Sanitary Committee to investigate the causes and nature of diphtheria by means of micro-pathological examinations and otherwise.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to take proper measures for the sale of surplus lymph.

That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of November, 1874, when approved by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, shall be duly certified by the President and Secretary and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 21, 1874.

The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 194, as follows, viz.: One public building, 934 tenement houses, 158 private dwellings, 155 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 56 stables, 62 slaughter houses, 5 manure dumps, 9 fat rendering establishments, 3 gut cleaning establishments, 3 dumping grounds, 10 public sewers and drains, 43 sunken and vacant lots, 49 yards, courts and areas, 48 cellars and basements, 57 waste pipes and drains, 155 privies and water closets, 35 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns and

cesspools, 1 dangerous and smoky chimney, 19 other nuisances, together with 70 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 606.

During the past week 45 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for examination and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 99 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 89 houses and 89 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

During the fortnight ending November 21, the Ambulance Corps have removed 63 cases of small-pox to the hospital and 3 dead bodies to the Morgue.

Forty-one permits have been issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this port.

Eighty-one permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The following is a comparative statement of cases of contagious diseases reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending November 21, 1874:—

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending November 21, 1874: Typhoid fever, 14; scarlet fever, 47; measles, 7; diphtheria, 152; small-pox, 60; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 5.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food: Cattle, 2 carcasses; calves (bob), 11 carcasses; calves (case), 4 carcasses; sheep, 1 carcass; hogs, 9 carcasses; beef, 35 pounds; veal, 25 pounds; poultry, 503 pounds; and fish, 500 pounds.

216 loads of night-soil were removed by the Scavengers from the privy-vaults of the City during the week ending November 21, 1874.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending November 21, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 521 burial permits for city deaths, 16 for bodies in transitu, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 521 deaths, 167 marriages, 457 births, 44 still-births, 16 applications for transit permits, and 55 returns from Coroners. There were 18 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths; and 4 transcripts of birth record, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau; 3 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—There were 521 deaths reported during the week that ended on Saturday, the 21st inst. The number which occurred during the previous week was 561. The decrease in mortality last week was chiefly noticed in consumption, and in the total of zymotic diseases. The occurrence of only 100 deaths from constitutional diseases last week and only 105 the previous week—18.95 per cent. of the total mortality in the two weeks—is evidence of unusual natural healthfulness of the season, for the average rate of mortality from these enfeebling diseases in the corresponding two weeks in the last five years was 24.68 per cent. of the entire number of deaths. The average number of deaths by constitutional diseases in the second week of November the past five years was 121, but this year there were 105 in that week and last week only 100. Zymotic diseases are less prevalent than in the past five years, excepting only an excess of diphtheria and small-pox, the latter of which was charged with 40 deaths in the past two weeks and the former with 125 deaths.

The death rate the second week in November was equal to 28 in the 1,000 living inhabitants yearly, and last week it was equal to 26 per 1,000. The death rate in twenty-one large cities of Great Britain during the last week in October was 25 per 1,000; in London it was 21; in Edinburgh, 20; in Glasgow, 35; in Dublin, 23; in Liverpool, 36 per 1,000 yearly rate. Paris the same week reported only 18 per 1,000; Vienna, the previous week, only 17; and Munich, 33 per 1,000.

Diphtheria is prevailing in this city and a great number of populous towns for 200 miles westward as it prevailed in Munich and numerous cities in Germany in 1864 and 1868. The 125 deaths in New York by this malady the past two weeks gave 11.55 per cent. of the total mortality. Brooklyn reported 34 deaths from this cause during the first two weeks of November, being 9 per cent. of the total mortality. Jersey City and Hudson county, New Jersey, reported 48 deaths by diphtheria in the month of October, or 14 per cent. of the total mortality, and the city of Patterson reported 23 fatal cases of this disease in October, being over 25 per cent. of all the deaths last month. The accompanying memorandum concerning this malady, and certain local and preventable causes which favor its propagation, is respectfully submitted with the chart.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to call your attention to a very important matter, for which, I fear, both your own Board and the Board of Health may be held to some degree responsible.

On the 24th of September, Eliza Collins, aged 22, travelling through the city, was taken sick with what was supposed to be small-pox. She was seen by two of our officers, and sent to the small-pox hospital, her trunks being left in our care.

On the 1st or 2d of October she presented herself to the Sanitary Superintendent, Dr. W. De Forest Day with the following statement: "Soon after her reception at the small-pox hospital on Blackwell's Island, the disease was pronounced to be the hives, and she was transferred to the neighboring pavilion hospital, all fear of small-pox having ceased. Here she was but twice visited by a physician, and she was the sole occupant of this ward, except when a work-house woman, employed as scrubber in the small-pox hospital, had a bed there. Her clothes were removed to another place by the steward."

