AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at Their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, November 25, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—The Comptroller (Hon. Edward M. Grout), Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis; also Chief Engineer Hill.

The President made inquiry as to whether or not there was any one present in accordance with the notice sent to Messrs. Williams & Gerstle, contractors for the construction of the Muscote Dam, and their sureties, for a hearing this day.

Whereupon L. Laflin Kellogg, Esq., stated that he represented said contractors, both of whom were present.

The President thereupon called up Report No. 440 of the Chief Engineer, dated November 10, 1902, upon which the notice to said contractors to appear was based, and directed the Secretary to read the same for the information of the contractors and their counsel.

Report No. 440 was then read, and Mr. Kellogg, counsel for said firm of Williams & Gerstle, contractors, was heard in their behalf.

Mr. Adrian T. Kiernan, representing the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company, and Mr. Leonidas Dennis, attorney for the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, the sureties in said contract, were also heard.

The counsel for the contractors having suggested a remeasurement of the work already done, on motion of the Comptroller, the Chief Engineer was directed to verify the original measurements and report to the Commissioners the result of his examination, and that the remeasurements be made by an Engineer not hitherto employed on that portion of the work.

On motion, the stenographic report of the remarks of counsel and others at this hearing were ordered filed with said Report No. 440.

The minutes of meetings of November 18, 19, 20, 21 and 24, 1902, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 14,812 to 14,822, inclusive, amounting to \$592.83.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The President submitted the following report of the Chief Engineer in regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, November 21, 1902, as follows:

NEW YORK, November 24, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, November 21, 1902, I would report as follows:

The rock excavation continued on the slope at the lower end of the spillway (see Photo. No. 36, previously submitted), but has been confined to moving rock already blasted, the drills having been busy on the core wall in the south bank, where excavation has continued above Elevation 110, between Station 1-10 and 1-50, ±, and also below Elevation 110, between Stations 2-1-00 and 3-1-00.

Earth excavation has continued in the south bank with the steam shovel as usual, both day and night, near the core wall above Elevation 110, and some work of shaping the excavation slopes above this elevation has been done both on the upstream and downstream sides of the dam line. The hand gangs with derricks and cars have continued excavation work below Elevation 110 on the downstream side of the core wall from Station 5±, back to and around the wing wall, approaching the core wall near its junction with the main dam, the bottom of this excavation being at about Elevation 70.

The above mentioned work of excavation and removal of core wall is shown in Photos Nos. 42, 43 and 44, submitted with last report.

Masonry work was continued as follows:

1 gang between Stations 8-1-00 and 8-1-50, then on Gate House No. 2.

1 gang between Stations 9-1-40 and 9-1-50.

1 gang on Gate House No. 2.

The amount of excavation by the steam shovel was about 3,900 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of excavation by the hand gangs was about 2,600 cubic yards for the week.

The core wall excavation is included as usual in the hand gang yardage, as there is no way of accounting for it separately.

The amount of rock removed at the spillway was about 420 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of masonry laid on the dam was about 500 cubic yards for the week.

The average number of men employed was as follows:

Excavation at south end.....	146
Excavation at Spillway.....	18
Masonry, main dam, etc.....	82
Quarry and spawl yard.....	173
Miscellaneous.....	21

Total..... 440

This is still only about 91 per cent of the force employed before the strike and a larger force should be employed.

The report was verbally explained by the Chief Engineer and thereupon ordered transmitted to the Mayor and a copy placed on file.

The Chief Engineer submitted progress report for the week ending Friday, November 21, 1902.

Which was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee with recommendation to file.

Report No. 448 of the Chief Engineer, dated November 24, 1902, was presented in reference to the excuses for absence without leave of George B. Bosworth, Clerk, which was read.

Whereupon the matter was referred back to the Chief Engineer for further report.

Report No. 449 of the Chief Engineer, dated November 24, 1902, was presented, transmitting a plan of the southerly end of the New Croton Dam, showing a modification of the substructure of Gate House No. 1, and affecting the inlets, the outlets, the reinforcement of the northerly wall of the chamber of the Gate House, and an overflow, and asking approval thereof; which was read.

Whereupon the matter was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

Report No. 450 of the Chief Engineer, dated November 24, 1902, was presented, being in relation to communications of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated October 16, 1902, and Deputy Comptroller Phillips, dated October 9, 1902, in reference to claim No. 14,635, filed in the Department of Finance by Kelly & Kelley, contractors, for work done in connection with their contract for building overflow and blowoff sewers, water pipes and appurtenances in connection with the Jerome Park Reservoir; accompanied by copy of report of Division Engineer Ulrich, giving information relative to said claim.

In connection therewith the President presented a communication from Deputy Comptroller Phillips, dated November 25, 1902, requesting to be furnished with a copy of the reports upon said claim.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of report No. 450 of the Chief Engineer to the Department of Finance, and said report and communication of the Deputy Comptroller were ordered filed.

The following communication was received from the Secretary:

NEW YORK, November 25, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to direction of the Commissioners on October 7, 1902, I desire to report that I have transmitted bill for taxes for School District No. 5, Town of Yorktown, N. A communication was received from the Mayor, dated November 21, 1902, relating to a former request for a resume of the work of this Commission to be transmitted to him by December 1 next.

In connection therewith the President stated that he had conferred with the Chief Engineer, whereupon the communication was laid over.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated November 21, 1902, transmitting letter from Frederick L. Hurt, dated November 17, 1902, requesting the privilege of purchasing certain waste wood on the watershed near Katonah, N. Y.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

A communication was received from Mr. James W. Pryor, Secretary of the City Club of New York, dated November 20, 1902, requesting two copies of each report or other important document printed for this Commission since December 31, 1900.

The Secretary was directed to reply thereto and the communication ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, dated November 25, 1902, returning the following tax bills and advising that the same be paid, viz.:

An opinion was received from the Corporation Counsel, dated November 25, 1902, in reply to two communications of the Secretary of October 21, 1902, in relation to highways and to certain highway bridge superstructures.

Whereupon the opinion was ordered filed and the Chief Engineer directed to report upon the plans, specifications, etc., submitted by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in relation to the highway bridge superstructures; also to report upon the plans, specifications, etc., for the construction of highways in the Croton River Division.

A communication was received from E. B. Kear, of Yorktown Heights, N. Y., dated November 24, 1902, in relation to Roads Nos. 15, 16, 17 and 18. Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

A communication was received from the Chief Examiner, Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated November 19, 1902, stating that an examination for promotion to the position of Sixth Grade Transmittal had been set down for December 10, 1902, at 10 o'clock a. m., and inclosing promotion slips to be filled out with the record of the candidates, and requesting that they be returned not later than December 12, 1902.

The Secretary was directed to acknowledge receipt of said communication, and the promotion slips were referred to the Chief Engineer to have properly filled out and returned to the Commissioners at as early a date as possible.

On motion, Reports of the Chief Engineer No. 425, No. 426 and No. 437, together with all other communications relating to the request of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman for the modification of their contract for building the New Croton Dam, under the provisions of chapter 588, Laws of 1902, to make eight hours constitute a day's work in connection with said contract, were ordered placed on file.

