DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1906.

October 22, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith, pursuant to the provisions of section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the report of the Department of Public Charities for the quarter ending June 30, 1906, together with reports of the heads of the institutions under the jurisdiction of the Department for the same period:

On April 5 the following letter was sent to Hon. Patrick F. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen, relative to the purchase of coal in open market by the Department:

"I beg respectfully to ask that this Department be authorized to purchase coal in the open market in an amount not to exceed a total cost of \$5,000. Said amount will carry this Department through a period of two or three months, by which time the question of the impending strike in the coal industry may be settled and the balance of the coal needed for this Department may be advertised for in the regular way.

"After due advertisement in the CITY RECORD for 7,000 tons pea coal, 1,200 tons stove coal and one ton blacksmiths' coal for the institutions of this Department in the Borough of Brooklyn, bids for which were to be opened on December 21, 1905, no bids were received. An advertisement for these same amounts was inserted in the CITY RECORD and corporation papers, bids for which were to be opened yesterday, but no bids were received. This is no doubt due to the imminence of a general coal strike.

"We can buy coal in the open market if we can obtain authority from the Board of Aldermen to do so. I enclose a form of resolution, trusting that in this form or

in some other form that may seem to you more appropriate, the resolution may be adopted at the next meeting of the Board.

On April 10 the Board of Aldermen adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of fourteen thousand one hundred and seventy dollars and one cent (\$14,170.01), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the purpose of paying salaries of employees in the Department of Charities for the year 1906."

And on May 25 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and concurs, to the extent of twelve thousand nine hundred and thirty-five dollars (\$12,935) in the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 10, 1906, and requesting the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of fourteen thousand one hundred and seventy dollars and one cent (\$14,170.01), the proceeds whereof to be applied to paying the salaries of employees in the Department of Charities for the year 1906, and that for the purpose of paying the salaries of one Confidential Stenographer, one Confidential Inspector of Food Supplies, two Assistant Superintendents, two Stewards, one Dietitian, one Pilot and one Engineer, for the remaining seven months of the year 1906, and of thirteen Hospital Helpers for the last eleven months of said year, and of paying increases in the salaries of two Pilots and twenty Engineers for the remaining seven months, and of providing means for the payment of such salaries and increases of salaries, the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, to issue Special Revenue Bonds of The City of New York to the amount of twelve thousand nine hundred and thirty-five dollars (\$12,935), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue."

April 17—Bids were opened for labor and material for:

1. Putting new roof on the Infants' Hospital Building, Randall's Island.

2. Setting new sash and frames in Female Tuberculosis Building, Metropolitan Hospital.

There were nine bidders, the lowest being Edward Stapleton for \$1,895.

April 20—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material necessary to supply and hang new sash and repair window frames in the Infants' Hospital Building, Randall's Island." There were five bidders, the lowest being Neptune B. Smyth, for \$4,170, and the contract was awarded to him on April 21, 1906.

April 24—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material necessary to erect new wooden inclosures on the first tier of the Male and Female barracks at the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwell's Island." There were six bidders, the lowest being A. S. Traub, for \$2,390, and the contract was awarded to him on April 25, 1906.

April 27—Bids were opened "For furnishing labor and material for putting new roof on the Infants' Hospital, Randall's Island." There were four bidders, the lowest being Rubin Solomon & Son, for \$3,098.

May 2—Bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering forty-seven hundred (4,700) tons of ice." There was only one bid received, the Foster-Scott Company, for \$27,730, and awarded on May 7, 1906, as it was necessary to get ice at once, owing to the failure of regular contractor to make deliveries.

May 7—Bids were opened "For furnishing labor and material necessary to install eight slop sinks in the male kitchen of the City Hospital, Blackwell's Island." There were five bidders, the lowest being J. D. Duffy, for \$897, to whom the contract was awarded May 10.

On the same day, bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material necessary to erect an inclosed passageway in the rear of the tents for the treatment of male tuberculosis cases, Metropolitan Hospital, and connect same with toilet of male tuberculosis hospital, Blackwell's Island." There were eight bidders, the lowest being James J. Buckley for \$2,175, and the contract was awarded him May 10.

May 16—Bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering groceries, agate ware, crockery, soaps, drygoods, hardware, lumber, and for other miscellaneous supplies." There were eleven bidders.

May 17—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material required for the erection of a new female dormitory, Blackwell's Island." There were fifteen (15) bidders, the lowest being Fuller & O'Connor, to whom the contract was awarded May 18 at \$36,967.

May 21—Bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering anthracite coal, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens." There were only three bidders, the lowest being John F. Schmadeke for \$27,236, to whom the contract was awarded May 23, 1906.

May 21—Bids were also opened "For furnishing and delivering horses, ice and manure, for Borough of Richmond," at which there were only four bidders. No bid for ice was received.

May 23—The contract for delivering four horses at \$275 each was awarded to Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company, they being the lowest bidders; for manure, to Kane & Wright, at \$1.1375 per cubic yard, or \$2,275 for the amount required, they being the lowest bidders.

May 23—Awards on opening of May 16 were made to the lowest bidders on the different articles mentioned in the advertisement.

May 23—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material required for the plumbing and drainage of the new female dormitory at the City Hospital, Blackwell's Island." There were six bidders, the lowest being the Metropolitan Plumbing Contracting Company, to whom the contract was awarded for \$4,299.

May 29—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material required for additions to male servants' dormitory, Randall's Island. There were twelve bidders, the lowest being J. & L. Moreland Company, to whom the contract was awarded on June 7 at \$40,275.

May 29—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material necessary to make certain alterations and repairs to the fire house on Blackwell's Island." There were nine bidders and the contract was awarded on June 7 to the lowest bidder, Martin Tully, at \$4,395.

May 29—Bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering distilled water, lockers and hospital furniture." There were seven bidders and awards were made on June 7 to the lowest bidders on the several items.

June 7—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material required for steam heating the new female dormitory at the City Hospital, Blackwell's Island." There were six bidders and award was made on June 7 to the lowest bidder, Harry F. Philp, for \$2,465.

June 21—Bids were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material necessary to install a complete steam heating apparatus in the male helpers' dormitory, Randall's Island." There were six bidders. The award was made to the lowest bidder, Harry Philp, for \$2,512, on June 22.

June 25—Bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering hospital supplies." There were twenty-six bidders and awards were made to the lowest bidders.

Three Hundred Dollar Emergency Fund for Central Office, Brooklyn.

On June 2 the following letter was sent to Hon. Patrick F. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen:

"For the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the conduct of the Brooklyn Central Office (located at No. 327 Schermerhorn street, Brooklyn) of the Department of Public Charities, such as the monthly car fare and other like bills of the examiners, as well as for postage stamps and other minor expenses, I respectfully request authority for James J. McInerney, Second Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities, in charge of the Brooklyn office, by a requisition, to draw upon the Comptroller of The City of New York for a sum not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300); and that the Second Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may by him be deemed necessary, to

the extent of the appropriation set apart for 'Supplies and Contingencies' of the Department of Public Charities; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller, by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified to by the Commissioner of Public Charities, covering the expenditure of the money paid thereon.

"We have a contingency fund for the use of the Central Office, Manhattan, established under the provisions of a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted May 7, 1897, but no such provision has ever been made for the Brooklyn Central Office. The present system is for the Examiners to put in vouchers in the ordinary way for moneys expended. This causes very great delay and inconvenience to persons receiving small compensation; hence this request for a contingency fund for the Second Deputy Commissioner. I inclose a form of resolution.

"Trusting that in this form, or in some other form that may seem to you more appropriate, the resolution may be adopted at the next meeting of the Board.

The said request was granted in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 12, 1906, and approved by the Mayor June 19:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Public Charities, in a communication to this Board, dated June 2, 1906, has requested that in order to facilitate the work of the Brooklyn Central Office, of the Department of Public Charities, a contingency fund be granted for the Second Deputy Commissioner in charge of said office; therefore be it

Resolved, That for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Brooklyn Central Office, the Second Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities may, by a requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars (\$300), and the Second Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may by him be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for Supplies and Contingencies of the Department of Public Charities; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Commissioner of Public Charities covering the expenditures of money paid thereon.

Report of the Grand Jury, County of Kings, for May, on Kings County Institutions.

On June 6 copy of a report by the Kings County Grand Jury was received, of which the following extract relates to the institutions in the County of Kings, which are under the jurisdiction of this Department:

County Buildings.

"On approaching the Kings County Buildings one is favorably impressed, at this season of the year, with the beauty of the grounds and their well kept condition.

"The almshouses, considering the fact that they have been built many years, are in an excellent state of preservation, and the Committee cannot commend too heartily the excellent condition prevailing. The buildings themselves are thoroughly neat in appearance and well ventilated, and as safe from the dangers of fire as conditions will permit. The sanitation is good, especially considering the fact that the buildings are not modern.

"The inmates of these institutions, both men and women, appear to be well cared for and well fed, and as contented and happy as such circumstances will permit. One cannot escape the thought that these people are experiencing infinitely better conditions than people of their class enjoy in their own homes.

"The food is plain and substantial, and the system of handling it is excellent. A model grocery department, butcher shop and bakery on the grounds offer facilities for the best and most economic results in the matter of feeding. A large cold storage apartment, cooled by an ice plant in the basement, is an important feature of the butcher shop.

"The recently added extension to the women's almshouse, furnishing each floor with ample sun parlors, cannot be commended too highly. It is not only a matter of comfort and health to the occupants of the building during the unpleasant season of the year, but gives added facilities for handling many when the building is overcrowded as at the present time.

"The hospital appears to be run with excellent system and under good discipline. A good state of order and neatness prevails. The operating room represents the result of the latest thought on the science of surgery. This apartment is fitted with every appliance of the most up-to-date character used in modern surgery. The hospital is fitted with a complete electrical outfit for X-ray treatment and X-ray photography. Some excellent and unusual results have been obtained in this line of work.

"The force of Nurses at the hospital is at present too small for the number of patients. This is explained as being due to the fact that sufficient good material is not available at all times.

"To sum up the situation, it is recommended that the conditions prevailing at the county buildings be reported as eminently satisfactory."

May 26—Commencement exercises of the Metropolitan Hospital Training School held at the Solarium, Blackwell's Island. At said exercises the library of the late Dr. Egbert Guernsey was presented to the Department of Public Charities for the use of the Medical Staff and Nurses of the Metropolitan Hospital and Training School by his daughter, Miss Florence Guernsey. It was accepted by the Commissioner on behalf of the Department.

