

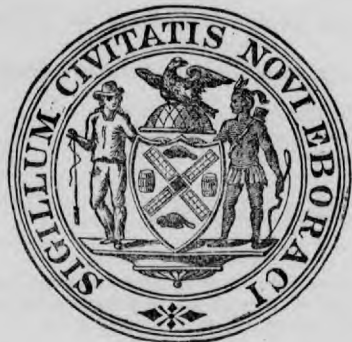
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DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1889.

STR—In compliance with the provisions of section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending September 30, 1889 :

During the period covered by this report the Board governing the Department has been changed by the retirement of Commissioner Stevenson Towle, and the appointment of Albert Gallup, as a Park Commissioner, in his stead. The organization of the Board of Parks is the same as at the close of the previous quarter. In pursuance of the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, an act authorizing the Department of Public Parks to alter the lines, class and grades of certain streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, maps showing the following changes have been prepared and adopted after being advertised, and hearings given as required by the act cited :

Showing change of lines of Undercliff avenue, between the W. R. Montgomery estate and the bridge across the Harlem river, at One Hundred and Eighty-first street and at the junction with Sedgwick avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Showing change of classification, from first to third class, of Kappock street, from Putnam avenue to the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway, and Independence avenue, from Morrison street to the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway, Twenty-fourth Ward.

Showing revision of that portion of the "Kingsbridge District" lying between Van Cortlandt Park, Van Cortlandt and Jerome avenues, Twenty-fourth Ward.

Showing change of grades in that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward, bounded on the north by Kingsbridge road, on the east by Jerome avenue, on the south by Tremont avenue, and on the west by Aqueduct avenue.

Showing the discontinuance and closing of Railroad avenue, West, from Sheridan avenue to Morris avenue ; Sherman avenue, from Railroad avenue, West, to One Hundred and Sixty-first street ; Grant avenue, from Railroad avenue, West, to One Hundred and Sixty-first street ; East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, west of Railroad avenue, East ; East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Railroad avenue, East, to Sheridan avenue ; East One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, from Morris avenue to Sherman avenue, Twenty-third Ward.

Showing change of street system in that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward, lying between Jerome avenue and the Bronx Park, and Bronx river, from the Southern Boulevard to Woodlawn Cemetery.

Showing change of classification of Railroad avenue, West, from Morris avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, Twenty-third Ward.

Under authority of chapter 577 of the Laws of 1887, the map heretofore filed of Hampden street, from Sedgwick avenue to Aqueduct avenue, Twenty-fourth Ward, has been taken from file, amended by designating thereon grades, angles, distances, etc., and refiled in the manner prescribed by law.

A map showing plan of drainage for Sewerage District No. 31F, and for portions of Sewerage Districts Nos. 31A, 33A, and 33B, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, has been adopted, and copies thereof have been filed in compliance with the provisions of section 4 of chapter 381 of the Laws of 1865, and of section 14 of chapter 329 of the Laws of 1874.

Assessment lists for the following-named works, together with the amounts and costs thereof, have been approved and forwarded to the Board of Assessors :

Regulating and paving, the Southern Boulevard, from the easterly crosswalk of Third avenue to the easterly crosswalk of Willis avenue.

Regulating and paving Morris avenue, or the public place at the intersection of Third and Morris avenues, from the northerly crosswalk of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to the northerly crosswalk of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street.

Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Rider avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets, with a branch in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Rider and Morris avenues.

Regulating, grading, etc., Boston road, between the easterly curb-line of Third avenue and the northerly curb-line of Jefferson street.

For regulating, grading, etc., Webster avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street. Louis E. Spencer, contractor ; Joseph A. Flynn and John O'Brien, sureties.

For regulating and paving with trap-blocks, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from the easterly crosswalk of Willis avenue to Brown place. Francis McCullagh, contractor ; Thomas Gearty and P. H. McCullagh, sureties.

