

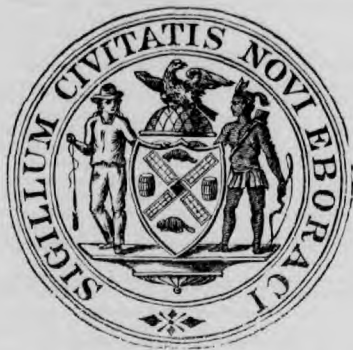

Stebbins Smith, attorney and in person, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on February 10, 1899.