The President verbally reported that after prolonged consideration and discussion of the matter of the request of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the construction of the New Croton Dam, for the modification of their contract under the provisions of chapter 588, Laws of 1902, to make eight hours constitute a day's work in connection with said contract, and after the preparation of a schedule of prices which was presented to the Mayor and the Comptroller and approved by them, as well as by the other four Commissioners, the schedule of prices so agreed upon is herewith submitted as they appear therein under the head of "Commissioners' Proposed Increase to the Contract Prices."

The report was received and the schedule of prices above referred to was approved, as evidenced by the initials of the Commissioners, and ordered filed.

The following form of letter was then presented and adopted, and the President directed to transmit the same:

NEW YORK, November 25, 1902.

Messrs. COLEMAN, BREUCHAUD & COLEMAN, Contractors, New Croton Dam:

DEAR SIRS—Referring to the correspondence and other proceedings which have taken place in connection with your application for the modification of your contract with The City of New York for the construction of the New Croton Dam, we have carefully noted everything which you have had to say on the subject. We are willing to make a modification of said contract under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, as being for the best interests of The City of New York, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and allow you the prices stated in the schedule hereto attached. We shall require further that the modified contract provide that the time for the completion of the work shall not be later than the 1st of October, 1904, and that prior to the 1st of October, 1903, such portion of the work shall be completed as may be necessary, in the judgment of the Aqueduct Commissioners and their Chief Engineer, to allow the commencement of the filling of the new reservoir with water on that date. It will be necessary that the sureties should agree to such modification of the original contract.

As soon as you notify us of your acceptance of these terms we will take immediate steps to pass the necessary resolutions and bring the matter before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for their approval, as required by the act from which we derive our authority to make this agreement, and on receipt of this approval we will request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary papers to carry this into effect.

The following communication was received from Messrs. Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the construction of the New Croton Dam:

NEW YORK, November 26, 1902.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners, 280 Broadway, New York, N. Y.:

DEAR SIRS—We beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 25th inst., inclosing schedule therein referred to, both having reference to a proposed modification, under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, of our contract with The City of New York for the construction of the New Croton Dam.

We have made a careful examination of the schedule submitted with your letter, and comparison between that and our schedule of October 4 last. Being exceedingly desirous that this matter shall be disposed of at the earliest possible moment, so as to allow for an immediate resumption of the work with full force, and hoping that such disposition may be reached before the first of the month, so as to avoid embarrassment on our part with reference to our employees, we are willing to agree to a disposition of the question as follows:

To accept the suggestions contained in your schedule as to items therein designated as a, b, cc, d, e, g, gg, h, j, l, n, r, s, t and u, and as to the remainder of the items, being those designated c, f, i, k, kk, m, o, p and q, to split the difference between the figures contained in your schedule and ours of October 4 last, so that as to those items there will be added to our contract price the price suggested in your schedule as to those items, plus one-half of the difference between the amounts shown in your schedule, and the amount shown in our schedule, as to the same items.

The President presented a communication received from Deputy Comptroller Phillips, dated November 24, 1902, transmitting copy of Claim No. 18,003, filed in the Department of Finance by Charles M. Boyce for the sum of \$2,000, and requesting information relative thereto.

Which was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The President presented a communication received from the Chairman of the Committee on Revision of City Records and Accounts, and Water Supply, of the Merchants' Association of New York, dated November 25, 1902, relating to the basin of the New Croton Reservoir, and requesting copy of a communication from Mr. Alphonse Fteley, as retiring Chief Engineer, to Mr. W. R. Hill, as succeeding Chief Engineer of this Commission.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer to furnish copy of the letter requested.

The Commissioners had under consideration communications from the Mayor dated November 21, 1902, which was laid over at the previous meeting, and also a communication dated May 13, 1902, in reference to the submission by this Commission of an annual report to the Mayor for use in the preparation of his annual message to the Board of Aldermen.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at Their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, December 16, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—The Mayor (Hon. Seth Low), the Comptroller (Hon. Edward M. Grout), Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis; also Chief Engineer Hill.

On motion, the regular order of business was suspended.

The President called up the matter of the application of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the construction of the New Croton Dam, for the amendment of their contract for building said dam, under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902.

Whereupon the Chief Engineer presented the following report:

REPORT No. 461.

NEW YORK, December 15, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Referring to the communication addressed to Messrs. Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman by William H. Ten Eyck, President of the Aqueduct Commission, dated November 25, 1902, relating to a modification of the contract for building the New Croton Dam under provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, transmitting a schedule of prices, I beg to report that such prices applied to the portion of the work remaining to be done on September 30, 1902, are estimated by me to increase the cost \$206,120.22. I believe the prices to be equitable.

The following communication was received from Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors for the construction of the New Croton Dam:

NEW YORK, December 12, 1902.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners, 280 Broadway, New York, N. Y.:

GENTLEMEN—We beg to acknowledge the receipt of your favor of November 28 last, which was in answer to our communication to you of November 26, both having reference to the proposed modification of our contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam. The position taken by your letter has required very careful consideration by us, and this will account for the time which has elapsed in sending you an answer.

Being desirous to relieve the situation at present existing with reference to the change in the hours of day labor, and its effect upon the work at the New Croton Dam, we have decided to accept the modification of our contract suggested in your letter to us of November 25 last, and hereby advise you that we will agree to a formal amendment providing for a schedule of prices as submitted by you with your aforesaid letter.

You will, we think, agree with us that it is most desirable in the interest of immediate progress of this work, and the early completion of the contract, that the matter should be progressed so as to result in the amendment of the contract being effected to take effect at the earliest possible date. We are able to keep a comparatively small number of men at work at this time, only upon the promise that in a very little while we will be in a position to respond to their demands for full day's pay for eight hours of day work.

Whereupon said communication was ordered spread on the minutes and filed, and in connection therewith the following preamble and resolutions were offered:

Whereas, The contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam on the Croton river, at Cornell site, in the town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, N. Y., was entered into by The City of New York in 1892, before the eight-hour working day now in force by statute in all new contracts had been adopted by legislation as the policy of the State in all public work; and

Whereas, Chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, a copy of which is hereto attached, authorizes and empowers the Aqueduct Commissioners, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to agree with any of their contractors, upon such terms and conditions as shall in their judgment and discretion be for the best interests of The City of New York, that eight hours shall constitute a day's work for all laborers employed by any person, firm or corporation in the performance of his or its contract, and that no laborer employed in the performance of any contract shall be required, permitted or allowed to work more than eight hours; and

Whereas, The contractors for the New Croton Dam have applied to said Commissioners to exercise said authority and modify their said contract accordingly, claiming that this legislation has caused strikes and delays and hindered them in the prosecution of their work, and asking that the time for the completion of said work be extended on account of the change from a composite to a masonry construction of a portion of the said dam; and

Whereas, Under these circumstances and by reason of strikes and the failure to procure a sufficient force of employees, delays in the construction of the New Croton Dam have already occurred and will continue, so that under present conditions, assuming that there should be no strikes, it will take nearly three years to complete the work, while if the said authority, conferred by said statute upon the Aqueduct Commissioners, is exercised, the contractors state that through the working of several shifts of men and in other ways many difficulties can be obviated and the work completed many months prior to that date; and

Whereas, A joint public hearing has been given upon this application by the Aqueduct Commissioners and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without calling out any public protest to such modification of said contract, and said application having been referred back to the Aqueduct Commissioners for further action by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it being the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners that the exercise of this authority will importantly hasten the completion of said dam, which is of vital consequence to the water supply system of Manhattan and The Bronx; and

Whereas, The contractors have agreed with the Aqueduct Commissioners to a schedule of prices which represents the additional cost to them of the work when prosecuted on an eight-hour basis, which prices were fixed, after careful examination by the Aqueduct Commissioners and their Chief Engineer, a schedule of which is hereto attached and constitute a part of these resolutions; therefore

Resolved, That, in the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners, the authority and power conferred upon them by chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902 should be exercised in the case of the contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam, and that, in their judgment and discretion for the best interests of The City of New York, the contractors should agree to the following conditions, which they have already informally accepted, namely:

To observe the requirements of said act as to the eight-hour working day; to complete the New Croton Dam and have the same ready for use not later than the first day of October, 1904, to which date the time for completion shall be extended; and that prior to the first day of December, 1903, such portion of the work shall be completed as may be necessary, in the judgment of the Aqueduct Commissioners, to allow the commencement of the filling of the New Croton Reservoir with water on said date; that the prices to be paid to said contractors shall be those incorporated in the schedule hereto annexed and go into effect as soon as the Chief Engineer has completed the necessary measurements; and that the sureties on said contract agree, in writing, thereto; and further

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners submit the foregoing preambles and resolutions to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its consideration and approval, and that, in the event of such approval, the Corporation Counsel be requested by the Aqueduct Commissioners to prepare the necessary papers to amend or modify the said New Croton Dam contract in accordance therewith.

CHAPTER 588.

"AN ACT relative to the powers of the Aqueduct Commissioners, provided for and holding office under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter four hundred and ninety of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-three, and its amendments:

"The People of The State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

"Section 1. The Aqueduct Commissioners, provided for and holding office under and pursuant to the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled 'An act to provide new reservoirs, dams and a new aqueduct, with the appurtenances thereto, for the purpose of supplying The City of New York with an increased supply of pure and wholesome water,' said act being chapter four hundred and ninety of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-three, and its amendments, are hereby authorized and empowered to agree with any person, firm or corporation with whom they have contracted or may hereafter contract, upon such terms and conditions as shall in their judgment and discretion be for the best interests of The City of New York, that eight hours shall constitute a day's work for all laborers employed by said person, firm or corporation in the performance of his or its contract, and that no laborer employed in the performance of any such contract shall be required, permitted or allowed to work more than eight hours. No agreement made under the provisions of this act shall be valid or binding until the same has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York.

"Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately."

(Became a law April 14, 1902, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present. Accepted by the City.)

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment copy of the preambles and resolutions adopted this day in reference to the modification of the contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam.

The following communication was also received from Messrs. Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman:

CROTON-ON-HUDSON, N. Y., December 12, 1902.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners, 280 Broadway, New York, N. Y.:

GENTLEMEN—In connection with the proposed modification of the contract for the New Croton Dam allow us to refer to two questions, which we do not doubt you will find of importance.

First—As the changes in the prices of the various units of work about to be made will obtain from the date upon which you may officially decide upon them, it becomes necessary that all the work performed prior to that date should be measured at that time. The computation of the quantities following and based upon the measurements takes much time, and we would ask you to assure us that no more than ninety days will elapse between the time of the official change in the contract prices and the completion of the said computation, so that we may not be made to wait too long a time for a final adjustment of our accounts on the old prices.

Second—We beg also to call your attention to the difficulties we labor under in cutting the joints for the facing stone. We are required to so shape the stone that a large portion of the joints prepared by us is not paid for. We are satisfied, and so, we trust, your Engineer is, that the work will be as well bonded and as good in every respect, if the back part of the joints were prepared in the manner indicated in the accompanying sketch, instead of being prepared as per the dotted lines, which indicate the present requirements.

Such being the case we ask you to relieve us from a difficulty which increases the cost of the work for no useful purpose. This request we think reasonable, from the fact, well known to you, that we are furnishing to the City and have furnished from the beginning of the work, a quality of stone much superior to that stipulated in the specifications.

We might add that the facing stone masonry with the modifications requested would remain in quality above the requirements of the contract.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for examination and report.

The Mayor thereupon asked that the Chief Engineer make a verbal report as to the progress made on the work at the Jerome Park Reservoir since the contract for said reservoir had been amended under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902; also as to what progress had been made in tearing down the core wall at the New Croton Dam.

The Chief Engineer then stated that the progress of the work at the Jerome Park Reservoir had been slow on account of the inability of the contractors to obtain coal, and that because of this fact they had not been warranted in increasing their force; that he had been unofficially informed that the contractors had now obtained a supply of 1,000 tons of coal.

That as to tearing down the core wall at the New Croton Dam, the contractors for said work had been doing as well as they could, but that they had been short of men, having had in the neighborhood of but 80 to 85 per cent. of men employed upon the work that they had previous to the strike.

The Chief Engineer then further explained by referring to a map the amount of work done by the contractors in this respect.

A communication of Robert L. Luce, of counsel for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, dated December 2, 1902, was presented, transmitting copy of a communication addressed to the general attorney of said railroad company by H. W. Wheeler, Clerk of the Commissioners of Appraisal of Cornell Dam, eighth supplemental proceeding, dated November 28, 1902, in reference to hearings before said Commissioners relative to claims filed by the New York and Putnam Railroad, the New York and Harlem Railroad, and the New York and Mahopac Railroad, wherein Mr. Luce requested to be informed as to whether or not the proposition of said railroad companies, submitted by it under date of July 14, 1902, was to be accepted, in order that it might prepare for the trial of the claims of the several railroads before the Commissioners of Appraisal.

In connection therewith the President stated that inasmuch as an opinion had been requested from the Corporation Counsel in reference to this matter, he had on December 4, 1902, transmitted to him copies of the above-mentioned communications; and that, on December 8, 1902, he informed Mr. Luce that he was unable to furnish him the information requested.

The action of the President was approved, and the communications referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of Appraisal of Cornell Dam, eighth supplemental proceeding, dated December 5, 1902, accompanied by copy of a communication addressed to the general attorney of the New York Central Railroad Company, by H. W. Wheeler, Clerk of said Commissioners, dated November 28, 1902, in reference to proceedings of said Commissioners in connection with the claims filed by the New York and Putnam Railroad, the New York and Harlem Railroad, and the New York and Mahopac Railroad.

In connection therewith the President stated that he had also transmitted copies of the above mentioned communications to the Corporation Counsel on December 8, 1902, the same probably having a bearing upon this question now before him.

