

The 1,037 deaths represent a death-rate of 35.30, as against one of 38.62 for the previous week, and one of 38.62 for the corresponding week of 1887.

The increase of 132 deaths over the previous week was mainly due to an increase of 8 in diphtheria, 86 in diarrheeal diseases, 15 in pneumonia, 12 in gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, and 5 in Bright's disease. There was a decrease of 8 deaths from scarlatina, of 6 from cancer, and of 10 from heart diseases.

The increase of deaths from diarrheeal diseases was most marked in the Tenth, Twelfth, Seventeenth and N ineteenth Wards.

That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, asa place in which or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any succeed the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health.
