Stephenson, Seventh Precinct, neglect of duty. Michael Doherty, Fourteenth Precinct, neglect of duty. Josiah A. Westervelt, Central Office, neglect of duty.

The Board of Police find as follows: From the evidence presented in these cases, we find that the charges made against Inspectors Williams and McAvoy are true, in so far as that, under the Superintendent's orders, an entrance was obtained into the places mentioned in the complaints, and that gambling paraphernalia was found therein, and arrests made, and that in West Thirty-sixth street the materials used in smoking opium were found, and some arrests also made.

In view of the fact, however, that the First Inspection District covers a large portion of territory, running from the Battery to One Hundred and Tenth street and from Broadway to the East river, while the Second District covers the same extent of territory west of Broadway, the Inspectors in command must necessarily rely to a great extent on the statements and reports made by the Captains of the various Precincts in the different Inspection Districts as to the existence of violations of law, we find that the Inspectors named are not guilty of the charges, as no actual knowledge of the existence of these places has been proved against them.

With reference to the charges made against Captains Doherty, Westervelt and Stephenson, we believe that, in view of the fact that their duties were confined to their Precincts, thereby giving them opportunities of learning more particularly of any or all violations of law that might exist therein, they should have promptly discovered the violations of law referred to in the complaints, and which violations of law the Superintendent was able to discover.

We therefore believe that Captain Michael Doherty, Captain John T. Stephenson and Captain Josiah A. Westervelt were negligent in the discharge of their duties as charged in the complaints, and are hereby severally censured and reprimanded.

The Board of Police take this occasion to say that it expects and requires from every member of the Police force a rigid and uniform enforcement of all laws and ordinances, and that hereafter should charges of this character be made and proven, severe punishment will be inflicted.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and

obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
