NEW YORK, July 19, 1882.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor, and President of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Society, of which I have the honor to be President, has been engaged for the past seven years in taking to the seaside poor, sick infants, with the mother as nurse, and free of any cost to them. During that time it has taken about 60,000 women and children. It is supported by voluntary contributions of the charitable people of the city and vicinity, and has had from time to time a portion of the excise money. In consequence of the death of a number of the most liberal of the contributors its funds this summer are very low, and also from the fact of not having received any excise money.

We therefore respectfully ask of your Honorable Body a portion of the fund. We are in the midst of our summer's work, which is increasing, and, unless we get an immediate appropriation, we shall be compelled to turn away the sick children and close the Seaside Sanitarium. We need the

sum of \$3,000.

To the Commissioners of the Police Department of the City of New York:

SIRS—I have estimates from N. F. Palmer & Co. to put in the new steamboat for your Department one Hancock inspirator, No. 40, with all necessary stop-valves, strainers, pipe-fitting and labor, ready for service, for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars. This is for main boiler.

One No. 12½ for donkey boiler, complete, for the sum of \$50, and one No. 45 bilge ejector, with Bray's suction and discharge pipes complete, for the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars.

The No. 40 inspirator and No. 45 injector are very necessary—the inspirator to prolong the life of the boiler in always putting hot water into it, and the No. 45 ejector to pump the boat out while lying still lying still.

The No. 12½ inspirator could be dispensed with, but I would recommend to put all of them in.

SIR—I have the honor to submit to your Board the following facts and circumstances, showing the inadequacy of the appropriation for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices," for 1882:

In my departmental estimate I asked that the sum of \$110,000 be allowed for this appropriation, stating that an increase over the appropriation of \$102,000 for 1881, including transfers, was needed in consequence of the general rise in the prices of fuel and other supplies, and to meet extra demands in fitting up, supplying and keeping in order public offices.

In the final estimate the Board allowed the sum of \$93,000 (including \$23,000 for salaries), being \$17,000 less than the departmental estimate, and \$9,000 less than the amount appropriated and used last year. Since the 1st of January the prices of the various supplies to be provided from the appropriation, have not only been maintained, but in most instances further and largely increased; and the Department has to supply steam power and attendance for a new elevator in the Brownand the Department has to supply steam power and attendance for a new elevator in the Brownstone Building. Only a small proportion of the requisitions made on the Department for office furniture, supplies, law books, etc., have been filled so far, and the condition of the appropriation is such that all requisitions of that class must now remain unfilled.

I therefore earnestly request that the following sums be transferred to the appropriation for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices," from the several appropriations hereinafter named, from the purposes of which the same can be spared:

SIR—In my departmental estimate for 1882, I asked for an appropriation of \$300,000, for "Repairs and Renewal of Pavements and Regrading," and an appropriation of \$200,000 for "Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc.," and stated with considerable detail the very urgent reasons for granting these amounts. In the final estimate \$200,000 was allowed for the former, and \$150,000 for the latter appropriation. Since the departmental and final estimates were made the force and urgency of the reasons for asking the sums placed in my estimate have not been diminished, but have been much increased by circumstances which have occurred and now prevail. There has been a considerable advance in the prices of materials and labor required for the respective works, and the amount of work which can be accomplished with a certain appropriation is proportionately diminished. I believe even at the time when the estimates were under consideration, the members of your Board concurred in the opinion that \$300,000 could be expended with great benefit and profit to the public in repairing the pavements during the year. The Department is unable to make pavement repairs in response to the innumerable complaints and reports from citizens, the Police and the Health Departments, with the promptitude and thoroughness which the circumstances demand. demand.

The insufficiency of the appropriation for "Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc.," to maintain the entire system for distributing water in perfect condition, and to carry on with the requisite vigor the supervision and extension of the water meter system and the inspections of houses and water-fixtures to suppress or control waste, is even more palpable. The number of water consumers, and the demands and ways for using water, have been and are growing with

undiminished rate. Complaints of reduced and inadequate pressure in the delivery of water are increasing from day to day, calling for further and more ample means to suppress waste—the only method now available for meeting new demands for, and at the same time maintain, a fair distribution of water.

Under these circumstances I most earnestly request the Board to make use of an opportunity of supplementing the appropriations named, without increasing the burden of taxation, by transfering to "Repairs and Renewal of Pavements and Regrading" for 1882, the sum of Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), and to "Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, &c.," for 1882, the sum of Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), from unexpended balances of appropriations made to the Department of Street Cleaning for 1881, after July 5, 1881.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such line and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or

In order that the matter may be clearly understood, I have to inform and instruct you that the new rates in reference to water-closets are not intended to and do not apply to existing houses and fixtures, but will be applied to all new houses hereafter erected or completed, and to all existing houses where the water-closets and fixtures therein referred may hereafter be put in. These water-closet rate are to go into general effect May 1, 1883.

A PPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) finder severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in 'person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punnshable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
