mittee, shall be duly certified by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized to grant permits to Charles G. Moser and F. J. Baiss to empty privies with the new apparatus, and upon the plan proposed by them, so long as it shall appear that privies can be emptied by said apparatus without offense, and in compliance with section 102 of the Sanitary Code.

That Wilbur F. Lane, M. D., Physician in charge of the Reception Hospital, be directed to perform the duties of Assistant Sanitary Inspector, and is appointed to that office without additional compensation.

That all restrictions as to the hours for removing night-soil, and the routes of scavengers' carts and wagons, be suspended.

That the attention of the Board of Police be respectfully called to the fact that complaints are received by this Department that cattle are driven through streets above Fortieth street, at other hours than those designated by the Sanitary Code, and that said Board be respectfully requested to enforce that part of section 55 of the Sanitary

Code, which limits such driving to "between the hours of eight in the evening and two hours after sunrise the next morning," etc., etc.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 27, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,446, as follows:

10 public buildings, 639 tenement houses, 107 private dwellings, 140 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 7 stores and warehouses, 63 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 1 cemetery, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 55 yards, courts, and areas, 39 cellars and basements, 68 waste-pipes and drains, 129 privies and water-closets, 8 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 2 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 6 other nuisances, together with 82 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 437.

During the past week 46 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

33 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

96 permits were granted to scavengers to disinfect, empty, and clean privy-vaults.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 68 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 58 houses, 58 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

29 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 3 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending March 27, 1875:

Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 3; scarlet fever, 44; diphtheria, 63; small-pox, 49; and cerebro-spinal meningitis 5.

1,121 cans, 13 tanks, and 718 tubs of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the past week.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending March 27, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 10 carcasses; sheep, 1 carcass; hogs, 5 carcasses; veal, 105 pounds; and fish 400 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending March 27, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 605 burial permits for city deaths, 25 for bodies *in transitu*, and 51 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 605 deaths, 99 marriages, 449 births, 51 still-births, 25 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from Coroners. There were 29 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth-record, and 25 of death were issued from this Bureau; 4 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—The total number of deaths reported in this city during the week ending on the 27th inst. was 605. The total number verified for the week ending on the 20th inst. was 564. The increase last week occurred chiefly in hospitals, and in infants under one year of age. Though there were 157 deaths of infants under a year old registered last week, against 113 in the previous week, there was a decrease in the fatality of the contagious diseases of childhood, except in scarlatina, small-pox, and whooping cough, each of which gave some increased mortality. The death-rate in the week ending on the 20th inst. was equal to 28.20 per 1,000 yearly, and last week was at 30.25 per 1,000. The mean temperature was 31.7 degrees Fahr. last week, and 32.1 in the previous week. The mean for the first four weeks of March is 31.9 degrees. During these four weeks there were 401 deaths charged to pulmonary phthisis, 340 to pneumonia, and 132 to bronchitis.