The action of the President was approved, and the communications referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

An opinion was received from the Corporation Counsel, dated December 15, 1902, in reply to communications of November 19, December 4 and 8, 1902, in reference to the power of the Aqueduct Commissioners to contract with the railroad companies affected, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a change of route and the reconstruction of the lines of the New York and Putnam Railroad, the New York and Harlem Railroad and the New York and Mahopac Railroad upon certain terms indicated in the papers transmitted to the Corporation Counsel.

In connection therewith, the Mayor and the Comptroller approved the intention of the Aqueduct Commissioners to contract if practicable with the railroad companies affected instead of awaiting proceedings before the Commissioners of Appraisal.

Whereupon the whole subject-matter was referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

Report No. 451 was received from the Chief Engineer, dated November 28, 1902, relating to a communication of the Merchants' Association of New York dated November 14, 1902, asking to be furnished with a duplicate of the plan submitted as an exhibit to report No. 113, and reporting that said original plan cannot be found, and transmitting a plan which is believed to be a print made from the same tracing from which the plan accompanying report No. 113 was made.

The Secretary was directed to transmit the same to the Merchants' Association stating the facts in connection with the matter.

The following communication was received from the Chief Engineer in regard to a request for copies of certain documents contained in a letter from the Merchants' Association dated November 25, 1902:

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Thursday, December 18, 1902, at 11.30 a. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis.

Minutes of meetings of November 25 and 28, 1902, were read and approved.

The Construction or Executive Committee referred back to the Commissioners the following report of the Chief Engineer (No. 449), with the recommendation that the same be approved and adopted:

REPORT NO. 449.

November 24, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—With this I present a plan of the southerly end of the New Croton Dam, showing a modification of the substructure of Gate House No. 1, of which I ask your approval.

There are four distinct features of the plan to which I call your attention, namely, the inlets, the outlets, the reinforcement of the northerly wall of the chamber of the gate house, and an overflow.

There are to be three brick inlets, eight feet in diameter, through which water can be drawn from different depths of the reservoir to supply the Old Croton Aqueduct. According to the original plans, these were to extend into the basin of the reservoir an aggregate length of 1,050 feet, 300 feet of which is now built. In consequence of building a masonry dam instead of an embankment with a core wall it will be unnecessary to extend the inlets beyond the face of the dam; hence that portion of the inlets now built, which cost about \$8,000, may be abandoned. It would cost about \$47,000 to complete them according to the original plans, while it will cost but \$9,000 to construct them to the face of the dam as is proposed, thus resulting in a saving of \$38,000.

The chambers of the gate house as now built have no other outlet than the one connecting with the Old Croton Aqueduct, which has a maximum capacity of 90,000,000 gallons per day. I deem it to be advisable to provide an additional outlet of about 300,000,000 gallons capacity per day, so that an additional aqueduct could be connected without drawing off the water from the reservoir. The remodeling of the structure to provide for this additional outlet would cost about \$27,000.

The northerly chambers of the gate house are to have a maximum depth of 54 feet of water. The outer wall as built is only seven feet thick. This is too light to prevent leakage, and to guard against a serious outbreak it should be reinforced. This is provided for in the plans under consideration by the curving of the downstream face of the dam against the walls of the chambers. This I consider very essential for the safety of the water confined in the reservoir. It will cost about \$16,000 to strengthen the wall as above described.

There is no overflow or waste weir to the old Aqueduct, as built and connected with the gate house. The necessity of an overflow is apparent when we consider that the water in the reservoir is to stand at an elevation of 39 feet higher than the top of the aqueduct and that the water is to be locked down through gates; hence the safety of the aqueduct is dependent upon the man operating the gates, and, through carelessness or accident the entire pressure due to the head of 39 feet might be thrown into the aqueduct. This would undoubtedly cause it to break, as the aqueduct was not built with the view of its sustaining any pressure other than is due to a full conduit. With an overflow properly constructed it would be impossible to put any additional pressure on the aqueduct. The cost of an overflow would not exceed \$1,000.

For the reasons above stated I respectfully ask you to approve the plan.

GENTLEMEN—The Construction or Executive Committee refer back to the Commissioners the accompanying communication of Deputy Comptroller Phillips, dated November 24, 1902, transmitting a copy of Claim No. 18003, filed in the Department of Finance, for the sum of \$2,000, and requesting information relative thereto, with the recommendation that the Secretary be directed to comply with such request.

In connection therewith the Secretary stated that, by direction of the President, he had transmitted the information to the Department of Finance.

Whereupon the recommendation of the committee was adopted and the action of the President and Secretary approved.

The President verbally stated that on December 3, 1902, he had transmitted to the Mayor the following report of the Chief Engineer in regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending November 28, 1902, as follows:

NEW YORK, December 2, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, November 28, 1902, I would report as follows:

The rock excavation has continued on the lower spillway channel on the slopes, the drilling having been resumed during the week, and the removal of material already blasted has continued as usual. (See Photo No. 36, previously submitted.)

On the core wall drilling has continued and excavation has been done south of Station 1-|-50 and has also continued below Elevation 110, between Stations 2-|-00 and 3-|-00.

The core wall excavation south of Station 1-|-50 and above Elevation 110 is nearing its limit and is approaching the lines of Gate House No. 2.

The hand gangs with derricks and cars have continued earth excavation as usual on the downstream side of the dam line.

Excavation has continued in the south bank with the steam shovel, as usual, both day and night. The latter has been at work below the dam line above Elevation 110 and is very near the limit of the slope at that elevation. A derrick has been moved and put in place above the core wall at Elevation 110, in order to facilitate excavation work at that point.

The above-mentioned work of earth excavation and removal of core wall is shown in Photos Nos. 46 and 48, submitted with this report.

Masonry work was continued as follows:

1 gang between Stations 8-|-00 and 8-|-50.

1 gang between Stations 9-|-40 and 9-|-90, then between 9-|-00 and 9-|-90.

1 gang on Gate House, No. 2.

The amount of excavation by the steam shovel was about 2,850 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of excavation by the hand gangs was about 1,900 cubic yards for the week.

The core wall excavation is included, as usual, in the hand-gang yardage, as there is no way of accounting for it separately.

The amount of rock removed at the spillway was about 300 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of masonry laid on the dam was about 300 cubic yards for the week. All the work during the week was interrupted by rain, but little work having been done on November 26 and 27 on that account.

The average number of men employed was as follows:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, December 5, 1902, I would report as follows:

The rock excavation has continued on the lower spillway channel on the slopes (see Photo No. 36, previously submitted).

On the core wall drilling has continued and a small amount of excavation has been done south of Station 1-|-50, the limit at this point being nearly reached, and has also continued below Elevation 110, between Stations 2-|-00 and 3-|-00.

The hand gangs, with derricks and cars, have continued earth excavation as usual above Elevation 70, on the downstream side of the dam, around the wing wall and approaching the core wall.

Excavation has continued in the south bank with the steam shovel, as usual, both day and night, above Elevation 110.

