#### DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE.

Report on Maintenance of Department of Correction in 1913 and 1914.

October 20, 1915.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—Before entering into a discussion of the financial statements of the Department of Correction for the years 1913 and 1914, an attempt will be made to set forth briefly the history of correctional institutions in The City of New York. Much of the information given is taken from an article on "Old Prisons and Punishments" in "Historic New York."

#### 1. History of Correctional Institutions in Greater New York.

The first place of imprisonment is said to have been within the walls of old Fort Amsterdam. It appears to have been used chiefly for the maintenance of military discipline and the punishment of refractory Indians. There is no certainty

that civil prisoners were ever confined there.

When the Stadt Huys was erected at the head of Coenties Slip in 1642 it did service as tavern, court, city hall and prison combined. The space set apart for prisoners was one small rear room on the first floor. In front of the building were the whipping post, the ducking stool and the stocks. A Provost Marshal, his duties fixed by ordinance, had charge of the jail. "He was to live in town, where a dwelling was provided for him. He was to visit the prison constantly, to feed and lock up the prisoners, and to be responsible for the keys and for the state of the locks, taking especial care that no file or rope or anything sharp be left on the premises."

The irons to be worn by each prisoner were determined when he was condemned, and could only be increased in case he proved dangerous.

Many of the persons committed to this prison were mutinous sailors. Here, too, were confined a number of Quakers because of their religious beliefs. It is related that one of them who attempted to preach was "fined and scourged, thrust into a cell, and chained to a wheelbarrow." Some of the penalties provided for small offenses would appear to the present generation to be very excessive.

Because of its unsound condition the first City Hall was sold in 1699, and the prison with its penitential paraphernalia removed to the new City Hall, situated in Wall Street where the United States Sub-Treasury now stands. The basement was reserved for ordinary offenders, the sub-basement for dangerous characters, and the attic for those held for debt. This remained the only prison of the City until about 1756.

In 1746, there were twenty-four hundred slaves in a total population of something less than twelve thousand, and the restraint put upon their movements and conduct was quite severe. Some of the new restrictions put upon the people generally in this period were a fine of ten shillings for working on the Lord's Day; one shilling for children playing upon the Sabbath; six shillings for the neglect of a householder to provide fire buckets or to keep them in proper condition, etc.

A new four-story prison was erected about 1756. It stood in the northeastern part of the present City Hall Park near the western terminus of the Brooklyn Bridge. At the time of its demolition, a few years ago, it was know as the Hall When erected of Records, it having been the office of the Registrar for many years. it was known as the New Gaol, and soon afterward as the Debtors' Prison. How harsh at this time were the laws pertaining to imprisonment for debt can be gathered from the statement in one of the histories of the City that "in the year 1788 nearly twelve hundred residents of the town, one in every twenty of its male population. went to jail for debt.'

As by 1775 the prisoners had become so numerous as to overtax the capacity of the Debtors' Prison, a new jail, known as the Bridewell, was built between Broadway and the present City Hall. It was intended mainly for long-term prisoners. The first poorhouse was erected in 1736 about where the City Hall now stands. It became inadequate and a new one was erected in 1795 on the north side of the Park, facing Chambers Street. The rapid growth of the City made this an inappropriate site and in 1810 seven acres were purchased at Bellevue for a new building. It was completed in 1812. The inmates of the last-mentioned building were removed to Blackwell's Island about 1847, and the building converted into the Belle-

The Bridewell just referred to was torn down in 1838, and some of the stones therefrom employed in the construction of the Hall of Justice in Centre Street. soon to be known as "The Tombs."

The abolishment in part of imprisonment for debt and the erection of a State's Prison at Greenwich in 1797 for long-term convicts gave added space for short-term prisoners both in the Debtors' Prison and in the Bridewell.

About this time the severity of many of the sentences inposed for crime was lessened and attention was given to the reformation of the prisoners as well as to their punishment. Spacious workshops were accordingly erected at Greenwich. The principal trades were weaving, spinning, shoe-making, brush-making and carpentry. It is stated that the locksmith's art was most popular. For some time the new system promised to be very successful, but lax management and the inadaptation of the building to its purposes brought about less desirable conditions. The prisoners were gradually transferred to Sing Sing in 1828 and 1829 and in the latter year Greenwich Prison was destroyed. A new penitentiary erected on Blackwell's Island about 1828, Sing Sing Prison and later "The Tombs" gradually took the place of the Debtors' Prison, Greenwich Prison and the Bridewell.

