

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NEW YORK, January 18, 1881.

The Board met this day.

#### Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 8, 1881

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,503 as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 644 tenement houses, 86 private dwellings, 72 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 16 stables, 14 slaughterhouses, 1 lime kiln, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 1 fat-house, 2 lodging-houses, 1 mill, 1 gas main, 2 manure dumps, 10 sunken and vacant lots, 65 yards, courts, and areas, 146 cellars and basements, 203 waste-pipes and drains, 179 privies and water-closets, 3 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 1 garbage-dump, 1 public sewer, 6 other nuisances, 5 cisterns and cesspools, together with 6 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 525.

During the past week 219 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 63 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

47 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 186 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 166 houses, 166 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Twenty-two cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the ambulance corps.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 143 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 129 houses, 129 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

# Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 640 births, 48 still-births, 184 marriages, and 778 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 8, 1881. This shows an increase of 117 births, 45 marriages, and 105 deaths, and a decrease of 7 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 107 births, 5 still-births, 47 marriages, and 270 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week the deaths from measles decreased 4; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 1; tpyhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 12; bronchitis, 8; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 11; apoplexy, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; and suicide, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; diphtheat, 20; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 9; inanition, 6; rheumatism and gout 1; cancer, 5; phthis pulmonalis, 25; heart diseases, 3; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 18; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 11. The number of deaths from alcoholism and pneumonia was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 158 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 214 under two years; 313 under five years, and 59 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 41 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 40.23 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Report upon the Seizure of Unwholesome Meat.

JANUARY 18, 1881.

I beg to submit the following report on a seizure of unwholesome meat by Officers of this Bureau since the last meeting of the Board.

On the 11th instant Officers Mooney and Kennedy were detailed to find an old bakery somewhere in Thirty-eighth street near Eleventh avenue, where objectionable meat was said to be prepared for making bologna sausages.

After a prolonged search they gained admission to a cellar at 520 Tenth avenue, where they found four men engaged by lamplight in boxing meat for sausages, and being in citizens' clothes they persuaded the workmen that they were purchasers. They learned that the name of the proprietor was Julius Meyer, of 454 West Thirty-fifth street, and that evening Meyer agreed to furnish Kennedy with 100 pounds per diem, at 5 cents per pound. He admitted that the price was rather high, but promised to supply only the very best. On the 12th instant the above named officers, reinforced by Roundsman Wisebaum with officers Acker and Weisburger and the offal cart visited the cellar at 520 Tenth avenue and seized 81 quarters of cow beef and 8 baskets of boned beef, a total of 6,390 pounds, which were taken to the offal dock, where they were afterwards inspected by Dr. A. Liau-

The officers, two of whom are old butchers and former meat inspectors, speak of this material as "the worst they ever saw." Dr. Liautard, in his report which is appended, says "it is scarcely fit for feeding animals." The officers describe the stench in the cellar as sickening. "You could smell it out on the sidewalk."

It was learned that the business had been going on at this place for about 12 days, the men working with locked doors, day and night, since Sunday last, the material having been received and sent out in the night, so that the neighbors did not know that the business was going on until it was

Meyers says the animals were slaughtered in the country, and the officers agree that the beef was country killed. He has been held for trial by Judge Patterson in \$100 bail. All of which is respectfully submitted.

CHAPTER 123.

An Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-inic shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPART-MENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:
