

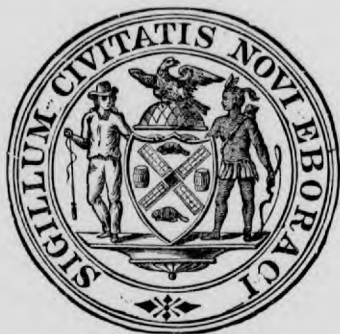

ELECTION MINUTES.

At a meeting of the Police Board of the Police Department of The City of New York, held on the 9th day of August, 1900.

Present—Commissioners York (President), Hess and Abell.

The minutes of August 6 were read and approved.

Resolved, That the places described upon the lists submitted by the Superintendent of Elections, marked "56," "57," "58," "59" and "60," are hereby designated, in accordance with the Election Law, as the places in the respective election districts in The City of New York at which the meeting for holding the Primary Election shall be held on August 28, 1900.

LOCAL BOARD.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, held its meeting at the temporary Borough Hall, in Jackson avenue and Fifth street, Long Island City, on July 27, 1900.

Present—Councilmen David L. Van Nostrand, Joseph Cassidy, Alderman Joseph Geiser and President of the Borough, Frederick Bowley.
Minutes of previous meeting approved.

On motion, the following was duly adopted:

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did, in accordance with the expressed desires of this, the Local Board of said borough, on July 13, 1900, cause notice to be published that a public hearing would be afforded by it, at meeting to be held on this July 27, 1900, upon the proposition that the course of public sewer to be constructed in Ridge street, First Ward, this borough, should be changed, as therein set forth, from that approved of by this Local Board on June 1, 1900; and

Whereas, No person appeared before this Board at such hearing in opposition to such proposed change; and

Whereas, It appears to this Board that to make such change of course of sewer as was suggested by the Deputy Commissioner of Sewers, this Borough, would be to the best interests of this city and all concerned; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it amend whatever action it has taken or may take in relation to the petition for sewer in Ridge street, from Academy street to Hopkins avenue, in First Ward, by changing its course so as to read: From Academy street to Sherman street and continued up Sherman street to Broadway, and there to connect with and discharge into existing public sewer.

Also,

Whereas, The minutes of the meeting of the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, held May 23, 1900, show that final action was taken by it in approval of map or plan showing the street system for the First Ward of the Borough of Queens (formerly Long Island City), as modified and proposed by said Board, notwithstanding the recommendation of the Topographical Engineer, who had received discretionary power upon petitions of property-owners to have alterations made to the map or plan originally submitted, to wit:

"That those petitioners whose suggestions were not favorably considered should have an opportunity to examine the map before its final adoption by the Board, and I wish to suggest that another public hearing be given before the map is adopted and forwarded to the Municipal Assembly; and

Whereas, It is more than two months since said map was approved and ordered transmitted to the Municipal Assembly, and as yet said Board has not submitted such map, or a full and correct copy thereof, to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon; and

Whereas, The President of this Borough has stated that he has been unable to procure a copy of said modified map of First Ward of the Borough of Queens, as approved of by the Board of Public Improvements on May 23, 1900; also that he is beset on all sides with inquiries by taxpayers as to said map, in the absence of which he is unable to make satisfactory replies thereto; and

Whereas, The withholding from public view of such vastly important map or plan of streets as altered and approved is not only naturally productive of the suspicion that same may be made liable to be tampered with, but also entails a great injustice upon the property-owners, whose right it is to insist upon being promptly and fully informed, as to in what manner their property is being affected thereby, and also as to the conditions they may be thereby subjected to in undertaking the improvement of their real estate holdings; now, in view of the aforesaid, it is

Resolved, That this, the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, in meeting assembled this 27th day of July, 1900, does hereby earnestly demand of the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it forthwith proceed to perform its whole duty to the people of the First Ward, this borough, in relation to said modified map of late Long Island City, and also to all the people of this borough, in causing, without delay, active progress to be made in mapping and planning system of streets for all sections of this borough, as the absence thereof has, since consolidation, been an incalculable impediment to the interests of real estate either for the sale or the improvement thereof.

Also,

Whereas, The absence of any established public highway along either side of the Long Island Railroad tracks, passing through Laurel Hill, in Second Ward, of Borough of Queens, City of New York, and against which manufacturing buildings abut, wherein hundreds of persons are employed, and who to reach same and return to their homes are obliged to walk upon the roadbed between the tracks of said transportation company, at imminent danger to their lives; and

Whereas, So many lives have been sacrificed in this perilous undertaking by persons being run down by the railroad trains, that this section has been deservedly referred to as the "Bloody Gorge"; and

Whereas, The attention of the Grand Jury has been given to the matter, thus emphasizing the public demand for immediate action by the City authorities; and

Whereas, The roads on both sides of same as laid out upon recently adopted map of said ward are, in the opinion of this Board, not of sufficient length, nor as direct between important points as would best serve public interests in said section; therefore

Resolved, That the President of this Board be and he hereby is requested to lay the matter before the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, in the endeavor to have said map changed to meet the requirements there existing.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this, the Local Board of the borough aforesaid, at its meeting held July 27, 1900, a petition for the legal opening of Bartow street, from Wolcott avenue to Jackson avenue, in First Ward, said borough; and

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, accord public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that compliance with said petition would be for the best interests of this city; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject matter of the petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this, the Local Board of borough aforesaid, at its meeting held July 27, 1900, a petition for the construction of a public sewer in Bartow street, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue, in First Ward of said borough; and

Whereas, This Board did, in conformity with notice published, accord public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that compliance with said petition would be to the best interests of this City; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject matter of the petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action.