June 1—The resignation of Mr. Joseph B. Pearce, Jr., Superintendent of the New York City Farm Colony, was accepted, and Henry Jetter was appointed in his place at the same salary. (See Special Order No. 7.)

June 2—Name of the "Bureau of Dependent Children" changed to the "Children's Bureau." (See General Order No. 20.)

June 5. Opening of the new chapel on Randall's Island and the benediction of the altar by the Bishop-Coadjutor of New York.

June 7—New dietary approved and ordered into effect, June 15, for the inmates of the New York City Farm Colony, who dine in the general dining room; also a new dietary ordered into effect same day for the inmates of the "cottages." (See diets printed in full under Special Orders Nos. 27 and 28.)

June 15. Miss Kate Tureaud was reappointed as Supervising Nurse at Randall's Island.

The First Deputy Commissioner.

April 1. Richard C. Baker was appointed First Deputy Commissioner, vice James E. Dougherty, who resigned March 31, 1906. (See General Orders Nos. 11 and 12.)

Crematory for Bodies of Unclaimed Dead.

April 3. The following letter was forwarded to the Comptroller on this subject: "Hon. Herman A. Metz, Comptroller:

"Dear Sir—Noting with interest your recent proposition, as reported in the enclosed press clippings, of establishing a crematory for the incineration of the bodies of the unclaimed dead, I beg leave to call your attention to section 673 of the Greater New York Charter, which provides as follows:

"The Commissioner of Public Charities and the Commissioner of Correction are respectively empowered to cause to be cremated the bodies of deceased paupers and criminals where relatives do not object to such cremation; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the approval of the Board of Aldermen, may cause to be erected and equipped proper facilities for such cremation."

"Should it be decided to remove the Potters' Field from Brooklyn, as pending legislation now proposes, it will probably be necessary to establish such a crematory. With a daily boat service from all the boroughs, it would be quite practicable, it seems to me, to do away to a great extent with Potters' Fields throughout the entire city.

During the quarter the following general orders were issued:

General Order No. 11.

April 2, 1906.

Ordered, That Mr. Richard C. Baker be and he is hereby appointed First Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, and is to be obeyed and respected accordingly. In this connection attention is called to the following provisions of section 659 of the Greater New York Charter:

"The Commissioner shall have power to appoint and in his discretion to remove not more than two Deputies, to be known as First Deputy and Second Deputy, and shall define their duties. The First Deputy shall, during the absence or disability of the Commissioner, possess all the powers and perform all the duties of the Commissioner except the power of making appointments."

In accordance with the provisions of the foregoing section of the Charter the duties of the First Deputy Commissioner are defined as follows:

The First Deputy Commissioner shall have general supervision of the offices, institutions, piers and boats of the Department in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and shall see that the rules and regulations of the Department are carefully observed in all such offices and institutions and on all such piers and boats. He shall visit and inspect all such offices and institutions, piers and boats as frequently as possible, and at least once in each fortnight, and shall promptly bring to the attention of the Commissioner, in writing, any abuse, evil or defect that he may discover in the work of the Department, or of any employee thereof, with his recommendations for remedying the same. In pursuance of these duties the First Deputy Commissioner shall give special attention to the food and other supplies of the Department and to the punctuality, deportment and industry of all the employees in the boroughs hereinbefore specified. He is authorized and empowered to bring charges against any such employee who fails to observe any of the rules and regulations of the Department and to suspend from duty any such employee pending the result of such charges.

Special duties shall from time to time be devolved upon the First Deputy, as circumstances may require.

General Order No. 12.

April 2, 1906.

Ordered, That Mr. Frank Kunzmann be and he is hereby appointed Private Secretary to the Commissioner, which position carries with it the duty of acting as Assistant Treasurer of the Department.

Authority is given to the Private Secretary to make full and detailed examination into the several trust funds and accounts of the Department and in all related matters for which the Commissioner is responsible. In all such matters, as well as in such matters as may be specially referred to him from time to time for attention, the Private Secretary is the direct personal representative of the Commissioner. All funds and accounts must be open to his inspection and examination and such other information as he may require is also to be given to him fully and freely at all times in accordance with his request.

Except in special instances, visitors wishing to see the Commissioner are to be referred to the office of the Private Secretary for attention.

Ordered, That, except in emergencies, no officer, employee or other person connected with the Department or otherwise, shall use the Department telephones except upon official business, and that the heads of institutions and bureaus shall see that this order is enforced.

General Order No. 14.

April 9, 1906.

In the preparation of reports intended for publication in the annual report, the quarterly report or otherwise, please to observe such of the rules as are applicable, laid down in the accompanying copy of "Notes for the Guidance of Authors," published by the Macmillan Company.

In preparing reports, paper 8½ by 11 inches, with a margin of 1 inch on the left side, is to be used whenever practicable.

General Order No. 15.

April 16, 1906.

To Heads of Institutions:

The State Charities Law, chapter 546 of the Laws of 1896, in section 111, provides as follows, with relation to the admission of patients to Craig Colony:

"Apportionment of State Patients—Whenever applications are made at one time for admission of more State patients than can be properly accommodated in the colony, the managers shall so apportion the number received, that each county may be represented in a ratio of its dependent epileptic population to the dependent epileptic population of the State, as shown by statistics furnished by the State Board of Charities."

Section 109 of the same act provides:

"It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of the Poor in every County and of the poor authorities of every city to furnish annually to the State Board of Charities a list of all epileptics in their respective jurisdictions, so far as the same can be ascertained, with such particulars as to the condition of such epileptics as shall be prescribed by said Board."

It will thus be seen that the number of patients that this Department can send to Craig Colony, and thus relieve the Department of the burden of their care, depends largely upon the fullness and accuracy of the census of epileptics reported by the Department to the State Board of Charities. Please, therefore, to report to the Superintendent of the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Manhattan Division, from time to time as they come under your notice or supervision, the facts with relation to all epileptic patients or inmates, as follows:

Name, age, sex, residence, married or single, physical condition, mental condition.

General Order No. 16.

May 5, 1906.

The General Bookkeeper and Auditor, in addition to the other duties of his office, shall establish and maintain a careful and thorough audit of the alimony, bastardy and other related financial accounts, generally known as the "Court Fund Accounts," in the offices of the Department in the several boroughs, of the results of which he shall make a report monthly, on or before the 15th of each month for the preceding month, in the form prescribed by the Commissioner, together with such other general or special reports as may be required from time to time.

The General Bookkeeper and Auditor shall also pass upon the form and efficiency of all bonds required by the Commissioner from employees having the custody of moneys, and shall see that all such employees furnish bonds in due form and sufficient amount, and that all such bonds are renewed when necessary, in order that the security may be continuously in force.

General Order No. 17.

May 24, 1906.

Attention is called to the following rules of the Department, adopted December 6, 1899:

"Ordered, That no subscription paper shall be circulated by the officers of any institution in this Department among employees of this Department,"

—which is now reaffirmed and adopted in amended form, as follows:

"Ordered, That no subscription paper shall be circulated among employees of this Department, and that no assessment shall be levied nor payment required by way of subscription from any such employee, by or at the instance of or with the consent of any officer or employee of the Department.

"Violation of this rule by any officer or employee will be regarded as warrant for the dismissal of such officer or employee."

General Order No. 18.

May 23, 1906.

To Heads of Institutions in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond:

Ordered, You are hereby instructed that whenever you have any patient or patients in your institution who, in your opinion, should be examined in regard to their mental faculties, notice of such fact should be communicated to the General Inspector of this Department at the earliest possible moment, and such cases should not be sent to the Psychopathic Ward of Bellevue Hospital without first consulting the General Inspector of this Department.

General Order No. 19.

May 31, 1906.

To Heads of Institutions:

The following rules and regulations of the Department, prescribing the duties and functions of the Dietitian at the Principal Office of the Department, have this day been adopted by the Commissioner, to go into effect June 1, 1906. The purpose of these rules and regulations is to secure a better food supply for the institutions of the Department, and all persons affected will govern themselves accordingly:

1. The hours of duty of the Dietitian at the principal office of the Department shall be from 6 a. m. to 8 a. m., from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, and from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. every week day except Saturday, when he shall be relieved at 2 p. m., or as soon thereafter as the boat leaves on its final trip to the islands.

2. He shall receive from the General Storekeeper a copy of all contracts for food supplies, other than meats, fish and poultry, and shall familiarize himself with the requirements of such contracts.

3. He shall also receive from the General Storekeeper a dated carbon copy of each order sent out for food supplies, with the name and address of the purveyor and the time and place the Department required the supply to be delivered. These copies of orders shall be filed by the Dietitian in a binder kept for that purpose, and the items of the said orders shall be duly checked with the date upon which the goods are delivered in accordance with the requirements of the Department.

4. The Dietitian shall keep a record of the dates upon which the Department requires the delivery of goods specified in the orders. Should the articles as specified not be received at the Department's pier in the quantity or of the quality ordered, or in time for the boat upon which they should be sent to the islands, he shall communicate with the contractor or purveyor, through the General Storekeeper when practicable, and otherwise directly, for the purpose of securing an immediate delivery of the articles required at such point as they shall be required.

5. Upon the receipt of food supplies at the Department's pier, the Dietitian shall make an inspection of the quantity of all supplies except meats, fish and poultry, and shall make an inspection of the quality of all supplies except meats, fish and poultry and such goods as may be delivered in tin, glass, stone and pasteboard packages. Such inspections shall be made before the delivery wagon leaves the pier.

The quality of the eggs shall be determined by such supervision of the candling and by such other means as may seem necessary to supplement the work done in candling the eggs by the contractor's employees.

The Dietitian shall be required to keep a record of the daily lactometer test of the quality of at least four cans of the milk delivered at the pier, of the appearance, flavor and cleanliness, so far as by him ascertainable, of every can of milk delivered at the pier, and of the condition of the cans in which the milk is delivered. He shall take samples of the milk daily for the determination of total solids, fats and specific gravity.

The Dietitian shall make such further tests of the food supplies as may be necessary to satisfy his judgment that the articles are up to the standard required by the Department, in accordance with the terms of its contracts and orders.

In the event of such inspection and tests requiring an unusual length of time, so that the purveyor's wagon could not await the decision, or that the supply could not be sent on the first boat, the Dietitian shall report the circumstances to the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian. In the event of any delay whatever in the sending of supplies from the Twenty-sixth street pier to the institutions, the Dietitian shall communicate immediately with the Store and the Dietitian of the institution affected and state what arrangements have been made for the delivery of the supply.

