Sanitary Bureau. The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

destroyed was 8, the number of arresis made was 2, and the amount of fines imposed was \$15. The certificates of \$40 births, 61 still-births, 277 marriages and 710 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Burcau during the week ending Saturday, January 9, 1886. This shows an increase of 192 births and 72 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births and 17 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 213 births, 7 still-births, 72 marriages and 33 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the pre-ceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; meales, 1; croup, 6; crysipleas, 2; crebro-spinal fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 5; aneurism, 2; maras-mus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 7; apoplexy, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 8; premature and preternatural births, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 7; diphtheria, 7; whooping-cough, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 4; all diseases, 5; inantiton, 1; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 37; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gratitis, enteristis and percentist, 10; Birght's disease and nephritis, 10; suicide, 3. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, heart diseases and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.



D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register: SIR—There were 710 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 9, 1886, which is an increase of 72, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 32 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual moritality for the week ending January 2, 1886, was 682, which is 18.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.97 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,420,511.
