



The Supervisor of the CITY RECORD informed the Board that, although no call had been made by the annual requisition of the Court of General Sessions for letter heads and envelopes for Recorder Goff, he had made provision in the contract specifications to supply the Recorder with the same quantities as his predecessor had in 1894, and that the style of lithographing should be chosen by him. The Clerk of the General Sessions had made the special requisition of January 10, for larger quantities than were covered by the contract, not knowing of the contract provision. The Recorder had also asked that his paper be stamped, instead of lithographed, and the contractor had agreed to stamp it with a special design, the extra cost to be made up to him in part by an order for the paper called for by the special requisition additional to that on the contract.

The Supervisor also asked permission to give a direct order for the printing and binding of the report of the Department of Charities and Correction for 1893 on the same terms, proportionately, as those on which the report for 1892 was to be done under contract. He said that the "copy" for the report for 1893 had not reached him until after the printing contract was let, else it would have been included in the specifications. But advantage of the contract method could, he said, be taken in the way he suggested. The price for which the report of 1892 was to be printed was, he said, \$900. He said a saving of about \$500 was effected by the contract method. On motion of the Counsel to the Corporation and by a concurrent vote of the three officers, the Supervisor was directed to give an order for the printing and binding of the report of 1893 to the contractor for the report for 1892, at a price proportionate to the contract price for the latter.

The Supervisor stated that he was completing the contract specifications for stationery, and that in preparing them he was using his discretion as to the quantities of stationery needed, being guided therein by his knowledge of what had sufficed in the past. At times, he said, he substituted his judgment as to the quality of the goods required. For instance, he proposed to give the Department of Street Cleaning typewriting paper of the quality ordinarily used instead of costly bond paper, needed only for record purposes.

On motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, and by a concurrent vote of the three officers, the Supervisor was authorized to use his discretion in such matters, and also to order seventy-five copies each of the forms of contract and estimate for stationery to be printed.

On motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, and by a concurrent vote of the three officers, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That the Supervisor of the City Record be and he is hereby instructed to procure by direct order, that is, without contract let after advertisement, the articles called for by the requisitions allowed, that course being deemed to be for the best interests of the City.

On motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the following was adopted by a concurrent vote of the three officers:

Resolved, That, pursuant to a provision of section 66 of the Consolidation Act (chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882), the following-named newspapers are designated to publish, during the year 1895, as required, "brief advertisements calling attention to any contracts intended to be awarded, or bonds to be sold": Morning—"Sun" and "Times"; Evening—"Commercial Advertiser" and "Daily News"; Weekly—"Weekly Mercury" and "Weekly Union"; German—"Staats Zeitung."

On motion of the Mayor, and by a concurrent vote of the three officers, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That, pursuant to his request, dated January 16, 1895, authority be and it is hereby granted to the Commissioner of Street Improvements to publish, twice a week for three successive weeks, in two daily newspapers, a notice of a hearing to be held in his office on February 21, 1895, respecting a contemplated change of line of Arthur avenue, and of changes in Sewerage Districts 42, 37 F, and 36; and

Resolved, That "The Press" and "The World" are designated as the daily newspapers in which the said notice shall be published.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT CHAPTER 697, Laws of 1894, authorizes the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to grant permits for the temporary occupancy of portions of the streets and public places in the City of New York, from 4 P. M. until 8 A. M., and on

Sundays and legal holidays only, by unlicensed trucks or other unlicensed vehicles owned by residents of the City of New York who have the consent of the owner or lessee of the abutting property upon the condition that the owners of trucks or vehicles for which such permits are issued shall keep the street clean under and around said trucks or vehicles, and subject to such other rules and conditions as the said Commissioner may from time to time prescribe, which permits the said Commissioner may at any time revoke.

Such permits will not be granted for either side of a street contiguous to a public building of the City and County of New York, or a church, school-house, hospital, asylum or other incorporated benevolent institution, or a licensed place of amusement, or for the following-named streets and public places:

Bowery, Broadway, Carmine street, Catharine street, Chambers street, Christopher street, College place, Cortlandt street, Desbrosses street, Essex street, Exchange place, Fulton street, Hester street, Hudson street, Liberty street, Nassau street, New street, Park Row, Varick street, Wall street, West Broadway.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street, Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).

Or for any streets under the control of the Department of Parks, Docks and Public Works, except upon the consent of the heads of those Departments.

All existing permits for the occupancy by unlicensed vehicles of any of the streets or portions of streets or places enumerated above are hereby revoked.

All unlicensed wagons, trucks or other vehicles standing in the streets or public places, other than those for which permits have been issued and which are in compliance with the conditions of the same will be seized and removed to the Corporation Yards of the Department of Street Cleaning, in pursuance of the provisions of the law.

TO STATIONERS.

SEALED ESTIMATES FOR SUPPLYING THE City Government with Stationery, Paper, Ink, Pens, Pencils, Penholders, Rubber Bands, etc., will be received at the office of the Supervisor of the City Record, Room No. 2 City Hall, until 12 o'clock M. of Friday, the 1st day of March, 1895, at or about which time said estimates will be publicly opened and read in the office of the Mayor.

Each person making an estimate shall inclose it in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for furnishing Stationery," and with his name and the date of its presentation.

Each estimate shall state the name and place of residence of the person making it; if there is more than one person, their names and residences must be given; and if only one person is interested in the estimate it must distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the preliminary security required, and in the proposals stated, over and above all his debts of every nature and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered will be subject to approval by the Comptroller of the City of New York after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

The amount of security required upon the execution of the contract will be in each case fifty per cent. of the estimated cost of the articles awarded to each contractor; the amount of preliminary security to be given until each award, and in which the sureties shall justify, shall be One Thousand Dollars.

Should the person to whom the contract may be awarded, neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, and that the adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered has been approved by the Comptroller, or if he accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet, as provided by law.

No estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation, and no estimate will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person not having at the time of making his estimate full, suitable and sufficient facilities for performing the work specified in his estimate.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the National or State Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of fifty per centum of the amount of the preliminary security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the Supervisor of the City Record, who has charge of the estimate-box; and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said Supervisor and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same, within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

Permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any bid or estimate, and the right is expressly reserved by the undersigned city officers to reject any or all bids which may be deemed prejudicial to the public interests.
