COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in the Mayor's Office, City Hall, at 2.15 o'clock P. M., on Thursday, July 17, 1913.

Present—William J. Gaynor, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; Robert R. Moore, Chamberlain; Ardolph L. Kline, Acting President, Board of Aldermen, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held June 25, 1913, were approved as printed.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of an extension to pier, new, 29, foot of Vestry street, North River, to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company:

July 16, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, approving and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of an extension to pier, new, 29, North River, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, upon land under water, described as follows:

"Beginning at a point on the outer end of the southerly side of Pier 29, as it now exists; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said pier 275 feet, more or less, to the pier headline, as modified by the Secretary of War March 1, 1913; running thence northerly along the said modified pier headline to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier to a point at the outer end of said pier; running thence southerly and along the outer end of said pier to the point or place of beginning."

The Department shall build or cause to be built at the expense of The City of New York, upon land under water above described, an extension to said pier, new, 29. The lease of said extension shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer of this Department shall certify that the extension is completed, and shall expire September 1, 1914, with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years.

The annual rental to September 1, 1914, shall be at the rate of 27½ cents per square foot for the area of land under water, covered by said extension, and, in addition, 5½ per cent. of the cost of construction thereof; said area and cost to be as shown by surveys and books of this Department, and for the period from September 1, 1914, to September 1, 1924, at a 10 per cent. advance. The lessee shall have the right to erect upon said extension, and to maintain thereon during the term of the lease or any renewal thereof, a shed extending offshore from the present structure a distance of 187 feet, which shed shall be built in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of this Department.

The extension to said pier and the shed to be erected thereon shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease or renewal thereof. The lease shall provide that the lessee shall at all times during the term thereof keep and maintain the said extension and all sheds or other structures, erected or to be erected, under the provisions of said lease, in good condition and repair to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease, excepting so far as they are inconsistent herewith, shall be similar to those contained in the leases of wharf property now used by this Department. In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

July 17, 1913.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On July 11, 1913, the Commissioner of Docks recommended and requested approval and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of an extension to pier, new, No. 29, foot of Vestry street, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

The lease recommended is for an extension of 275 feet to the present pier and extends from the outer end of the present pier to the pier headline as modified by the Secretary of War, March 1, 1913. The lease shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks shall certify that said extension is completed and shall expire September 1, 1914, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years.

The annual rental to September 1, 1914, shall be at the rate of 27½ cents per square foot for the area of land under water covered by said extension, and in addition 5½ per cent. on cost of said extension.

The terms and conditions of the lease are similar to those approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for extension to piers in this locality.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of an extension to Pier New No. 29, foot of Vestry street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, upon land under water, described as follows:

"Beginning at a point on the outer end of the southerly side of Pier 29, as it now exists; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said pier 275 feet, more or less, to the pier headline, as modified by the Secretary of War March 1, 1913; running thence northerly along the said modified pier headline to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier to a point at the outer end of said pier; running thence southerly and along the outer end of said pier to the point or place of beginning."

The Department of Docks and Ferries shall build or cause to be built, at the expense of the City, upon the land under water above described, the extension to said Pier New No. 29.

The lease of said extension shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries shall certify that said extension is completed, and shall expire September 1, 1914, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten (10) years. The annual rental to September 1, 1914, shall be at the rate of twenty-seven and one-half (27½) cents per square foot for the area of land under water covered by said extension, and in addition five and one-half (5½) per cent. on the cost of said extension, said area and cost to be as shown by the surveys and books of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and for the renewal period from September 1, 1914, until September 24, 1924, at a ten (10) per cent. advance.

The lessee shall have the right to erect upon said extension and to maintain thereon, during the term of the lease or any renewal thereof, a shed which shall be built in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and the said shed shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease.

The lease shall provide that the lessee shall at all times, during the term thereof, keep and maintain all sheds or other structures erected or to be erected under the provision of said lease, in good condition and repair to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease, excepting in so far as they are inconsistent herewith, shall be similar to those contained in the leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Sir—I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of extensions to Pier (new) 27, at or near the foot of Hubert street, and Pier (new) 28, at or near the foot of Laight street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, upon land under water, described as follows:

Extension to Pier (New) 27.

