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POLICE DEPARTMENT.

New York, February 16, 1906.

The following proceedings were this day directed by Police Commissioner Theodore A. Bingham:

Whereas, In the opinion of the Police Commissioner it is necessary for the purposes of the Police Department to procure three automobile carriages and to repair the automobile carriage now owned and in use by the Police Department, the entire cost of which will not exceed \$16,000; and

Whereas, It is not to the advantage of the City to purchase such automobile carriages nor to repair the one at present the property of the Police Department under contract after public letting made pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter.

Ordered, That whenever the Board of Aldermen shall have authorized the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$16,000 to enable the Police Commissioner to purchase three automobile carriages for the use of the Police Department of The City of New York, and to repair the automobile carriage now owned and in use by the Department, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to concur therein.

Whereas, The title to premises Nos. 134 to 138 West Thirtieth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, has been vested in The City of New York for the purposes of a station house for the Police Department of The City of New York; and

Whereas, Corporate Stock in the sum of \$170,000 has been issued for the construction of a new station house, prison and stable for the Nineteenth Police Precinct thereon; and

Whereas, The plans for the erection of such buildings are now in course of preparation and nearly completed,

Ordered, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby respectfully requested to take measures for the sale at public auction of the buildings thereon, and to turn over to the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York the said premises at the earliest practicable moment.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matter set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