The steam shovel work has been confined largely to trimming slopes below the dam and to excavation near the core wall next to Gate House No. 1, the face of which is nearly reached.

The above-mentioned work of earth excavation and removal of core wall is shown in Photos Nos. 46 and 48, submitted with last report.

No work was done on Friday, December 5, on account of the storm.

The core wall excavation is included, as usual, in the hand gang yardage, as there is no way of accounting for it separately.

The amount of rock removed at the spillway was about 360 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of masonry laid on the dam was about 330 cubic yards for the week.

The President submitted the following report of the Chief Engineer in regard to work done on the New Croton Dam, for the week ending December 12, 1902, as follows:

NEW YORK, December 15, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, December 12, 1902, I would report as follows:

The work of rock excavation was continued on the lower spillway channel. (See Photo No. 36, previously submitted.)

On the core wall work of excavation was continued below Elevation 110, between Stations 2-|-00 and 3-|-00. The work of racking off the end of the main dam section at Station 3-|-50, near its present top elevation, was started in preparation for its junction with the new work of the section extended.

The hand gangs with derricks and cars continued earth excavation as usual on the lower cut near the wing wall, and also on the Old Aqueduct about Station 1-|-00 at the left of the dam line.

Excavation continued in the south bank with the steam shovel, as usual, both day and night, until December 11, above Elevation 110, its work being confined mostly to cleaning up slopes. On December 11 the contractors started to move the shovel to the cut at Elevation 70 on the downstream side of the dam near the wing wall.

The above-mentioned work of earth excavation and removal of core wall is shown in Photos Nos. 51 and 52, submitted with this report.

Masonry work, on account of the cold and bad weather, was prosecuted only on one day, with the gangs located as follows:

One gang between Stations 8-|-10 and 8-|-50.

One gang between Stations 9-|-00 and 9-|-40.

One gang on Gate House No. 2, and also between Stations 9-|-70 and 10-|-12.

The amount of excavation by the steam shovel was about 1,600 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of excavation by the hand gangs was about 1,900 cubic yards for the week.

The core-wall excavation is included as usual in the hand-gang yardage, as there is no way of accounting for it separately.

The amount of rock removed at the spillway was about 220 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of masonry laid on the dam amounted to but one day's work.

The average number of men employed was as follows:

Excavation at south end.....	154
Excavation at Spillway.....	18
Masonry, Main Dam, etc.....	40
Quarry and Spawl Yard.....	64
Miscellaneous.....	20
Total.....	296

This is only about 62 per cent. of the force employed before the strike, and is 127 men less than last week. A larger force should be employed. The reason for the great reduction of force and small amount of work done during the week was due to a great extent, however, to the cold and inclement weather.

"1. Sewer from Van Cortlandt avenue gate house through Van Cortlandt avenue, etc., to sewer on Broadway.

"2. Connection at gate house opposite Two Hundred and Fourth street, between north 48-inch main on Two Hundred and Fourth street and the 48-inch main from gate house to pumping station on Jerome avenue, north of Van Cortlandt avenue.

"3. Completion of Old Aqueduct through Jerome Park Reservoir, so that a regular quantity of water can flow through same at all times.

"4. Completion of the west side of Jerome Park Reservoir as soon as practicable.

"If properly carried on, first, second and third can be done next year and fourth in 1904."

Mr. Nicholas S. Hill, Jr., the Chief Engineer of this Department, concurs in these recommendations.

With your approval, I would ask that the matter be laid before the Aqueduct Commissioners. Mr. Birdsall and myself would be glad to appear before that Board at any time and make such further explanation as may be desired.

SIR—Referring to your communication of December 15, 1902, transmitting an opinion regarding the power of the Aqueduct Commissioners to make an agreement with certain railroad companies regarding the transfer and release of certain properties as set out therein:

In the course of the condemnation proceedings mentioned therein the objection has been made that the original maps filed by the Commissioners do not show in numbered parcels, as required by the act, the land now occupied by the railroad companies, nor the routes to be substituted therefor, and that therefore no title can be acquired thereto until the original maps are amended or new or additional maps filed and the proceedings taken which are provided for by the amendment in 1887 of the Act of 1883.

We now desire to have your opinion as to whether it is necessary to amend the original maps filed by the Commissioners under the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, and the amendments thereto, by numbering the parcels of railroad property intended to be acquired by the Commissioners and showing the substituted route or to file new or additional maps, and what effect the amendment contained in chapter 196 of the Laws of 1887 has upon the proceeding for filing, etc., provided for in the original act; and, if any, what form of maps should be prepared and what form of resolution is necessary to be passed by the Aqueduct Commissioners to comply with the requirements of said act as amended, and what further proceedings or steps are necessary to enable the Aqueduct Commissioners to act under the powers which you have advised them they possess in your opinion hereinbefore mentioned.

The Chief Engineer presented progress reports for the weeks ending December 19 and 26, 1902.

Which were referred to the Construction or Executive Committee for disposition.

The President presented the following report of the Chief Engineer in regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam:

CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE—AQUEDUCT COMMISSIONERS,
NEW YORK, December 22, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, December 19, 1902, I would report as follows:

The progress of the work was greatly delayed during the week by severe weather. On December 13 a heavy snowstorm occurred, stopping all work, and on December 16 a heavy rainstorm caused a stoppage of all the work. On December 17 the water rose in the river channel above the dam to a height of 15 feet.

The work of rock excavation was continued on the lower spillway channel until the evening of December 18, when work was stopped owing to shortage of coal. (See photograph No. 36, previously submitted.)

On the core wall work of excavation progressed between stations 2-|-00 and 3-|-00, and the work of racking off the end of the main dam section at about station 3-|-50±, near its south end, was continued in preparation for its junction with the new work of the section extended.

The hand gangs with derricks and cars continued earth excavation as usual, except for the weather, on the lower cut near the wing wall and also on the old aqueduct on each side of Gate House No. 1.

Excavation continued with the steam shovel, as usual, both day and night, weather permitting, at elevation 70± on the downstream side, near the wing wall.

The location of the above-mentioned work of earth excavation and removal of core wall is shown in photographs Nos. 51 and 52, submitted with last report.

No masonry work was done during the week, partly on account of the bad weather and partly owing to lack of coal.

The amount of excavation by the steam shovel was about 3,500 cubic yards for the week.

The amount of excavation by the hand gangs was about 1,100 cubic yards for the week.

The core wall excavation is included, as usual, in the hand gang yardage, as there is no way of accounting for it separately.

The amount of rock removed at the spillway was about 170 cubic yards for the week.

The average number of men employed was as follows:

Excavation at south end, 121; excavation at spillway, 16; on main dam, etc., 10; quarry and spawl yard, 78; miscellaneous, 11. Total, 236.

This is only about 49 per cent of the force employed before the strike and is 60 men less than last week. A larger force should be employed. The reason for the great reduction of force and small amount of work done during the week was due to a great extent, however, to the snow, rain and generally inclement weather and to lack of coal.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE—AQUEDUCT COMMISSIONERS,
NEW YORK, December 29, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, December 26, 1902, I would report as follows:

No rock excavation work was done on the spillway extension owing to lack of coal. (The location of this work is shown in Photo 36, previously submitted.)

