STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

Resolution Adopted.

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following requests for variation of law, made by the parties named herein, in which appeal is made from a strict compliance with the orders issued by the said Division of Factory Inspection, the granting of which would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case, and in accordance with the facts submitted recommends as follows:

Premises affected, (1) Albany, New York Central ave.; appellant, N. Y. C. & H. R. R. Co. 6—Fireproof windows on course of fire escape.

7—Self-closing doors on course of fire escape.

1- and 3-story semireproof building; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 25 above the 2d floor; exit, one interior stairway not properly enclosed; fire escape on side of building, imperfect in that openings on course are not fireproof. Openings 3 feet by 6 feet 4 inches; exits remote.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape and waive orders while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

Premises affected, (2) Amsterdam, Livingston st., Mill No. 5; appellant, John K. Stewart & Sons. 1—Prohibit occupancy. 2—Legal exits.

4-story nonfireproof factory building; open lofts; Section 83-a sprinkler; occupancy on 3d floor 15, on 4th floor 1 occasionally; exit, one exterior stairway from 2d floor to ground; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d and 3d floors.

Recommendation: Accept stairway from 3d to 1st floor with interior ladder from 3d to 4th floor; accept exterior stairway properly hand-railed from north side of 4th floor to rear roof at 3d floor, from which present exterior stairway extends to ground, a distance of 10 feet. Accept the present bridges at 2d and 3d floors.

Premises affected, (3) Buffalo, Washington st. near High st.; appellant, German-American Brewing Co. 4—Prohibit occupancy.

6—Additional exit. 5-story nonfireproof building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 2 occasionally above 2d floor; exit, one interior stairway; no egress from roof.

Recommendation: Accept present stairway as 1st means of exit, and as 2d exit openings in wall to connect 1st, 2d and 3d floors of coopers shop, which has stairway to ground; 2d means of exit from 4th and 5th floors of bottling house, stairway to be erected in bottling house from 3d to 5th floors, located at northeast corner.

Premises affected, (4) Buffalo, Washington st. near High st.; appellant, German-American Brewing Co. 4—Prohibit occupancy. 10—Additional exit. 3-story nonfireproof factory building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 2 above 2d floor; no egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit from 2d to 3d floors to bottling house.

Recommendation: Acceptance of horizontal exits on 2d and 3d floors as is if horizontal exit be provided on 1st floor, also leading to bottling house.

Premises affected, (5) Bainbridge; appellant, W. R. Prouty. 13—Sanitary washbasin equipped with proper water service; sanitary flush inside water closet. Hopper water closet installed, equipped with flushing device which works below frost line; does not entirely meet Code requirements; enclosure not roofed over; floor and side walls not waterproof; no artificial light provided; wash basin supplied but no supply of water provided.

Recommendation: Accept present water closet if roofed over and artificial light provided and kept clean at all times; accept wash basin if kept clean; runway maintained thereto and supply of water provided in tank nearby.

Premises affected, (6) Buffalo, 490 Broadway; appellant, Buffalo Forge Co. 4—Arrange doors to stairway enclosure to open out to ground; fireproof building; open lofts; sprinkler installed; no fire alarm system; 52 above 2d floor; exits, exterior screened stairway and one fireproof enclosed stairway; openings to stairway enclosure provided with sliding doors; there is not room to swing these doors outwardly; there are 51 persons on 2d floor.

Recommendation: Accept these doors if kept open at all times when building is open for business on condition that double-swing wooden doors be provided in addition thereto.

Premises affected, (7) Buffalo, 96 Terrace; appellant, Hoefler & Co. 1—Additional exit. 2—Prohibit occupancy. 5-story nonfireproof factory building; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 6 above the 2d floor; exit, one interior stairway; no egress from roof; there is a straight ladder escape; all males employed; escape is not substantial; lease expires Nov. 1st, at which time tenants will remove.

Recommendation: If straight ladder fire escape be made structurally safe and all other orders complied with, accept same while occupancy remains unchanged.

Premises affected, (8) Camden; appellant, Hydraulic Turbine Co. Water closet in machine shop and foundry; also water closet in 1st floor of Machine Shop No. 1. Waterclosets located over raceway of power used to run mill, hence always flushes; buildings 2 stories high; lower story of machine shop basement used for dead storage.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as appellant intends to remove these buildings in the near future and build larger buildings, if water closet be properly enclosed as explained to manager, present water closet to be accepted until new building is erected wherein proper water closets are to be installed.

