## Commissioner's Column



First, I would like to wish a very Happy New Year to everyone in the Sanitation family. I know that 2015 is going to be an exciting time at the Department. As with all New Years, DSNY was the first out of the gate, cleaning up the 48 tons of confetti and party leftovers from the one million spectators at Times Square. I invite you to view [pictures](#) and [video](#) of your colleagues getting the job done on that cold night.

Sanitation has already made a number of exciting new changes in the first few days of 2015. On January 1st, it became illegal for residents to set out electronics at the curb. This includes television sets, computers, tablets, printers, video games, VCRs, keyboards, and fax machines. New Yorkers can recycle their electronic waste at more than 95 retailer drop-off sites, through community organizations, at DSNY SAFE Disposal events and the e-cycleNYC program to help keep toxic materials such as lead, cadmium and mercury from polluting our

land and water. More than 27,000 tons of electronics will now be sustainably recycled in NYC.

We will shortly be releasing the second report on how curbside collection of organics has gone over the last six months, and here is a sneak peak at the results. This year, we expanded the program to more than 100,000 residents, and to date approximately one-third of eligible households have participated in this voluntary program. Surprisingly, the additional service has increased the tonnage of metal, glass plastic, and paper collections in these sections. For example, Brooklyn District 6 Section 4 now has a diversion rate of 36.6 percent compared to the citywide rate of 15.4 percent, and in Manhattan District 9 the participation of just one large complex increased the district's diversion rate by a percentage point.

I again end with a reminder of the importance of safety. Last week, a Sanitation Worker experienced a serious injury that resulted in the worker losing his hand. Please remember that this is a dangerous job, and I ask that you make it your New Year's resolution to think safety first every day.

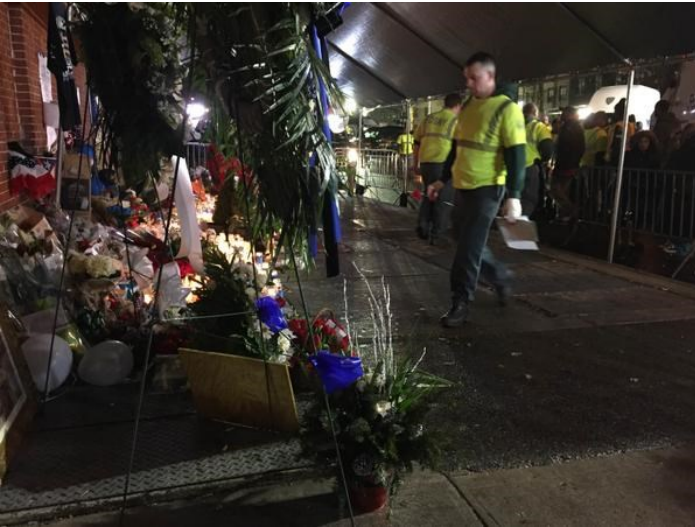
Assistant Commissioner Jean-Louis joins the

## E-Waste Out of the Trash

Starting January 1, a state law made it illegal for New Yorkers to discard most electronics in the trash. Sanitation Workers can no longer collect electronics left at curbside. Electronics covered by this state law include computers and their peripherals, televisions, fax machines, VCRs, DVD players, printers/scanners, video game consoles, MP3 players, tablets, and small servers. The law does not include appliances, batteries, or light bulbs.

Sanitation Workers who encounter e-waste on their routes should make note of the location on their DS 350 and inform their Supervisor.