Beginning at a point at the outer end of the southerly side of Pier (new) 27, North River, as it now exists; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said pier to the pierhead line modified by the Secretary of War March 1, 1913, a distance of 147.81 feet more or less; running thence northerly and along said modified pierhead line to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier; running thence easterly and along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier to the outer end of the present pier; running thence southerly along the outer end of the existing pier to the point or place of beginning.

Extension to Pier (New) 28.

Beginning at a point at the outer end of the southerly side of Pier (new) 28, North River, as it now exists; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said pier to the pierhead line modified by the Secretary of War March 1, 1913, a distance of 153.10 feet; running thence northerly along said modified pierhead line to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier; running thence easterly and along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier to the outer end of the existing pier; running thence southerly along the outer end of the said pier to the point or place of beginning.

The Department shall build or cause to be built at the expense of The City of New York, upon the land under water above described, the extensions to said Piers (new) 27 and 28, North River. The lease of said extensions shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer of this Department shall certify that said extensions, re-

spectively, are completed. The lease shall expire September 1, 1914, with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years.

The annual rental to September 1, 1914, shall be at the rate of 27 1-2 cents per square foot for the area of land under water covered by said extensions, and, in addition, 5 1-2 per cent. of the cost of construction thereof; said area and cost to be as shown by surveys and books of this Department; the rental for the period from September 1, 1914, to September 1, 1924, shall be at a 10 per cent. advance.

The lessee shall have the right to erect upon said extensions and to maintain thereon during the term of the lease or any renewal thereof, sheds which shall be built in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of this Department. The extensions to said piers and the sheds to be erected thereon shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease or renewal thereof. The lease shall provide that the lessee shall at all times during the term thereof keep and maintain the said extensions and all sheds or other structures erected or to be erected under the provisions of said lease in good condition and repair to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease, excepting so far as they are inconsistent herewith, shall be similar to those contained in the leases of wharf property now used by this Department. Very truly yours,

Gentlemen—On July 31, 1913, the Commissioner of Docks recommended and requested approval of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company of extensions to Pier (new) No. 27, at or near the foot of Hubert street, and Pier (new) No. 28, at or near the foot of Lighthouse street, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

The lease recommended is for extensions to the present piers, and extend from the outer end of the present piers to the pierhead line modified by the Secretary of War March 1, 1913.

The lease will be for a period coterminous with the existing lease of said piers, dated October 16, 1903, the term of which begins September 1, 1904, and expires September 1, 1914, with the privilege of one renewal term of ten years.

The annual rental to September 1, 1914, shall be at the rate of 27 1-2 cents per square foot of land under water covered by said extensions, and in addition 5 1-2 per cent. on the cost of construction of said extensions; the terms and conditions recommended are similar to those approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for extensions to piers in this locality.

"Beginning at a point at the outer end of the southerly side of Pier New 28, North River, as it now exists; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said pier to the pierhead line modified by the Secretary of War March 1, 1913, a distance of 153.10 feet; running thence northerly along said modified pierhead line to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier; running thence easterly and along the westerly prolongation on the northerly side of said pier to the outer end of the existing pier; running thence southerly along the outer end of the said pier to a point or place of beginning."

The Department of Docks and Ferries shall build or cause to be built, at the expense of the City, upon land under water above described, extensions to said Piers New No. 27 and New No. 28, North River.

The lease of said extensions shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries shall certify that said extensions respectively are completed.

The lease shall be for a period coterminous with the existing lease of said piers dated October 16, 1903, the term of which begins September 1, 1904, and expires September 1, 1914, with the privilege of one renewal term of ten (10) years.

The annual rental to September 1, 1914, shall be at the rate of twenty-seven and one-half (27½) cents per square foot of the area of said extensions, and in addition five and one-half (5½) per cent. of the cost of said extensions, said areas and costs to be as shown by the surveys and books of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and for the renewal period, from September 1, 1914, to September 1, 1924, a ten (10) per cent. advance.

The lessee shall have the right to erect upon said extensions and to maintain thereon during the term of the lease or any renewal thereof, a shed, which shall be built in accordance with the plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries; and the said shed shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease.