For furnishing, delivering, etc., furniture for Art Schools in the Metropolitan Museum of Art. James A. Seward, contractor ; Charles Froatz and Jacob Dieter, sureties.

For steam heating and ventilation work in the basement of the old building of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Rutler & Blake, contractors ; Frank Thompson and Timothy Kiely, sureties.

For plumbing work in the basement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. John Regan, contractor ; M. J. Dady and Hugh Getty, sureties.

For constructing a sewer in East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Railroad avenue, East, and Courtland avenue, and in Morris avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-

ninth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets. John A. Devlin, contractor ; John B. Devlin and F. V. Morrison, sureties.

For constructing a sewer, etc., in Third avenue, between the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards line and One Hundred and Seventy-first street. James W. O'Grady, contractor ; Otto H. Georgi and Paul G. Decker, sureties.

For furnishing, etc., an incandescent electric-light plant in the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The Edison Electric-light Company, contractor ; Samuel Insull and Abram B. de Frece, sureties.

An agreement has been duly made and executed with the New York and Harlem Railroad Company for the depression of the tracks and changing the grades of that portion of the Port Morris branch of said railroad, extending from East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to the junction with the main line at One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

Permission has been granted the National Transit Company to open the sidewalk and roadbed along the northerly side of Transverse Road No. 1, for the purpose of laying a new pipe for oil in place of old ones in use.

Permission has also been granted the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to divert a branch of the waters of Mill Brook coming from the Jerome Park region, in the vicinity of Bedford Park station, to the Bronx river, in order to facilitate the work of depressing the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad.

The consent of the Department has been given to the erection of projections on the building being erected at the northwest corner of Union Square and Fourteenth street, and known as the "Lincoln Building," the said projections not to extend more than one foot beyond the house-line, as shown on a plan submitted.

Consent has also been given to the erection by John H. Talles of projections on the buildings on the west side of Central Park, West, fifty feet south from One Hundred and Seventh street, the same not to project more than fifteen inches beyond the house-line, in accordance with a plan submitted.

A license has been granted to William A. Hall to moor a bath at the Battery for the term of three years, the licensee to pay to the City the sum of \$1,200 per annum for the privilege.

The sum of \$822.87, expended by the licensee of the Casino Refreshment House, in the Central Park, in making repairs, erecting sheds, storm doors, etc., under the direction of the Department, has been allowed him on account of his license fee.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transfer the sum of three thousand dollars from the appropriation made for "Police Salaries" for the year 1889 (for which it was not required) to the appropriation for "Police Uniforms and Supplies" for the same year, which was insufficient.

Plans and estimates for the completion of the bays and stairways on the westerly side of Morningside Park and the entrance and stairway at the southeast corner of said park have been forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the request that the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars be appropriated for the work, under the provisions of chapter 444 of the Laws of 1889.

A plan for a system of walks on that portion of Riverside Park lying east of the railroad, between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-second streets, has also been transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval, and with the request that the Comptroller be authorized and directed to issue bonds to the amount of thirty thousand dollars for the purpose of carrying out the work, as shown on said plan, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887.

The Departmental Estimate of money required to carry on the business of the Department during the year 1890, amounting to \$1,896,045, has been carefully prepared and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and a copy to the Board of Aldermen.

Application has been made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an additional sum of twelve thousand dollars for the completion of the approaches in the vicinity of the building of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

The subject of the practicability and advisability of widening the East Drive in Central Park, north of the south end of the Mall, either in part or along its entire length, by fifteen feet, so as to have a uniform width of sixty feet, has received attention and is under consideration.

Consideration has also been given the matter of the proposed widening and improvement of One Hundred and Tenth street, from Fifth to Riverside avenue, including an entrance to the Riverside Drive.

The subject of the completion and improvement of the northwest corner of the Central Park has received attention, and plans are in course of preparation.

The rate of speed on all bridle paths in Central Park, except around the Reservoir, has been regulated so that it shall not exceed eight miles per hour. Hereafter not more than two or three persons will be allowed to ride abreast according to the width of the paths.

