Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same, and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Yorkville District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To reregulate, regrade, curb and recurb, flag and reflag East Seventy-sixth street, from Exterior street to a point 314 feet westerly therefrom, and in connection therewith to construct necessary masonry retaining wall and guard rail; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The President announced that the Vice-Chairman and Alderman Weston had been excused from attendance.

The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the Stated Meeting of March 23, 1909. On motion of Alderman Gunther, further reading was dispensed with and the minutes were approved as printed.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from His Honor the Mayor:

No. 1971.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,
March 30, 1909.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I herewith call your attention to that part of the Code of Ordinances which deals with the licensing of special hacks and recommend that the subject be taken up by you to the end that any seeming omissions or contradictions may be corrected by the passage of an amendment to the ordinances.

On May 22, 1899, an ordinance was adopted entitled “A general ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York.”

Under the heading, “Public Hacks and Hackmen,” it was provided:

“Sec. 12. None but licensed hacks shall use the designated public hack stands in the city. The owner of any hack not intended to use the public stands and having the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises, in the discretion of the Mayor or the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, may be specially licensed and permitted to use temporarily a portion of the street in front of said premises as a stand, and shall be confined to carrying passengers from said premises.

“Sec. 13. The owners of hacks specially licensed shall, in addition to the lawful fees hereinbefore provided, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.”

It will thus be seen that provision was made for the licensing of a special hack stand in front of private premises and imposing a license fee of \$25 for each hack allowed the special hack stand.

On April 25, 1905, there was introduced at a meeting of the Board a proposed ordinance entitled “An ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen.” Sections 2 and 3 of the proposed ordinance were identical with sections 12 and 13 of the general ordinance of May 22, 1899. The resolution was referred to the Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, which made the following report on October 31, 1905 (page 225), wherein sections 2 and 3 of the proposed ordinance were continued as identical with sections 12 and 13 of the general ordinance of May 22, 1899. In the minutes of the proceeding of the Board of Aldermen of said date, October 31, 1905 (page 230), it was stated that the report was ordered on file. Then followed the statement:

“Reports of Standing Committees Resumed.”

“Report of Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers.”

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to which was referred on October 17, 1905 (Minutes, page 127), the annexed ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen, respectfully report:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted, with the following amendment: Substitute for section 3, Article 1, the words:

“Sec. 3. No hackney coach, carriage or cab, which shall be specially licensed by virtue of the provisions of this ordinance, shall make, use or come upon any stand that is now or may be hereafter designated as a hackney coach stand, or at any other place in The City of New York, except in front of or adjacent to any hotel or hotels,

or at any other place which may be designated by the Mayor, and which may be used as a stand, with the approval and consent of the persons occupying the premises in front of which said coaches, carriages or cabs are to be permitted and allowed by the authority of the Mayor, as aforesaid, provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit nor take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of the guests of said hotel or hotels."

The Board accepted said later report and adopted the ordinance.
An examination of the whole subject clearly shows that a clerical error was made in the report. It recommended a substitute for section 3 of the proposed ordinance before the Board, while it manifestly appears that it was intended to recommend a substitute for section 2 of the proposed ordinance. The proposed substitute concerned the subject covered by section 2.

In the establishment of a private hack stand permission of the owner or lessee of the premises was essential; the substitute provided only for the permission of the persons occupying the premises. Section 2 permitted only the use temporarily; the substitute eliminated such restriction. Section 2 provided that the special licensed hack shall be confined to carrying passengers from said premises, while the substitute made other and different provision and provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit nor take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of said guests of hotel or hotels.

The ordinance as printed in approved proceedings, November 6, 1905, contains these two inconsistent provisions (page 575). The Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, approved November 8, 1906, compiled by the Committee on Codification of Ordinances of the Board of Aldermen, in chapter 7, title 2, the granting and regulation of licenses, article 3, special regulations and rates, repeated the same error in sections 317 and 318, which are identical with the language of sections 2 and 3 of the ordinance of November 6, 1905.

I therefore recommend the passage of an ordinance whereby the provisions of section 318 of the present Code of Ordinances be substituted for those of section 317, and that the original provisions of section 13 of the general ordinance of May 22, 1899, providing for a license fee of \$25 for each hack be substituted for the present provisions of section 318 of the Code of Ordinances.

