The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of the communication from the Board of Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, dated June 4, 1909, requesting the establishment of the position of Assistant Clerk in said court, with salary at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, which communication was referred by your Board June 15 to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, we would report thereon as follows:

It would appear from information furnished your committee that Thomas F. Meagher, who receives a salary of \$1,800 per annum as a Court Attendant, has for the past nine years rendered services as an Assistant Clerk. It is proposed to change the title of his position in order that his official duties will be properly and legally designated.

The Justices of the Court are unanimously in favor of the establishment of the new position. They have instructed the Clerk of the Court to inform your Board that Mr. Meagher, although holding the position of Attendant, is satisfactorily performing the duties of an Assistant Clerk, and is at the head of a Civil Service list for appointment as an Assistant Clerk. Should the new grade of Assistant Clerk at \$1,800 per annum be established, it would not increase the yearly ratio of expenditures for salaries of the court as fixed in the 1909 budget, as it is proposed to request a modification of the budget salary schedule that will permit the transfer of the salary of an Attendant at \$1,800 to meet the salary of an Assistant Clerk at the same annual rate.

In view of the facts stated herein your committee recommends the establishment of the position of Assistant Clerk in the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, with salary at the rate of \$1,800 per annum.

Gentlemen—In reference to a communication to your Board from the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated June 23, 1909, requesting the establishment of the grade of the position of Superintendent of Docks, at the rate of \$5,000 per annum for one incumbent, which was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration, we beg to report as follows:

The incumbent for whom the establishment of the grade is requested is Charles A. Manly, who has been employed in the Department since September 21, 1897. On July 2, 1902, he was promoted to the position of Superintendent of Docks, at a salary of \$4,000 per annum, being the same compensation that he is receiving at present.

The Commissioner of Docks and Ferries states that Mr. Manly has charge of the Bureau of Superintendence, which covers the supervision of the entire water-front of the City, some 440 miles in length. He has charge of over 550 employees, engaged in keeping the marginal streets, piers and bulkheads in proper condition. He also has charge of the 9 Recreation Piers, as well as the 24 Dockmasters, and during the summer season, while the Recreation Piers are open, he is compelled to be on duty nights and Sundays. The Commissioner also states that the position is one that requires a wide range of experience and the exercise of good judgment, and that Mr. Manly has always performed the duties of the position in a most satisfactory manner.

In view of the importance of the position and the apparent responsibility attached to the duties thereof, we recommend the approval of the request of the Commissioner in accordance with the resolution hereto appended.

In the establishment of the position of Supervising Inspector at \$3,000 per annum, it is contemplated to abolish the position of Superintendent of Construction in the Bureau of Sewers at the same annual salary. No monetary change will result from the aforesaid change in title.

It is proposed to increase the salary of one Axeman from \$900 to \$1,200 per annum by establishing a grade for Axeman at \$1,200 per annum. The President states that the employee affected by the establishment of this new grade "has rendered faithful service to the Department for a period of fourteen years, and he is well deserving of the small increase which it is desired to give him." The salary attending the position under consideration is paid through the medium of assessable improvements.

By the establishment of the position of Inspector of Construction and Repairs at \$2,100 per annum, it is contemplated to change the title of one Foreman Bricklayer at \$6 per diem. It is further intended to change the title of the position of Foreman Plumber at \$5 per diem to read Inspector of Plumbing at \$1,800 per annum; the title of one Foreman at \$5 per diem to that of Inspector of Markets at \$1,800 per annum; the titles of one Foreman at \$5 per diem, one Steamfitter at \$6 per diem, and one

Assistant Foreman at \$4 per diem, to be known hereafter as Inspectors of Steam Plants at \$1,350, \$1,500 and \$1,800 per annum, respectively.

It is asserted by the President of the Borough of Manhattan that "these positions and grades are required in order that various employees of the Department may be given titles appropriate to the duties they are called upon to perform."

By the establishment of the grade of Keeper of Corporation Yards at \$1,200 per annum, it is proposed to increase the salary of an employee now receiving \$900 per annum. The present incumbent of said position has been in the service for a period of twenty-five years, and has not heretofore enjoyed any increase in salary.

Sir—In the matter of the application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the establishment of the grade, in salary, of the position of Chief Engineer of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, at \$5,000 per annum, referred to the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration and report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The incumbent for whom this increase is requested entered the service of the Park Department in 1872 as a Rodman, and was promoted through the various grades until 1883, when he was advanced to the position of Assistant to the Engineer of Construction, serving in this position until May, 1898, when he was advanced to the position of Chief Engineer, at an annual salary of \$3,500.

On July 1, 1901, the salary of Chief Engineer, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, was fixed at \$4,000 per annum, and remains at that figure at present. The incumbent has not received any increase in compensation in seven years, notwithstanding that the work of the Department has been materially increased by the addition and laying out of new parks, and the necessary increase in work of keeping up the older parks.

The work performed by the Chief Engineer, Department of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond, is of a varied character, dealing with problems of water supply, sewer construction, agricultural drainage, bridges, retaining and heavy wall construction, the building of roadways, drives, sea walls and general park construction.

The increase is requested by the Hon. Henry Smith, Park Commissioner, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, on the ground of long and faithful service, the incumbent having served thirty-five years in the City employ. The Commissioner also states that the work performed by the Chief Engineer is extremely important.

Dear Sir—During the month of September it was found by the Mayor and the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges that it would be necessary to operate a shuttle car service over the Queensboro Bridge. This was an emergency matter and the Commissioner of Bridges applied to the Commissioner of this Department for power to operate the electric cars necessary for the service. It was found that the only company from whom we could obtain this service at once was the New York Edison Company, and a very reasonable arrangement as to price was made with them.

The Bridge Department transferred funds to cover the expenditure to the end of the year to this Department, by consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

We would therefore request that we be permitted to order the New York Edison Company to furnish this service so long as is necessary, up to and including December 31, 1909. The total expenditure necessary is estimated at about five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

As no other company can furnish the power, and the arrangement is one that is of benefit to the traveling public over the Queensboro Bridge, I would therefore request that your Board allow us to contract for this service without public letting.

Sir—This Department is now extending the high pressure fire service system through five (5) additional districts, work for three of them having been already advertised.

In order to provide for all possible calls from the enlarged territory and secure the continuity of the service, as well as to make provision for an adequate reserve to meet breakage or emergencies at the stations which might disable one or more of the units now in commission, it is necessary to install one additional unit at each station and by this means we will be also saved the need of acquiring duplicate parts for the machinery, the cost of which is estimated at about \$22,000 for both stations.

After a thorough study of the subject and discussion of the matter by the Chief Engineer of the Department with the Allis-Chalmers Company, the contractors for the machinery now installed at both stations, they have submitted a proposal to install two additional units, i. e., one at each of the pumping stations, for fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000); the work to be done consisting not only in furnishing and installing said units, i. e., engines, motors and appurtenances, but also cutting out and replacing of the floor and incidental work to put the new units in actual service. The new unit, furthermore, will be an exact counterpart of those now in place, so that they may be absolutely interchangeable in every part, and is to be furnished and installed in strict accordance with the specifications under which the ten (10) units now in place were furnished and installed by the Allis-Chalmers Company, and to be subjected, before acceptance, to the tests specified in the contract between that firm and this Department.

Under the original contract for the ten (10) units installed at the two high pressure fire service stations, the average price per unit was, in round numbers, about twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000), so that, considering that only one unit is now to be provided for at each station, that the work of cutting out and replacing the floor, not included in the former contract, is to be done by the contractors, and particularly that the work is to be done while the stations are in service under a high tension of 6,600 volts, and at the risk of doing some damage to the existing plant, which the contractors would have to make good, the Chief Engineer of the Department considers that the price now stipulated is a reasonable one and I concur in this opinion.

In designing the stations, it was anticipated that the plant would have to be enlarged, and provision was made for three additional units at each station. We have on hand a sufficient balance from the appropriations granted for the purchase of these two units on the above basis, and I therefore request that you submit this communication to the Honorable Board and ask the adoption of the enclosed resolution authorizing the purchase of the two units above referred to from the Allis-Chalmers Company and the expenditure of this money without public letting.

Dear Sir—On April 3 last your Board approved the resolution submitted in my communication of February 5, 1909, requesting authority to purchase, without competitive bids and proposals, five hundred and seventy-five (575) high pressure fire service hydrants from the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company, at the rate of \$108.50 apiece, these hydrants being required for the extension of the high pressure fire service through districts 4, 5 and 6. In my communication of February 5, already alluded to, I stated the reasons I had to solicit this authorization, i. e., the extraordinary amount of time, labor and expense required, as shown by past experience, in securing these hydrants by contract, owing to the lengthy and expensive tests required, and the obvious advantage of having uniform hydrants through the entire system, especially when those installed, after the most trying service had given entire satisfaction.