Also,

Whereas, Property-owners and residents on Cedar street (in Corona), Second Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, have submitted to this, the Local Board thereof, at its meeting on July 27, 1900, their requirements for supply of water, and that such can be obtained by the Citizens' Water Supply Company, extending its water-main from Central avenue, near Lake street, and running thence in a northerly direction along Central avenue for about three hundred feet, and thence westerly along Cedar street to Sycamore avenue, a distance of about seven hundred feet, and that fire-hydrants be connected therewith; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give such prompt and favorable consideration and action to the foregoing as the needs of the petitioners may demand and the rights of the company under the law may entitle it to.

Also,

Whereas, The requirements of property-owners on Spruce street (in Corona), Second Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, for supply of water, was submitted to this, the Local Board of aforesaid borough, at its meeting held on July 27, 1900, and who therein set forth that such can be had by the Citizens' Water Supply Company extending its mains therein from National avenue westerly to termination of same, a distance of eight hundred feet, and that fire-hydrants should be connected thereto; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give such prompt and favorable consideration and action to the foregoing as the needs of the petitioners may demand and the rights of the company under the law may entitle it to.

Complaint of the Newtown Democratic Association against the charge of \$1.25 per 1,000 cubic feet of gas, by the Newtown Gas Company was, on motion, referred to Councilman Cassidy and Alderman Geiser to investigate and report.

Reply of Board of Docks, dated 25th instant, in relation to the subject of it converting sewer, Pier foot of Broadway, First Ward (without disturbing the original purpose for which it was built), for additional use as a public dock, was received, read and filed.

Communication from Commissioner of Public Lighting, dated 16th instant, as to electric light, recommended by the Local Board, this borough, to be erected on De Witt street, between Jackson avenue and Smith street, Corona, was read and ordered filed.

Adjourned to August 10, 1900.

The objections of McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys, to the assessment for regulating and grading Clinton avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street to Crotona Park, South, Borough of The Bronx, were overruled and the list ordered transmitted to the Board of Revision of Assessments for confirmation.

Counsel requested that the award of \$350 made to Stephen D. Ditchett, executor, be changed to Stephen D. Ditchett as executor of the last will and testament of Emily C. Ditchett, deceased, and in the case where no damages are given to Stephen D. Ditchett, as executor of the last will and testament of George W. Ditchett, deceased.

In the matter of the assessment for sewer in Kingsbridge road, Bailey avenue and Boston avenue, Borough of The Bronx, the assessment against the property of Helen Jay Healy was eliminated and the objections of C. C. Ferris, attorney, overruled. The list was ordered transmitted to the Board of Revision of Assessments for confirmation.

Hearing in the matter of the assessment for regulating and grading Brook avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Wendover avenue, was adjourned until September 4, 1900, at 11 A. M.

Hearings in the following matters were adjourned until September 11, 1900, at 11 A. M., at request of counsel:

Sewer in East One Hundred and Ninetieth street, between Aqueduct avenue and Old Croton Aqueduct.

Sewer in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, from Webster to Washington avenue.

Sewer in Spencer place, between East One Hundred and Forty-fourth and East One Hundred and Fiftieth streets.

John C. Shaw, attorney, submitted testimony in support of the claims for damages caused by the change of grade of Pelham avenue, from Webster avenue to the Southern Boulevard, Borough of The Bronx, and hearing was further adjourned until September 4, 1900, at 11 A. M.

In the matter of flagging Seventh avenue, from Greenwich avenue to Central Park, South, and Eighth avenue, from Thirteenth street to the Harlem river, Borough of Manhattan, all objections and testimony introduced were ordered transmitted to the Department of Highways for a report.

The Board considered to apportionment of the assessment for the acquisition and improvement of Jamaica avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the cost of the acquisition and improvement of Jamaica avenue be distributed as follows: That all lots facing the side streets and to the extent of half the block on either side from Pennsylvania avenue to the county line be assessed at the rate of sixty cents per running foot; that all lots on the side streets from Broadway to Pennsylvania avenue and to the extent of half the block, be assessed at the rate of thirty cents per running foot; and the balance of the money necessary to reimburse for the cost of this improvement be assessed pro rata from Broadway to the county line on lots facing Jamaica avenue, excepting that lots facing Jamaica avenue, between Broadway and Pennsylvania avenue, be assessed at the rate of fifty per cent. of the amount charged per foot to the lots on Jamaica avenue, from Pennsylvania avenue to the county line.

In the matter of the award for damages made to Susan Bray in the regulating and grading of Spring place, from Third avenue to Boston road, Borough of The Bronx, said award was changed to "Unknown owner," counsel for said Susan Bray failing to prove title after due notification.