Sir—In the matter of two communications from the County Clerk of New York County, as Clerk of the Supreme Court, both addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of March 3, 1909, and referred to the Comptroller for consideration, I would beg to report as follows:

A modification is requested of the schedule supporting the appropriation in the Budget for 1909, entitled No. 1481, Supreme Court, First Department, Salaries, by the addition thereto of the position and grade of Telephone Operator at a yearly compensation of \$1,000. To provide the funds necessary to pay the salary of the Telephone Operator, as previously specified, a transfer is requested to be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the sum of \$1,000 from the 1909 Budget appropriation, entitled No. 1483, Supreme Court, First Department, General Supplies, including Printing. The County Clerk also requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the creation in the manner provided in section 56 of the Greater New York Charter of the position of Telephone Operator at the yearly compensation herein previously indicated.

It appears that this action now becomes necessary because of the discontinuance by the Telephone Company on January 1, 1909, of the former practice of furnishing Switchboard Operators and including in its bill for service the salaries of the Operators.

In view of the facts as herein stated, I would respectfully suggest that the Comptroller recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the approval of the resolutions appended hereto.

Dr. THOMAS DARLINGTON, President, Board of Health, Borough of Manhattan, New York City:

Dear Sir—The near approach of the active outdoor season is bringing with it a return to that unmitigated and unabated noise nuisance, the open muffler, to which the enclosed editorial, which is one of a number which have appeared in the "Bicycling World and Motorcycle Review," refers.

As all previous efforts to abate the nuisance proved fruitless, I address you in the hope that you may see fit to have the Board of Health enact such a rule as will suppress it, as I understand it is within your power to do. Except on a steep hill, or very loose going, the noise is wholly unnecessary, as the opening of the muffler serves no purpose except to amuse the man or boy who opens it. Everyone who has the good repulse of motorcycling at heart will thank you for any effort you may make in the direction indicated, and I dare say that the public generally will even more devoutly do so. Practically all of the motorcycle organizations are contending against the evil, and twice during my term as President of the Federation of American Motorcyclists, the national body, I endeavored to have the Alderman of our district introduce an ordinance that might suppress the annoyance, but he was lackadaisical and professed to believe that the Board has no power to do anything of the sort. It is quite evident that nothing but a few arrests will serve a good purpose and if they are made in New York the news will travel fast and, I think, will result in at least a fairly general abatement of the nuisance in other parts of the country. Of all unnecessary street noises there is none that is more absolutely uncalled for or inexcusable than that caused by open mufflers on motorcycles or motor cars.

Dear Sir—There is enclosed herewith for consideration of your Honorable Board a request for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$15,000 for the purpose of collecting, compiling and preserving the cost data of maintaining highways and the sewer system of this Borough.

The request is made pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of October 9, 1908, appointing committees to investigate the cost of maintaining the highway and sewer systems of the various Boroughs, and resolutions of January 22 and February 26, 1909, respectively, requesting the Presidents of the several Boroughs, provided their appropriations for the current year were not sufficient to meet the expense of collecting the data, to apply to the Board of Aldermen for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in a sum sufficient to cover the cost of so doing.

The Chief Engineer of Highways estimates the requirements for the work under his charge as follows:

One Assistant Engineer, at \$1,800 per annum; one Clerk, at \$1,200 per annum; one automobile, at \$1,800; storage, care and supplies, \$900 per annum; one Chauffeur, at \$1,200 per annum.

The estimate of the Chief Engineer of Sewers is as follows:

One Clerk, at \$1,200 per annum; two automobiles, at \$1,800 each, \$3,600; storage, care and supplies, at \$1,800 per annum; two Chauffeurs, at \$1,200 each, \$2,400 per annum.

Dear Sir—The Department submits, for the consideration of the Honorable Board of Aldermen, the renewal of the contract with Columbia University for the testing of electric meters for private consumers. \$1,500 has been provided in the Budget to meet the expense of testing electric meters. The form of contract is the same as in previous years, but the sanction and approval of the Board of Aldermen are required, as provided by section 419 of the Charter, to spend this money without advertising for competitive bids. The University has given satisfactory service in past years.

The Charter regulation provides that this Department shall test any electric meter against which a consumer has entered a complaint of over registration, and on the filing of the Department certificate of any excess in the registration of electric current the lighting companies make adjustment with the consumers.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—I respectfully request the authority of your Board to purchase coal without public letting during the year 1909, to an amount not to exceed \$5,000. In this connection, I desire to state that for each of the years 1905, 1906 and 1907 your Honorable Board authorized us to purchase coal without public letting for the use of our different Bureaus, to an amount not to exceed \$5,000, and for the year 1908, to an amount not to exceed \$7,500. Much of this coal is required for use on our steam road rollers, and at scattered points throughout the island, where from one to three tons at a time are required.