For the further extension of the high pressure fire service system through districts 6, 7 and 8, two hundred and twenty-five (225) more hydrants will be required, which the manufacturers offer to furnish on the same basis as the previous ones, i. e., at the rate of \$108.50 per hydrant, the total cost, therefore, amounting to \$24,412.50. 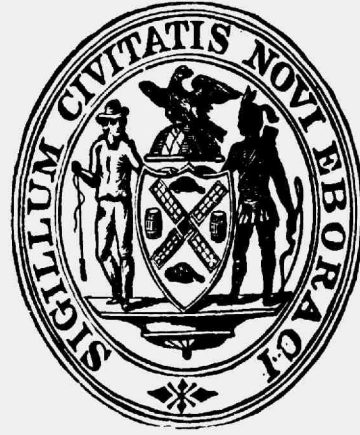

Each parcel must be bid for separately and will be sold in its entirety, as described in above advertisement.

Each and every bid must be accompanied by a deposit of cash or certified check in a sum equal to 25 per cent. of the amount of the bid, except that a minimum deposit of \$50 will be required with all bids, and that a deposit of \$500 will be sufficient to entitle bidders to bid on any or all of the buildings.

Deposits of unsuccessful bidders will be returned within twenty-four hours after successful bidders have paid purchase price in full and given security, and those of successful bidders may be declared forfeited to The City of New York by the Comptroller upon the failure of the successful bidder to further comply with the requirements of the terms and conditions of the sale, as set forth hereinafter.

Successful bidders will be required to pay the purchase money and deposit the required security within twenty-four hours of the receipt of notification of the acceptance of their bids.

The Comptroller reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to waive any defects or informalities in any bid should it be deemed in the interest of The City of New York to do so.

All bids must state clearly (1) the number or description of the building or buildings bid for, (2) the amount of the bid, (3) the full name and address of the bidder.

All bids must be enclosed in properly sealed envelopes, marked "Proposals to be opened October 22, 1909," and must be delivered, or mailed in time for their delivery, prior to 11 a. m. of that date to the "Collector of City Revenue, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, New York City," from whom any further particulars regarding the buildings to be disposed of may be obtained.

The buildings will be sold for immediate removal only, subject to the following

TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

The buildings and appurtenances thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the contract. The purchaser, in placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances or any part thereof within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the costs and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against

any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-boles, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day, the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The New York and Queens County Railway Company has, under date of April 14, 1908, made application to this Board for a grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate an extension to its existing street surface railway system, beginning and connecting with the tracks of the company in Jackson avenue, opposite the Queensboro Bridge plaza, in the Borough of Queens; thence upon the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon the bridge approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly terminus thereof at Second avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law, and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on May 1, 1908, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as June 12, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was made for at least fourteen days in the Long Island City "Daily Star" and the Flushing "Evening Journal," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly had on such date; and

Whereas, At the meeting of this Board held September 17, 1909, the Select Committee to whom the matter had been referred submitted a report recommending certain amendments in the form of contract previously presented, and the Chief Engineer was thereupon directed to prepare a contract in accordance with such recommendations, which amended contract was presented to this Board September 24, 1909; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the New York and Queens County Railway Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the New York and Queens County Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York and Queens County Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York and Queens County Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to operate passenger cars, upon two tracks only, upon and across the Queensboro (Blackwell's Island) Bridge, as an extension to its existing lines in the Borough of Queens, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning and connecting with the tracks of the Company in Jackson avenue, opposite the Queensboro Bridge plaza, in the Borough of Queens; thence in and upon the Queensboro Bridge plaza to the easterly approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly terminus thereof at Second avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, all in The City of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this right or privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for a term of ten (10) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and may continue for a further term not exceeding in any case fifteen (15) years, which further term shall be terminable at the option of the Board at any

time during the said fifteen (15) years, upon six months' notice by the Board to the Company.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash within thirty days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200).

During the third term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400).

During the fourth term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$2,675), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$2,675).

During the remaining term of five years, or during such portion of said term as this contract shall be in force, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,900).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross earnings of the Company from all sources as shall bear the same proportion to such gross earnings as the length of the route to be authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the day on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the bridge structure and approaches thereon, the sum of five cents for each round trip, or the sum of two and one-half cents for each single trip of each and every car operated upon the bridge.

The number of such cars shall be certified by the Commissioner of Bridges to the Comptroller once each month in such form as shall be designated by the Comptroller.