The lease shall provide that the lessee shall at all times during the term thereof keep and maintain all sheds or other structures erected, or to be erected under the provisions of said lease, in good condition and repair to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease, except in so far as they are inconsistent herewith, shall be similar to those contained in the existing lease of Piers New No. 27 and New No. 28, dated October 16, 1903.

Sir—I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Clyde Steamship Company of an extension to Pier (New) 36, North River Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, upon land under water described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the outer end of the southerly side of the present pier, new, 36, North River; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said pier to the pierhead line modified by the Secretary of War, March 1, 1913, a distance of one hundred and sixty-seven and fourteen one-hundredths feet (167.14 ft.); running thence northerly and along the pierhead line modified by the Secretary of War, March 1, 1913, to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier; running thence easterly and along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said pier to a point in the outer end of the present Pier 36; running thence southerly and along the outer end of said pier to the point or place of beginning.

Extension to Pier (New) 44.

Beginning at a point in the outer end of the northerly side of Pier (new) 44 as it now exists; running thence westerly and along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of Pier (new) 44 a distance of two hundred and twelve and seventy-six one-hundredths (212.76) feet to the pierhead line modified by the Secretary of War, March 1, 1913; running thence southerly and along said modified pierhead line to a point distant forty (40) feet southerly; running thence easterly and parallel with the first described course to a point in the outer end of the present pier; running thence northerly and along said outer end to the point or place of beginning.

The leases of said extensions shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries shall certify said extensions are completed; the leases to be for a period coterminous with existing leases of said piers.

The annual rentals are fixed at the rate of 27½ cents per square foot for land under water covered by said extensions, and, in addition, 5½ per cent. on the cost of construction of said extension; said areas and costs to be as shown by the surveys and books of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

It is provided that the respective lessees are to have the right to erect upon said extensions and to maintain thereon, during the term of the lease or the renewal thereof, a shed which shall be built in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries. The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, requesting an amendment to the corporate authorization of \$3,500, for the construction of two shelter houses for longshoremen:

November 29, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—In July, 1911, resolutions were adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the issuance of corporate stock in the sum of \$3,500 to cover the cost of constructing two shelter houses for longshoremen.

This item was included in a resolution covering various other corporate stock items, which resolution was approved by the Board of Aldermen on July 25 and by his Honor the Mayor on August 29, 1911.

This Department, after consideration, found it impracticable to erect two struc-

tures for the amount provided and it was therefore deemed best to erect one shelter on the marginal street area between 16th and 17th streets, North River. Specifications and form of contract have been prepared for this one shelter house and it is estimated that to complete the structure and make it available for use will necessitate an expenditure of the full amount allowed for the two houses in July, 1911, \$3,500.

I therefore request that the authorization of July, 1911, be rescinded and that in lieu thereof a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to provide corporate stock funds for this Department in the sum of \$3,500 for the construction of one shelter house between West 16th and West 17th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan. This amount, it is estimated, will cover the entire installation, including plumbing and steam heating.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

June 19, 1913.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On November 29, 1912, the Commissioner of Docks requested that a corporate stock authorization of \$3,500 for the construction of two shelter houses for longshoremen be amended to make the amount available for the construction and equipment of one shelter house, to be located between West 16th street and West 17th street, North River, Borough of Manhattan. In connection therewith we report as follows:

The appropriation for the two shelter houses was approved in the 1911 Budget. Plans and specifications were prepared and it was found that almost the full amount provided would be necessary to erect and equip one shelter. These plans and specifications were submitted on November 8, 1912, for approval.

The Commissioner states that he intends to "lease out for revenue under certain restrictions the privilege of selling refreshments, such as coffee and sandwiches, and control the use of the place by assigning one intelligent employee of the laboring class for each eight-hour shift."

The Church Temperance Society offered to operate the shelter if the City would provide funds for the cost of same. The Society estimates the cost of operation would be about \$1,700, and that the profit from the sale of sandwiches and coffee would be about \$624 per year.

This Society has found that the men prefer to sit at a counter instead of tables, and that there is no need for a kitchen when only coffee and sandwiches are to be served.

The plans and specifications should be modified to provide a lunch counter and do away with the kitchen. This will facilitate the service and save expense.