6. A duplicate of the report to the General Storekeeper upon the quantity and quality of meats, fish and poultry delivered to the Department at the pier shall be furnished the Dietitian by the Meat Inspector.

7. The quantity of all goods received in tin, glass, stone and pasteboard packages shall be reported to the General Storekeeper by the Dietitian immediately upon its arrival, for the purpose of permitting of an inspection by the General Storekeeper. When the cases containing such goods have been marked as approved by the General Storekeeper, the Dietitian will be responsible for such goods being forwarded to the Storehouse by the first boat from the pier.

8. The Dietitian shall report to the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian, as soon as practicable, the condition of such food supplies as he deems not to be of the quality required by the Department, in order that the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian may have an opportunity to inspect such articles before they are rejected. In case there remains any question as to the acceptability of any such supply, the question shall be settled by the agreement of the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian, subject at all times to the action of the Commissioner; and in case of their non-agreement the matter may, if necessary, be referred to the Commissioner.

9. Upon inspection of the food supply by the Dietitian, he shall, if the quantity and quality be acceptable, superintend the placing of the articles on the boat in such manner as to insure their proper care in transit to the institution. He shall be responsible for seeing that all goods liable to freezing are covered or placed in such manner that they will not be frozen in transit. He shall also be responsible for placing all supplies which may be affected by sunlight, heat or dust in a cool, clean and sheltered part of the boat, as may be provided for them.

10. The Dietitian shall have such other and further duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the rules and regulations of the Department.

11. The Dietitian at the principal office of the Department shall be immediately responsible to the Departmental Dietitian for the observance of the foregoing rules and regulations.

12. These rules and regulations, which are to go into effect June 1, 1906, are subject to change by the Commissioner at any time.

The death certificate shall in every case, except in Coroner's cases, be sent with the body. In case the attending physician is unwilling to state the cause of death absolutely he shall state the same as of his information and belief."

Most Urgent Needs of Department in the Way of New Buildings, etc.

On June 29 the following communication on this subject was forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—To meet the most urgent needs of this Department for "new buildings and additions, alterations and extraordinary repairs to buildings and apparatus," I have the honor to request an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$1,593,000, to be expended for the following purposes:

1. For the enlargement of the facilities of the City Hospital on Blackwell's Island in order to make provision for the care of a greater number of patients and thereby to relieve the overcrowding of the hospital such as has occurred for several winters. To accomplish this purpose in the most economical manner possible, it is proposed to remove the family of the Superintendent and the members of the Medical Staff from the hospital building and to house them in separate buildings to be erected adjacent to the hospital. It is also proposed to erect a separate service building for the kitchens, dining-rooms and storerooms of the hospital with their necessary appurtenances, thereby releasing additional room for the care of patients. It is estimated that this additional room will provide for about 250 patients, at an expense of \$175,000, or \$700 a bed, whereas the cost of new construction for this purpose seldom falls below \$2,000 a bed.

For the construction of a residence for the Superintendent and his family it is proposed to expend \$20,000 00

For the construction of a residence for the Medical Staff it is proposed to expend 30,000 00

For the construction of a storehouse and service building with all necessary equipment and appurtenances it is proposed to expend 125,000 00

Making a total expenditure for enlargement of the facilities of the City Hospital of \$175,000 00

2. For the enlargement of the facilities of the Metropolitan Hospital on Blackwell's Island, and the better housing of the employees, which is most urgently demanded. This hospital, which has capacity for over a thousand patients, is greatly overcrowded every winter, and its facilities in all respects overtaxed. The quarters for its help are so thoroughly unsuitable that it is difficult to induce good employees to remain in the service. Some additional provision is being made for the housing of the male employees at this hospital, but nothing has been done for the women employees. It is impossible to increase the nursing force of the hospital until further provision is made for housing the Nurses.

It is accordingly proposed to construct a new Nurses' Home and Training School at a cost of.....	\$200,000 00
And to use the present Nurses' Home and Training School building for housing the female employees of the hospital, adding to it facilities by the construction of a wing, to cost approximately.....	50,000 00
It is also proposed to add a wing to the male employees' dormitory building, now in course of construction, to cost.....	50,000 00
With these additions we should be able to make suitable provision for the employees of the hospital and at the same time to add greatly to its facilities for caring for patients, both results being most desirable.	
It is also proposed to add to the facilities of the hospital through the construction of a storehouse and service building, with all necessary equipment and appurtenances, to cost.....	125,000 00

With these changes and improvements in the Metropolitan Hospital, estimated to cost.....	\$425,000 00
—provision can be made for 125 additional patients, and at the same time the employees can be properly housed and maintained.	=====

To furnish beds for this additional number of patients alone, were a new hospital construction provided for them, would cost, at the low estimate of \$2,000 a bed, upwards of \$250,000, and the plan proposed is the most economical way of meeting the situation.

3. For additional facilities at the City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Manhattan Division, Blackwell's Island. At the present time there is no day room provided for the women inmates of this institution, who at present number of 1,229, and such a room is a humane provision urgently needed.

It is proposed to erect such a structure, with its appurtenances, at a cost of.....

The day room at present provided for the male inmates, who now number 1,093, is a low wooden structure, improvised by the Superintendent some years ago. It is not only unsanitary, but is otherwise absolutely unfit for the purpose.

CONDITION OF CONTRACTS.

New Boiler House at City Hospital, Blackwell's Island.

This work was started on the 30th of June, 1905, the time allowed for the completion of the entire contract being 100 working days; giving ample allowance for weather and extra work, the time limit would have expired on January 25.

The work has been progressing very slowly, and the contractors have not shown any desire to complete the contract speedily, paying little or no attention to the notices sent them. There is really little work left to be done; but when I consider the methods of the contractors, I cannot say when the work will be completed. Under ordinary circumstances two weeks would be ample time. For the past month the boilers have been in use for testing purposes, and during the past week they have been used for heating the entire institution. The work on the building contract yet to be completed is as follows: Doors to be hung and covered with metal, toilet inclosures to be covered with metal, sash hung and hardware to be put on, walls cleaned down and some cement flooring for the coal yard, sash and doors painted.

Isolation Pavilion, Kings County Hospital.

This building has been entirely completed, and early in the quarter occupied.

Alterations to the Consumptives' Building, Kings County Hospital.

This building was completed and is now being occupied by the children for whom it was altered.

Male Dormitory, Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island.

The Corporation Counsel having decided that the building must be erected upon the site originally selected, the contractors were directed to abandon the work already done and to start the building on the original site. A claim for compensation for the work then completed was filed with this office, and, together with my report on same, was submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his decision. He has not as yet given same.

The work on the building has been progressing rapidly. Upon excavating, it was found that the footing at the depth shown on the plans was not as good as desired in one corner of the building, but was secure enough to stand two tons per square foot. In order to reduce the pressure to a minimum, the footings were spread an additional six inches on each side and increased to sixteen inches in thickness, and the walls stepped up to their required thickness. This reduced the load to one ton per foot, and gives a good and secure foundation.

The second tier of beams are now in position, and during August the building should be topped out.

The plumbing for the building should be started during this month.

Metal Ceilings, Cumberland Street Hospital.

This work is progressing fairly well, but another gang of workmen could be used to advantage. The contractor tells me that he has tried to procure more men, but had not been successful up to last Thursday. However, the top floor of the hospital is entirely completed, and within the month the job should be finished.

Inclosure for Stairs, Cumberland Street Hospital.

The stairs leading from the top balcony to the roof garden being only a railing 2 feet 6 inches high, caused the patients to become dizzy; therefore an expanded metal inclosure was erected to a height of 8 feet, and seems to answer its purpose all right.

Cement Floor, Store Room, Cumberland Street Hospital.

This work was completed during April.

New Cement Floor, Klondike Building, New York City Home.

This work was considerably delayed on account of the low bidder having made a mistake in his bid and declaring same before the opening. The matter was submitted to the Corporation Counsel, who decided that he could withdraw the bid, and the award be made to the second bidder.

The work for a while progressed rapidly, so that the grading and bedding is all completed, and the contractor is now waiting for cement, which has been long in arriving. I should say that three weeks will see the work completed.

New Window Frames and Sash, Female Tuberculosis Infirmary, Metropolitan Hospital.

The sash and frames are all delivered and about one-quarter are in position. Another week should see them all in place and only the plastering, painting and hardware to be done.

New Roof, Infants' Hospital.

All of the painting, patching, slate work and leaded work is completed, and all of the roofing material is on the ground. On Thursday the roofer started the composition roofing, which will be completed in three weeks.

Metal Ceilings for Six Buildings, New York City Home for Aged and Infirm.

All of the wards in all of the buildings are completed and painted. The small rooms ought to be finished by July 20.

Metal Ceilings for Male and Female Tuberculosis Infirmary, Metropolitan Hospital.

The first floor of the male infirmary is completed and the work progressing very rapidly. The finish coat of painting on this floor will be applied this week.

Inclosures for First Tiers, Male and Female Barracks.

This work is going along nicely. The cement floors are completed, but two panels have to be renewed on account of the inmates having walked on same.

The frame work on one side of the male barracks is completed and is now ready for the sash and painting.

New Female Dormitory, City Hospital, Blackwell's Island.

The excavation is completed, and, if the cement, sand and stone were on the job, the contractor could finish his footings. This material has held the work back a few days, but should be delivered by Tuesday.

Plumbing, New Female Dormitory, City Hospital.

This work cannot progress until the building is further under way. The hot and cold water connections were made last Monday, so that it will not be necessary to shut down those lines, which are in connection with the new layout, when they are in operation.

Repairs to the Fire House, Blackwell's Island.

The cellar ceiling is completed and the work on the plumbing started. The contractor has not had time to get his material on the job, but should be making a good showing by the end of the coming week.

Remodeling Male Servants' Dormitory, Randall's Island.

The contract for this work has not yet been approved by the Comptroller, but the contractor has started his work on his own responsibility.

The excavation is almost completed, and the ground shows as follows:

Under the top soil, which runs about two feet deep, is solid earth for a depth of four feet more; then a strata of sand, nice, coarse, clean, gritty sand, was met, but this lasted only a few inches—perhaps a foot. At this point I noticed that water from a rain of the night before did not soak through, and I came to the conclusion that perhaps we would strike rock soon, but under the same runs a layer of clay which holds the water to some extent, but I think that at the required depth, which is a foot below the sand strata, we will come to good ground or perhaps rock.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—Herewith is submitted my report for the second quarter of the current year:

Organization.

