## REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1913.

During the quarter ending September 30, 1913, the Park force was engaged in  
general maintenance of parks, particular attention being required by and given to the  
various outdoor activities, such as golf, tennis, baseball, etc.

A large number of trees were cut down, and among them many apparently sound  
hickory, which, pursuant to an order from the State Agriculture Department, had to  
be cut down and burned because of a diseased condition.

Roads, paths and drives were kept in repair, laws and grounds mowed and kept  
free from rubbish. In Van Cortlandt Park some 2,200 feet of a 15-foot road was  
built at the Nursery. Greenhouses, toilets, fences, hotbed sash, lockers and signs were  
painted, and some 5,000 feet of two-rail fence erected.

Trees have been pruned and doctored, shrubs cut back and growth of brush  
thinned out. The wagons and larger tools have been repaired and painted.

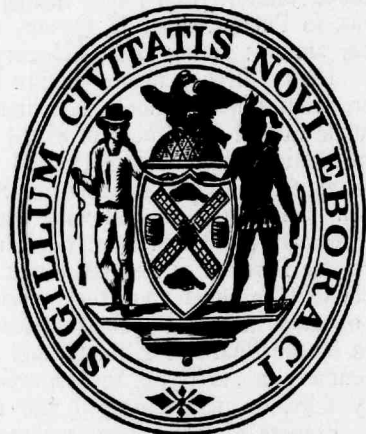

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check, cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