On the core wall work of excavation progressed between Stations 2-|-00 and 3-|-00, and the work of racking off the south end of the main dam section was continued in preparation for its junction with the new work of the section extended.

The hand gangs with derricks and cars continued earth excavation on the lower cut near the wing wall, and also on the Old Aqueduct on each side of Gate House No. 1.

Excavation continued with the steam shovel, both day and night, at elevation 70± on the downstream side near the wing wall.

(The location of the above-mentioned work of earth excavation and removal of core wall is shown in Photos Nos. 53, 54, 55 and 56, submitted with this report.)

All the work was stopped on December 25, Christmas Day being observed as a holiday, and but little work was done on December 26, on account of the snow and holiday of the previous day.

No masonry work was done during the week, partly on account of the cold weather and partly owing to lack of coal.

The amount of excavation by the steam shovel was about 1,100 cubic yards for the week, but little work being done on December 20 and 24.

The amount of excavation by the hand gangs was about 1,750 cubic yards for the week (this includes core wall excavation).

The average number of men employed was as follows:

Excavation at south end of dam, 173; on main dam, etc., 13; quarry and spawl yard, 98; miscellaneous, 17. Total, 301.

This is only about 63 per cent. of the force employed before the strike; a larger force should be employed. The small force and slight amount of work done during the week was due, to a great extent, however, to the snow, cold weather, lack of coal, and the Christmas holiday.

REPORT No. 464.

NEW YORK, December 23, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I herewith return Report No. 462, relating to proposed changes in the lines of the highways from that ordered by the Supreme Court on December 29, 1899, and January 6, 1900, which you referred back to me for further information, and I herewith transmit, as you directed, maps showing the proposed changes.

The original location of Road No. 17 was made with the view of crossing the tracks of the New York and Putnam Railroad at grade. This would not be permitted, as it is contrary to law, hence the change is necessary in order to throw the road upon higher ground to bridge over the railroad tracks. For the same reason a change in the line of Road No. 31 is made at the crossing of the proposed route of the New York and Mahopac Railroad.

On Road No. 26 east the line crossing the New York and Harlem Railroad is at a sharp angle; the change is made in order to have the bridge cross the railroad tracks squarely.

REPORT No. 462.

NEW YORK, December 15, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I wish to call to your notice the fact that a considerable saving can be made in the cost of constructing the highways in the environs of the New Croton Reservoir by slight changes in the lines now ordered by the court.

On Road No. 5½ a slight change over a portion of the route would shorten the distance, straighten the line and result in a saving of about \$5,000, and a slight change to improve Road No. 6 would result in a saving of about \$2,800.

Slight changes at a trivial expense could be made on the following roads: On Road No. 9 at the junction with the Yorktown road, at the intersection of Road No. 9½ with No. 14, and at the intersection of Roads Nos. 12, 13 and 14 to improve the approach to the new bridge at Old Croton Dam.

On Road No. 17 a change should be made to throw a portion of it upon higher ground to make an overhead bridge, crossing the New York and Putnam Railroad. An embankment has been partly made in view of this change, which will result in a saving of about \$20,000.

On Road No. 19, near Pines Bridge, a change can be made by building a small portion of it further from the reservoir without any increased cost. Such a change has been requested by the Croton Lake Land and Improvement Company.

A change on Road No. 26 west would shorten and straighten the line and result in a saving in the cost of construction. At Duffy's Crossing of the New York and Harlem Railroad on Road No. 26 east a slight change should be made to better the alignment and to reduce the cost of construction.

At Golden's Bridge, on Road No. 29½, a slight change is wanted by abutting property owners; such a change would not increase the cost of construction.

On Road No. 31 a change should be made to throw the line upon higher ground to lessen the cost of constructing the road over the proposed line of the New York and Mahopac Railroad.

All the above changes, except on Roads Nos. 26 east and 29½, can be made upon the City's property and no additional right of way will be required. The additional land required to make the changes on Roads Nos. 26 east and 29½ I believe will be furnished at the expense of the Town of Lewisboro.

The aggregate saving that can be made by the above mentioned changes is \$33,000.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

two buildings, which were transmitted to you by Mr. R. G. Monroe, Commissioner

GENTLEMEN—I herewith return to you forms of contract, specifications and plans of of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, under date of December 8, 1902, and which you referred to me.

On August 24, 1900, Mr. William Dalton, Commissioner of Water Supply, addressed a communication to the Aqueduct Commissioners recommending that preparation be made for the construction of a building to be used by the Department of Water Supply as a residence and office for a resident Assistant Engineer and a house for the resident Foreman in charge of the maintenance of the Croton Dam Division, also for the construction of the necessary barns and outhouses, the buildings to be erected on the high ground northwest of the Old Croton Dam. The flooding of the valley for the New Croton Reservoir will require the removal of the buildings now in use.

On October 30, 1900, the Aqueduct Commissioners authorized the Chief Engineer to order the plans, specifications, etc., to be made by Messrs. Werner & Windolph, architects. A preliminary estimate of the buildings then proposed would cost \$41,000. From time to time during the preparation of the plans, specifications, etc., the architects, as well as myself, were in conference with the Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply. During these consultations it was deemed advisable to build an extension to the stone barn and storehouse for storage room for an emergency plant, consisting of a portable boiler, hoisting engine and coal and water wagons to be used for making repairs when an emergency might occur due to an accident to the Aqueduct or to any of the structures. The expense of the addition and the great increase in the prices of labor and materials since 1900 will increase the cost to \$77,000, according to the estimate made by the architects.

The plans provide that the buildings are to be constructed of stone of a permanent character.

I have examined the form of contract, specifications and plans, and I recommend that the form of specifications and contract be printed and that the plans be lithographed.

As these structures are under the control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, I suggest that the communication be referred to him for his consideration.

The Chief Engineer also presented Report No. 471, dated December 30, 1902, relating to Report No. 456, transmitting a copy of a letter of Richard Weeks, Trustee of the Amawalk Executive Meeting of Friends, concerning the removal of remains from the Salem Friends' Cemetery at Golden's Bridge, and reporting as to a plan of procedure.

The report and the subject matter thereof were referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

A communication was received from Deputy Comptroller Stevenson, dated December 27, 1902, transmitting certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 19, 1902, concurring in and approving of the preamble and resolutions adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners December 19, 1902, relative to the contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam. Which was ordered filed.

A communication was received from the President of the Ocean View Cemetery, dated December 27, 1902, requesting information in reference to the removal of bodies from cemeteries.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated December 19, 1902, requesting the Aqueduct Commissioners to consent to the transfer of John Kenny, Inspector of Masonry, to said Department.

No. 35.