Pupil Dietitians—On April 11 Miss Bailey completed her term of service at the Metropolitan Hospital. Miss Eastman, who had been substituting for the Dietitian at the City Home, was transferred to the Metropolitan Hospital, and completed her term of service as Pupil Dietitian there on June 1. Both Miss Bailey and Miss Eastman were granted the Department certificate in recognition of their work.

Appointments as Pupil Dietitians were made as follows:

June 1, Miss Amelia McNaughton at the Metropolitan Hospital.

June 14, Miss Lita F. Rogers at the City Hospital.

Dietitians—On June 15, Miss E. A. George, Dietitian at the City Hospital, was relieved from duty for her annual vacation.

Miss E. Grace McCullough has tendered her resignation, to take effect July 1.

On June 1, Chas. A. Ashenden, Dietitian, was appointed to the position of Dietitian at the principal office of the Department. The necessity for creating this position was set forth in a letter to you, written by myself, under date of January 25, 1906.

General Order No. 19, dated May 31, 1906, addressed to Heads of Institutions, on the rules and regulations of the Department, prescribing the duties and functions of the Dietitian at the principal office of the Department, stated that "the purpose of these rules and regulations is to secure a better food supply for the institutions of the Department, and all persons affected will govern themselves accordingly." (For the duties and functions of the Dietitian at the principal office of the Department, see Exhibit "A").

Kitchens—The feasibility of reorganizing the service in the main kitchen at the City Hospital has been the subject of several reports made to yourself. One of the first steps necessary in the plan is that of securing more skillful cooks. This has not yet been accomplished.

Dining Rooms—It is to be regretted that patients suffering from tuberculosis are being employed in the dining hall at the Tuberculosis Infirmary, together with non-tubercular employees.

Buildings and Equipment.

An office has been built on the pier for the accommodation of the Dietitian at the principal office of the Department. This room provides space and equipment for the inspection of perishable food supplies, with the exception of eggs, which are candled in the room adjoining.

The test of the use of galvanized iron ware for food containers, in place of wooden tubs, formerly used at the City Home, has been completed to the satisfaction of those interested. It is agreed that the boxes now made at the City Home, supporting an inner box of galvanized iron, the latter being removable, are very practical and a great improvement upon the former means of conveying cooked food.

At the City Hospital there has been provided equipment for six trays for meals to be used for doctors and officers who happen to be ill at the institution. Heretofore great difficulty has been experienced in serving these meals to this class of inmates, owing to the scarcity of the regular table furnishings, and their unadaptability to tray service. The new equipment consists of plates, cups, saucers, knives, forks, all of luncheon and tea size, and of white metal soup tureens, coffee pots, sugar bowls, cream

pitchers and meat platters with covers, all of these of the size suited for individual portions. This equipment has made the service of these meals more satisfactory and attractive than they had heretofore been.

Food and Dietaries.

Arrangements have been made with the Department bakery to supply rolls for the clerks' dining room at the Metropolitan Hospital.

Considerable attention has been given to comparative tests of Cleveland Baking Powder and Egg Baking Powder with regard to their adaptability to the needs of this Department.

An investigation has been made of milk contracts and the standards required by different departments and institutions of the City, with the object of improving the specifications for milk in the contracts made by this Department. My recommendation was that the Department advertise for certified milk according to the requirements of the Milk Commission of the Medical Society of the County of New York.

The Dietitian at the principal office of the Department has been instructed to test every can of milk received at Twenty-sixth street pier for temperature, specific gravity, cream content, cleanliness, acidity, and to inspect the condition of the cans. For this purpose there has been provided a Babcock milk testing machine, Farrington's alkali test tablets and several lactometers. It is expected that during the summer months the use of the alkali test tablets will enable us to reject at this pier milk which is apparently sweet but which would turn sour within a few hours. The Dietitian also sends samples daily to the General Drug Department for the determination of total solids and fats, and samples to the Health Department for the bacteria count.

An increased allowance of fresh fruits and vegetables has been asked for by both training schools for nurses; my recommendation to you was that a per capita allowance of five cents per diem be made the basis of expenditure for these commodities in the training school dietaries.

A request for additional food supplies to lend variety to the menu for the doctors at City Hospital was disapproved by yourself; among other things additional fresh fruits and vegetables were asked for and my recommendation to you was that a per capita allowance of seven cents per diem be made as the basis of estimate for these commodities.

An apparent shortage of meats at the City Hospital was found upon investigation to be due to inaccuracies in weights received, the weight sometimes exceeding and sometimes falling below the amounts required. Thus, although the average of weights for a considerable period of time was correct the actual weights were not as required. Greater accuracy in this matter is now observed.

Two articles of food supply, namely, canned succotash and Durkee's salad dressing, were cut from the schedule by yourself, with the instructions that succotash should be made from corn and beans and salad dressing be made from the olive oil, the corn, beans and olive oil being supplied by the schedule.

Under date of April 28 the amount of fine coffee for City Hospital was ordered by yourself to be reduced one-half in order that only officers and employees of the highest grade should receive this coffee, it having been previously distributed to certain employees of lower grades.

Changes in Dietaries—The dietary for Hospital Helpers at the Metropolitan Hospital was improved at the additional cost of \$1.50 per capita per annum by the substitution for bologna sausage of fresh meat, dried beef, macaroni and cheese, fresh fish and dried fish in rotation.

New Dietaries—In May the dietaries for the inmates of cottages at the New York City Farm Colony and for the general dining rooms at the New York City Farm Colony were revised upon recommendations made after a visit by myself to the Farm Colony, and after Mrs. Aldred, Dietitian at the City Home, had spent several days at the Farm Colony investigating conditions in the Dietary Department. The dietary approved and ordered into effect June 15, 1906, for the inmates at the New York City Farm Colony general dining rooms was promulgated as Special Order No. 27, under date of June 7, and follows this report as Exhibit "B." The dietary approved and ordered into effect June 15, 1906, for the inmates of the cottages at the New York City Farm Colony appears as Special Order No. 28 under date of June 8, and follows this report as Exhibit "C."

Teaching at the New York City Training School for Nurses.

During this quarter I have conducted the classes as follows:

One section in dietetics, two sections in junior cookery, one section in preparatory cookery, two sections in bacteriology.

EXHIBIT "A."

Duties and Functions of the Dietitian at the Principal Office of the Department.

The following rules and regulations of the Department, prescribing the duties and functions of the Dietitian at the principal office of the Department, have this day been adopted by the Commissioner, to go into effect June 1, 1906. The purpose of these rules and regulations is to secure a better food supply for the institutions of the Department, and all persons affected will govern themselves accordingly.

1. The hours of duty of the Dietitian at the principal office of the Department shall be from 6 a. m. to 8 a. m., from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, and from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m., every week day except Saturday, when he shall be relieved at 2 p. m., or as soon thereafter as the boat leaves on its final trip to the islands.

2. He shall receive from the General Storekeeper a copy of all contracts for food supplies, other than meats, fish and poultry, and shall familiarize himself with the requirements of such contracts.

3. He shall also receive from the General Storekeeper a dated carbon copy of each order sent out for food supplies with the name and address of the purveyor and the time and place the Department required the supply to be delivered. These copies of orders shall be filled by the Dietitian in a binder kept for that purpose, and the items of the said orders shall be duly checked with the date upon which the goods are delivered in accordance with the requirements of the Department.

4. The Dietitian shall keep a record of the dates upon which the Department requires the delivery of goods specified in the orders. Should the articles, as specified, not be received at the Department's pier in the quantity or of the quality ordered, or in time for the boat upon which they should have been sent to the islands, he shall communicate with the contractor or purveyor, through the General Storekeeper when practicable and otherwise directly, for the purpose of securing an immediate delivery of the articles required at such point as they shall be required.

5. Upon the receipt of food supplies at the Department's pier the Dietitian shall make an inspection of the quantity of all supplies except meats, fish and poultry, and shall make an inspection of the quality of all supplies except meats, fish and poultry, and such goods as may be delivered in tin, glass, stone and pasteboard packages. Such inspections shall be made before the delivery wagon leaves the pier.

The quality of the eggs shall be determined by such supervision of the candling and by such other means as may seem necessary to supplement the work done in candling the eggs by the contractor's employees.

The Dietitian shall be required to keep a record of the daily lactometer test of the quality of at least four cans of the milk delivered at the pier, of the appearance, flavor and cleanliness, so far as by him ascertainable, of every can of milk delivered at the pier, and of the condition of the cans in which the milk is delivered. He shall take samples of the milk daily for the determination of total solids, fats and specific gravity.

The Dietitian shall make such further tests of the food supplies as may be necessary to satisfy his judgment that the articles are up to the standard required by the Department, in accordance with the terms of its contracts and orders.

In the event of such inspection and tests requiring an unusual length of time, so that the purveyor's wagon could not await the decision, or that the supply could not be sent on the first boat, the Dietitian shall report the circumstances to the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian. In the event of any delay whatever in the sending of supplies from the Twenty-sixth street pier to the institutions, the Dietitian shall communicate immediately with the store and the Dietitian of the institution affected and state what arrangements have been made for delivery of the supply.

6. A duplicate of the report to the General Storekeeper upon the quantity and quality of meats, fish and poultry delivered to the Department at the pier, shall be furnished the Dietitian by the Meat Inspector.

7. The quantity of all goods received in tin, glass, stone and pasteboard packages shall be reported to the General Storekeeper by the Dietitian immediately upon its arrival, for the purpose of permitting of an inspection by the General Storekeeper. When the cases containing such goods have been marked as approved by the General Storekeeper, the Dietitian will be responsible for such goods being forwarded to the store house by the first boat from the pier.

8. The Dietitian shall report to the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian, as soon as practicable, the condition of such food supplies as he deems not to be of the quality required by the Department, in order that the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian may have an opportunity to inspect such articles before they are rejected. In case there remains any question as to the acceptability of any such supply, the question shall be settled by the agreement of the General Storekeeper and the Departmental Dietitian, subject at all times to the action of the Commissioner; and in case of their non-agreement, the matter may, if necessary, be referred to the Commissioner.