In all our coal purchases our custom is to secure bids in competition from several dealers and make the award to the one who can best meet the interests of the City by low prices, best quality and satisfactory delivery.

In connection with the work of our Bureau of Highways, we can only use coal in small quantities, requiring it to be delivered at many different points throughout the Borough, wherever the steam road rollers may be working. Consequently, we cannot secure reasonable prices for delivery to be made at indefinite points, but if permitted to purchase on open order, we can then lay from the nearest dealer, and secure the most favorable terms.

We also use a few hundred dollars worth of coal at scattered points throughout the Borough to heat our various field engineering offices, buying from one to three tons of coal at a time for each place.

The limit for the purchase of coal without public letting is placed at \$5,000 this year, instead of \$7,500, as allowed last year, for the reason that much of the coal for use in the Borough Hall we expect to purchase by public letting.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York and North Shore Traction Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embracing all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this _____ day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York and North Shore Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to

construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Borough of Queens, in the City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the proposed tracks of the Company to be constructed upon the route for which a franchise was granted by a contract dated February 1, 1909, on Chestnut street at Murray lane; thence northerly in and upon Murray lane to Higgins lane; thence easterly in and upon Higgins lane to a point where Ninth avenue is extended would intersect said Higgins lane; thence northerly through private property along the line of Ninth avenue to Fourth street; thence westerly in and upon Fourth street to Eighth avenue; thence northerly in and upon Eighth avenue to Twenty-first street; thence easterly in and upon Twenty-first street to Eleventh avenue; thence northerly in and upon Eleventh avenue to a point about 200 feet north of the north side line of the Boulevard in the former Village of Whitestone, all in the Borough of Queens.

One of the following alternative routes may be used in the place of and upon the abandonment of the portion of the route above described between the intersection of Chestnut street and Murray lane and the intersection of Fourth street and Eighth avenue:

(1) Beginning at and connecting with the proposed tracks of the Company to be constructed upon the route for which a franchise was granted by a contract dated February 1, 1909, in Chestnut street at Van Riper avenue, as called, thence northerly in and upon Van Riper avenue to and across Bayside avenue; thence northerly through private property to Higgins lane at a point between near the intersection of said Higgins lane with Seventh avenue; thence easterly in and upon Higgins lane from said point to Seventh avenue; thence northerly in and upon Seventh avenue to Eleventh street; thence easterly in and upon Eleventh street to Eighth avenue, and thence connecting with the route first herein described.

(2) Beginning and connecting with the proposed tracks of the Company to be constructed upon the route for which a franchise was granted by a contract dated February 1, 1909, in Chestnut street at Brewster avenue; thence in and upon Brewster avenue to and across Bayside avenue; thence northerly through private property to Higgins lane at a point between near the intersection of said Higgins lane with Seventh avenue; thence easterly in and upon Higgins lane from said point to Seventh avenue; thence northerly in and upon Seventh avenue to Fourth street; thence easterly in and upon Fourth street to Eighth avenue, and thence connecting with the route first herein described.

(3) Beginning and connecting with the proposed tracks of the Company to be constructed upon the route for which a franchise was granted by a contract dated February 1, 1909, in Chestnut street, at a point near the intersection of Chestnut avenue with Chestnut street; thence northerly upon private property, and crossing Bayside avenue; thence still upon private property, to Higgins lane, at a point between near the intersection of said Higgins lane with Seventh avenue; thence easterly in and upon Higgins lane from said point to Seventh street; thence easterly in and upon Seventh street to Eighth avenue, and thence connecting with the route first herein described.

The said routes, with switches and cross-overs, are shown upon a map attached.

—and signed by John L. Stanley, President, and Charles H. Clark, Consulting Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, it is to be deemed a part of this contract, it is to be construed with the terms thereof, and it is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional switches and cross-overs which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—It is agreed that the Company before commencing construction on any portion of the routes herein described from between Chestnut street and the intersection of Fourth street with Eighth avenue, shall notify the Board in writing which one of the three routes herein described between Chestnut street and the intersection of Fourth street with Eighth avenue the Company selects and adheres as the route upon which it shall construct the railway. Upon such notification by the Company to the Board all of the rights and privileges hereby granted upon the routes not so selected and designated shall be considered null and void of no effect, and the Company shall be deemed thereupon to have waived all rights or franchises which are hereby granted upon the routes not so selected and designated by the Company. The Company further agrees that it shall select and designate its route as herein provided not later than six months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