A GENERAL ORDINANCE providing for the issuing of permits for the erection of bay windows projecting beyond the building line.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough Presidents and the Park Commissioners having jurisdiction, shall issue permits for the erection of bay windows projecting beyond the building line, provided in the opinion of the Officer having jurisdiction no injury will come to the public thereby. Permits for the erection of bay windows lying within any park, square or public place, or within a distance of three hundred and fifty feet from the outer boundaries thereof, shall be issued by the Park Commissioner having jurisdiction, as provided in section 612 of the Charter, as amended by section 1, chapter 723 of the Laws of 1901. Permits for the erection of all other bay windows shall be issued by the Borough President having jurisdiction.

For the purposes of this ordinance a "bay window" shall be taken to mean and include all projections on the face of a building in the nature of windows, such as are commonly called bay windows, show windows, oriel windows and bow windows, without regard to the material of which they are constructed or to the purposes for which they are to be used.

Section 2. Before the erection of any bay window projecting beyond the building line shall have been commenced, the owner or his duly authorized agent shall make application in writing to the Officer having jurisdiction, on suitable blanks furnished by him, and shall state the length and width of the proposed bay window, the number of stories through which it is intended to be carried, and the number of square feet of area covered by that portion of the bay window projecting beyond the building line. Drawings showing the size of and area covered by the bay window, the number of stories through which it is proposed to be carried and its location in reference to the lot and building lines shall be submitted with each application, and for the purpose of computing the area covered by a bay window projecting beyond the building line the outside face of the bay, exclusive of cornices, pilasters, trims, etc., shall be the line taken as a basis of computation.

Each application for the erection of a bay window projecting more than one foot beyond the building line shall have indorsed thereon the consent of all the adjoining property owners within a distance of fifty feet from the centre of the bay window, on the same side of the street; meaning, thereby, so much of the side of a street as is unintersected by any other street on which it is proposed to be erected.

Each application shall be accompanied by the amount of the compensation due the City for the privilege of erecting said bay window, as hereinafter provided.

Section 3. Each application for the erection of a bay window projecting more than one foot beyond the building line shall be accompanied by a certified copy of the last assessed valuation of the property on which said bay window is to be erected, which appears upon the books of the Department of Taxes and Assessments. Except as hereinafter provided the amount that shall be paid as a compensation to the City for the privilege of erecting each bay window shall be at the rate of ten per cent. of the assessed value per square foot of the property on which the said bay window is to be erected, for each and every square foot, or fraction thereof, of area covered by said bay window beyond the building line for each and every story through which it is carried.

If the projection of a bay window does not exceed one foot beyond the building line, and it is not carried higher than the sill of the second-story windows, the rate throughout The City of New York shall be ten cents for each square foot or fraction thereof of horizontal area covered by said bay windows beyond the building line.

Section 4. Bay windows may be hereafter erected with a projection of not more than three feet beyond the building line, provided that when the projection exceeds one foot beyond the building line the total number of feet in width occupied by all the bay windows on the same frontage of the same building shall not exceed seventy-five per cent. of the width of the frontage of the building on which they are located. When the total number of feet to width occupied by all the bay windows on the same frontage of the same building exceeds seventy-five per cent. of the width of the frontage of the building on which they are located, the projection shall not exceed one foot beyond the building line, nor shall the bay window be carried higher than the sill course of the second-story windows.

Section 5. Permits for the erection of bay windows shall be issued in duplicate, one of which shall be retained by the applicant, and kept at the building during the erection of the window, and the other shall be filed by him, with the plans for the construction of the window, in the Department of Buildings. If it shall appear, upon completion, that the bay window occupies a greater number of square feet, or has been carried through a greater number of stories than shall have been paid for, the applicant shall pay twice the sum previously paid for each square foot of area occupied by said bay window over and above the number of square feet paid for originally.

Section 6. Permits granted pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance are revocable permits, and shall have the following clause printed thereon, viz.: "This permit is issued subject to revocation thereof at any time hereafter by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, upon the recommendation of the Officer having jurisdiction, when the space occupied by said bay, or any portion thereof, may be required for any public improvement, or upon any violation of any of the terms or conditions upon which this permit is issued." A permit for the erection of a bay window shall be deemed to have expired when the bay window is taken down, and the space formerly occupied thereby shall no longer be used for the purpose for which the permit was issued, unless a permit for its reconstruction shall have been granted, as provided in section 7 of this ordinance. In case it is thereafter desired to erect a bay window on the said property, the applicant shall comply with all the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 7. Permits for the reconstruction of now existing bay windows as defined by this ordinance, and for the reconstruction of all bay windows which shall be hereafter erected under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be issued by the Officer having jurisdiction, without the applicant's obtaining the consent of adjoining property owners, as provided in section 2 of this ordinance; provided that the bay window, when reconstructed, shall have no greater projection or width, nor be carried through a greater number of stories, nor cover a greater area, than the window as originally constructed. And, further, provided that no fee shall be charged for the reconstruction of bay windows which have been erected under the provisions of this ordinance, or for which a fee has been paid for the privilege of erecting the same under the provisions of the laws in force at the time of the erection of the said bay window. The restrictions specified under section 4 of this ordinance shall not apply to the reconstruction of now existing bay windows; but permits issued for the reconstruction of now existing bay windows, for which no fee has heretofore been paid, shall be paid for as provided in section 3 of this ordinance.

Section 8. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to conflict with the provisions of the Building Code, and all bay windows for which permits are issued, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be erected in accordance with all the provisions of said Code in regard to the kind and quality of materials used. No plans for the construction of a bay window as defined in this ordinance shall be approved by the Superintendent of Buildings until the permit is filed, as provided by section 5 of this ordinance.

Section 9. All fees received by the Borough Presidents or the Park Commissioners for the issuing of permits for the erection of bay windows shall be accounted for in proper books kept for that purpose, and shall be turned over by them to the City Chamberlain and credited to the General Fund.

Section 10. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine of ten dollars (\$10) for each offense, and ten dollars (\$10) for each and every day that such offense shall continue, which shall be duly sued for and collected.

Section 11. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE widening East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Boston road to the Bronx river, changing the lines of Tremont avenue from the Bronx river to the first street easterly therefrom, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: That, in pursuance of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted by that Board on the 28th day of November, 1902, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by widening East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street from Boston road to the Bronx river, changing the lines of Tremont avenue from the Bronx river to the first street easterly therefrom, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to widen and change the lines of the aforesaid streets as follows:

1. Widening of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street, from Boston Road to the Bronx River.

This widening consists in adding a strip 70 feet in width on the south side of the existing East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and cutting off the corner at the southeast intersection of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and West Farms road, in order to make the width of Boston road 150 feet.

2. Change of Lines of Tremont Avenue, from the Bronx River to the First Street Easterly Thereof.

It is proposed to deflect Tremont avenue from the first street easterly of the Bronx river in a northerly direction to West Farms road, and to widen West Farms road from 100 feet to 150 feet, from the Bronx river to the first street easterly thereof.

3. Discontinuance of Tremont Avenue, from the Bronx River to the First Street Easterly Thereof.

This discontinuing extends for a distance of about 150 feet from the centre of the Bronx river easterly, where it will meet the changed location of Tremont avenue.

