### PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, June 28, 1877.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the following ordinance, adopted on the 30th day of April, 1877, as amended on the first day of June, 1877, I, Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice that the said ordinance will be enforced on and after Monday, the second day of July, 1877.

And I do hereby give notice that I have caused to be provided and do hereby indicate the dog pound at the foot of Sixteenth street, East river, as the place where all dogs seized and captured, pursuant to said ordinance, are to be delivered, and that said pound is to be kept open from eight o'clock A. M. until five o'clock P. M. of every day, except Sundays.

And I do hereby designate and appoint the following persons to seize and capture all dogs found loose or at large, and authorized to be seized and captured by said ordinance, and to deliver the same at the aforesaid dog pound, said appointments to take effect from and after the second day of July, 1877, viz.:

The persons so appointed shall have a shield, with the number of their respective districts thereon, which shield they shall be obliged to wear in a public manner, at all times, when in the performance of their duty.

And I hereby designate and appoint John McMahon as the Keeper of the Dog Pound, to take effect from the second day of July, 1877; and I direct that all dogs delivered at the said pound, not claimed within forty-eight hours, and redeemed by the owner, by paying the sum of three dollars therefor, or otherwise disposed of, shall be killed and destroyed by drowning, by and under the direction of the said John McMahon and such workmen, in the said dog pound, as may, from time to time, be appointed to assist him.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the Danger of Hydrophobia to any of the Inhabitants of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose or at large in any of the public streets, lanes, alleys, highways, parks or places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, under a penalty of three dollars for each offense, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who knowingly harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large; and the Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the Corporation Attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits, as aforesaid, for the recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance; such penalties and all license fees, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the Comptroller of said city, and upon the requisition of the Mayor, to be applied towards the payment of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent any dog from going into any such street, lane, alley, highway, park or public place, provided such dog shall be held, by such owner or other person, securely by a cord or chain, to be not more than four feet long, fastened to a collar around the neck of the animal.

Sec. 2. Every owner, possessor, or person who harbors any dog shall take out a permit for each dog, at the Permit Bureau, paying the sum of two dollars (\$2) for the same. All permits, and renewals of the same, shall be dated from the first day of May in each and every year, and shall be for one year from date, and all renewals shall be one dollar (\$1). Said permit shall have the name of the owner and the number of the permit or license on it. Any dog so licensed must have a collar around his neck, with a metal tag attached, having the number of the license on it. And any dog so licensed must, when in the street, be held by such owner, or other person, secured by a cord, rope, or chain, not more than four feet in length; but the owner, at his option, may use, instead of the above, a muzzle, constructed so as to prevent the dog from biting. Any dog that is not so secured, although he is licensed, shall be captured the same as if no license was granted. No dog having a collar and

tag, with the number of his license on it around his neck, that may be in a wagon or other vehicle belonging to his owner, shall be captured. Any person appointed by his Honor the Mayor to capture dogs who shall permit any person to take one or more dogs from him for nothing, or for pay, shall be arrested, and taken before a police justice, and upon the facts being proven, the judge shall impose a fine of not less than \$10, or more than \$50, for each offense. Any person may make a complaint of persons having dogs unlicensed at the police stations, and the officer in command shall entertain the same; and all policemen on patrol duty must report all violations of this ordinance the same as any other violation of a Corporation ordinance. All such reports shall be transmitted to the Corporation Attorney, the same as for other violations of city ordinances, and in addition to the \$3 fine, shall be added all costs of suits for the recovery of the same as for any other violation of the city ordinances. The provisions of this section, except those relating to leading and muzzling dogs, shall not apply to dogs owned by non-residents, in remaining temporarily or in passing through this city, or to dogs brought into this city and entered for exhibition at any dog show or annual exhibition of dogs.

Sec. 3. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance. All dogs found loose or at large, as aforesaid, shall be seized, captured and delivered by such persons as the Mayor shall designate, at a place to be provided and indicated by him, where such animals, if not within forty-eight hours thereafter claimed and redeemed by the owner or some other person, shall be killed and destroyed in such manner and by such persons as the Mayor shall designate.

Sec. 4. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city; and any person who shall knowingly present any such dog, and claim payment for the capture thereof, which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of this city, shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars.

Sec. 5. No person shall hinder or molest any person or persons so appointed by the Mayor while engaged in seizing or capturing and delivering any such dog as aforesaid, or any other person engaged in the performance of any duty enjoined by the provisions of this ordinance, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars for every offense, to be sued for and recovered in the manner now provided by law or ordinance for the recovery of penalties for violations of the ordinances of the Common Council, on the complaint of the person so hindered or molested; the penalty, when recovered, to be accounted for, paid, and appropriated, as provided in section one of this ordinance. The Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and required to cause the persons so engaged in the performance of any of the duties prescribed by this ordinance, to be protected from hindrance or molestation.

Sec. 6. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, June 26, 1877.

The Board of Health met this day.