I recommend that the plans and specifications be redrawn to provide for two shelter houses to be in different sections of the water-front.

I am returning herewith the plans and specifications, and also the communication requesting the amendment of the resolution.

I recommend the denial of the request because I believe we should begin such experiments on a simpler basis than the one proposed. Respectfully,

Whereas, By resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in July, 1911, and included in resolution covering other various corporate stock items, approved by the Board of Aldermen July 25 and by his Honor the Mayor August 29, 1911, an issue of corporate stock in the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) was authorized to cover the cost of constructing two shelter houses for longshoremen; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Docks, under date of November 29, 1912, requests that this authorization be amended to make the amount available for the construction and equipment of one shelter house to be located between West 16th and West 17th streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, and has submitted specifications and form of contract for this one shelter house; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that two shelter houses should be provided for in different sections of the water-front, and that the plans and specifications should be redrawn accordingly; therefore be it

Resolved, That the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the corporate stock authorization of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) for the construction of two shelter houses for longshoremen, be amended to make the amount available for the construction and equipment of one shelter house, be and the same is hereby denied. The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease to the Brooklyn and Richmond Ferry Company, of franchise to operate a ferry from the foot of Bay Ridge avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, to South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond:

June 12, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Several months ago my predecessor recommended that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and authorize a lease to the Brooklyn and Richmond Ferry Company of a franchise to operate a ferry from and to the foot of Bay Ridge avenue (69th street), Borough of Brooklyn, to and from the foot of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond, specifying the property to be used in connection with said ferry, the selection of the property having been made by the then officials of this Department.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held May 21, 1913, a resolution was adopted approving of and authorizing said lease.

Under date of June 3, 1913, the present Superintendent of Ferries reports as follows:

"The construction of a slip in the area included in the franchise would, by reason of its close proximity to the present entrance to the St. George Ferry, result in unnecessary congestion of the automobile and vehicle traffic whereby neither ferry would be in a position to properly handle this traffic, and would also be responsible for conditions which would result in possible injuries to foot passengers desirous of taking either the Brooklyn Ferry or the ferry to Manhattan. The approach to the St. George Ferry is along a roadway built on a fair slope, and traffic approaching the ferry house, particularly automobiles, which usually travel at a more than moderate rate of speed along this roadway, would inevitably meet with accident, due to the fact that the team entrance to the present ferry house is not visible to traffic along the roadway until the end of the roadway has been reached, when a sharp turn must be made to the ferry entrance. The construction of another ferry slip with its attached ferry houses at this point, together with a waiting line of teams or automobiles, would further narrow the driveway at the point directly ahead of the inclined approach, at which point all of the available area should be provided to eliminate the possibility of accidents of this nature. Teams and automobiles leaving the ferry house do so usually in a double line, the automobiles gathering speed for the purpose of making the incline on the approach with all possible ease, and any further restriction of the area at the team entrance to the present ferry by the construction of additional slips or ferry houses could not possibly be for the best interests of either the general public or either ferry company. The location of the proposed slip would also place in jeopardy any boats that the Department might have tied up in the lay-up slip alongside of the south pier, inasmuch as it would be impossible for the Brooklyn and Richmond Ferry Company to make landings at the proposed point due to the treacherous tides without at some time coming in collision with the Department's boats that might lay in the slip referred to."

I beg to recommend that, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by unanimous vote amend the resolution of said Commission, dated May 21, 1913, as follows:

Strike out the following paragraph:

Parcel "B" at St. George.

"Beginning at the intersection of the southerly side of the pile platform at the foot of the South street approach with a line drawn parallel with the easterly side of the platform and distant 10 feet westerly therefrom, running thence northerly along said platform 55 feet; thence easterly at right angles thereto 10 feet to the easterly side of said platform; thence northerly along the easterly side of said platform 15 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of the present pile platform at the present ferry lay-up slip; thence easterly along the southerly side of said platform 50 feet; thence southerly at right angles thereto to an intersection with a line parallel with and 60 feet northerly from the easterly prolongation of the southerly side of the South street platform; thence easterly, parallel with and 60 feet northerly from the southerly side of the platform at the foot of South street, to the established pierhead line; thence southwesterly along the established pierhead line to an intersection with a line parallel with and 10 feet southerly from the southerly line of the South street platform; thence westerly and along said parallel line to its intersection with the southerly prolongation of the first course; thence northerly along said southerly prolongation of the first course to the point or place of beginning, as shown on lease map attached hereto."