Premises affected, (9) Cadonia; appellant, Thos. Keery Co. 4—Additional exit. 5—Prohibit occupancy. 3-story nonfireproof tenant factory building with open lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; 1 above 2d floor; exit, 1 interior stairway; building measures 32½ by 50 feet; used to manufacture charcoal; no one regularly above ground floor; 7 on ground floor.

Recommendation: Accept, while present occupancy remains, an exterior iron ladder, accessible from each floor, located at north end of building.

Premises affected, (10) Cattaraugus; appellant, Theodore J. Eberle. 1—Water closet for female employee. 2-story brick building; 1st floor occupied by Cattaraugus Times; one female employee; said employee lives at hotel across the street, about 200 feet from her place of employment; 1 water closet in cellar for males.

Recommendation: Waiver of order while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

Premises affected, (11) Dexter; appellant, Dexter Sulphite Pulp & Paper Co. 17—Prohibit occupancy. 18—Additional exit. 3-story nonfireproof building; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 1 above the 2d floor occasionally; exit, one interior stairway from 1st to 2d floors; no egress from roof; no regular employment above the 2d floor or on the 2d floor, a ladder meets stairway in back of building; there is a straight ladder from 1st to 2d floor at front of building.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders while present conditions and occupancy remain.

Premises affected, (12) Green Island, Paine st.; appellant, American Blower Co. 4—Provide at least four individual suitable and convenient sanitary water closets to replace trough water closets. 4 water closets and 4 urinals have been installed in the toilet rooms, not separated in any way nor arranged for any degree of privacy; room sufficiently large to permit construction of partitions, and such partitions will not interfere with circulation of air or cause an accumulation of refuse or unsanitary material nor create a condition which will permit an undue amount of privacy and cause waste of time.

Recommendation: Accept present water closets on condition that partitions at least 5 feet high standing forward at least 15 inches further than the toilet fixture and space at least 6 inches between partition and floor, installed in accordance with Industrial Code Rule 116.

Premises affected, (13) Green Island, Centre Island; appellant, Excelsior Bag & Mfg. Co. 11—Prohibit occupancy on 3d and 4th floors.

20—Fire alarm system. 4-story nonfireproof building; open lofts; sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy above 1st floor 268; above 2d floor 177; exit, one interior stairway; imperfect rear fire escape with nonfireproof openings to fire escape; building used by H. J. Bartels Mfg. Co. to manufacture mosquito bars for U. S. Government; sprinkler installed, same has but one source of water supply, and the occupancy of these floors exceeds 50 per cent. of the capacity of the exits; a class C fire alarm system is therefore necessary according to Rule 375; 168 of the 177 persons above the 2d floor are women; material used is combustible.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as there is a sprinkler system installed, accept a Class B fire alarm system, additional exit to be complied with within 30 days or 3d and 4th floors discontinued.

Premises affected, (14) Frankfurt, Turner st.; appellant, Savage Arms Co., Utica. Enclose top and sides of exterior iron stairs to conform to variation granted Nov. 21, 1916; Building 7, oil house. 3-story fireproof building; open lofts; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; 3 above the 2d floor; exit, 1 interior stairway from 1st to 2d floors properly enclosed in fireproof partitions; doors open out, but are not self-closing; no egress from roof; perfect exterior stairway from 3d floor to loading platform level with 2d floor; imperfect horizontal exit on all floors; no doors at 1st floor; one sliding door at 2d and 3d floors.

Recommendation: Accept present exits on condition that one self-closing sliding door be provided at 1st floor horizontal exit.

Premises affected, (15) Fulton, 6 W. 1st st.; appellant, United Worsted Mills, Inc. (Order for additional exit). 6-story nonfireproof building; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 143 now above the 2d floor, 280 when running full force; exits, one interior stairway properly enclosed with fireproof partitions; doors, sliding, self-closing; no egress from roof; imperfect rear fire escape; openings to balconies nonfireproof; exits remote; building is 300 feet long by 110 feet wide; not more than 65 employees on any floor; measured from far side of tower there is one point which exceeds 150 feet.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as the distance is but slightly in excess of 150 feet waive No. 15 on condition that fire escape on south side is provided with fireproof openings and screened as per Rule 4. Accept present sliding doors on condition that same be left open at all times when building is open for business, and self-closing double-swing wooden doors provided in addition.