290 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to communicate to the President of the Department of Docks that this Board cannot permit the use of garbage, ashes, and street dirt in filling during the warm weather, unless the material is properly disinfected.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 23, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,860, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 875 tenement-houses, 169 private dwellings, 70 other dwellings, 12 manufactories and workshops, 27 stores and warehouses, 62 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 1 pork-packing establishment, 2 public sewers, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 3 milk inspections, 1 roadway, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 72 yards, courts, and areas, 62 cellars and basements, 134 waste-pipes and drains, 227 privies and water-closets, 49 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 5 cisterns and cesspools, 3 chimneys, 1 roadway, 10 other nuisances, together with 2 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 772.

During the past week 178 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

82 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

178 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 49 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 47 houses, 47 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,390 privy-sinks, 495 yards, courts, and areas, 270 cellars and basements, 120 garbage-boxes, and 136½ miles of street gutters.

1 person sick with small-pox was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending Saturday, June 23, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 422 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transit, and 40 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 422 deaths, 145 marriages, 445 births, 40 still-births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 42 returns from coroners. There were 19 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and — transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, June 26, 1877.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, June 23, 1877, 422 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city, which is an increase of 8 as compared with the number reported for the preceding week, and 21 less than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876, 100 less than 1875, 23 more than 1874, 52 less than 1873, 218 less than 1872. The actual mortality for the week ending June 16, was 411, which is 83.2 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 19.85 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,076,618. This compares favorably with the latest returns received from Europe and Asia, being below the rate given for 34 of their principal cities.

The increase during the past week was from the following causes, viz.: Small-pox, 1; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 3; membranous croup, 1; whooping-cough, 4; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 33; cancer, 6; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 29; premature and preterm births, 5; and the decrease was, from measles, 3; erysipelas, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; inanition, etc., 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 24; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 6; disease of the heart, 4; aneurism, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, peritonitis, and gastritis, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2. —of which 55 were under 5 years, which is an increase of 34 deaths from these diseases, in children under this age, compared with the number reported the preceding week. The table of mortality presented last week showed that July was the most fatal month in the year to infants, 22,217 persons having died during the past 6 years, in this month, of whom 8,433 were from diarrhoeal diseases of children under 5 years.

The above statement will show the gradual weekly increase in the number of deaths reported from these diseases, which could be kept below the average mortality of previous years by the observance of the practical suggestions contained in the tract on "Diarrhoeal Diseases of Infancy," issued to the public gratuitously by the Board of Health.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 81 were in institutions, 208 in tenement-houses, 121 in houses containing 3 families and less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, boats, streets, etc., 3 were on the basement floor, 101 on the first, 109 on the second, 81 on the third, 27 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, and 1 was not stated; 419 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents; 68 were stated as single, 83 married, and 38 widowed, and the condition of 233 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age; 129 deaths were of children under 1 year, 161 under 2 years, 195 under 5 years, and 23 were of persons 70 years and over.

The disposition of 414 deaths and still-births, or 89.61 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 6, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 168, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 62, Greenwood (undenominational) 37, Lutheran (undenominational) 63, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 13, Evergreen (undenominational) 26, Woodlawn (undenominational) 15, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 6, Union (Methodist Protestant) 4, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 5, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) —, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 2, Washington (undenominational) 7.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 23, was 70.1 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 67, saturation being 100, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.875 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,092, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.52 inches, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending June 16, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 5; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 9; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 6; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 15; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 22; Twelfth, 37; Thirteenth, 16; Fourteenth, 8; Fifteenth, 6; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 32; Eighteenth, 18; Nineteenth, 53; Twentieth, 35; Twenty-first, 27; Twenty-second, 31; Twenty-third, 11, and Twenty-fourth, 3.

SIR—There were 422 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 23, 1877, which is an increase of 8, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 21 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending June 16, 1877, was 411, which is 83.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 19.85 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,076,618.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 187. That every person who omits or refuses to comply with, or who resists any of the provisions of the Sanitary Code, or any of the rules, orders, sanitary regulations, or ordinances established or declared by this Board, under or pursuant to any of the provisions of the seventy-fourth chapter of the Laws of 1866; or of chapter six hundred and eighty-six of the Laws of 1866; or of chapter nine hundred and fifty-six of the Laws of 1867; or of chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the Laws of 1873; or of chapter seven hundred and fifty-seven of the Laws of 1873; or of chapter six hundred and thirty-six of the Laws of 1874; or refuses or neglects to comply with any of the provisions of the said laws, in so far as the same are now in force, and applicable to the City of New York; or omits or refuses, or neglects the execution of any order or special regulation of this Department, will be liable to the arrest, suit, penalty, fine, and punishment in said laws provided and declared; of all of which, notice must be taken.

Bidders are also required to state the price for which they will furnish the illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting lamp-posts and lamps, replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, crossheads, lamp-irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from July 16, 1877, to December 31, 1877, both days inclusive; stating the price for the above named period of five and one-half months, for each lamp.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will fit up and repair lamp-posts.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The number of lamps to be contracted for is from 50 to 75.

The lamps are to burn on an average of 1,855 hours and fifty minutes each, per term.

The burners are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be other than coal-gas, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometrical test), equal to the light given by the gas-burners now in use in the public lamps in the City of New York. Should any alteration of, or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which proposals are made, such alterations shall be done, and attachments placed on the lamps without expense to the City.

The amount of security required is \$2,500.00.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract is so awarded neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, or if he accept but does not execute the contract and give the proper security, it may be re-advertised and relet as above provided.