—and insert in lieu thereof the following paragraph:

Parcel "B" at St. George.

"Beginning at a point in the easterly side of the South street approach to the St. George Ferry Terminal, distant 150 feet southerly from the intersection of the easterly side of said South street approach and the bulkhead line approved by the Secretary of War, March 26, 1907; running thence easterly a distance of 97 feet, more or less, making an angle with the easterly side of the South street approach of 123 degrees; thence at right angles to the last mentioned course a distance of 15 feet; running thence easterly and parallel with the first described course a distance of 40 feet to the point of intersection of the southerly side of the platform at the inner end of the lay-up slips with the westerly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips; running thence easterly to an intersection with the southerly prolongation of the easterly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips; running thence northerly and along the southerly prolongation of the easterly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips, along the easterly side of said westerly pier and its northerly prolongation to the pierhead line approved by the Secretary of War, February 1, 1906; running thence easterly and along the pierhead line approved by the Secretary of War February 1, 1906, to the westerly side of the pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip; running thence southerly and along the westerly side of said pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip to the outshore face of the platform at the inner end of the lay-up slips; running thence southwesterly to a point in the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slips distant 70 feet, measured along the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slip from the intersection of the westerly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips and the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slips; running thence southerly and at right angles to the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slips to a point distant 35 feet, measured at right angles to the first described course; running thence westerly and parallel with the first described course a distance of 35 feet therefrom, to a point distant 45 feet from the easterly side of the South street approach, measured along the prolongation of this last described course; running thence southwesterly a distance of 45 feet to a point in the easterly side of the South street approach distant 75 feet; measured along the easterly side of the South street approach from the point or place of beginning; and running thence northerly and along the easterly side of the South street approach to the point or place of beginning; as shown in red on the accompanying map. Together with the right to erect on said platform a ferry waiting room 15 feet by 40 feet, with the right to erect and maintain ferry racks in the above mentioned area, along the easterly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips and the westerly side of the pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip; together with the right to erect and maintain a light and fog bell at the outer end of the pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip."

Strike out the following paragraph:

"(14) The right of the lessee to maintain a fence and gateway across the platform at the inner end of the lay-up slips at the Richmond terminal shall always be subject to the right of The City of New York and its assignees to have free, uninterrupted and unrestricted ingress and egress to and from the property of the City adjoining and in proximity to the premises hereby leased."

—and insert in lieu thereof the following paragraph:

"The City of New York, its officers, employees, agents or contractors shall have at all times during the term of the lease and at all hours of the day or night, free, uninterrupted and unrestricted passage for persons, vehicles, horses, implements and goods of every description over that portion of the premises leased between the South street approach and the platform in rear of the slip hereby leased, to the two lay-up slips easterly thereof."

In connection therewith, the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

June 26, 1913.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—In a communication dated June 12, 1913, addressed to the Chairman of your honorable Board and transmitted herewith, the Commissioner of Docks, Mr. R. A. C. Smith, refers to the resolution adopted at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held May 21, 1913, approving of and authorizing a lease to the Brooklyn and Richmond Ferry Company of a franchise to operate a ferry from and to the foot of Bay Ridge avenue (69th street), Borough of Brooklyn, to and from the foot of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond. The resolution specifies the property to be used in connection with the ferry.

In this communication there is quoted from the report of the present Superintendent of Ferries, dated June 3, 1913, a series of objections to the site of the proposed Richmond terminal, and the Commissioner of Docks recommends that, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by unanimous vote amend the resolution of said Board dated May 21, 1913, substituting the area including the most northerly slip of three lay-up slips situated at St. George, and to the southeast of the site originally specified in the aforementioned resolution.

The Commissioner further recommends that paragraph No. 14 of said resolution be amended to read as follows:

The City of New York, its officers, employees, agents or contractors shall have at all times during the term of the lease and at all hours of the day or night, free, uninterrupted and unrestricted passage for persons, vehicles, horses, implements and goods of every description over that portion of the premises leased between South street approach and the platform in rear of the slip hereby leased, to the two lay-up slips easterly thereof.