"On the morning of her discharge at 6.30 A. M. the Steward, Major, came into the ward, sent the scrub woman away, and after a struggle, in which she fainted, succeeded in violating her person."

In my conversation this afternoon with one of the members of your Board, I learned that the Steward has been before you, and does not deny the material points of the charge. Her appearance after her discharge, when seen by the Sanitary Superintendent and the Chief Clerk of the Health Department, clearly satisfied them that she was not in a physical condition to successfully resist an able-bodied man, and in so far corroborates her story of the outrage. She has since stated that nothing would induce her to marry the man, and that she does not want money, but that she is indignant, and desires that the man be punished for the protection of others. The case was reported to George Kellock, your Superintendent of out-door poor, by the Sanitary Superintendent in person, and the woman was sent to your office the next morning in company with a representative of the Sanitary Bureau. I am informed that Miss Collins has made an affidavit to the facts, which affidavit is in your possession. I am also informed that the Steward has not been discharged, although a week has elapsed, and that no steps have been taken to secure his punishment.

I would say that this matter is now in your hands; that as the alleged act of violence was committed in your jurisdiction and by one of your employees, it would seem that the punishment of the offender should proceed from some such action as your Board should be advised to take in the premises; and that the matter cannot be abandoned in the expectation that some other department or that private persons may assume the responsibility of vindicating the character and the discipline of the public departments charged with the care of such persons.

I cannot believe that the discharge of the Steward, without further measures, would satisfy the demands of justice, or relieve public officers from the responsibilities of their position; it certainly would not if the crime were theft or arson.

I will further say that the Board of Health is so far interested, that since this woman was sent to you by its officers, it will have some duty to perform, in the event that your Board permits the case to rest; and it may become a question whether I shall not feel obliged to bring the subject to the attention of the District Attorney, in case he is not otherwise officially informed of it.

In consequence of our conversation to day, in which there was some apparent divergence of views, I have thought it best to make this communication, as a matter of record, and I beg to invite your further consideration of this subject in the hope that you will inform the Health Department of the measures that you propose to take.

By Commissioner Bowen—
Resolved, That proposals be invited, by public advertisement, for the building of three pavilions on Blackwell's Island, in accordance with the plans and specifications at this office. Adopted November 19, 1874.

Hon. JAMES BOWEN, President:

SIR—I respectfully beg leave to submit a statement of row-boats, size and condition, used at Blackwell's Island.

Work-house has three boats: two 30 feet long, in good order; one 25 feet long, worthless. One of said boats is manned by six men and a captain.

Lunatic Asylum has one boat, 13 feet long, in good order; kept as an emergency boat.

Alms-house has one boat 32 feet long, in good order, manned by five men and a captain.

Penitentiary has five boats: three about 30 feet long, in good order; two 37 feet long, worthless. One of these boats is manned by six men and a captain.

Charity Hospital has one boat, 26 feet long, in good order. Kept as an emergency boat.

Store-house has two boats, one 30 feet long, in good order; one 24 feet long, not in very good order.

As the steam launch takes the place of these thirteen boats, I submit their disposition to your Honorable Board.

Resolved, That the boats, and furniture to the same, now in use by the several Wards on Blackwell's Island be turned over to the Store-keeper, and by him stored in safety. There shall be a suitable boat placed under the charge of

Chief of Staff of Charity Hospital, for the reasonable use of himself and the Warden of the Penitentiary. Another boat under charge of

Storekeeper for the reasonable use of himself, Warden of Alms-house, Work-house, and Lunatic Asylum. Members of families resident on the Island, and friends of Warden to cross in steam launch; all others by special pass from the Commissioners. Adopted November 20, 1874. Ayes—Commissioners Bowen, Laimbeer, and Stern.

By Commissioner Bowen—
Resolved, That there be a Bureau of Repairs established under charge of General Store-keeper, for making and repairing such articles as may be made and repaired by the mechanical labor on Blackwell's Island, under the following rules and regulations.

1st. The work-shops at the Alms-house and Penitentiary shall be turned over to the Bureau for Repairs, and such mechanics and laborers other than from Penitentiary, as may be necessary, shall from time to time be assigned for duty to the Alms-house Work-shops, and to the Work-shops at the Penitentiary such convict labor as may be required.

2d. The Warden of the Alms-house shall until the further action of the Board be Superintendent of the labor at the Alms-house shop, and the Master Blacksmith at the Penitentiary be Superintendent of the Penitentiary shops, all requisitions for mechanics shall be made by the General Store-keeper, and all orders for work shall be transmitted to him.

All Work-shops on Blackwell's Island other than the above, to be broken up, when the Store-keeper shall report that the Bureau is prepared for work. Adopted November 20th 1874. Ayes—Commissioners Bowen, and Laimbeer.
