the present, what institutions desire to maintain whooping cough clinics, and what facilities they possess for dealing with this disease. Altogether, one hundred and sixteen were visited; of these, seventy-eight reported that they have no cases of whooping cough applying for treatment; only five have a district physician attending whooping cough patients at their homes.

It is interesting to note that sixty-seven institutions admitted that their physicians did not report all cases of whooping cough to the Department of Health. This is probably due to the fact that fifty-two institutions were not clear as to who really attended to the reporting of such cases; only four institutions maintain and support classes for treating cases of whooping cough on the premises, three of these were hospitals and one a dispensary.

In reply to an inquiry as to whether a special class for the treatment of whooping cough would be established if permission was granted by the Department of Health, fifty-five institutions answered definitely "no"; forty-six were "doubtful," and fifteen said "they would consider the matter."

These answers probably give the reason why whooping cough is so prevalent in this City, and why it has thus far failed of administration control. The Department of Health is taking up the matter with the Associated Out-Patient Clinics and the hospitals, and it is hoped that before long adequate facilities for the care of patients suffering from whooping cough will be provided.

**MOSQUITO EXTERMINATION IN ALL THE BOROUGHES.**

Mosquito extermination through the drainage of marsh lands was undertaken by the City in 1905, the work commencing in the Borough of Richmond. To date over \$100,000 has been spent by the City for ditching and the maintenance of drainage channels in that borough. During this time the property owners of the borough have not directly contributed anything to the cost of the work, although the breeding of mosquitoes has practically ceased in Staten Island.

Similar work was started in the Borough of Queens in 1908, but the City has thus far spent less than \$3,500, while the citizens of Queens, on orders issued by this Department, have spent over \$40,000. In the Bronx anti-mosquito work was started in 1909, and since that time the City has spent \$6,500, while the citizens of the borough, on orders issued by this Department, have spent nearly three times that sum.

At the present time certain areas in the Bronx and Queens are so pestered by mosquitoes, because of insufficient drainage, that it seems proper for the Department to immediately undertake drainage work with the force of laborers at its disposal. It is the intention of the Department to have drainage done in every instance by private owners, where such owners can be promptly discovered. The Borough of Richmond will not be discriminated against in maintenance work, but, until the other boroughs are put in as good condition as Richmond, no new construction work by the City is likely to be undertaken there.

**PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS OF EMPLOYEES.**

The Department is compiling a list of corporations and firms which employ physicians for the purpose of making periodic physical examinations of employees.

Readers of the Bulletin will confer a favor upon the Department by sending the name of any corporation or firm which should be included in this list, adding, wherever possible, the name of the physician in charge of the work and the date of its inauguration.

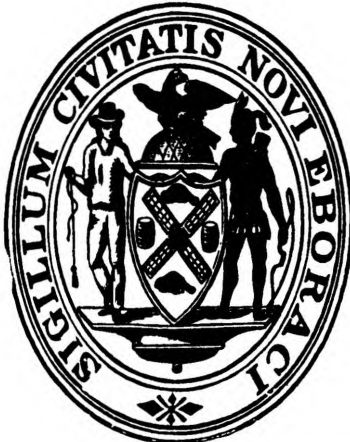
**Claims Under Special Statutes.**

During the past quarter the Board has taken testimony, visited the property and made awards for damages caused by changes of grade of streets under special statutes, as follows: Chapter 737 of the Laws of 1911, as amended by chapter 577 of the Laws of 1913; three awards, aggregating \$28,000, for damages to property occasioned by a change in grade of streets by reason of the location and construction of the new Manhattan Bridge.

**Claims for Damages Under the Charter.**

During the past quarter, under section 951 of the Charter, as amended, 218 claims were filed. The Board made awards in 101 cases, the awards aggregating \$50,435, which amount was added to the cost of the work and apportioned among the several assessment lists affected.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