The three lay-up slips, of which the most northerly one is now proposed to be substituted as a location for the St. George terminal, are situated to the southeast of the St. George Municipal ferry terminal. The wooden platform contiguous to these slips connects with a wooden platform or approach projecting from the foot of South street.

The Department of Docks and Ferries is now constructing a platform connecting the terminal at the foot of the South street approach to the northerly end of the platform contiguous to the three lay-up slips. That department intends to remove all or a part of the platform projecting from the foot of South street to permit boats to approach the dumping board situated on the shore of the South street approach.

A representative of the Department of Finance made an inspection, and in reply to his enquiries, was informed that it would be to the advantage of the City were the proposed ferry terminal at St. George substituted as recommended.

The contentions of the Superintendent of Ferries as quoted in the communication of the Commissioner of Docks previously referred to seem well founded. The present plan comprehending the removal of the platform projecting from South street and the erection of the platform at the foot of the South street approach makes the northerly slip of the three lay-up slips most practicable for terminal purposes.

Should the franchise area be changed as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks, paragraph 14, of the aforementioned resolution would require modification as pointed out in his communication dated June 12, 1913.

In view of the foregoing, I am substantially in accord with the recommendations of the Commissioner of Docks as herein stated.

Transmitted herewith please find for your consideration a resolution amending the description of parcel B at St. George, and paragraph 14 of the resolution adopted by your honorable Board May 21, 1913. Respectfully,

"Beginning at the intersection of the southerly side of the pile platform at the foot of the South street approach with a line drawn parallel with the easterly side of the platform and distant 10 feet westerly therefrom, running thence northerly along said platform 55 feet; thence easterly at right angles thereto 10 feet to the easterly side of said platform; thence northerly along the easterly side of said platform 15 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of the present pile platform at the present ferry lay-up slip; thence easterly along the southerly side of said platform 50 feet; thence southerly at right angles thereto to an intersection with a line parallel with and 60 feet northerly from the easterly prolongation of the southerly side of the South street platform; thence easterly, parallel with and 60 feet northerly from the southerly side of the platform at the foot of South street, to the established pierhead line; thence southwesterly along the established pierhead line to an intersection with a line parallel with and 10 feet southerly from the southerly line of the South street platform; thence westerly and along said parallel line to its intersection with the southerly prolongation of the first course; thence northerly along said southerly prolongation of the first course to the point or place of beginning, as shown on lease map attached hereto."

—and inserting in lieu thereof the following paragraph:

Parcel "B" at St. George.

"Beginning at a point in the easterly side of the South street approach to the St. George Ferry Terminal, distant 150 feet southerly from the intersection of the easterly side of said South street approach and the bulkhead line approved by the Secretary of War, March 26, 1907; running thence easterly a distance of 97 feet, more or less, making an angle with the easterly side of the South street approach of 123 degrees; thence at right angles to the last mentioned course a distance of 15 feet; running thence easterly and parallel with the first described course a distance of 40 feet to the point of intersection of the southerly side of the platform at the inner end of the lay-up slips with the westerly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips; running thence easterly to an intersection with the southerly prolongation of the easterly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips; running thence northerly and along the southerly prolongation of the easterly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips, along the easterly side of said westerly pier and its northerly prolongation to the pierhead line approved by the Secretary of War, February 1, 1906; running thence easterly and along the pierhead line approved by the Secretary of War February 1, 1906, to the westerly side of the pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip; running thence southerly and along the westerly side of said pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip to the outshore face of the platform at the inner end of the lay-up slips; running thence southwesterly to a point in the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slips distant 70 feet, measured along the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slip from the intersection of the westerly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips and the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slips; running thence southerly and at right angles to the southerly side of the platform at the inshore end of the lay-up slips to a point distant 35 feet, measured at right angles to the first described course; running thence westerly and parallel with the first described course a distance of 35 feet therefrom, to a point distant 45 feet from the easterly side of the South street approach, measured along the prolongation of this last described course; running thence southwesterly a distance of 45 feet to a point in the easterly side of the South street approach distant 75 feet; measured along the easterly side of the South street approach from the point or place of beginning; and running thence northerly and along the easterly side of the South street approach to the point or place of beginning; as shown in red on the accompanying map. Together with the right to erect on said platform a ferry waiting room 15 feet by 40 feet, with the right to erect and maintain ferry racks in the above mentioned area, along the easterly side of the westerly pier of the lay-up slips and the westerly side of the pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip; together with the right to erect and maintain a light and fog bell at the outer end of the pier between the westerly lay-up slip and the centre lay-up slip."