Premises affected, (16) Fulton, 1 W. 1st st.; appellant, United Worsted Mills, Inc. 20—Additional exit. 3-story and basement nonfireproof building; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy above the 2d floor 80; 1 interior stairway not properly enclosed; doors open out, but not self-closing; no egress from roof; there is a balcony at 3d floor and straight-out stairs to one-story roof; balcony of drop stairs off roof is small and below floor level, reached by short straight ladder.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape on south provided balcony be established on one-story roof with counterbalanced stairway to ground; sprinkler heads to be placed on 2d floor in front of windows under balcony and steps provided to reach entrance to roof on 2d floor.

Premises affected, (17) Gloversville, S. Harrison st.; appellant, E. S. Parkhurst & Co. 6—Two means of exit, Section 79-a. 7—Prohibit occupancy. 2-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1914; divided lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 10 on 2d floor; no egress from roof; two imperfect horizontal exits on 2d floor; building measures 200 by 40 feet, is of semireproof construction; horizontal exits lead to storage building of same construction with practically same exits, and consist of open bridges located remote from each other; on north side there is a wooden ramp to platform with steps to ground; on each side there is a porch with steps to ground.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders Nos. 6 and 7 while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

Premises affected, (18) Gloversville, W. Fulton and Rose sts.; appellant, Hall & Johns. 3—Belt shifter and loose pulley on breaking machines. 5—Exit doors to open out. 8—Additional water closet or urinal. One drive belt operates two breaking machines, with an employee at each end; they leave their machines at different times to secure material; as at present arranged, if shifter were provided on loose pulley same would stop all machines and thus necessitate four men stopping work; several large double doors used as exit doors; one water closet and one 30-inch sink made of iron, which sink is used as a urinal and provided with running water.

Recommendation: Install belt shifter in each machine, which can be done by providing both tight and loose pulley on each machine; waiver of order to open doors out, as there is more than

one exit door; install a proper urinal, or a water closet as called for.

Premises affected, (19) Gloversville, Beam House, West Fulton and Rose sts.; appellant, Hall & Johns. 1—Prohibit occupancy. 4—Additional exit. 2- and 4-story building with open lofts; sprinkler installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy above 1st floor 2; above 2d floor occasionally 1; exit, one interior stairway extending from 1st to 2d floors along the dividing wall between the 2-story buildings, and extending from 2d to 3d and 3d to 4th floors along the northerly wall between the 4- and 2-story buildings; no egress from roof of 4-story building.

Recommendation: Accept as 2d means of exit from 4-story part, while occupancy remains unchanged, entrance through window at 3d floor to roof of 2-story building and stairs from roof of 2-story building to ground at westerly end; entrance made at west end of 4-story attic and ladder to two-story roof.

Premises affected, (20) Johnstown, 8 Prindle ave.; appellant, Johnstown Coloring Co. 1—Additional exit. 2—Prohibit occupancy. 3-story nonfireproof factory building; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; 1 above 2d floor; exit, 1 interior stairway, doors to which open out; no egress from roof; 6 men besides the proprietor work here; building measure 50 by 30 with high boiler room in rear; roof of boiler house half way between levels of 2d and 3d floors, and coal shed alongside same is a little above the level of the 2d floor; 3d floor used to dry skins; same is divided in two lengthwise by wooden partitions; 2d floor open.

Recommendation: Accept wooden balcony and straight-out stairs with proper hand rail, stairs at 45-degree pitch, 24 inches wide at window sill level; southwest window on 3d floor to roof of coal shed, with counterbalanced stairs to ground; openings at 2d and 3d floors to be doors opening outwardly, steps to be provided inside to sills; guard rail to be placed at edge of boiler house; inasmuch as there is only one window inside of boiler house toward coal shed, which would be on course of proposed exit, same need not be fireproofed.

Premises affected, (21) Johnstown, 108-110 S. Market st.; appellant, Hallock & Stewart. 2—Prohibit occupancy. 4-story nonfireproof factory building; divided lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; 39 above the 2d floor; exit, one interior stairway; doors open out, not self-closing; safe egress from roof; fire escape on side imperfect in that it extends to 3d floor only; openings to balcony fireproof.