Second—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six (6) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Third—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until February 1, 1934, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year

before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board and one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Fourth—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sum of money:

(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within four (4) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than one thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,575), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,575).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than two thousand six hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,650), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand six hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,650).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,900).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than three thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,850), and which shall be equal to six (6) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,850).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than four thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,200), and which shall be equal to the (6) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,200).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross earnings of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to such gross earnings as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes, of whatever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fifth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewed, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, or any assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewed, or of any part thereof, or of any part of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege, upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues hereinbefore described.

The use of said railway which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or

any structure in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues hereinbefore described, for street railway purposes, for a distance not exceeding two thousand (2,000) feet, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall not exceed the legal interest on such portion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway as used. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest of the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to pay for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage of the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Seventh—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any way notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Eighth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the expiration of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall remain the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual. It is further, at the termination of this contract, as above, that the Board shall, by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Ninth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within six (6) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within eighteen (18) months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinbefore provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding, in the aggregate the months, each, and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company; and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other extension of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structure in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Twelfth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission in the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, at any time after the first ten (10) years of this contract, upon giving to the Company one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by any

other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and avenues of the City.

Thirteenth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway, and by the City as above.

Fourteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fifteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

The rate for the carrying of such property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Sixteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be wired for electricity, or by some lighting by resolution of the Board.

Nineteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board. Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Twentieth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be run, shall cause to be watered at least three times every twenty-four hours when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such watering at least one tank car the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the President of the Borough of Queens, enter into an agreement for each winter season or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-second—As long as the said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repair herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-third—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structure in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized, be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed, and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances, at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—Should, in the opinion of the President of the Borough of Queens, the present roadway of any of the said streets and avenues be of insufficient width to accommodate both railway and other vehicular traffic, the Company shall widen such roadway under the direction of the President of the Borough of Queens to a width sufficient to accommodate such traffic, provided that no roadway shall be widened beyond the total width of the street or avenue.

Twenty-sixth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner as directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time before or during construction of the railway the Board

should deem any of the streets and avenues on which said railway is to be constructed of insufficient width to accommodate both railway and other vehicular traffic, the Company shall either construct and operate its railway upon a private right of way outside of the lines of such streets, or avenues, or shall purchase and grade to the City a strip of land adjacent thereto, for the purpose of widening the same to a width sufficient for the use of a street surface railway and for the accommodation of other vehicular traffic. If such street or avenue is so widened the Company shall grade the roadway thereon as directed by the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of streets and avenues.

Twenty-eighth—Where the bridges, viaducts or culverts encountered in the route are of insufficient width to carry the roadway as the same may be widened as herein provided, or of insufficient strength to bear the additional load of a street surface railway, the Company shall either carry its tracks upon new structures independent of the existing ones, or as not to interfere with the present and future use by the City of such bridges, viaducts or culverts, or shall, without cost to the City, construct new bridges, viaducts or culverts sufficiently wide to carry the roadway as the same may be widened, as herein provided.

Provided, however, that the Company shall not be required to pay the portion of the cost of strengthening or rebuilding of the existing bridge across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad at Eighth Avenue, which the Long Island Railroad Company shall be required to pay, pursuant to law.

Twenty-ninth—The Company hereby agrees that if the City is or shall become entitled to acquire, and shall at any time during the term of this contract acquire, or otherwise come into possession of any of the property on which this Company shall construct railway tracks, on the route herein described, no compensation shall be awarded for the right to have railway tracks thereon.

Thirtieth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report, not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
 2. The amount paid in as by last report.
 3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
 4. The funded debt by last report.
 5. The total amount of funded debt.
 6. The floating debt as by last report.
 7. The total amount of floating debt.
 8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
 9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
 10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
 11. The total amount expended for same.
 12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
 13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
 14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
 15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
 16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
 17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
 18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.
- and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Thirty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Thirty-second—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a notice in writing by the Corporation Counsel, on a writ of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board to rescind the contract, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to answer before it on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirty-third—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Thirty-fourth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-fifth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to indemnify the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-sixth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with

the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or, after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or, in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each day that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to these matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its President, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in default, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any default made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-seventh—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become ineffective, shall be mailed by the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and where above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-eighth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, boulevards, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title," enumerated in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-ninth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, pertinent herein, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.