—and by striking out the following paragraph:

"(14) The right of the lessee to maintain a fence and gateway across the platform at the inner end of the lay-up slips at the Richmond terminal shall always be subject to the right of The City of New York and its assignees to have free, uninterrupted and unrestricted ingress and egress to and from the property of the City adjoining and in proximity to the premises hereby leased."

—and inserting in lieu thereof the following paragraph:

"The City of New York, its officers, employees, agents, contractors, lessees or assigns shall have at all times during the term of the lease and at all hours of the day or night, free, uninterrupted and unrestricted passage for persons, vehicles, horses, implements and goods of every description over that portion of the premises leased between the South street approach and the platform in rear of the slip hereby leased, to the two lay-up slips easterly thereof."

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Parks Borough of Brooklyn, turning over Dreamland Pier at Coney Island, as no longer required:

May 21, 1913.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, 280 Broadway, New York City:

Gentlemen—On March 25, 1912, a communication was received by this Department from the Corporation Counsel stating that title to all the lands embraced within the "Public Park" at Coney Island, in the 31st Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, as laid out on the map or plan of The City of New York by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted October 19, 1911, and January 11, 1912, and approved by the Mayor on December 29, 1911, and January 11, 1912, respectively, vested in The City of New York on March 14, 1912, and that as the land was acquired for the purposes of a public park, the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn would have administrative jurisdiction thereof under sections 607 and 612 of the Charter, subject to the rules and regulations of the Park Board.

On May 31 1912, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized an issue of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) corporate stock to provide means for cleaning up debris, etc., and for the general improvement of the park, providing that no part of the sum appropriated by the Board should be used for the removal of the piles and other foundations of what was formerly known as the "Old Iron Pier," or for the removal of other piers and jetties, until after the Corporate Stock Budget Committee shall have reported to said Board whether or not the old piers are worth rebuilding for use as a bulkhead or jetty.

On September 27, 1912, a further communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, stating that title to the lands within the limits of the park, belonging to the Dreamland Corporation, and shown upon the Commissioners' damage map as Damage Nos. 1 and 2, did not vest in The City of New York until six months after the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners, namely, September 14, 1912, for the reason that the pier on the property was constructed to be a building within the meaning of section 990 of the Charter. On September 12, 1912, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution in pursuance of section 990 of the Charter, directing that title to Damage Parcels Nos. 1 and 2 shall vest in The City of New York on September 14, 1912.

In a communication received on September 23, 1912, from the Comptroller I was informed that "the property known as Parcels Nos. 1 and 2 of the Dreamland park site, having been acquired by the City on September 14, 1912, is hereby turned

over to you for the purpose for which it was acquired, subject to the right of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to collect the revenue from the pier."

On April 30, 1913, the following communication was received from Commissioner R. A. C. Smith, of the Department of Docks and Ferries:

"April 28, 1913.

"Hon. MICHAEL J. KENNEDY, Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn:

"Dear Sir—An examination of the Dreamland Pier, Coney Island, by the Engineers of this Department, shows that from six to ten thousand dollars must be spent to put the structure in a safe condition for use. Several applications have been made for permission to land excursion boats at this pier, and it is my opinion that the pier should be repaired and maintained as an open pier at which all steamboats desiring to make landings could be accommodated.

"There seems to be some doubt as to whether your department or this department has jurisdiction over the pier in question, but assuming that such authority is vested in your department if you will turn the pier over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with a statement that it is not at present required by your department, and with a request that it be transferred to his department, steps will be taken at once to put the pier in condition for use in order that it may be open as a public landing place during the coming summer. Very truly yours,

On May 15, 1913, a further communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries signed by Deputy Commissioner Farley, transmitting copy of an opinion from the Corporation Counsel, dated May 13, 1913, stating that the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, has administrative jurisdiction over Damage Parcels Nos. 1 and 2 in the public Park at Coney Island, which includes the Dreamland Pier.