In Brooklyn the cornerstone of the City Prison in Raymond Street was laid in August, 1836. The "penitentiary" (presumably, the Kings County Penitentiary), is said to have been occupied in January, 1854. This latter institution was demolished about 1907, its prisoners, together with the machinery and manufacturing industries, having been removed to the penitentiary on Blackwell's Island

Document No. 1 of the Board of Assistants, May 23, 1831, printed by order of the Common Council, is the "Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Alms House, Bridewell and Penitentiary of the City of New York. It shows the number of persons in the various institutions on May 1, 1831: Alms House, 1,936; Bridewell 63; Penitentiary, 427; Bellevue Hospital, 335. Total, 2,761.

Chapter 283 of the Laws of 1845 made it "lawful for the Common Council of

the City of New York to nominate and appoint one person to be an overseer of the poor thereof, who shall be known and distinguished as the 'commissioner of the alms house department,' and who shall have the same powers and authority as are now conferred by law upon the commissioners of the alms house and Bridewell of the City of New York. \* \* \*"

A report of the Alms House Commissioner for the year 1848 contains the following statement of expenditures for supplies for that year:

"For the support of an average weekly number of 2,878 persons in the Alms House on Blackwell's Island, the branch on Randall's Island, and

Making the grand total of the year's cost, as per tables..........\$403,307 83" In another table there is deducted from the total cost of the supplies for indoor support as given above, \$289,726.15, receipts of \$11,030.08, leaving a net cost for supplies for the year 1848 of \$278,696.07, or an average of 85.6 cents per week per

This table is shown principally, however, to bring out the fact that at this period the City Prisons and workhouse were under the jurisdiction of the Alms House

Chapter 246 of the laws of 1849, passed April 6, 1849, provided that thereafter the Alms House Department should be controlled and managed by a board of ten governors named by the law, their successors to be elected.

By chapter 510 of the laws of 1860 the Alms House Department was abolished, and in its stead was created the Department of Public Charities and Corrections,

at the head of which were to be four commissioners.

Section 4 of this chapter, quoted below, defines the scope of this new department: The department hereby created, is hereby empowered and directed to possess and exercise full and exclusive powers for the government, management, maintenance and direction of the several institutions and buildings, and premises and property and appurtenances thereto, which immediately preceding the appointment of the four commissioners aforesaid, were under control of the board of governors of the alms house, and especially of the alms house and work house, of the nurseries for poor and destitute children, and of the county lunatic asylum, and of the Potters' field, or other public burial place of the poor and strangers in the city and county of New York, and especially also of the penitentiary and city prison, and various prisons and houses of detention in said city, which are hereby particularly designated as the institutions of the public correction and charities provided for by this act. But the foregoing shall not relate to the house of refuge, nor the juvenile delinquent asylum, nor the house of detention of witnesses, nor the county or sheriff's jail.'

In the Alms House report for the year 1848, the Commissioner has the following

to say relative to the Penitentiary:

"This prison, to my regret, continues still to be the united habitation of the guilty felon and the unfortunate vagrant. Our laws, as yet, make no discrimination in providing for their condition, dissimilar as all know it to be, and unjust as it is to incarcerate together the poor and abandoned victim of poverty, and the convicted criminal. I had hoped that a House of Industry would have, before this, been furnished for the vagrant poor. In such a refuge, how many a wandering mendicant might be restored to a life of honorable usefulness, and personal pride and comfort. The reckless, dissipated and abandoned, would have an opportunity of being benefited by a salutary, and, perhaps, permanent reformation. This effect, however, can never be accomplished without the radical separation of the prisoner and vagrant, the association of whom, to serve out a term of confinement, should at once offer the strongest argument against so unnatural a process, and so unproductive a principle—thus leading to a thorough change in the law and its action."

'It will be remembered, that among the several reasons I have from time to time proposed for your action, this separation conspicuously stands-a prison is certainly not a proper place for a class of people who commit no crime, unless to be poor be acknowledged a criminal condition-yet how long have our authorities cruelly kept them in the closest communionship; simply because a poor person is arrested in the streets, or gives himself up for protection, and becomes an inmate by magisterial authority, is rather an inhuman and unsatisfactory reasonif reason it can be called-to incarcerate him with the felon; and I cannot but regret, that the Common Council have so long permitted this condition of ou pauper and prison affairs to remain a blot upon their otherwise conceded liberal

policy generously pursued." Chapter 510 of the laws of 1860, quoted in part above, creating the Department of Charities and Corrections, retained these functions in one department, although section 11 of this chapter provides that so far as possible the paupers and criminals shall be kept separate "so that the novice in crime may not become contaminated by the evil example of, or by association and contact with, the more hardened and criminal." It was not until the enactment of chapter 912 of the laws of 1895 that they were legally separated.

Sections 4 and 5 of this chapter refer to the duties placed upon the new Depart-

ment of Public Charities and the new Department of Correction:

"Section 4. The commissioners of public charities (3) shall be the head of the department of public charities of the City of New York. They shall have the general direction and charge of all hospitals, asylums, almshouses and other institutions belonging to the city or county of New York which are or shall be devoted to the care of the insane, the feeble-minded, the sick, the infirm and the destitute, except the hospital wards attached to the penitentiary and to other prisons and institutions under the direction of the Commissioner of Correction, and except such hospitals as are or may be established or conducted by the Department of Public Health, pursuant to law. They shall have all the authority concerning the care, custody and disposition of the insane, the feeble-minded, the sick, the infirm and the destitute which the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction now have, and they shall be subject to the same duties and obligations in respect of such persons as the Commissioners are. It shall be the duty of the same Commissioners to keep and preserve a proper record of all persons who shall come under their care or custody and of the disposition made by them of such persons, with full particulars as to the name, age, sex, color and nativity of each, and in the case of minors, as to the names and residence of parents and their religious faiths, so far as ascertained, and the name, religious faith and residence of the institutions or families with whom they are placed, together with copies of any instruments of indenture executed by the said Commissioners. In the placing out, transfer, indenture or commitment of any child, such child shall, when practicable, be placed with or transferred, indentured or committed to an institution governed by persons of the same religious faith as the parents of the child, or to an individual of like religious faith. But the said Commissioners shall have no authority or duty in respect to any criminal or misdemeanant, or in respect of any institution devoted to the custody of such persons \* \* \*"

"Section 5. The Commissioner of Correction shall be the head of the Department of Correction of the City of New York. He shall have all the authority concerning the care, custody and disposition of all criminals and misdemeanants in the city and county of New York, which the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction now have, and he shall be subject to the same duties and obligations in respect to such persons as the said Commissioners now are. But he shall have no authority and be subject to no obligation in respect of any destitute persons not charged with or convicted of any crime or misdemeanor. He shall have the general charge and direction of all prisons and other institutions for the care and custody of criminals and misdemeanants which belong or shall belong to the city and county of New York. Said department shall be authorized to demand and receive all fines imposed for intoxication and disorderly conduct in the city of New York in the manner and for the purposes now prescribed by law. The Commissioner of Correction may provide for the doing in the correctional institutions of any work, labor or service for the Department of Public Charities that may be required by the commissioners thereof, and may from time to time, in his discretion and upon the request of the Commissioners of Public Charities, detail and designate inmates of the workhouse to perform necessary work, labor and Engineers, 3; Stokers, 3.

service in and upon the grounds and buildings which are in the charge of the Commissioners of Public Charities, and said inmates of the workhouse when so employed shall at all times be under the personal oversight and direction of a workhouse keeper or keepers, but no inmate of the workhouse shall be employed in any capacity whatever in any ward of any hospital."