9. Upon inspection of the food supply by the Dietitian, he shall, if the quantity and quality be acceptable, superintend the placing of the articles on the boat in such manner as to insure their proper care in transit to the institutions. He shall be responsible for seeing that all goods liable to freezing are covered or placed in such manner that they will not be frozen in transit. He shall also be responsible for placing all supplies which may be affected by sunlight, heat or dust, in a cool, clean and sheltered part of the boat, as may be provided for them.

10. The Dietitian shall have such other and further duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the rules and regulations of the Department.

11. The Dietitian at the principal office of the Department shall be immediately responsible to the Departmental Dietitian for the observance of the foregoing rules and regulations.

12. These rules and regulations, which are to go into effect June 1, 1906, are subject to change by the Commissioner at any time.

The number of applications, both personal and referred, which have been received at this office have considerably increased during the past three months, necessitating more frequent visits to the various hospitals, institutions and asylums under the Department of Public Charities.

Fewer complaints with regard to the laborious work on Blackwell's Island and Randall's Island have been received and I have not been obliged to make as many transfers as in the previous months.

During the past quarter I have met with considerable difficulty in securing competent helpers, especially Laundresses and Cooks, particularly for Randall's Island, owing to the low rate of wages paid and the increasing demand for general house-workers for out-of-town service.

Three women who were reinstated during the past three months have been reported as performing satisfactory work to date.

During the past quarter of the current year I have endeavored to fill all requests received for helpers for the various hospitals and institutions under your supervision as promptly and expeditiously as investigations as to the character and ability of the applicants would warrant the recommendation for employment.

An average of four Carpenters have been employed. They have worked an aggregate of 295 days, 127 of which were spent in making coffins, the remainder having been divided among all institutions not having Carpenters in their employ.

One Wheelwright has done 76 days work on repairing the vehicles of the Department.

One Farrier has worked 77 days shoeing horses at the stable.

One Ironworker has worked 45 days at ironwork for vehicles and bread trucks.

One Harnessmaker has worked 77 days repairing harness and covering food wagons.

An average of four Painters have done 297 days' work at institutions not employing Painters of their own.

There are 21 horses, all in use. Eighteen paid and five unpaid Drivers and two Helpers have performed 1,749 days' work for the several institutions on Blackwell's Island.

REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS.

October 1, 1906.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, Twenty-sixth Street and East River, New York, New York:

Dear Sir—In forwarding the report of this Bureau (Morgue included) for the quarter ending June 30, 1906, I beg to call your attention to the following facts:

During said quarter 3,417 applicants for admission to hospitals were sent to the Examining Physician of this Department for examination as to their eligibility for admission to the hospitals connected with this Department; 357 children sent to institutions for children on Randall's Island; 947 persons sent to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm.

There were 177 children discharged from the institutions on Randall's Island.

This Bureau issued 19,493 passes to visit Blackwell's and Randall's Islands; 609 tickets for meals were given to destitute persons awaiting disposition of their cases.

Transportation was afforded to 124 sick and destitute persons to reach their homes, thereby preventing them from becoming charges upon The City and County of New York.

There were 39 sick and destitute persons committed to the State Almshouse (New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm) for care, awaiting the action of the State Board of Charities.

There were 166 persons sent to the Municipal Lodging House; requests made for the examination of 130 men and 179 women as to their sanity; 28 deaf mutes admitted to institutions for same.

There have also been sent from this Bureau 37 patients to the Craig Colony for Epileptics; 1 to the State Custodial Asylum for Feeble-minded Women; 4 to the Syracuse State Institution for Feeble-minded Children; 1 to the Rome State Custodial Asylum; 30 to the New York State Hospital for Incipient Tuberculosis.

In addition, this Bureau has examined 6,854 cases of applicants for admission to hospitals other than our own, to be cared for there at the expense of The City and County of New York, of which 1,534 were rejected as improper charges.

This Bureau has also taken 282 complaints of abandonment, of which 109 were granted requisitions and 173 treated at this office; 90 non-support applications; 80 bastardy cases sent to Court; 136 bastardy cases not sent to Court; 28 discharges from the Workhouse.

Payments in abandonment and bastardy cases during the quarter ending June 30, 1906, have amounted to \$43,123.08, and disbursements in same \$38,484.18, thus saving that much to the taxpayers of The City and County of New York.

Total number of cases (including the passes issued to visit Blackwell's and Randall's Islands) handled by the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, during the quarter ending June 30, 1906, 33,004.

This Bureau has charge of the morgues at foot of East Twenty-sixth street and foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, where 2,755 bodies were received during the three months ending June 30, 1906, of which but 1,234 were buried by friends.

During said quarter a loose leaf ledger and manifolding receipt and checking system has been introduced in the Alimony Division of this Bureau, and is a marked improvement.

The brass rail placed around the office serves as a protection, prevents the taking of papers, passes, etc., from the desks and adds much to the appearance of the office.

A new desk and chair have been furnished for my private office.

There is a large amount of business done in this Bureau, with a limited number of Clerks doing the work as expeditiously as possible. More clerical help is necessary.

REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S BUREAU.

New York, June 30, 1906.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

My Dear Sir—During this quarter there were two thousand and seventy-one (2,071) children proposed for commitment, of whom six hundred and forty-one (641) were accepted as public charges. During the same period one hundred and twenty-seven (127) children were discharged upon reinvestigation, to parents who were found to be in a position to support them at home. The sum of seven thousand eight hundred and two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$7,802.25) was collected by this Bureau during the quarter ending June 30, 1906, in part payment for children committed to institutions. During the quarter ending June 30, 1905, the amount collected was six thousand five hundred dollars and fifty cents (\$6,500.50), showing an increase of one thousand three hundred and one dollars and seventy-five cents (\$1,301.75) collected during the corresponding period this year.

During the quarter we had an application from a San Francisco sufferer to commit two (2) children, this by the way, is the only application of this kind that we have had since that dreadful catastrophe.

Many men and women when making application for the commitment of their children seem under the impression that it is their right to demand that their offspring be brought up in an institution. This is evidenced by the fact that when children are taken and the parent is asked the question: "When do you expect to resume the care of your children?" the reply generally is "When they grow up and are able to work." This attitude on the part of parents naturally leads up to the question, to what extent is the City responsible for the support of such children? The writer is of the opinion that some definite time should be stated for which the City is responsible, after which, except in special cases, the children should be indentured or adopted.

The rule now is that all children must be reaccepted as public charges once each year dating from the time of first acceptance, but while this rule is an excellent thing and has saved the City a great many thousands of dollars annually by reason of reinvestigation of the circumstances of parents, it does not quite meet the exigencies of the case. For example, Mrs. "S." has six (6) children in an institution at Peekskill, New York, for the past seven (7) years; she also has one (1) child in an institution on Staten Island for the past five (5) years, and all the children mentioned have been public charges since their admission to the institutions. Mrs. "S." has one child at home which she has cared for since her other children were placed in an institution, but this woman is no nearer to solving the problem of caring for her children to-day than she was seven (7) years ago when they were committed to an institution as public charges. Mrs. "S's" husband is alive but his whereabouts is unknown.

Another case in point is that of Mrs. "J." whose husband is dead. This woman has had two children in an institution for the past eight (8) years. When her children were taken by the City she was homeless and apparently she has made no effort since to re-establish a home and resume the care of her children. Reinvestigation of this case recently disclosed the fact that Mrs. "J." was employed as domestic by a woman who paid her nothing, gives her only her board and lodging in return for services.

Another case is that of Mrs. "R." who has three (3) children in an institution for the past eight (8) years. This woman stated recently that she did not intend to take the children until they were able to work. During the last investigation of this case Mrs. "R." was found to be without a home of her own, she was living with friends. The father of these children is a deserter and nothing is known of his whereabouts.

The foregoing are typical of hundreds of such cases. That there is little or no effort made by parents to relieve the City of the care of children committed to institutions is a well known fact; children are committed to institutions usually when there is no other alternative. When the parents have been dispossessed and are homeless, or when a father of a family deserts his children and the mother is unable to support them, or in case of sickness or death of one or both parents. The impression seems to obtain among parents having children in institutions that if they care for one child at home it is all they can reasonably be expected to do.

In addition to tabulated statistics which follow, I beg to call your attention to the fact that our census during this quarter was lower than ever before in the history of this institution; for comparison I beg to show the following interesting figures:

This falling off was, no doubt, occasioned by the fact that the weather was very pleasant and work plenty, especially for the laboring classes. Another fact to which might be attributed in a measure the falling off of the census is that all able bodied men who drift into this city from all over the country are on the morning following their first application at this institution, sent in charge of an attendant to the Wayfarer's Lodge and Woodyard, in order that they might earn by labor a ticket entitling them to a night's lodging and two meals in some lodging house other than this one; to complete their task at the woodyard consumes from two and one-half to three hours.

This same rule is also rigidly enforced on those who belong in this city, if after investigation they are found to be shiftless and lazy and make too frequent use of this institution.

Those who refuse to go to the woodyard or make false statements, are sent to court as vagrants or tramps, and in nearly all instances are sent to the Workhouse for six months.

Many of the institutions in our Department, as well as that of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, have been supplied with mechanics, helpers, scrub-women, etc. No one is sent to fill any of these vacancies whose record is unfavorable on our books.

Repairs and Improvements.

Many important repairs were found necessary during this quarter, among these being the relining of the furnace, the repairing of the roof, the electric fire bells and gas range, etc.

Among the improvements in contemplation may be mentioned the card system. I have long had this idea in mind, and have now come to the conclusion to give the same a trial. An order for a cabinet, cards, etc., has been sent out, and ere my next quarterly report is presented, I will have formed a decided opinion as to whether we can work as rapidly with them as we are now doing with our indexed books.

New Building.

While work on the excavation of our new building has been going on since December 11, 1905, yet the same is not nearly completed, and at the present time I have grave doubts as to the building being completed on time, as per contract of 240 days. In fact, it looks like an impossibility. The lease of our present building expires on November 1, of this year, and it was hoped that we would not have to remain here after that date.

Requisitions.

Much credit is due to all of the officials at the central office and storehouse, through whose hands all the requisitions for supplies, repairs, etc., must pass for expediency and satisfaction.

Disposition of Inmates.

Reports from the Bureau of Dependant Adults, the Children's Bureau, the Charity Organization Society, the Wayfarer's Lodge and Woodyard, etc., relative to the disposal of such inmates referred to them for disposition, have been received as usual without unnecessary delay.

Precautions Against Fire.

