

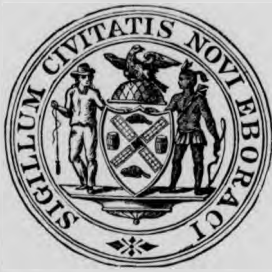

Resolved, That the attention of his Honor the Mayor be respectfully called to the manifest errors in the statement in his message to the Board of Aldermen printed in the CITY RECORD of January 5, 1886, relating to this Department. The 300 judgments mentioned in the message are not the important results of the policy pursued by this Board in prosecutions for penalties for non-compliance with its orders, as the quarterly reports and special reports printed in the CITY RECORD show. This Department in the last year necessarily began prosecutions on 11,836 orders, and by them secured abatement of the nuisances and compliance with orders, without the delays and costs of actual litigation in court, in 10,086 cases, leaving some 1,750 civil cases and 215 criminal cases to be prosecuted in court. This statement represents but a small portion of the work of prosecuting nuisances, conducted by this Department. The examinations of the Mayor independently of the quarterly reports, and especially the report published in the CITY RECORD of August 14, 1885, and the subsequent weekly reports published, have explained the details of the 300 judgments, which were the remnants of the prosecutions in the year 1884. It appears that in 238 judgments, the nuisances have been reported abated or orders of the Board complied with; in many of the cases, the defendants, who had been reported as responsible, were found not to be owners or responsible on execution issued, or were merely agents and, in some cases, transient persons, who could not be found; 53 of the judgments were opened by the Court. These reports, already before the Mayor, disclose the mistake of saying that only three of the judgments were satisfied. In addition, in the same year, 1884, \$6,599 in fines, were paid into the City Treasury from the Criminal Courts, the result of the prosecutions and trial by the representatives of the Department, of 768 criminal cases. In 1885, 215 criminal cases have been tried, and \$3,880 paid into the City Treasury therefrom.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Board are due and are hereby tendered to President Thomas S. Brennan and his associate Commissioners of Charities and Correction, for the aid and assistance so kindly rendered in transferring the property of this Department from Riverside Hospital to the new quarters at North Brother Island. That in this act of courtesy on the part of President Brennan and his colleagues, we recognise an official amenity calculated to strengthen the friendship so long existing between the two departments.

Resolved, That the plans and specifications of the pavilions now being constructed on North Brother Island, be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval, as provided in a "note" appended to the final estimate made by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the conduct of this Department for the year 1886, with a view to contracting at an early day, for the construction of two such pavilions.

A petition from physicians in respect to the change of law requiring physicians to report cases of contagious diseases was received and the Secretary was directed to inform the signers of the same that the Board concurs with the view expressed, and will be pleased to co-operate and assist in securing the desired result.

A committee of citizens appeared before the Board in respect to the driving of sheep through the streets and avenues of the City, and after a hearing the subject was laid on the table for further consideration.

An application from Richard Reilly for permission to make copies of the daily records of death was received, and on motion denied.

A communication from the State Board of Charities, in respect to filling blanks relating to statistics of hospitals, was received and referred to the Sanitary Superintendent.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 9, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,447.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 400.

During the past week 174 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 61 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 63 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 174 visits were made, and 88 disinfections and 26 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 9.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,130, of which 116 were primary, and 1,014 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 16,160 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 42, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 8, the number of arrests made was 2, and the amount of fines imposed was \$15.

The certificates of 840 births, 61 still-births, 277 marriages and 710 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 9, 1886.

This shows an increase of 192 births and 72 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births and 17 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 213 births, 7 still-births, 72 marriages and 33 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; measles, 1; croup, 6; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 5; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 7; apoplexy, 4; cyanosis and alectasis, 8; premature and pretermatural births, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 7; diphtheria, 7; whooping-cough, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 4; puerperal diseases, 5; inanition, 1; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 37; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 10; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; suicide, 3.

The number of deaths from malarial fevers, heart diseases and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 117 were in institutions, 394 in tenement-houses, 186 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 131 on the first, 204 on the second, 139 on the third, 71 on the fourth, 30 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 710 were stated to be residents of New York City and 0 non-resident; 83 were stated to be single, 193 married, 101 widowed, and the condition of 333 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 9, 1886, was 32.1 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.625; the mean humidity was 81, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 2,114, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.96 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