The rules concerning the opening of streets and public places within the jurisdiction of this Department have, pursuant to an ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, approved August 3, 1880, been amended in the following respects :

There will be charged for each opening for sewer connection, ten dollars ; for repairing sewer connection, six dollars ; for water, gas, steam or electric wire connection, six dollars ; for repairing water, gas, steam or electric wire connection, four dollars. In addition to the amounts payable as prescribed for opening such streets and public places for sewer, water, steam, gas and electric wire connections and for repairing the same, there will be required to be deposited with the Department for each superficial square yard of pavement displaced for any purpose whatsoever, an amount equal to the cost of laying such pavement in the first instance.

In case such excavation does not include water, sewer, steam, gas or electric wire connections, or the repair of the same, the payment of the amounts fixed for such connections or repairs respectively, will not be required.

The following resolution was adopted by the Board of Parks :

Resolved, That this Board request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund not to take any action in relation to erecting a municipal building on City Hall Park until there is opportunity for further action by the Legislature.

CENTRAL AND CITY PARKS.

GARDENING DEPARTMENT.

The gardening force has been employed in cultivating the flower-beds throughout the Central and City Parks, also the care of the water-lilies in the various fountain-basins throughout these parks. Considerable work was done at the greenhouses in connection with the propagation and care of bedding plants, cultivation of shrubs and vines, sowing of pansies and daisies, and transplanting of these and other plants.

A large number of dead trees and shrubs, poisonous vines and briars, have been thoroughly rooted and grubbed out in Central Park, commencing at Fifth avenue and One Hundred and Sixth street, and continuing around the north boundary of the park to One Hundred and Fifth street and Eighth avenue. This work has greatly enhanced the beauty of this portion of the park, and also affords a large area for future planting of shrubs, vines and plants of desirable and showy sorts.

Throughout other portions of Central Park, in the most conspicuous places, dead trees and shrubs have been removed.

In Washington Square, a thorough cutting-out and pruning of dead and overcrowded limbs has been carried on, thus improving it very much.

The beneficial effects of the thorough thinning out of the plantations, with the replanting in many places of new and vigorous trees and shrubs, is becoming more apparent every year in the more healthy growth of those remaining.

GENERAL MAINTENANCE.

Central Park.

This work consists of the graveling, watering and care of the drives and bridle roads, cleaning of walks and basins, and mowing of lawns, and is materially the same throughout all the divisions of Central Park.

The Ladies' and Gentlemen's Cottages have been kept clean and open, in the care of attendants, daily from 8 A. M. to 6 P. M.

The transverse roads have been regularly cleaned and sprinkled.

The bronze statues throughout the Park were cleaned, with flannel cloths, on an average of once a week.

Accommodations and attendance were furnished those engaging in the games permitted on the Park.

Fifth avenue, Seventy-second and One Hundred and Tenth streets, were regularly cleaned and sprinkled.

City Parks.

The usual maintenance work of cleaning walks and lawns has been attended to on these various parks, also the necessary work of preparing for and cleaning up after concerts.

At Mount Morris Park, where croquet playing is permitted, the necessary attendance and care of grounds, has been furnished the players.

At Washington Square, about 2,500 square feet of the driveway has been repaired with asphalt.

The cottages at various points on the City Parks, and urinals, have been kept open in charge of attendants, from 8 A. M. to 7 P. M., and in some instances at all hours of the day and night. The small parks have been kept open, in charge of attendants, until 10 P. M.

Park Stables.

The work at this point has consisted of the cleaning and caring for the 66 horses at the Eighty-fifth Street Stable, and the 19 horses in the Sheepfold Stables.

This force has also had charge and attended to the care and cleaning of the light wagons and harness of the Department.

Riverside Park and Drive.

The work at this point has consisted of the almost daily sprinkling of the Drive, and the cleaning and care of the roadway.

The lawns have been regularly mowed and the gutters and basins cleaned and repaired, as required from time to time.