The present organization and functions of the Department of Correction are governed principally by sections 694 to 717 of the Greater New York Charter. The scope of the authority and duties of the Commissioner as set forth in section 695, quoted in part below, are very similar to those mentioned in section 5, chapter 912, of the laws

of 1895, just referred to:

Section 695. The Commissioner shall have jurisdiction over and it shall be his duty to take charge of and manage all institutions for the care and custody of criminals and misdemeanants which belong to or shall be hereafter acquired by the city of New York, except the house of refuge, the house of detention of witnesses \* \* incorporated societies for the prevention of cruelty to children and such places for the detention of prisoners or persons charged with crime as are by law placed under the charge of some other department, board or officer. The buildings now used as jails in the counties of Kings and Queens are hereby placed under the control and authority of the Commissioner; and all prisoners other than those detained by civil process, who by law are committed to the custody of the sheriffs of the counties of Kings and Queens, respectively, are hereby placed in the custody of the Commissioner. \* \* \* The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall \* \* \* designate and set aside any portion of these buildings or any other suitable buildings as common jails for the accommodation of prisoners detained by civil process held in the custody of such sheriffs, and such portions of buildings or other suitable buildings so designated and set aside shall be and remain under the separate control of the respective sheriffs of the counties aforesaid.

Section 700, relative to the employment of inmates, provides:

"Every inmate of an institution under the charge of the Commissioner, whose age and health will permit, shall be employed in quarrying or cutting stone, or in cultivating land under the control of the Commissioner, or in manufacturing such articles as may be required for ordinary use in the institutions under the control of the Commissioner, or for the use of any department of The City of New York, or in preparing and building sea walls upon islands or other places belonging to The City of New York upon which public institutions now are or may hereafter be erected, or in public works carried on by any department of the City, or at such mechanical or other labor as shall be found from experience to be suited to the capacity of the individual. The articles raised or manufactured by such labor shall be subject to the order of and shall be placed under the control of the Commissioner, and shall be utilized in the institutions under his charge or in some other department of the City. All the lands under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner not otherwise occupied or utilized and which are capable of cultivation shall in the discretion of the Commissioner be used for agricultural

Section 701 provides that inmates of the correctional institutions may be detailed perform work, labor and service for any other administrative department of the City, but must remain in the costody of the Department of Correction.

Sentences to the workhouse do not exceed six months and those to the penitentiary are rarely longer than one year.

Chapter 579 of the laws of 1915 authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to create in place of the Board of Parole a Parole Commission to consist of three members appointed by the Mayor, and ex officio, the Police Commissioner and the Commissioner of Correction. "The Commission is to have power to parole, conditionally release, discharge, retake or re-imprison (with certain exceptions and restrictions) inmates of any workhouse, reformatory or penitentiary under the control of the Department of Correction."

The Commissioner of Correction is also a member ex officio of the Board of Inebriety, together with the Commissioner of Public Charities, also ex officio, and

five other members appointed by the Mayor.

The Board owns an 800-acre tract in Norwich, Orange County, to which persons addicted to the use of alcohol or drugs may be committed upon their own application or upon the petition of a relative.

#### II. Institutions or Buildings Controlled in Whole or in Part by the Department of Correction.

The City's penal institutions are divided into five classes, namely: 1. District Prisons (For Detention of Arrested Persons)-

(a) Second District, 10th St. and 6th Ave.

(b) Third District, 69 Essex St.

(c) Fourth District, E. 57th St. (d) Fifth District, 121st St. and Sylvan Pl.

(e) Sixth District, 161st St. and Brook Ave.

(f) Seventh District, W. 53rd St. (g) Eighth District, Westchester.

2. City Prisons (For Detention of Persons Awaiting Trial and Detention of Convicted Prisoners)-

(a) 101 Centre St., Manhattan.

(b) 149 Raymond St., Brooklyn.(c) Court Sq. and Jackson Ave., Queens.

3. Workhouse (For Detention of Misdemeanants)—

(a) Blackwell's Island.

(b) Hart's Island-Branch.

(c) Riker's Island-Branch.

4. Reformatories (For Detention of Boys Between the Ages of 14 and 25)—

(a) Hart's Island.

(b) New Hampton Farms. 5. Penitentiary (For Detention of Criminal Offenders)—

a) Blackwell's Island. At the Reformatory on Hart's Island the following trades are taught: Carpentry, Electric Wiring, Painting, Plumbing, Printing, Tailoring and Tinsmithing, Cement Blocks and Ice are Manufactured by the prisoners.