All possible and known means of preventing a fire making much headway in this institution have been adopted. All fire laws and instructions from the Fire Department are strictly carried out. Fire drills take place regularly each and every week at different hours and days for both day and night employees; after each alarm is sounded our Inspector passes through the building to see that all instructions have been carried out, and that every employee is at his post with apparatus ready for action, after which the engineer on duty examines all fire apparatus to see if everything is in good working order. Full reports and suggestions, if any, are then entered in a book and signed by the Inspector and Engineer. In addition to this, printed instructions to attendants and inmates are posted in all dormitories calling their attention to their duties in case of fire.

Medical Report.

During this quarter the 9,171 inmates were examined by our house physician, of which 784 required either medical or surgical treatment. All lodgers not showing a good scar, received the benefits of vaccination; the importance of this cannot be overestimated, as the lodgers received come from all parts of the world, and many of them are more than ordinarily exposed to contagion; of this class it was found necessary to vaccinate 2,875.

During this quarter one man died of natural causes.

Conduct of Employees.

Taking into consideration the fact that we fed, lodged, bathed, fumigated clothing, etc., of 9,171 men, women and children of all nationalities and creeds during the quarter, I think I have every reason to feel pleased with the conduct on the whole of the officers and employees of this institution (about 66 per cent. of our employees are unpaid). Of our unpaid help all those that show ability and willingness to work are sent when pay vacancies exist to our different institutions, etc.

Charitable Societies.

All communications, requests to and from all charitable institutions and individuals have been acted upon promptly and courteously.

In conclusion, I beg to say that it affords me great pleasure and satisfaction in knowing and trusting it may remain so, that the best of feelings and respect exist between the Commissioners and other officials of the Department of Public Charities, the different charitable organizations and interested individuals and the officials of this institution, all of which tend to the betterment of the condition of those coming under our care and supervision.

The repairs to surgical instruments and apparatus amounted to \$260.80.

We have continued to supply Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Department of Correction with medicines and surgical instruments. The two departments have replaced the supplies furnished by the equivalent purchase of a few expensive articles of large consumption.

The Manufacturing Bureau has turned out a great variety of pharmaceutical and chemical preparations. These comprise 650 gallons fluid extracts and tinctures, 700 gallons elixirs and syrups, 1,020 gallons liniments, 525 gallons mixtures, 610 pounds ointments and various other articles.

The preparation of sterilized and chromicized catgut for the hospitals has been continued, and the quality of the milk delivered to the Department has been controlled by frequent analyses of samples.

On June 30 the force was distributed as follows:

Five Trained Nurses, 2 Head Nurses, 59 Pupil Nurses, 3 Probationers and 3 Male Orderlies at City Hospital.

Five Pupil Nurses at Maternity Hospital.

One Trained Nurse and 22 Pupil Nurses at Gouverneur Hospital.

One Trained Nurse and 12 Pupil Nurses at Harlem Hospital.

One Trained Nurse and 7 Pupil Nurses at Fordham Hospital.

Eight Pupil Nurses were on vacation.

At the Home—Two Trained Nurses, 5 men and 21 women.

During the quarter two Pupil Nurses resigned and ten graduated.

During the early part of the quarter we had a good deal of trouble with contagion among our nurses; very light forms of measles and diphtheria and two cases of scarlet fever developed. While the nurses were not very ill, still, fearing that something serious might develop if others contracted the disease, it was thought best to remove every suspicious case to the contagious hospitals of the Board of Health. All made good recoveries and, so far, there have been no ill effects following these diseases. The very damp weather of the spring seemed to be responsible for the conditions. The epidemic began to abate the latter part of May. In June one of our senior nurses was taken ill with an attack of appendicitis. It was necessary for her to have an operation performed, which was done at the Nurses' Home. She has made a good recovery and has gone to her home to further recuperate. There were three other cases of appendicitis developed at the same time. All recovered without operation.

During May the regular examinations of the first half year were held—the junior examination on May 11; 5 probationers took this examination, 4 of whom passed very creditably. The intermediate examination was held May 21, 21 pupils taking this examination, all passing but 2, who were obliged to take the term work over again. The senior examination was held May 2; 13 pupils took this examination. All passed, the class making an average of 82+ per cent. The written examination of the graduating class was held May 22, and the oral examination May 25. The examinations were conducted by Dr. Peck, Chairman; Dr. Cooke, Dr. Goffe, Dr. Potter and Dr. Foote. Forty-six pupils came up for examination, all of whom passed, the class making an average of 84 per cent. This percentage is the record of not only the examination, but also the marking of the class work of the term, as well as the deportment for the term. Taking all this into consideration, we feel it is a very creditable showing.

The subjects of surgical nursing, obstetrics and principles of cookery were taken up by Misses Silver, LeFebvre and Corbett during six weeks of May and June, so as to allow the members of the class to take their vacations during July and August, and also to lessen the work of the fall term, as we found last year's fall term pretty heavy. No changes were made in the schedule of the work, but it was thought best to request that a set of lectures be given to the graduating class in the fall, as well as the spring, as we found it almost impossible to relieve the 46 nurses who composed the graduating class of the first half of the year without severe strain on the hospital. By having the two sets of lectures, only half of the class would be relieved at a time, which would make it comparatively easy for the work of the hospital.

On April 16 a communication was sent to Central Office regarding the repairs needed to the home, and asking that the work of repainting the home, as well as the repairs necessary for beginning this painting be begun early, as the number of inmates at the home would be reduced during vacation period.

Another communication was sent relative to the nurses in the Bellevue Department being paid by the Department of Public Charities. A message was received stating that in all probability the Bellevue Department would pay these salaries in the future. Another communication was sent regarding the opening of the new hospitals in the Bellevue Department, which would necessitate a much larger force of nurses to care for them than City Hospital would be able to furnish, owing to its limited ground for training. A communication was sent at this time so as to give ample time to prepare for furnishing nurses from other sources if the Bellevue Department found it necessary.

The latter part of June the contractors began their work on the female dormitory of City Hospital. As this site is adjacent to the Nurses' Home grounds, it was necessary to land the supplies at the Home dock. So far the contractors have been able to do this work with very little disturbance. Their supplies are promptly removed from the dock, and while some damage has ensued, owing to the heavy strain of such large lighters on the light framework of the dock, still there has not been as much disturbance as one might naturally expect.

Our supplies for the quarter have been of much the same character as formerly. Changes have been made to gain greater variety and to avoid the monotony of ordering the same thing on the same days. So far it has not been very successful, as the condition of the market allows very little to order from.

On April 25, 26 and 27 the Superintendent was relieved from duty to attend the Convention of Superintendents of Training Schools, held in the City. The annual vacation was also granted her from June 16.

I have to report that the new steam plant is still in an incomplete condition, all the piping has been completed, with the exception of the water connection on the west side. The piping and conduit was completed and covered without testing, as the specifications call for, the contractor taking the risk of having to open the trenches in the event of leaks developing.

The boiler which was temporarily installed at laundry has been dismantled and placed in the new boiler house, completing the set of six.

Two of the temporary pavilions have been utilized as dormitories for the female help, enabling us to occupy the top floor of the erysipelas building for nervous cases, and giving two isolating rooms on the lower floor.

The contractors for the new female dormitory started June 14, 1906, and rapid progress is being made on same, a large force of men being employed and plenty of material on hand.

I deplore the necessity of calling your attention to the dilatory manner in which the York Construction Company is acting regarding the removal of their surplus building material; no effort has been made to clear the grounds on their part, and where the surroundings should be presentable they are the worst.

The usual amount of painting, carpentry, plumbing, plastering, repairs, etc., were carried on the same as the usual custom.

REPORT OF THE NEW YORK CITY HOME FOR THE AGED AND INFIRM, BLACKWELL'S ISLAND.

July 12, 1906.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner:

Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith my report for the quarter ending June 30, 1906, showing a decrease in the population of this institution during the quarter of 298 inmates, namely, 258 men and 40 women; of this decrease, 172, namely, 74 men and 98 women, were caused by death. Fourteen women were transferred to the lunatic asylum and 2 men and 1 woman (tuberculosis cases) were transferred to the Metropolitan Hospital.

In the way of alterations and improvements that have taken place, I have to report as follows:

The old wooden toilet building connected with the Superintendent's cottage has been torn down, a new driveway built connecting the Superintendent's grounds with the eastern roadway, which has been newly curbed, as has also the road in the rear of the north pavilion. The gardens adjoining the Superintendent's premises have been made and are in fine growing condition; the usual amount of grading and repairing of

roads, cutting and trimming of grass plots, etc., has been accomplished, and 85 feet of new iron fence has been erected at the north end of the hospital grounds.

The remains of the old frame building, for a long time used as a tailor's shop, and recently partially destroyed by fire, has been torn down and removed, and the vacant space graded and put in order. New floors have been laid in the Incurable Hospitals. The crippled inmates have been transferred from Ward L to Blind Ward No. 1, which they find more pleasant quarters; and Ward L has been converted into three distinct sections for the respective accommodation of the epileptic, paralytic and feeble-minded.

The following improvements have been let out under contract and are in process of completion, namely, new metal ceilings and repainting throughout, and new window shades in the four hospital buildings and the two blind wards; new sashes and cement floors in the first tiers of both stone buildings; a new cement floor, new urinals and drinking fountain in the building known as the "Klondyke," and the open shed adjoining.

Changes in the Administration.

On April 1, 1906, Dr. Geo. T. Stewart was appointed Superintendent of this institution, to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Dr. J. B. Mickle, and transferred from the position of Superintendent of Hospitals for Contagious Diseases in the Department of Health. Dr. Stewart is a graduate of the Metropolitan Hospital Staff of 1883, serving as an interne during the years 1882 and 1883, when the Hospital was situated on Ward's Island. He was appointed Chief of Staff and Superintendent in 1890, when the Hospital was known as the "Ward's Island Hospital," and served in that capacity until the year 1900, when he was transferred as Superintendent to Bellevue Hospital. After two years' service in Bellevue Hospital, he was appointed Superintendent of Hospitals for Contagious Diseases in the Department of Health. This is, therefore, his second administration.

Another important change in the institution was the appointment of Mrs. E. A. Aldred as Dietitian on July 1, to fill vacancy due to the resignation of Miss Emma G. McCullough.

On June 1, on the recommendation of the Superintendent, the Honorable Commissioner was pleased to transfer to the Metropolitan Training School thirteen (13) positions of Hospital Helpers. This change places all the Hospital Ward Helpers under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Training School and diminishes the hospital payroll \$1,770 per annum. It is to be hoped that this change will benefit the

institution and in the future that material betterment will be shown in this class of help. The Commissioner was also pleased to grant increases in salaries to the following positions: Engineman, an increase of 50 cents per diem, and three Hospital Helpers an increase of \$60 per annum each.

