Day, the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said buildings be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board,

Whereas, the Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot Nos. 147 and 149 Cedar street, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation, because of defects in the plumbing, ventilation and the construction of the same and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among the occupants thereof,

Ordered, that all persons in said building, situated on lot Nos. 147 and 149, Cedar street, be required to vacate said building on or before July 30, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing, ventilation and the construction of the same, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among the occupants thereof, and further that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of Dr. Walter De F. The 1,037 deaths represent a death-rate of 35.30, as against one of 30.82 for the previous week, and one of 38.62 for the corresponding week of 1887.

The increase of 132 deaths over the previous week was mainly due to an increase of 8 in diphtheria, 86 in diarrhoeal diseases, 15 in pneumonia, 12 in gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, and 5 in Bright's disease. There was a decrease of 8 deaths from scarlatina, of 6 from cancer, and of 10 from heart diseases.

The increase of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases was most marked in the Tenth, Twelfth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,
NEW YORK, January 31, 1888.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same to any person, or shall occupy the same as a dwelling, or allow the same to be occupied as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person, let, hire out, or occupy the same as a dwelling, or allow the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstones of any adjacent street or road, or which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.