New Hampton Farms consists of a tract of 610 acres purchased by the City in 1913. Here agriculture is taught to the inmates. It is expected to devolop this plant to a capacity of about 750 persons.

The following articles are manufactured at Blackwell's Island: Brushes and Dusters, Clothing and Knit Goods, Cylinder Brooms, Hair Mattresses and Pillows, House and Whisk Brooms, Iron Beds and Wire Mattresses, Printing and Bookbinding, Shoes and Slippers, Street and Stable Brooms.

A baker and butcher shop maintained here supplies all the penal institutions. Vari-

ous garden products are also produced. Most of the roads and walks of the various institutions are built and kept in

condition by the prisoners. The 1914 sales of prison-made articles yielded \$137,696.04.

The cost of operation and maintenance of the Department of Correction for 1914; as shown above, was \$1,419,703.57, for the year 1913 it was \$1,450,295.08, showing a decrease in 1914 under 1913 of \$30,591.51 or 2.1 per cent. The item "Prison Industries" represents the cost of materials used in various articles manufactured at the Penitentiary for sale. In 1914 these materials cost \$113,254.75; in 1913, \$113,278.18. Deducting these amounts from the total expenditures for 1913 and 1914, the net expenditures for those years are \$1,337,016.90 and \$1,306,448.82 respectively, a decrease in 1914 of \$30,568.08 or 2.3 per cent.

There has been an increase in receipts in 1914 in all the items enumerated above except "Sales of Manufactured Goods."

# VI. General Remarks.

The expenditures of the Department of Correction decreased in 1914 as compared with 1913, \$30,591.59. The greater part of this decrease took place in the operation and maintenance of steamers and launches and in prison service.

Some of the matters to which it seems desirable to call attention are the differences in the cost of the Manhattan and the Brooklyn stables, the increases in the indirect costs in a number of the prisons where there have been decreases in the direct costs, the differences in 1914 in the costs of food in different institutions, these costs ranging from 12.57 to 17.30 cents per prisoner-day and from 30.09 to 52.12 cents per employee-day, and the decrease in sales of manufactured goods and in the percentage of profit thereon. It is quite likely that consideration of these subjects and of the elements that enter into their costs may be productive of some savings.

Other matters that came to view during the consideration of the statements of the Department of Correction give promise of greater savings than those directly connected with that Department. One of these matters is the question of the transportation of passengers and freight to and from Blackwell's Island. Both the Department of Correction and the Department of Public Charities have institutions on this island. The Commissioner of the latter department recommended in his annual report of 1911 that the island be connected with the Queensboro Bridge by elevators. He said:

There should be a suitable elevator service from the island to the bridge for passengers, freight and ambulance. The justification for this service will City as a whole should be considerably reduced. Respectfully, be understood by the fact that during 1911 1,241,717 persons were carried to

Blackwell's Island by the boats of this Department and the Department of Correction. During the year there was expended on the six steamboats maintained by the Department the sum of \$153,857.60. Three of these boats could be abandoned if there were adequate elevator facilities to the island from the bridge, thus saving annually approximately \$70,000, or about two-thirds of the entire cost of the installation of the elevator service. Assuming that it would cost \$10,000 per year for the maintenance of the elevator, there would be a saving to the City of \$60,000 in the difference in the cost of maintenance, which would pay for the entire cost of installation of the elevators in less than two years. The Department of Correction could also obtain similar economies.

The two departments referred to have in all eleven boats. The cost of operation and maintenance of them in 1914 was \$185,11895. This included also the cost of transportation of passengers and freight to Randall's, Hart's, Riker's Islands and sometimes to Staten Island. The estimated number of persons carried by these boats to and from Blackwell's Island in 1914 was 1,874,646, and the freight transferred both ways is estimated at 12,918 tons. Another proposition includes a storehouse on the island in connection with the elevator proposed by Commissioner Drummond, and still another plan considers the consolidation and reduction of the boat service. No recommendations are made here except that the suggestion for decreasing the cost of the transportation service be given thorough consideration.

