The Pound is located in West Thirty seventh street, between the Tenth and the Eleventh avenues, and will be open between the hours of 8 A. M., and 5 P. M., every day except Sundays.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the killing of Dogs in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows :

Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose, or at large, in any of the streets, lanes, alleys, where not enclosed, highways, parks, piers or public places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, unless the head of every such dog shall be encased in a wire muzzle sufficiently large to cover the head entirely, but so constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to permit the nose of the dog to protrude; the muzzle to be securely fastened around the throat and behind the ears of every such dog, under a penalty of three dollars for each offence, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large.

Sec. 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance; and for that purpose is further authorized and empowered to appoint persons, or direct any person now attached to his office, to capture all such dogs found running abroad, loose or at large, paying for every such dog so captured and delivered at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents, and a like sum shall be paid at the place so designated to any person, whether appointed by the Mayor or not, for the capture and delivery of any and every such dog. Such dogs, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner thereof, or any other person, within a period of 48 hours thereafter, shall, within six hours after the expiration of the time, be killed and destroyed in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

Sec. 3. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render, under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of the city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

Sec. 4. All money paid for fines for violation of section 1 of this ordinance, and for redemption of dogs as provided in section 2, shall be retained by the Mayor and applied to the payment of the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, but a statement showing the aggregate amount thus received shall be submitted quarterly to the Comptroller of the City of New York.

Sec. 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city, and any person who shall present any such dog and claim payment for the capture thereof which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of this city shall

thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars. This ordinance shall apply only to any such dogs of the age of six months and upwards.

Sec. 6. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ried and constantly expanding charities devolving upon them; a public demand for retrenchment in civil expenditures has, in all departments of our city government, imposed obligations of extreme economy upon all persons entrusted with the disbursement of public funds. But were this even a positive enactment, it could not be technically applied by rule of anticipation to public charities, since disbursements here are always to be made upon an equitable construction of the necessities of beneficiaries, whose sliding scale of demands constantly vary with numbers, diseases and degrees of destitution. Hence it is eminently within the discretion of the Commissioners to apportion the funds given them according to the exigencies of their trust, for their first duty is not to the fund but to the beneficiary, and I am very sure that the same public which provides the fund would enlarge it if the Commissioners would call its attention to the fact that, with their present appropriation, they cannot meet the demand made upon them for the changes in dietary that are required by the insane now under their care. No class of persons have a higher claim upon our commissary. Prisoners against their will and for no crime; and that, too, without the resources or the solace of an unclouded mind to soften the long hours of isolation and weary waiting for the day of deliverance, the insane deserve, as they also need, every physical and moral comfort which is suited to their condition. The citizens of New York in their demand for economy in public expenditures, cannot intend that this principle should obstruct the freedom of action or the humane discretion of those Commissioners to whose wisdom and integrity they have committed the solemn trust of disbursing out public charities, and if your Board are not possessed of the powers or the means necessary to carry out the measures of reform above suggested by me, I need only remind them that the source whence both are derived, and which expresses its will through public opinion, is never worked in vain whenever the appeal is made in behalf of the poor, the sick or the friendless.

In the event of the abolition of the school ship at the end of June, the sum of \$5,500 (which will be required for teachers and instructors of the boys on shore) will have to be substituted for the amount called for in the above estimate. The total appropriation will then amount to \$980,913.66, instead of \$985,393.66, as above.

So far as the 23d and 24th wards are concerned, there was an appropriation of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) made for the need of said wards after the general estimate was made for 1874.

We would recommend, in view of the establishment of a Reception Hospital for that District, pay to visiting physicians, visitors to the poor, ambulance, furniture, rent of building, stable, &c., &c., that the amount be allowed to remain as it is.

This is a large piece of territory, and extending as it does from the East to the North Rivers, and north to Fordham, it may require more than we can now foresee to provide for the wants of the poor.

We have expended some two thousand dollars thus far in coal, visitors to the poor, donations in money, physicians, and support of prisoners, without any provision for Reception Hospital or ambulance furniture. In fact, no provision has been made for the future wants, rather waiting to have them develop themselves from time to time, and then care for them in the most economical way. During the present year proper arrangements can be made so that in future the estimates can be made more definite, or can be included in the general estimate.

From the above statement it will be seen that a deduction of one hundred and eighteen thousand and six hundred and seventy-one dollars and twenty-four cents (\$118,671 24) can be made from the original estimate.

We have endeavored to meet the order of your circular letter, and hope that in presenting the accompanying statement we have succeeded in so doing; any and all questions will be answered most cheerfully either verbally or by letter.