The grass plots about the tree spaces on West Seventy-second street have been sodded.

Considerable work was performed in connection with the watering of the trees along the Drive and on West Seventy-second street.

The Ladies' Cottage, near the Tomb, was kept open from 8 A. M. to 6 P. M., in charge of an attendant.

Morningside Park.

The most important work in connection with the construction of this Park has been the grading of the lawns and slopes between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets. This work required the filling in of sunken places to a higher grade, involving the handling of 6,000 cubic yards of crude earth; 72,209 square feet of sod has been laid along the borders of paths, on high banks, and around rocks and basins. The level portions and lawns have been sown with grass seed.

The main walk of the Park, between One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Twenty-third streets, has been regraded and placed in perfect order.

Two hundred large rocks have been placed in the banks for the purpose of retaining the earth, and for landscape effects.

Considerable work has been done in connection with the blasting and excavation of rock for steps and drain-pipe; the stone blasted was broken and used as foundation for walks.

New Parks, North of Harlem River.

The force in these Parks has been employed in the care of the trees and buildings and in repairing the roadways. At the present time the improved condition of these roadways show the effect of the City's work upon them.

MECHANICAL WORK.

Carpenters.

This force has been engaged on repairs in the offices at the Arsenal, the Animal Buildings, Police Stables, Casino Building, Swedish Cottage, workshops, Mt. St. Vincent Hotel and at the greenhouses. Considerable work has been done in the way of repairing the Ladies' and Gentlemen's Cottages throughout the Central Park; also in repairing the rustic structures and police shelters.

At Mt. Morris Park repairs were made at the Ladies' Cottage. The music-stand was also erected before and after each concert.

At the Ladies' Cottage, Riverside Park, partitions and eight new closets were fitted up, new hood was made and put up over entrance, and the cottage put in good condition.

Repairs have been made to the stoop, doors and closets of the Cottage at East River Park.

The Cottage at Union Square has been overhauled and interior altered, five new closets have put up, new front and stoop has been put up on south side; also altered front and rear gables, put in ventilators and eight new water-closets in basement.

Incidental repairs were made to the cottages and police shelters at Tompkins, Washington and Battery Parks.

Made 175 new signs and repaired 24 old signs; also repaired 1,118 settees for the Central and City Parks.

Repaired 55 pieces of rolling stock; also 68 pieces or parts of tools, such as wheelbarrows, harrows, etc.

At the Third Avenue Bridge, repaired the Round House and fenders on each end of approach, and such other repairs as were necessary.

At Madison Avenue Bridge, covered over the open lattice-work on each side of the roadway on draw; made repairs to walks where required.

At Central Bridge, laid 300 lineal feet of new planking on roadway, made new sidewalk on southerly side of approach, also made incidental repairs to other parts of the bridge.

Made necessary repairs to the three buildings in St. Mary's Park; also fences and structures over wells and cisterns.

At Bronx Park, built new bridge over Bronx river, 17 feet wide by 110 feet long.

Also built new stoop at Lorillard Mansion; also repaired stalls at stables near mansion, and covering over well.

At Pelham Park, rebuilt road-bridge on City Island road; also repaired draw and cribs of the City Island Bridge.

At Van Cortlandt Park, shingled roof of Van Cortlandt Mansion; also made and put up new cornice around same; also repaired seven dormer windows and twenty-four pair of blinds.

Also made necessary repairs at Disbrow House and Tremper House.

Covered three cisterns, made four new gates and stoop for mill; put up 250 feet of three-rail fence along roadway, and built new bridge near mill, as well as other incidental repairs.

Painters' Work.

This force has been employed in painting repairs to woodwork of cottages and other buildings throughout the Department, also in attending to the necessary glazing.

Bow Bridge, boat landing at Large Lake, Seventh Avenue Iron Bridge, and 37 pieces of rolling stock, together with several parts, such as poles, etc., were painted over entire surface.