Having experienced some trouble regarding the care of patients' property, the Superintendent has inaugurated the present system of caring for the property: A receipt is now given to each patient on his admission to the hospital after he has been thoroughly searched for money or other valuables. We trust that less difficulty will be experienced in the future in this important branch of the Hospital Department.

Improvements and Repairs.

During the past three months many alterations and improvements have been started and finished at this institution. At the Tuberculosis Infirmary these alterations are very noticeable. A contract for new metal ceilings was awarded to the Canton Steel Metal Company, it being the lowest bidder; cost, \$4,565, and in June the work was started on Ward M. At the present time the corridor, small rooms and alcoves have been finished. The ceiling of Ward L, Female Tuberculosis Infirmary, has been covered with the new metal ceiling, and presents an improved condition. This work, starting, as it did, under very adverse conditions, has progressed very rapidly and to our satisfaction and were it not for the moving of the beds and patients from one ward to another, the work on the ceilings would be much further advanced. Another noticeable improvement at the Infirmary is the new windows which have taken the place of the old, antiquated, small-glass sashes. The contract for this work was awarded to Edward Stapleton, of Flushing, L. I., to cost \$1,895.

At the tents, male Tuberculosis Infirmary, a covered passageway has been erected by James Buckley, of New York City, to cost \$2,175. We are very glad to be able to say that we are satisfied with this passageway. The contractor cannot be held responsible for the changes made in the plans, nor can those in charge of the hospital, for had the plans and specifications been submitted to the Superintendent of the Hospital, same could have been looked into and the changes made before work was started. Nevertheless, this passageway is built and we are thankful.

The grounds at the upper end of the island have been given a thorough cleaning up, and some of the antiquated buildings are now in process of demolition.

It is to be hoped that the Honorable Commissioner will allow two new Solariums built, something on the style of the present Solarium. Owing to the necessity of more room for the contractors, we were compelled to place beds in the Solarium. This arrangement, of course, has taken away the play hall for the patients, but during such beautiful weather these poor unfortunates can well afford to give up their Solarium. It certainly makes a beautiful ward and can accommodate easily eighty patients. With two more similar Solariums we could accommodate 168 extra patients.

Suggestions as to Plumbing and Steam Fitting.

We trust it will not be considered an imposition to request some improvements in the line of sanitary plumbing. During all the past years, the Tuberculosis Infirmary seems to have been shut out from any improvements which might benefit it as an institution. It is looked upon as the largest institution of its kind in the world, and at the present time offers treatment for six hundred patients daily and on an average of three thousand per annum. In an institution of this kind the best of modern plumbing should be one of its first requisites, but this seems to have been entirely forgotten. Running water can only be found in the present toilet rooms, which certainly are not half large enough to accommodate the patients. The wash rooms are altogether too small, bathing, as we do, at least once a week, six hundred patients, to say nothing of the general average of about twenty-five per diem of discharged and admitted patients desiring to wash their faces and hands and cannot do so because of lack of room. At the present time there are no hand or face basins where a nurse can bathe.

Last March, the Supervising Engineer of the Department, accompanied by the former Superintendent, inspected the plumbing throughout the Tuberculosis Infirmary and decided upon many improvements, but as yet nothing has been definitely decided upon. To our mind, the best plumbing is essential to the health of the tuberculosis patient. The subject of lighting the hospital with electricity being at present under consideration, we omit discussing the question of gas, which at present is far from satisfactory.

The surrounding grounds at the infirmary have been improved and beautified and this work is still going on.

The roofs of the dining hall and solarium have been painted and repaired and present quite an improved appearance. It may not be out of place to respectfully recommend the painting of these buildings on the outside. This painting, if allowed, would add greatly to their appearance.

Necessary repairs have been started on the two dumb waiters in the male and female buildings. These buildings are being painted throughout. In connection with the painting of these buildings, it is urgently recommended that the outside walls, or stone work, be repaired and pointed up where necessary. It would be paint wasted not to point up these walls, as the rain and dampness show through the painting, no matter how many coats of paint the walls receive. The roofs of the male Tuberculosis Infirmary also need extensive repairs. The slating has been loosened by the rain and the roof leaks badly after each storm.

Extensive repairs to the coal bin, at the boiler house, have been made and the walls have been thoroughly overhauled.

Main Hospital.

Extensions to the drug store have been planned and contracted for, and it is to be hoped that in the near future this improvement will be finished.

All the wards and halls of the main building have been painted and the plastering has been repaired where necessary. The annex building has received its just share of improvements and painting. It is to be hoped that better accommodations will be found for those of the nurses who occupy the rooms of the annex building, as the present accommodations are too small, although they have been fitted up to the best of our ability.

The work on the new male help dormitory is progressing slowly, but we trust that it will be ready for occupancy soon, as we certainly need this building.

In one of the new pavilions, at the river front, a partition has been erected separating the male erysipelas patients from the female. The pavilion has been designated as the Erysipelas Ward. The former Erysipelas Ward has been renovated and is being used as a much needed storehouse for the Steward's Department. It is earnestly recommended that accommodations for the leper patients, now occupying the east end of this building, will be found elsewhere. The change will enable us to use the better part of this building for a storehouse. The west end of this building is used as a clothes house. An examination of the flooring of this building shows absolute danger of collapse. The beams are badly decayed and should be attended to.

The basement of the S. and T. building has been renovated and the carpenters have finished the necessary work, fitting out a part of the basement to be used as a clothes house for the tuberculosis patients. This improvement will enable us to relieve the present clothes house of over five hundred suits of clothing.

We hope to make a change of the sterilizing apparatus now installed in the northern half of this basement, and we recommend that this sterilizer be placed under the female tuberculosis building. This change will enable us to fit out the northern half of the basement under the S. and T. building as a clothes house for the Main Hospital. We respectfully recommend that the roof of the laundry be repaired and that proper ventilation be installed.

Fire Service.

During the past few months a most careful study has been given to the welfare of the patients in case of fire. Repeated consultation with the Fire Department Captain of Engine Company 49 have proven to our satisfaction that all has been done in our power to safeguard the patients. Fire extinguishers, axes, hose, hooks, buckets, etc., have been placed to the best advantage. Fire test drills have been called as often as three times a month, and we are glad of this opportunity to note that these drills have been satisfactory in all details. Concerning the help, we have every reason to be proud of their conduct toward their officers in charge of these drills.

In conclusion, we beg to offer our sincere thanks to the Commissioner for the many improvements granted, also to all the charitably inclined ladies and gentlemen connected with the societies, for the many visits to the institution.

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to submit the report of the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools for the quarter ending June 30, 1906.

During the quarter the following wards were quarantined:

Ward 35, for erysipelas, from April 5 to April 8, and from April 8 to May 5, for scarlatina; Ward 36, for measles, from June 23 to June 30; Wards 37 and 38, reception building for measles, from April 16 to May 7; Ward 41, reception building for measles, from June 23 to June 30; Ward 50, infants' hospital building, for chickenpox, from April 9 to June 30; Wards 15, 16 and 17, Custodial Asylum, for measles, from April 19 to June 10; Pavilion K, for measles, from April 14 to May 5; and School for Feeble-minded, for measles, from June 29 to June 30.

In order to relieve the overcrowding of Pavilion F, a new dormitory was opened on the first floor of that building.

On April 5, the children of Pavilion G were transferred to Ward 15, where they have much better accommodations. A portion of Pavilion G is now used by the Upholsterer, in which the larger boys are employed in teasing hair for mattresses; the other portion is used as a mending room.

Repairs.

At the infants' hospital building the valves on all the radiators of that building have been repacked. Boilers No. 1 and No. 2, at the boiler house attached to this building, have been cleaned internally, new discs placed in the stop-valves and a Metropolitan injector fitted up. A new main belt has been placed on the counter shaft at the laundry. The walls of Wards 51 and 59 have been repaired. The west side of the stone foundation wall has been painted in two coats, also two dormitories, two bathrooms, two toilet rooms, two kitchens and two hallways of Wards 57 and 59. All the woodwork, ceilings and walls, sashes and blinds of these wards have also been painted in two coats and the radiators alumined. The ceilings and walls of Ward 60, all the woodwork, sashes and doors were painted in two coats and the radiators alumined. On the first, second, third and top floors of this building, seventeen rooms for nurses, with bathrooms, halls and stairways, have also been painted in two coats.

The contract work for repairing the roof, leaders and gutters of the Infants' Hospital building was commenced May 21, and is still in progress. On June 11 the contractor started the work of putting in new windows, repairing frames, sashes, etc.

At the reception building the valves on all the radiators have been repacked. One glass wash basin has been fitted up in the operating room. The windows of the ward occupied by ophthalmic cases have been painted green. Five benches have been stained and shellacked and twelve cellar screens painted in two coats.

At the North Hospital the stairway leading to the cellar on the west side of the building has been closed and a new one opened on the north end. Two small airshafts have also been built. The walls of the different wards have been repaired and painted in two coats, also a portion of the brickwork.

At the South Hospital the ceilings and walls of the entire building have been painted in two coats, also a portion of the brickwork. The dado and lattice work in the pantry have also been grained and varnished.

In the School for Feeble Minded the corridor leading from the School for Feeble Minded to the dining room has been painted in two coats, also the dining room, kitchen and bathroom. All the radiators in the building have been alumined. The walls of the top floor, also the walls of the play room, have been repaired. The wooden fence to the rear of the building has been repaired and painted in two coats. Sixteen new flower beds have been planted in close proximity.

In Pavilion F one wall of the dining room was lathed and plastered and the floor repaired. A new floor has been laid in the summer house and the ceilings and walls painted in two coats.

In wards 21 to 28 the valves on all the radiators have been repacked. A new hot water main has been laid from ward 24 to ward 25, and the floor repaired.

In wards 15, 16 and 17 the ceilings and walls, bath and clothes rooms have been repaired and painted two coats, the woodwork grained and varnished and the radiators alumined.

In Pavilion H the ceiling and walls of the dining room have been painted in two coats and the radiators alumined. Four benches have also been made and placed in the ward.

In Pavilions A, B, C, D and E the ceilings and walls have been repaired; also the hallways.

In the Day School two large gas fixtures have been erected, the ceilings and walls painted and the radiators alumined.