Recommendation: Accept as 2d means of exit from 4th floor an interior straight ladder to be placed on same side of building as fire escape at point on 3d floor near where escape terminates.

Premises affected, (22) Little Falls, 515 E. Mills st.; appellant, Little Falls Mfg. Co. 4—Reconstruct bridges at 2d and 3d floors rear south end, to be at least 44 inches in width, and enclose sides and bottom and top of same with fire-resisting material. 5—Provide unobstructed means of exit from east end of bridge, near south end of building at 3d floor at bridge level and provide stairs to 2d floor 2-story part. 2- and 3-story and basement nonfireproof building; open lofts; 83b sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; no fire alarm system installed; 25 above the 2d floor; exits, one interior stairway, doors to which open out and are self-closing; building measures 130 by 30; two buildings separated by court to passageway; at rear for two-thirds their length the buildings are 3 and 4 stories high; bridges 30 inches wide connect all floors; bridges have iron railing and spaced iron flooring; bridge at top of westerly building, which is the highest, leads to top of lower or easterly building; windows 30 feet from bridge fireproofed; these bridges are irregular, not being located directly above each other; stairs connect the bridges; there is also an outside stairway along the westerly wall of two-story building from easterly end of bridge leading to bridge below, from which there is an outlet in two-story building at east.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

Premises affected, (23) Little Falls, Albany st.; appellant, D. E. Burrell & Co. Provide approved means of exit from 6-story building remote from stairway. 5- and 6-story building; 6-story building is of fireproof construction with divided lofts; sprinkler installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm; no one permanently employed in 6-story building; one interior stairway in 6-story building enclosed with fireproof partitions; said stairway has sliding doors and doors open out; no egress from this roof.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as there is no regular occupancy on 6th floor, accept stairway leading from 6th floor to roof of 6-story building, if proper ladder be installed from said roof to give access to tower stairway in 5-story building which extends to said roof.

Premises affected, (24) Little Falls, S. Ann st., Mill No. 5; appellant, Phoenix Underwear Co. 1—Fireproof receptacle for refuse at both ends of building near stair hall. This firm has one fireproof receptacle on each floor at point most accessible.

Recommendation: Accept one fireproof receptacle as provided.

Premises affected, (25) Little Falls, S. Ann st., Mill No. 5; appellant, Phoenix Underwear Co. 23—Sills of incombustible material under fire doors from Buildings 5 to 4, at both ends of bridges at 2d and 3d floors. 6-story nonfireproof building; divided lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; no regular occupancy above the 2d floor; exits, two interior stairways properly enclosed with fire resisting partitions; doors slide and open out, self-closing; no egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exits on 2d and 3d floors; imperfect rear fire escape; openings to balconies fireproof; bridges necessary only for 2d and 3d floor employees, as stairways and fire escape take care of law's requirements on other floors and very nearly take care of occupancy on this floor.

Recommendation: Accept bridges as now constructed and waive order.

Premises affected, (26) Little Falls, Mill and S. 2d sts., Mills 1 and 2; appellant, Phoenix Underwear Co. 3—Properly guard exposed gears on all spinning frames, 3d and 4th floors. 4—Countersink or cover protruding set screws on shafting of driving machines of all spinning frames. 1—Properly encase roller gears on all spinning frames on 4th floor. Gear and set screws are guarded by railing about 3 feet high, which is covered with metal sheets hung on railing; gears not guarded in any way, but are not very dangerous, due to distance the operator is away from the machine.

Recommendation: Waiver of Nos. 3 and 4 and acceptance of present guards; order to encase roller gears to be complied with.

Premises affected, (27) Jamestown, 516 E. 6th st.; appellant, Sakura Silk Co. 1—Three sanitary wash sinks. 2—Floors of water closet other than wood. 3—Side walls water closet other than wood. Water closets are new installation; clean and sanitary; they do not comply with sanitary code in re floors and walls: one wash sink provided for 70 females; sewing machine tables have a board 6 inches wide only

Premises affected, (28) Niagara Falls, N. Y., 119-121 Fall st.; appellant, Bier Bros. 1—Prohibit occupancy. 2—Two means of exit from all floors. 4-story nonfireproof building; divided lofts; sprinkler being installed on 3d floor; no fire alarm; no combustibles; occupancy above 2d floor 15; one interior stairway; this building is used as a department store, with millinery and alteration department on 3d and 4th floors; ground floor not divided, but all the upper floors are divided by fire wall running lengthwise through the building, since inspection workrooms have been located on 3d floor only; at time of inspection stairway from 2d to 3d floors was taken out, but has been restored; horizontal exit on 3d floor with fire door on one side only; 4th floor used for storage of articles used in the retail business; the restoring of this stairway from 2d to 3d floors makes a continuous stairway from 1st to 4th floors.