Painted, lettered and varnished 238 signs for the Central and City Parks, also 1,222 settees for the same, together with several hundred posts of the iron fences.

Painted gates of Madison Avenue Bridge, Round House of Central Bridge, and engine room of Third Avenue Bridge.

Attended to the stenciling of music programmes for concerts on the Central and City Parks.

In the New Parks considerable work was done in painting of repairs at Van Cortlandt House, and roof of Disbrow House at Van Cortlandt Park. In painting roof of Lorillard House and staining office floor, and painting other repairs of buildings at Bronx Park, as well as other incidental painting of repairs at Pelham Park, St. Mary's Park and City Island Bridge.

Mason Work.

This force has been employed in building 5,064 cubic feet of stone foundation, setting 773 feet of fine-sawed blue-stone steps, building 19 new walk basins, one large field basin, and laying 500 feet of 6-inch vitrified pipe, at the northeast angle of Central Park, One Hundred and Sixth street and Fifth avenue.

Also removing old flagging, cutting, fitting and relaying 8,496 square feet of blue-stone flagging on east sidewalk of Eighth avenue, between Eighty-first and Eighty-fifth streets.

Also laying 1,485 square feet of concrete on Fifth avenue walk, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-sixth streets. Also laid 290 square feet of concrete gutters at Boat House, Large Lake, Central Park.

Also laid 80 feet of 10-inch drain-pipe, removed 30 feet of park wall, and built 5 basins to new grades at Museum of Natural History, Central Park.

Also excavated 40 cubic yards of rock, laid 42 feet of 8-inch iron pipe, and 12 feet of 8-inch earthen pipe, and laid 44 square yards of street pavement in connecting Gentlemen's Cottage, Central Park, with sewer in Sixty-fifth street, Transverse road.

At Stuyvesant Park, cut, fitted and relaid 2,560 square feet of blue-stone flagging on Second avenue walks.

At East River Park, built new receiving-basin and laid 90 feet of 8-inch drain-pipe.

At City Hall Park, regulated and reset 215 feet of blue-stone curb on plaza.

At Morningside Park, cut, fitted and set 217 feet of blue-stone rock steps.

At Bronx Park, quarried, hauled and laid 3,753 cubic feet of dry-hammered stonework in construction of piers and retaining-wall of new bridge across Bronx river.

In addition to the above work there were various other incidental pieces, such as repairs and pointing of stonework, etc.

Machinists' Work.

This force has been engaged on the repairs of the iron-work of the various pieces of rolling stock throughout the Department, in the shoeing of the Park and Police horses, repairing of iron railings of City Parks, settees, etc., and in attending, when necessary, the boiler at the Arsenal and at the shops.

The force of Engineers, Firemen and Bridge-tenders, in connection with the bridges over the Harlem river, have been constantly employed in operating these bridges at all hours of the day and night.

Plumbers' Work.

The work performed by this force on Central Park, outside incidental repairs, to burst-pipes, etc., consisted of putting in lead lining of tank at greenhouses, repairing roofs of Arsenal Building, Casino Building and Mt. St. Vincent Hotel and Dairy.

Repairs were made to several of closets and urinals on the City Parks; also repairs to drinking-fountains.

Repaired the sewer-pipes, basins and pumps at Van Cortlandt House, Van Cortlandt Park; repaired pumps and put in water at Lorillard Mansion, Bronx Park.

IMPROVEMENT AND CONSTRUCTION OF CENTRAL PARK, UNDER AUTHORITY OF CHAPTER 575, LAWS OF 1887.

Constructing Approaches to and the Reconstruction of the Grounds around the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

This work is being prosecuted under contract, and was commenced in October, 1888, and is now practically completed.

The quantities of work done during the quarter are:

6,125 square yards of gravel roadway completed.

28,400 square feet of Seyssel pavement of walks laid.

3 road basins built.

1 walk basin built.

350 lineal feet 6-inch vitrified drain-pipe laid.

EAST RIVER PARK.