A report issued in 1915, entitled "Study of County Government Within The City of New York and a Plan for Its Reorganization," has the following to say regarding the cost of maintaining civil prisoners in county jails:

'The law requires civil prisoners to be kept separate from criminal offenders. The former are detained in the custody of the sheriff in the county jail in each county. In Kings County the county jail is merely a portion of the Brooklyn City Prison, which is set aside for the use of the sheriff. In Bronx and Richmond counties criminal prisoners serving short terms are under the jurisdiction of the sheriff and are confined in the county jail. The salary cost of maintaining the five county jails, as indicated in the budget for 1915, is \* \* \*\$95,044.50, of which \$74,180 was for guarding prisoners.

The average number of prisoners confined in the county jail daily during 1914 was: New York, 20; Kings, 15; Bronx, 85; Queens, 2; Richmond, 45; a total of 167. In Bronx and Richmond counties the daily average of prisoners arrested by civil process is two per diem. The sheriffs of these counties, however, have the custody of witnesses detained by the state and of prisoners awaiting criminal trial or sentence or serving short terms for criminal offenses. On this basis the average daily cost of guarding prisoners per 1915 budget would be per prisoner: New York, \$3.49; Kings, \$3.21; Queens, \$5.20; Bronx, 64 cents, and

"In contrast with the preceding, the records in the Department of Correction show that the cost of guarding prisoners solely is as follows: Workhouse, one keeper to 13.5 male prisoners at a cost of about sixteen cents per prisoner per diem, one matron or orderly to 24 female prisoners at a cost of less than seven cents per prisoner per diem; penitentiary, one keeper to 17 male prisoners at less than sixteen cents per prisoner per diem, one matron or orderly to 3 2-3 female prisoners at thirty-seven cents per prisoner per diem.

It will be noted that Cleaners are paid \$900 per annum in New York, \$750 in Kings, and \$600 in Bronx County jails, while \$360 per annum is the standard for

this work in other branches of the City's service.

The Commissioners of Accounts have heretofore reported on extravagance in the conduct of the county jails and recommended that they be abolished and the custody of prisoners turned over to the Department of Correction. In a report to the Mayor under date of April 28, 1913, attention was called to the fact that at the New York County Jail two Engineers were employed at \$4.50 per diem each, their duties being confined to the care of a small heating boiler carrying not over ten pounds of steam during the winter months and of a kitchen range and a water heater during the summer months. The same situation exists today, except that one of the Engineers is employed only for 200 days."

In a report made under date of September 28, 1915, to the Sheriff of New York County by his counsel, copy of which was forwarded to the Comptroller, occurs the

Early in your administration you took up the question of the expense of maintaining the County Jail, and at that time you found that the approximate expense of maintaining the jail, including salaries of employees, feeding of prisoners, loss of interest on value of land occupied and loss of taxes, was approximately \$50,000 per annum. Prior to January 1st, 1914, we found that the average number of prisoners confined in the County Jail was about 14. During the year 1914, the average number of persons confined in the County Jail was about 20. There was in the County Jail on the 1st of January, 1914, 14 prisoners, and during the isoners were received. I his total of 348 prisoners was confined for a total of 7,198 days. Taking the total expense of about \$50,000 as applicable to the number of prison days occupied during the year 1914, it shows an average expense of over \$7 per day. This expense was considerably higher prior to January 1st, 1914, because the average number of prisoners was smaller.

"The maintenance of a separate jail for civil prisoners is applicable only to the County of New York. The County Law, article 6, sections 90 and 91, provides generally that 'each County Jail shall be used \* \* \*

2. For the detention of prisoners charged with crime and committed for

trial or examination;

"'3. For the confinement of prisoners duly committeed for any contempt or upon civil process \* \* \*\* Section 91 provides that each County Jail shall contain a sufficient number of rooms for the separate confinement of prisoners committed on civil process

or for contempt. "The prison law, section 345, provides that a prisoner arrested in a civil cause must not be kept in a room in which any prisoner on a criminal charge or conviction is confined."

"The Prison Law generally provides that the Sheriff of a county in which there is more than one jail may confine a civil or criminal prisoner in either jail. Apparently the only regulation on the subject is that the civil prisoners shall be kept separate and apart from the criminal prisoners.

The maintenance of a separate jail for the civil prisoners in the County of New York is pursuant to section 120 of the Code of Civil Procedure, which comes from the revised statutes of the State of New York. This section provides that 'the building now used as a jail in the City of New York, for the conconfinement of prisoners in civil causes, shall continue to be the jail of the said County of New York for the confinement of such persons, and the Sheriff of the City and County of New York shall have the custody thereof, and the prisoners in the same.'

