

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, MAYOR'S OFFICE—CITY HALL, TUESDAY, January II, 1876-2 o'clock P. M.

The Board met pursuant to the following call:

OFFICE OF THE MAYORALTY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CITY HALL, New York, January 8, 1876.

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1, of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Tuesday, January 11, 1876, at 2 o'clock P. M., in pursuance of a resolution adopted at meeting of September 27, 1875.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the provisions of section 112, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, Assessment Bonds of the City of New York, as authorized by chapter 397, Laws of 1852, and chapter 580, Laws of 1872, one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000).

## BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Friday, January 7, 1876, at 2:37 o'clock P. M.

Present-Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation; John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held December 23, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors with communications dated December 29, 1875, viz.:

1. Seventy-sixth street—Regulating and grading, from Fifth avenue to East river.

2. Thirty-sixth street—Paving, with Belgian pavement, from Tenth to Eleventh avenue.

Fifty-fifth street—Paving, with Belgian pavement, from Eleventh avenue to Hudson river.
 Sixty-sixth street—Paving, with Belgian Pavement, from Third avenue to Avenue A.
 Seventy-first street—Paving, with Belgian pavement, between Second and Third avenues.

Ninety-third street -Paving, with granite-block pavement, from Second to Fourth avenue. 7. Fifty-sixth street - Flagging north side of, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, opposite Nos.

339 and 341.

8. Seventh street—Flagging on both sides of, from Lewis street to East river.

9. Fifty-sixth street-Curbing, guttering, and flagging north side of, from Sixth to Seventh

10. Third avenue -Flagging west side of, between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets.

11. Eighty-third and Eighty-fourth streets-Sewers between Eighth and Ninth avenues, and in Ninth avenue, between Eighty-third and Eighty-fourth streets, with branch in Eighty-fourth street.

12. Fencing vacant lots on block bounded by One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, First and Second avenues.

13. Fencing vacant lots on north side of Sixty-ninth street, between Third and Lexington avenues, and on east side of Lexington avenue, between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed thereto, on motion of the Recorder, they were severally confirmed—all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating and grading Eighty-fifth street, from Eighth to Ninth avenue, received from the Board of Assessors with a communication dated December 29, 1875, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

A further communication was also received from the Board of Assessors dated January 7, 1876, transmitting objections filed to said assessment list by Messrs. Martin Zborowski and F. W. Lasak.

After hearing Mr. John Ely, attorney, in behalf of Mr. Lasak, on motion of the Comptroller,

said assessment list was laid over. The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating, grading, and super-structure of Avenue St. Nicholas, from the intersection of One Hundred and Tenth street, Sixth avenue and Avenue St. Nicholas, to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, received from the Board of Assessors with a communication dated December 31, 1875, and the objections to the same of the Academy of the Sacred Heart, Mary G. Pinkney, Wm. H. Gebhard, Thomas Faye, Henry A. Cram, Mayer and Sanders, Gutman, and others.

After hearing Mr. Charles E. Miller, attorney for the Academy of the Sacred Heart; Mr. C. B. Pierce, attorney for Mary G. Pinkney; Mr. John S. Davenport, attorney for Mr. Cram, Mr. Gutman, Mr. Gebhard, and Mr. Faye, in opposition to the assessment, on motion of the Comptroller, the said

assessment list was laid over.

The assessment list for regulating and grading Ninth avenue, from Eighty-third to Ninety-second street, to conform to the new grades established under chapter 226, Laws of 1871, received from the Board of Assessors with a communication dated December 29, 1875, and objections filed to the same by Messrs. Martin Zborowski and J. Watts Depeyster, were presented by the Comptroller.

Mr. Zborowski was heard in behalf of the objections filed by him.

On motion of the Comptroller, said assessment list was laid over.

At 4 P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.