(d) For the use of the tracks owned by the City upon the bridge and approaches, a sum equal to four (4) per cent. per annum upon the valuation of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) per mile of single track used—provided, however, that if such tracks are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of such four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such tracks by the Company. The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use of such tracks and certify the same to the Comptroller.

(e) For the use of terminal loops and other terminal facilities which are the property of the City a sum equal to four (4) per cent. upon the cost of the tracks in the terminals, and all overhead equipment necessary for the operation of the cars, provided, however, that if such terminal loops and other terminal facilities are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such facilities by the Company. The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use of such terminal facilities and overhead equipment and certify the same to the Comptroller.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law, as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract shall be strictly complied with.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, except the payment of three (3) per cent. of the gross receipts during the first five years of the contract, and five (5) per cent. of the same thereafter, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewed, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewed, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statute relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—The Company shall use only such tracks and terminal facilities as shall be assigned to the Company by the Commissioner of Bridges, and nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, or to affect the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to assign the same or other tracks and terminal facilities to such individual or other corporation.

Such tracks, terminal facilities and all electrical equipment necessary for the operation of cars thereon shall be installed at the expense of the City, and shall remain the property of the City, but the Company shall pay the cost of keeping and maintaining such tracks and electrical equipment in good order and repair, and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall furnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges for the operation of its cars. If deemed necessary by the Commissioner of Bridges, the Company shall install and operate a system of signals to insure the safe and efficient operation of cars; such system to be approved by the Commissioner of Bridges. In the event of any necessity for changing the layout of tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms on the bridge in order to facilitate operation of cars by the Company, said Company must do all the work and furnish all the labor and tools necessary for effecting such changes, which shall all be made under the control and direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, and no such changes, or construction connected therewith, or relating thereto, shall be made unless the plan or plans for the same have been first submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges and approved by him.

If, however, the tracks, terminal facilities, electrical equipment or signal system are used by any other company or companies, and should any change in the layout of such tracks, curves, switches, sidings or equipment be made necessary while used by any other company, then, and in that event, the Company shall bear only that proportion of the cost of such signal system and the cost of making such changes in the layout of the tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms as the use of such track, electrical equipment and signal system by the Company shall bear to the entire use of such appliances.

Sixth—Before beginning the operation of the cars the Company shall file with the Commissioner of Bridges a statement for his approval and assent as to the type of car which it proposes to operate, and a sketch showing clearance dimensions, weight on axles and wheel spacing, or such other information as may be required by said Commissioner. All cars operated over the bridge by the Company, and all equipment and appliances relating to such operation shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the Commissioner of Bridges or his authorized representatives, who shall have power to forbid the entrance to the bridge of cars which may for any reason be unsatisfactory, and who shall have power to direct the removal of any old or inadequate appliance and the substitution thereof of appliances of approved character.

Said Commissioner may adopt rules and regulations in regard to the number of cars to be operated over the bridge, the rate of speed of said cars, the movement of roadway thereof, the type and weight of cars to be used and the condition thereof, the switching of cars and the use of platforms and the control of the electrical current used by the Company, and the said Commissioner may alter and amend any such rules and regulations so as to secure the safety and comfort of persons using the bridge and preserve the purposes for which the bridge was constructed, and upon serving notice upon the Company that such rules and regulations have been made, amended or altered, the Company shall comply with all the requirements thereof.

Seventh—A sufficient number of cars from the lines of the Company operated in the Borough of Queens shall at all times be operated across the bridge to accommodate passengers desiring to ride upon such cars. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as permitting the Company to operate local bridge cars back and forth upon the bridge between the bridge plaza in the Borough of Queens and the bridge approach in the Borough of Manhattan.

Eighth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City when such employees are in full uniform, and shall carry free upon the bridge and its approaches such employees of the Department of Bridges as may be designated by the Commissioner of Bridges.

Ninth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Tenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eleventh—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation and the total miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twelfth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirteenth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to make any alterations or changes in the construction, operation or management of the bridge, or to affect in any way the control of such Commissioner over such bridge, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Fourteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or shall fail to maintain the structures and equipment, as herein provided, in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages; or the Board, in case such structures or equipment shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time, after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all the needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Sixteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, and the repair and maintenance of tracks and equipment upon the bridge, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or, after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or, in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the rules and regulations made by the Commissioner of Bridges and the heating and lighting of cars, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated or lighted in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its president, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or, where the amount of the penalty is not as appears to the Board to be just, and, without legal procedure, direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Seventeenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Eighteenth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