'In Kings County, the law requires that the Sheriff shall have exclusive custody of a suitable portion of the jail, to be assigned by the Board of Supervisors for civil prisoners. All other jails in the County of New York are under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Corrections, pursuant to section 695 of

There is nothing in the Constitution of the State which requires a separate jail for civil prisoners in the County of New York. Our suggestion to the Bud get Committee was two-fold: one, that the separate jail for civil prisoners might be abolished, and much of the expense of maintaining the separate jail saved to the County by setting aside part of the City Prison for civil prisoners, pursuant to the provisions of the Prison Law; and, two, that imprisonment for debt be abolished altogether.

"It is, of course, of interest to the people of the County that they be put to no unnecessary expense in the enforcement of civil process, but the danger of advocating the abolition of a separate jail for civil prisoners and the placing of civil prisoners in the City Prison lies in the fact that if this be done, the interest of the public may not be maintained in the proposition which we have been urging, to abolish imprisonment for debt entirely.'

As it has not been possible as yet to make detailed reports upon the Department of Public Charities and the various Sheriff's offices, it has been deemed advisable to introduce these latter three matters here, regardless of the fact that they do not principally concern the Department of Correction. If further examinations demonstrate that the suggestions are practicable and their adoption advisable, the expenses of the

The Great Eastern Telephone Company hereby makes application to your Honorable Board for a franchise or privilege to do a telephone business in the City of New York, and respectfully shows as follows:

That the Company was incorporated under the Telephone and Telegraph section of the Transportation Corporations Law of the State of New York on October 9, 1905, for the purpose of doing a telephone business, with an authorized capital stock of one million dollars.

That at a special meeting of the Stockholders for that purpose on April 5, 1909, the Stockholders authorized an increase of the capital stock to fifty million dollars; and that on July 6, 1910, the owners of more than two-thirds of the capital stock of the Company, then outstanding, consented in writing to the execution of a trust deed to secure an issue of fifty million dollars of 5%, 20 year Convertible Gold Bonds.

That the stockholders of this Company, relying

upon the validity of a franchise granted to the New York Electric Lines Company in 1883, as determined in the Court of Appeals (188 New York, 523), entered into contractual relations with said Company, and has spent more than half a million dollars in an earnest effort to establish a modern system of telephony in this city at reasonable rates; but that said franchise has now been declared void by the United States Supreme Court, and we respectfully urge that good faith with our Stockholders, and with more than one hundred thousand subscribers who have contracted for our service, prompts us to petition this Honorable Board for a new franchise under which we may accord the relief heretofore attempted.

That this Company, in order to test the public demand for telephone competition, and establish a basis for its business activities, instituted a partial canvass for subscribers some time since, which resulted in 107,000 contracts for its service, secured in four and one-half months, demonstrating the fact that at least a million subscribers could be secured within the City of New York at reasonable rates.

That the Company owns certain valuable telephone inventions and has contracted for the use of others, which will enable it to install a strictly modern telephone system, with the highest efficiency in articulation, absolutely private, and several times as rapid as the present manual system, which it is able to maintain and operate at

rates greatly below prevailing prices.

That, mindful of the policy of the City Government to secure local transportation at a minimum cost, as evidenced by the favorable conditions under which our rapid transit system is now in process of construction, this Company volunteers to meet all conditions now imposed upon other telegraph and telephone companies, and limit the charges it may demand for its business service to from two cents to four cents per message, according to the number of messages contracted for, subject to a discount of not less than 10% for prompt payment, with no

extra charge for interborough messages. That it will establish an unlimited Residential rate of four dollars per month for a private line; three dollars per month for a 2-party line; two dollars per month for a 4-party line, with no extra charge for interborough messages; and a rate of one dollar per month for an unlimited residential service within zones, where several

subscribers are served by a single circuit.

That it will establish a Pay Station rate of five cents per message, irrespective of borough boundary lines, applicable to all parts of the

That in addition to the Commercial, Residential and Pay Station rates above recited, the Com-pany will handle the official business of the City New York, as fast as its lines may be extended, at a flat rate of one cent per message, irrespective of borough boundary lines or dis-

tances within the City.

