BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, BUREAU OF FRANCHISES,

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, in a communication dated March 22, 1906, has advised the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that it has determined and established an additional route for a rapid transit railway to those already existing or proposed, and requests the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the same.

Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 631 of the Laws of 1905, a day has been fixed for the consideration of the matter, to wit: Friday, April 6, and due notice published of such intention in the CITY RECORD.

The route lies wholly in the Borough of Brooklyn and commences at a point in Fourth avenue, near Thirty-eighth street, where connection is to be made with the proposed rapid transit railway on Fourth avenue, thence under and along Fortieth street, New Utrecht avenue, across private property and under Eighty-sixth street to a point between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth avenues, where it emerges from the ground and becomes an elevated railway to Stillwell avenue, and thence under Stillwell avenue to Surf avenue, Coney Island.

A full description of the route and the reasons for its selection are given in the communication. Since the plans were presented on March 30, 1906, a change in the profile has been made of the proposed railway, the grade being lowered at Sixty-first street to enable it to pass under the tracks of the New York, Brooklyn and Manhattan Beach Railway, which are to be placed below the surface grade, and a communication from the Chief Engineer, dated April 4, is herewith presented, formally transmitting a map of the altered profile.

The proposed railway is to be a four-track road and will furnish, when completed, an additional route to Coney Island, which is greatly needed during the summer season. For the local traffic along the route it will be in direct competition with the Brooklyn, Bath and West End Railroad on the surface of New Utrecht avenue and operating through trains from Coney Island to the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge over the Fifth Avenue Elevated Railroad from Thirty-ninth street. This line, between Thirty-ninth street and Coney Island, although a surface route, has stations along its route for regular stopping.

The proposed rapid transit route will necessitate the acquisition of easements between Thirty-eighth and Fortieth streets, near Fourth avenue, between Eighty-fourth and Eighty-sixth streets, near New Utrecht avenue, and the widening of Eighty-sixth street, between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth avenues, where the line emerges from the ground and will occupy a space of the street surface about 60 feet in width between these avenues.

At present there are no houses or other improvements on either side of Eighty-sixth street at this point. Fortieth street, New Utrecht avenue and Eighty-sixth street are in use. Stillwell avenue is not open on the ground, nor has title thereto been acquired, although I am informed a proceeding was initiated in 1902 to open the same from Surf avenue to the canal, being only a part of the distance required for this route.

The communication of the Rapid Transit Commission recites that the Commission is informed that upwards of 28,000,000 people visited Coney Island during the season of 1905, and it would therefore appear that a route such as is proposed is not only necessary, but, in view of the share of the excursion business which it would enjoy, would form a very attractive route to bidders when coupled with one or more of the routes already established. One point, however, would seem to require the careful consideration of the Board before contracts are let for construction, and that is the terminal facilities at Coney Island which the summer traffic will demand. As at present proposed, four tracks are to be constructed within the lines of Stillwell avenue, and all trains will have to run to the terminus of the route, unload passengers, transfer train crews, take on the return passengers, and, by means of cross-overs, start back again. It would seem, therefore, that the conditions now existing at the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge will, in a measure, be duplicated.

The present rapid transit railway in Manhattan has a loop terminal at the City Hall and at the Battery, permitting the continuous operation of trains, and for the traffic at so important a terminal as Coney Island I am of the opinion that similar provisions should be made. Owing to the limited time I have had to examine the route, I have been unable to take up this question with the Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission, but I believe that it is worthy of consideration before final action is taken.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: During the week ending March 10, thirty-six operations were performed at Bellevue, fourteen at Gouverneur, three at Harlem and eight at Fordham; none of these was performed in the absence of the Attending or Assistant Attending Surgeons.

An inspection of the new Harlem Hospital shows that it will be impracticable to occupy the Out Patient Department on April 1. The owner of the property now used as the Out Patient Department is willing to extend the lease at the same monthly rental with the privilege of either party terminating it on thirty days' notice. It is recommended that this be done.

In the new Harlem Hospital the end rooms on the Out Patient floor are not provided with hand basins. It is recommended that the architects, Messrs. Dr. Woodruff, who was sent to the Minturn Hospital suffering from diphtheria, is improving and will probably be discharged in a few days.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Resolution adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the Headquarters of the Fire Department, City of New York, October 9, 1905, amending section 28, part 2, of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, so as to require signs on all cars carrying explosives.

Resolved, That section 28, part 2, of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 28. Explosives intended for transportation by rail shall only be landed at railroad piers, from whence they shall be hauled directly beyond the City limits; and explosives received at railway stations within the City limits shall be promptly discharged and removed at such storage as these regulations prescribe. Every railroad car containing explosives within the City limits must be marked by signs securely attached to the sides of the car parallel with the tracks, with the words "Explosives, Dangerous" in red letters at least twelve inches high on a white background.