The work of paving with concrete mortar of Portland cement the walk adjoining the sea-wall between Eighty-fourth and Eighty-sixth streets, was placed under contract June 20, 1889, and was commenced June 27, and completed on July 20.

The quantity of work done was

12,703 square feet of walk pavement laid.

RIVERSIDE PARK IMPROVEMENT, UNDER AUTHORITY OF CHAPTER 575, LAWS OF 1887.

Construction of Retaining-walls and Appurtenances, Walks and Drainage, from Seventy-second to Seventy-ninth street.

This work is being done under contract, and is still in progress.

The work done since June 30, is

746 lineal feet of retaining-wall built.

1,000 cubic yards of earth and rock excavation.

MORNINGSIDE PARK IMPROVEMENT, UNDER AUTHORITY OF CHAPTER 575, LAWS OF 1887.

The works being prosecuted under contract are:

(1). The construction of receiving-basins and inlets for walk and surface drainage.

(2). The erection of blue-stone steps and foundation masonry for same.

The work done since June 30, is

17 walk basins built.

5 surface basins built.

1 inlet built.

116 cubic yards masonry in foundation for steps.

2,436 lineal feet blue-stone steps furnished and set.

1,375 lineal feet of drain-pipe and tile furnished and laid.

266 lineal feet of stone drains have been laid by day's work.

WORK DONE BY CONTRACT FOR REPAIRS OF CITY PARKS.

TOMPKINS SQUARE PARK.

Repairing and Repaving with Rock Asphalt the Walks in Tompkins Square Park.

This work was done by contract and commenced on August 12, and is still in progress.

The work done to September 30, is

44,200 square feet rock asphalt pavement laid.

CITY HALL PARK.

Repairing and Repaving with Rock Asphalt the Esplanade in front of the City Hall and other Walks in the City Hall Park.

This work was placed under contract July 24, 1889, and was commenced on August 26, and is now practically completed.

The amount of work done, is

32,547 square feet of rock asphalt pavement laid.

SETTING AND RESETTING CURB-STONES AND IMPROVING SEVENTY-SECOND STREET, FROM THE BOULEVARD TO THE EASTERLY LINE OF THE NEW YORK CENTRAL AND HUDSON RIVER RAILROAD.

This work is being done by contract and was commenced August 12, and is still in progress.

The work done is:

60 cubic yards of rock excavation.

1,100 cubic yards excavation other than rock.

1,050 cubic yards of mould furnished and placed in tree spaces.

470 lineal feet 6-inch blue-stone curb furnished and set.

HARLEM RIVER BRIDGES, SPECIAL REPAIRS.

Third Avenue Bridge.

454 lineal feet of iron railing has been furnished and set upon the two fixed spans of this bridge.

No other special repairs have been made during the quarter.

PELHAM BAY PARK.

The repairs to the City Island Bridge, which were commenced in March last, have been completed, the work having been done by day's work.

POLICE.

Work continued with activity throughout the quarter on all public contracts, and contracts carried on by property-owners under the supervision and direction of the Department; on the depression of the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and bridging the streets over the railroad, and the operations of the street car companies.

The progress made on most of the works has been quite satisfactory, more particularly in the case of the large sewer in Webster avenue, which is now nearing the end, as at present contracted for. The extension of this sewer is of the greatest moment and should be undertaken as soon as the City acquires title to the portion of the avenue for which proceedings have been so long pending and are still in progress. The total length of sewer built during the quarter is 4,945 linear feet, or $\frac{239}{1000}$ of a mile. The total length of new paved street laid in the quarter is 3,900 linear feet, or $\frac{780}{1000}$ miles.

Four assessment lists for completed improvements were transmitted to the Board in the quarter. Five contracts for new improvements were executed in the quarter; two being for sewers, one for regulating and grading, and two for paving.

Seven contracts were completed in the quarter; five being public contracts and two property-owners' contracts.

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, licensed pharmacists or druggists, actually engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; militiamen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible), and at this office only, under severe penalties. TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in the manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