That these rates are offered with the understanding that the Company shall pay for its subway facilities, where they now exist or where they may hereafter be provided, the legal annual rental paid by other telephone and telegraph companies of \$800 to \$1,000 per mile of duct space, in addition to the legally assessed taxes upon its property and franchise; but that otherwise no greater burdens may be imposed upon it than are now imposed upon other telegraph and telephone companies operating within the

That the rates proposed are substantially 40% below present prices, affording a saving to the public of more than \$8,000,000 a year in exchange service and interborough charges, based upon the present use of the telephone, and that the cheaper rates proposed will undoubtedly increase the use of the telephone, with a corre sponding saving to the public.

That the rate of one cent per message to the

City for official business is substantially 72% below what the City has been paying, interborough charges considered, or a saving to the City of about \$205,000 a year after discounts have been deducted, to which should be added between \$600,000 and \$700,000 for subway rental in Manhattan and The Bronx, when the system shall have been completed, affording a direct and indirect revenue to the City of more than \$800,000 a year, besides the taxes levied upon its property and franchise.

That the same interests that control the policy of the Great Eastern Telephone Company have spent more than five hundred thousand dollars in the construction of telephone properties adjacent to New York City, with plants in operation as near as Peekskill on the north, and Perth Amboy on the south, with right-of-way to the Yonkers City line on the north and from Philadelphia to the foot of Morgan Street on

the North River in Jersey City.

That this entire expenditure in excess of \$1,000,000 in suburban construction, engineering lans, securing City subscribers and the effort to establish reasonable rates in this Cty, is a fair indication of our consistent effort to a most desirable solution of the telephone question.

That contracts have been executed with this Company insuring long-distance connections with at least two million independent telephones within talking distance of New York, at present ex-cluded from our markets for lack of a local Independent system with which to connect, placing the Metropolis to a commercial disadvantage when compared with Philadelphia, Buffalo, St. Louis, and over three thousand other municipalities where competition has been established.

That there is a demand for another telephone system in this City is shown by the fact that there are now but 203,000 contracts in a popula-tion of 5,583,871; that with a claim of 568,000 telephones in operation, the last directory contained but 214,761 business and 127,234 residential listings, showing 138,995 more listings than contracts, and that 365,000 of the telephones claimed are extensions, hotel or apartment house instrument. That in Manhattan and The Bronx there is but one business listing to 20 people (5%) and one residential listing to 52 people, or about 2%. In Brooklyn and Queens there is one business listing to 47 people (about 2%) and one residential listing to 37 people (practically 3%. Richmond has one business telephone to fifty-one people (2%) and one residential telephone to twenty-one of its population, or about

That under the terms of the proposed franchise every objection to a duplicate telephone system is obviated. The cheaper rates place the telephone within the reach of substantially 1,000,000 families and 340,000 small business concerns now deprived of its benefits because of excessive rates, while adding no burden to those employing the present system. As all service is "measured," every mesage diverted to the new system carries a proportionate reduction in price, so that those whose business may be benefited by a wider range of communication will find that BOTH SYSTEMS ARE CHEAPER THAN ONE at the present time, and that the subscriber who can divert one-half of his business to the new system will pay practically 20% less for both systems than he now pays for one.

That the Company will promptly accept the franchise, make its engineering plans conform to present conditions, and apply for space in the conduits within ninety days; begin the construc-tion of its system within six months from the allotment of space in the conduits, and complete at least one exchange with a capacity of at least ten thousand telephones within one year thereafter, official delays and delays caused by liti gation excepted.

Your petitioner therefore requests that a day be set for a public hearing upon the application as required by law.





Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira tion of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal or shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actua demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of

the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale there of and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurte-nances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their founda-tions shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be con-sidered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean

earth. The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regu-lations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the

work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurte-nances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture ot ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser cause the same to be removed. to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against

the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the suc-cessful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto. and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of

said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the ma-terials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, protecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-even the walls shall be made permanently self-even the walls. shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according

to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by he oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak ing the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of

of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

excess of 5 per cent. The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