4. The Grades.

A—The grade at the intersection of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Boston road to be 19 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

B—The grade at the bridge over the Bronx river to be at its westerly end 13.7 feet above mean high-water datum, and at its easterly end 15.2 feet above mean high-water datum.

C—The grade at the intersection of Tremont avenue and the first street easterly of the Bronx river to be 20 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Water street, distant 102.28 feet westerly from the intersection of the northerly line of Water street with the westerly line of Coenties slip, and running thence westerly along the northerly side of Water street for a distance of 131.75 feet to the intersection of the northerly line of Water street with the easterly line of Broad street; running thence northerly along the easterly side of Broad street 113.81 feet to the intersection of the easterly line of Broad street with the southerly line of Pearl street; thence easterly along the southerly line of Pearl street a distance of 112.75 feet to a point on the southerly side of Pearl street, distant 102.94 feet westerly from the intersection of the southerly side of Pearl street with the westerly side of Coenties slip; thence southerly for a distance of 108.05 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Charges having been made against Robert S. Peterson, Deputy Clerk in the Police Department, for neglect of duty, in this, to wit:

Specification 1—That the said Robert S. Peterson, while on duty in the office of the Complaint Clerk, and while acting as Acting Complaint Clerk in the said Complaint Bureau, did furnish and permit to be furnished from the records of the Police Department a certain false record of one John Dugan, a Roundsman of the Municipal Police Force in The City of New York, in that the said false record so furnished by the said Robert S. Peterson, reported that the said John Dugan, on June 13, 1882, was fined two days' pay on a conviction for conduct unbecoming an officer, whereas in truth and in fact said John Dugan had been fined twenty-one days' pay on said June 13, 1882, on conviction for assaulting one John Shea; and in that the said false record did report that the said John Dugan was fined one day's pay on conviction upon June 13, 1882, for conduct unbecoming an officer, whereas in truth and in fact the said John Dugan had been fined seven days' pay on the said June 13, 1882, for having assaulted and abused one Julia Roach; that the said fines upon June 13, 1882, of twenty-one days and seven days, heretofore mentioned, were the only fines imposed upon said June 13, 1882, upon the said John Dugan, except a fine of two days' pay upon conviction on said June 13, 1882, for refusing to give his number.

Specification 2—In this, to wit: That the said Robert S. Peterson, while acting as Acting Complaint Clerk in the Complaint Bureau of the Police Department of The City of New York, did alter, and permit to be altered, a certain book in the custody of the said Robert S. Peterson, to wit: "The Record of Complaints of Patrolmen and Doormen," No. 7, from 1876 to 1884, at page 386 thereof, as follows: The record of one John Dugan, appointed Patrolman August 20, 1881, in that the fine of twenty-

one days entered therein on conviction upon June 13, 1882, for assault upon one John Shea, was altered and erased as aforesaid so as to appear two days, and that the fine of seven days' pay on conviction on June 13, 1882, for assault upon one Julia Roach, was altered and erased as aforesaid so as to appear one day's fine.

And an opportunity having been given to the said Robert S. Peterson to make an explanation before Second Deputy Commissioner Alexander R. Piper, on the 13th day of January, 1903, the same having been referred to the Commissioner for decision, upon due consideration, the Commissioner adjudges the said defendant to be guilty thereof, and does convict him thereof, and upon such conviction the Commissioner adjudges and determines that the said Robert S. Peterson be and is dismissed from the Police Department of The City of New York.

Ordered, That a copy of such judgment be filed with the Municipal Civil Service Commission and in this Department.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets, avenues, highways, parkways and public places to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railroad is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successor or assigns. It shall be in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority. One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested free-

holder. The three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the streets, avenues, roads, highways, public places, bridges and viaducts, including power house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority.

Fourth—The New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$15,000, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts, or such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$15,000; during the remaining twenty years of the term, an annual sum which shall not be less than \$30,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$30,000; for the use of the four bridges described above, during the first term of five years the annual sum of \$4,000 for each bridge; during the second term of five years the annual sum of \$4,500 for each bridge; during the third term of five years the annual sum of \$5,000 for each bridge; during the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$5,500 for each bridge; and during the last term of five years the annual sum of \$6,000 for each bridge.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad, provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that portion of the above sums as the time of the commencement of operation of any portion of the road, before September 30th next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30th next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successor or assigns of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute of the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased, or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent of the City.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the Union Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law. Provided, however, that as to such portions of the route of the said railroad which are within the limits of the Borough of Manhattan such railroad shall be operated as soon as practicable by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison avenues in the Borough of Manhattan. And, provided further, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, upon giving to the grantee, its successor or assigns, one year's notice in writing, may require it or them to operate its railroad upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially according to the system now in use on the railroads in the Borough of Manhattan above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, highways, bridges and public places of The City of New York.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street

railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall be five cents, and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the City ordinance.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said street, avenues, highways, parkways, public places, bridges or viaducts, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets, avenues, highways, parkways, bridges and viaducts, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, highway, parkway and public place and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—The said railway company so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues, highways, bridges and viaduct shall cause to be watered the entire roadway of each of the above streets, avenues, highways, bridges and viaduct, except when the width shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, when a roadway of 60 feet shall be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Eighteenth—If any of the streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York, in respect to the opening of such streets, avenues, highways, public places and bridges.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article 4 of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted affecting the surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grant of this franchise shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar franchise upon the same or other terms and conditions over the same bridges and their approaches, and the viaduct and over the streets and highways within a distance of 1,000 feet from the end of such approaches to said bridges and viaduct, to any other person or corporation, and in such case the use of the street railway, including tracks, wires and other equipment constructed thereon by the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, aforesaid, shall be granted by such company to any person or corporation which The City of New York may hereafter grant the right or franchise to use any portion of such viaduct, such bridges and their approaches for the street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum which shall not exceed the legal interest on one-half the cost of the construction of such portion of such street railway, and the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars of such company thereon and one-half the cost of maintenance of the tracks, wires and other equipment of the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company used by the said grantee, including the watering, paving and cleaning of streets from ice and snow and all the other duties imposed upon the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company in connection with the maintenance of the portion of its road used by said grantee. And such persons and companies shall have the right to make all track and other connections which may be requisite and necessary to connect with the tracks of the grantee, its successors or assigns, it being intended by this provision to restrict to two the number of tracks upon the bridges above described and the approaches thereto, including the viaduct in West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

Sec. 5. The portion of the route above described which passes over the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct and the Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and its approaches shall be operated by the grantee, its successors and assigns, solely upon the street railway, erected in such streets, bridge, approaches and viaduct by the Union Railway Company of The City of New York, and not otherwise, and upon such terms of payment as may be agreed upon in the manner fixed by the provisions of a certain grant of a street railway franchise to such Union Railway Company of The City of New York, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 1900, provided that such grant is accepted by said Union Railway Company and in case such grant shall not be accepted by such company then the operation of the Inter-Borough Railway Company over such bridge and viaduct shall be carried on in such manner as may be provided by subsequent legislation.

Sec. 6. Said railway company shall commence construction within six months from the date

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.