Recommendation: Acceptance of stairway and horizontal exit while occupancy remains unchanged.

Premises affected, (29) Otto; appellant, Elliott Spinning Co. 9—Prohibit occupancy. 10—Additional exit. 3-story nonfireproof factory building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; no permanent occupancy above the 2d floor; exit, one interior stairway; this is a frame mill used for spinning wool; 7 males, 6 females employed; there is an iron ladder between 2d and 3d floors on ground floor.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders as long as no one is employed above the 2d floor.

Premises affected, (30) Palmyra, 70 Jackson st.; appellant, Peerless Ptg. Press Co. 7—Self-closing gates 5 feet 6 inches high on sides of elevator used for loading and unloading. 9—Bars at 2d floor in addition to drop doors at elevator shaft. 10—Safety devices on car. Old style of elevator rests level with 1st floor and raises to 2d floor; opening at 2d floor fitted with lift door; owner has provided a rail on two sides not used for loading; on 1st floor there is not sufficient room for gates 5 feet 6 inches high, but a shorter gate and telltale chains could be provided.

Recommendation: Accept a gate 3 feet high, full automatic, and telltale chains to be provided; bars to be provided 3 feet high on sides used for loading and unloading; same to be manually or mechanically operated; waive No. 10 if notice be posted forbidding anyone to ride on car.

Premises affected, (31) Peekskill, 100-108 S. Division st.; appellant, Frank R. Riley. 1—Additional exit. 4-story nonfireproof tenant factory building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; 8 to 11 above the 2d floor; one interior stairway, not properly enclosed; doors open in; no egress from roof; imperfect fire escape with nonfireproof openings.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape when window openings on course on 1st, 2d and 3d floors have been made full fireproof; exemption from fireproofing 4th floor windows.

Premises affected, (32) Peekskill, 36 N. Division st.; appellant, James F. Martin, Inc. 2—Prohibit occupancy. 3—Additional exit. 3-story nonfireproof building; open lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; 1 occasionally above the 2d floor; 1 interior stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; safe egress from roof; 3d floor used for drying tobacco; one man visits this floor occasionally to turn tobacco; ladder provided from doorway on 3d floor to roof of one-story extension; two stairways from 2d floor.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders while occupancy and conditions remain as is.

Premises affected, (33) Rochester, 68 Manhattan st.; appellant, E. M. Phillips. Enclose stairway. 3—Additional exit. 4—Swing door out. 5—Stairway not less than 44 inches wide. 6—Prohibit occupancy. 2-story nonfireproof tenant factory building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; 2d floor occupancy 2; exit, one interior stairway, doors to which open in, not self-closing; stairway enclosed with wooden partitions; no egress from roof; 1st floor used as private garage, 2d floor by Phillips Carbon & Ribbon Co., employing one person.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders while occupancy and conditions remain unchanged.

Premises affected, (34) Salem, Main st.; appellant, Manhattan Shirt Co. 5—Approved fire alarm signal system. 3-story nonfireproof building; open lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles; fire alarm; 35 above 2d floor; exits, one interior stairway from 1st to 3d floor and one from 1st to 2d floor; doors open out, not self-closing; no egress from roof; imperfect exterior screened stairs; imperfect exterior smokeproof tower; perfect rear fire escape; fire alarm system installed conforms to Code, except as two sources of energy; has but one source, City lighting current through transformer.

Recommendation: Acceptance of present system.

Premises affected, (35) Utica, 407-411 Blandina st.; appellant, Nugent Knitting Mills, Inc. Prohibit occupancy; organize and maintain fire drills; additional exit; provide approved fire alarm signal system. 3-story nonfireproof tenant factory building; lofts divided; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm system; no regular occupancy above the 2d floor, 54 on the 2d floor; exits, two interior stairways, one of which extends to the third floor and one to the 2d floor only; no egress from roof; one exterior wooden stairs; since date of inspection the employees in the cutting room have been removed to the 2d floor, and door leading to 3d floor has been locked.