In view of the facts submitted in the letter from the Commissioner of Docks, above quoted, and the further fact that the Dreamland Pier on the Dreamland park site, Coney Island, is not at present required for park purposes, I hereby turn over said Dreamland pier, as shown upon plan submitted herewith, to your Honorable Commission for transfer to the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, who is vested with the control, leasing, maintenance and repairs of piers, under section 818 of the Greater New York Charter. Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held June 25, 1913, the matter of the assignment of the Dreamland Pier at Coney Island to this department was laid over. Since then an understanding has been reached between this department and Mr. Kingsley L. Martin, President of the Foundation Company, representing citizens of Coney Island, whereby the company is to make the necessary repairs to the pier which will be finally passed upon by the Chief Engineer of this department. After certification that the pier is safe, permit will be granted for its use upon such conditions as may be prescribed by the Commissioner of Docks.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should therefore adopt a resolution assigning the Dreamland Pier at Coney Island to the Department of Docks and Ferries. Very respectfully,

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from the Commissioner of Parks, stating that on March 25, 1912, a communication was received in his Department from the Corporation Counsel to the effect that all the lands embraced in the Public Park at Coney Island, in the 31st Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, as laid out on the map or plan of The City of New York by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted October 19, 1911, and January 11, 1912, and approved by the Mayor on December 29, 1911, and January 11, 1912, respectively, vested in The City of New York on March 14, 1912, and as the land was acquired for the purposes of a public park, the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of Brooklyn would have administrative jurisdiction thereof under sections 607 and 612 of the Charter, subject to the rules and regulations of the Park Board.

It is further stated that on May 31, 1912, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized an issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$25,000, to provide means for cleaning up debris, etc., and for the general improvement of the park, providing that no part of the sum appropriated by the Board should be used for the removal of the piles and other foundations of what was formerly known as the "Old Iron Pier" or for the removal of other piers and jetties, until after the Corporate Stock Budget Committee shall have reported to said Board whether or not the old piers are worth rebuilding for use as a bulkhead or jetty.

He further states that on September 27, 1912, a further communication was received from the Corporation Counsel stating that the title to the lands within the limits of the park, belonging to the Dreamland Corporation, and shown on the Commissioners' damage map as damage Nos. 1 and 2, did not vest in The City of New York until six months after the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners, namely, September 14, 1912. On September 12, 1912, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution directing that title to damage parcels Nos. 1 and 2 shall vest in The City of New York on September 14, 1912.

The Park Commissioner claims that in a communication dated September 23, 1912, the Comptroller informed him that the property known as parcels No. 1 and No. 2 of the Dreamland Park site, was turned over to him for the purposes for which it was acquired, subject to the right of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to collect the revenue from the pier, and that on April 30, 1913, he received from the Commissioner of Docks a communication to the effect that an examination was made of this pier which showed that from six to ten thousand dollars must be spent to put the structure in a safe condition; that several applications had been made for permission to land excursion boats at the pier, and that it was his opinion that the pier should be repaired and maintained as an open pier, at which all steamboats desiring to make landings could be accommodated.

In order to remove any doubt as to whether the Park Department or the Dock Department would have jurisdiction over the pier, the Commissioner of Docks requested the Park Commissioner to turn the pier over to the Sinking Fund Commission, with the statement that it would not be required by him, and with the request that it be turned over to the Dock Department.

In accordance therewith, the Park Commissioner turns over said Dreamland Pier, as shown upon a plan submitted with his communication, and requests the transfer of the same to the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution assigning to the Department of Docks and Ferries, Dreamland Pier, on the Dreamland Park site, Coney Island. Respectfully,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign to the Department of Docks and Ferries the Dreamland Pier on the Dreamland Park site, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks transmitting for approval proposed amendment to the new plan for the improvement of the waterfront between Wall street and Maiden lane on the East River, Borough of Manhattan, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law June 24, 1913.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