At the Industrial School the valves on all the radiators have been repaired, a new brick floor laid in the store room and the entrance to the school reflagged.

At the office building, the stairway on the south side leading to the cellar has been removed and a new one built on the north side. The sidewalk in front of the office has been partly relaid and the flagging repaired. The cellar has also been repaired and whitewashed and the entrance to same covered with an iron grating. The ceiling on the second floor of the building has been relathed and entirely repaired, using two coats of mortar and hard finish. The doctors' quarters have been painted in two coats.

In the drug store a new floor has been laid, covering an area of 675 square feet, and the wainscoting grained and varnished.

The building formerly occupied by the boys of the Randall's Island Band has been enlarged and converted into a chapel for Protestant services, the old partition having been removed, the ceiling and sidewalls lathed, plastered and painted in two coats. The wainscoting and doors have also been grained and varnished, the floor stained and shellacked, and the roof and outside of the building painted in two coats. Twenty-four new windows with two lights of glass in each have been placed therein.

At the Nurses' dormitory two sets of lavatories have been fitted up. The ceiling and walls of the hall have been painted in two coats, also a portion of the outside brick work.

On June 25 the alterations and addition to the male helpers' dormitory were begun.

At the central power house all the boilers have been cleaned, in addition to many necessary minor repairs. The contract for the 200 horse power boiler has also been completed.

At the gas house one of the stand pipes became clogged with tar and carbon, which necessitated it being taken down and thoroughly cleaned.

At the main laundry a new canvas apron has been placed on the mangle.

At the main kitchen the cemented flooring of the cellar has been repaired. The stone steps and platform leading from the yard to the kitchen have been reset and stone pillars placed on each side of same. The yard has also been repaved and the entrance to the cellar repaired. A plank walk leading from the sidewalk to the cellar has also been made.

A stand for the milk room has been erected, and the ceiling and walls painted. The milk is now distributed to the wards in specially constructed air-tight bottles, thus insuring perfect cleanliness and purity.

Fire drills have been held weekly. In addition to the number of fire extinguishers in the different wards and buildings which have been examined and recharged when found necessary, twenty-four additional ones have been distributed where most required.

A roof has been placed on the platform situated near the Industrial School and used by the boys of the band for entertainments. The ceiling has been painted and the posts and railings stained and varnished. The foundation has also been cemented.

During the quarter fifty-two iron bedsteads have been enameled, twenty-five door screens painted, also many mosquito screens which have been placed in the different wards and buildings.

In addition to the foregoing, many minor repairs have been made in the line of plastering, painting and carpentry.

During the quarter all the garbage has been hauled to the crematory and destroyed.

Four hundred and seven lights of plain glass and 22 lights of ground glass were placed in the different buildings.

One thousand three hundred and twenty-one tons of coal have been carted from the coal dock to the boiler houses and coal pile.

Three hundred and sixty-one tons of ice have been carted from the coal dock to the ice house.

During the quarter 275 loads of ashes have been carted from the boiler houses to the dump, and 115 loads distributed where most needed in grading the different walks and roadways.

Three thousand four hundred and five pounds of rags, 1,713 pounds of bones and 2,762 pounds of grease have been sent to the storehouse, Blackwell's Island, during the quarter.

Fourteen thousand seven hundred and three quarts of farm milk have been distributed among the different subdivisions of this institution.

BROOKLYN DIVISION; CUMBERLAND STREET HOSPITAL, BRADFORD STREET HOSPITAL AND RECEPTION HOSPITAL, CONEY ISLAND; ALSO THE TRAINING SCHOOLS AND OTHER BRANCHES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES, IN THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS, NEW YORK, 1906.

Brooklyn, July 15, 1906.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Public Charities, New York:

Dear Sir—I hereby submit for your consideration the second quarterly report of the year 1906 of the institutions in the Department of Public Charities, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Kings County Hospital.

There remained in this hospital, April 1, 1906, from the previous quarter, 371 male patients, 214 female patients, a total of 585; 2,484 patients were admitted during the second quarter; of whom 1,738 were males and 746 females, making the total number under treatment 3,069.

Four hundred and eighty-one male patients were discharged recovered, and 108 female; 952 male patients and 277 female patients were discharged improved; 86 male patients and 46 female patients were discharged unimproved; 252 patients were transferred to the State hospitals for the insane; 168 males and 77 females died, and 532 patients remained under treatment June 30, 1906, of whom 307 were males and 225 were females.

The number of visits made by the visiting staff was 598. The number of major operations was 80.

There were 577 ambulance calls made, including both the emergency and transfers.

There were 4,823 days' labor performed by convalescent patients.

Kings County Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary 1,169 cases were treated during this quarter, of whom 976 were males and 193 were females; 496 were new cases and 673 were revisits.

The New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division.

There were in this home March 31, 1906, 1,449 inmates, of whom 847 were males and 602 were females. There were 429 males and 225 females admitted during the quarter, making the total number 2,103.

Of this number 550 males and 213 females were discharged, 27 males and 31 females died, leaving in the home, June 30, 1906, 699 males, 583 females; a total of 1,282.

Neurological Hospital.

There were in this hospital March 31, 1906, 66 males and 59 females, a total of 125. There were 54 males and 24 females admitted during the quarter, making the total number under treatment 203. Of this number 69 were discharged improved, 11 died and 123 remained under treatment June 30, 1906, of whom 62 were males and 61 were females.

The inmates of the Home for the Aged and Infirm performed during this quarter 51,896 days' labor, distributed as follows:

At the Home for the Aged and Infirm..... 42,168
At the Kings County Hospital..... 6,699
Department of Transportation and Gardens..... 3,029

Cumberland Street Hospital.

There were in this hospital March 31, 1906, 205 patients, of whom 130 were males and 75 were females. There were 393 male patients and 221 female patients admitted, making the total number under treatment 819, of whom 523 were males and 296 were females. Of this number 367 were discharged recovered, 200 as improved, 21 as unimproved, 57 died and 174 remained under treatment June 30, 1906.

The total number of visits made by the visiting staff was 298.

The number of major operations performed was 70.

Cumberland Street Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary 4,794 cases were treated during this quarter, of whom 3,351 were males and 1,443 were females. Of this number 1,548 were new cases and 3,246 were revisits.

The number of ambulance calls made during the quarter was 534.

Bradford Street Hospital.

In this hospital 31 patients were admitted, of whom 19 were males and 12 were females, no cases remaining from the previous quarter.

Eight patients were discharged as recovered, 16 as improved, 2 as unimproved, 4 died and 1 remained under treatment June 30, 1906.

The number of visits by the visiting staff was 19.

The number of major operations performed was 2.

The number of ambulance calls was 380.

Bradford Street Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary 2,826 cases were treated during this quarter, of whom 1,871 were males and 955 were females. Of this number 889 were new cases and 1,937 were revisits.

Reception Hospital, Coney Island.

This hospital was opened for the season of 1906 on May 1.

The number of patients admitted during the remainder of this quarter was 43, of whom 23 were males and 20 were females.

The number of patients discharged recovered was 17; 7 patients were discharged improved; 2 died; and 17 remained under treatment June 30, 1906.

The number of visits made by the visiting staff was 17.

One major operation was performed.

The number of ambulance calls was 207.

Reception Hospital, Coney Island, Dispensary.

In this dispensary during the last two months of this quarter 990 cases were treated, of whom 785 were males and 205 were females; the number of new cases was 527; 463 were revisits.

Improvements.

The work of completing the isolation pavilion for contagious diseases on the grounds of the Kings County Hospital is finished, as also the alterations of the Children's Hospital, formerly the Consumptives' Home. The occupants of this latter building were removed from the main building and all were transferred to the Children's Hospital, excepting those having whooping cough and those suffering from venereal diseases.

At the Cumberland Street Hospital a number of improvements have been accomplished, including the cement floor in the store room and fireproof floor over the boilers, where a hall and dining room are located, a much needed improvement; a guard has been placed on the stairway leading to the roof garden to prevent anyone falling over. The work of installing steel ceilings is well under way, and will improve the appearance of the hospital as well as add to the fire protection. A number of the wards have been painted.

REPORT OF THE NEW YORK CITY FARM COLONY.

July 17, 1906.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to herewith submit my report of the New York City Farm Colony for the quarter ending June 30, 1906.

On June 1, 1906, Superintendent Joseph B. Pearce resigned from the position of Superintendent, and in his place Henry Jetter was appointed.

On May 1, 1906, Mrs. Sarah T. Pearce was relieved of her duties as Matron of Cottage B, and Miss Emma Boiles, a Trained Nurse, was appointed in her place.

A watchman has been appointed and assigned to duty on the hill with a time clock, which he rings every twenty minutes during the night.

The three old wooden buildings, known as the watch house, store house and carriage shed, which formerly stood in front of the Superintendent's residence, have been torn down and the ground where they stood has been graded.

The Superintendent's residence is all being thoroughly renovated.

The office, which was located in the Superintendent's residence, has been moved to one of the wing rooms of the new male dormitory.

Four new horses have been added to our stock, making a total of sixteen now; all the old stock has been numbered.

The stable has all been overhauled, the old stalls torn out and new ones built in their place. A new flooring has been laid. The upper part of the barn has been thoroughly cleaned out, and is now used to store the carriages, wagons and ambulances.

The new stage arrived and now runs daily, Sundays excepted, between the colony and Castleton Corners, meeting the 10 a. m. boat from the City, and returning, leaves the colony at 4 p. m.

A sewer has been laid from in front of the ice house, connecting with a blind drain, which runs alongside of male dormitory. This sewer takes all of the surface water coming from the main road.

Six hundred feet of 2-inch hose, placed on two reels, has been purchased. Three hundred feet has been placed at the cottages, three hundred feet at the main institution. This hose can be connected to the stand pipes in all of the cottages and at the main institution to the stand pipes in the male dormitory.

During the quarter it became necessary for the institution to purchase ice. This was advertised for and the Hygiea Ice Company of Stapleton, S. I., were awarded the contract. Manure was also advertised for and Kane & Wright of the city were awarded the contract.

The old outside toilet, an old wooden structure, has been torn down, the toilets in the old stone building being used now.

A stone walk has been commenced between the Superintendent's residence and the male dormitory.

On Friday, June 29, owing to the warm weather, three of our horses were overcome by the heat while hauling provisions from the boat to the colony. Two of the horses are now working again, the other is being doctored with good chances for recovery.

On Friday, June 15, we shipped our first shipment of vegetables.


