Froceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 10 o'Clock A. M., on Thursday, August 5, 1915.

Present—George McAneny, Acting Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain; Henry H. Curran, Acting President, Board of Aldermen; and Frederick H. Stevenson, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

Dock Department—Lease of Ferry Franchise from City Island to Great Neck, L. I.

In the Matter of the Request of the Twin City Ferry Company for the Rescindment of the Action Taken in Authorizing the Lease of a Franchise for a Ferry from City Island to Great Neck, Long Island, to Wilbur F. Steele.

Considered at the last meeting and laid over in order that the views of the President of the Borough of The Bronx might be obtained.

President Mathewson, of the Borough of The Bronx, stated that he had looked into the matter very carefully and could see no objection whatever to the establishment of a ferry between the points mentioned and believed that the establishment of such

a ferry would be for the best interests of the City. He believed, however, that the resolution authorizing the lease should be amended so as to embody the following:

The lessee at all times to furnish and provide, maintain, keep and navigate such and so many good and substantial steam ferryboat or boats as shall be necessary for the operation of said ferry for vehicular and passenger traffic of all kinds customarily carried on ferryboats, the number of daily trips to be such as the Commissioner of Docks may approve at the expiration of one year from the commencement of operation, with the right to appeal to the Commissioners of he Sinking Fund; provided, that during that one year at least ten round trips per day for at least five months in the year be made. The lease to contain provisions as to when operation should be commenced and forfeiture if not complied with by May, 1916, and that no assignment of the lease shall be made with out consent; that the lessee shall furnish a bond to commence operation, etc." Discussion followed.

On motion of the Deputy Comptroller the application of the Twin City Ferry Company for a rescindment of the action taken in authorizing the lease was denied The Chamberlain moved for a reconsideration of the resolution authorizing the

On motion, the matter was referred back to the Commissioner of Docks, with instructions to confer with Deputy Comptroller Brough and recommend an amendment to the resolution authorizing the lease by incorporating the suggestions of President Mathewson.

A request was then made for further hearing.

Mr. F. W. Weeks, president of the Twin City Ferry Company; Mr. Wilbur F Steele, the proposed lessee; representatives of the City Island Board of Trade, and representatives from Great Neck, Long Island, were heard in regard to the matter. Discussion followed.

On motion, the hearing was adjourned, to be continued at ten o'clock in the forenoor, on Thursday, August 12th, 1915.

Dock Department-Lease of Ferry Franchise from City Island to Great

In the matter of the protest of the Twin City Ferry Co., against the leasing of this ferry, considered at the last two meetings and further hearing laid over to this meeting.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller reported that he made a personal investigation of the matter, and could see no objection to the ferry.

Mr. F. W. Weeks, Mr. Wilbur F. Steele, President Connolly of the Borough of Queens, and representatives of taxpayers and civic organizations were again heard.

Discussion followed. The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks as requested at the last meeting:

Pier A, North River, August 5, 1915. Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking

Fund: Dear Sir-At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held June 23, 1915, preambles and resolutions were adopted approving of and authorizing a lease to Wilbur F. Steele of a franchise to operate a ferry from and to a point at or near the foot of Main Street, City Island, Borough of The Bronx, to and from a point in the vicinity of Steamboat Dock, in the Town of North Hempstead, County of Nassau, and State of New York.

Certain modifications have been suggested in the resolutions, which have been accepted by Wilbur F. Steele, the proposed Lessee, and I therefore beg to recommend that the aforesaid preambles and resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be amended in the following particulars, viz:

Strike out

The time table shall be fixed by the Lessee so as to provide ample facilities or the accommodation of passengers and vehicles desiring to cross the waters between the above mentioned points.

And insert in lieu thereof, the following:

The number of daily trips to be made between said points shall be such as the Commissioner of Docks, with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, may prescribe at the expiration of one year from the commenceoperation of the said ferry; provided, however, at least ten (10) round trips daily shall be made for not less than five (5) months of the year for the first year of the lease and until the number of trips shall be prescribed by the Commissioner of Docks, with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as herein provided.

Strike out: "The lease to be for a term of two (2) years from July 1, 1915, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years."

nsert in lieu thereof: The lease to be for a term of two (2) years from the date of the commencenent of the operation of the ferry, with privilege of renewal for a further term

And in case the operation of the ferry in accordance with the provisions of the lease is not commenced on or before May 1, 1916, the lease shall be void and of no force or effect." Strike out

"The Lessee at his own proper cost and expense shall and will at all times during the said term, find, furnish and provide good and sufficient ferry boats licensed and approved by the Federal Government for the operation of said erry.

nsert in lieu thereof:

"The Lessee shall at all times during the continuance of the lease furnish and provide, maintain, keep and navigate such, and so many good and substantial steam ferry boat or boats as shall be necessary for the operation of said ferry for vehicular and passenger traffic customarily carried on ferry boats.

"The Lessee shall not, during the said term, transfer, assign or set over, let or underlet, or in any manner convey the lease or any part thereof, or any estate or interest therein, or any part thereof, without license or consent of the Commissioner of Docks." insert:

"The Lessee shall furnish a bond in a sum to be agreed upon by the Comproller and the Commissioner of Docks, with surety or sureties to be approved by the Comptroller, that he will commence the operation of the ferry in accordance with the provisions of the lease on or before May 1, 1916, and that he will faithfully perform all the covenants and conditions of the lease during the continuance thereof.'

Strike out the words: The lessee at his own proper cost and expense shall and will at all times during the said term, find, furnish and provide good and sufficient ferry boats licensed and approved by the Federal Government for the operation of said ferry.' Insert in lieu thereof the words:

'The lessee shall at all times during the continuance of the lease furnish and provide, maintain, keep and navigate such, and so many good and substantial steam ferry boat or boats as shall be necessary for the operation of said ferry for vehicular and passenger traffic customarily carried on ferry boats." Insert the words:

The lessee shall not during the said term, transfer, assign or set over, let or under-let, or in any manner convey the lease or any part thereof, or any estate or interest therein, or any part thereof, without license or consent of the Commissioner of Docks.' Insert the words:

"The lessee shall deposit with the Comptroiler of the City of New York the sum of \$2,500 as security, or at the option of the Comptroller give a bond satisfactory to him that he will commence the operation of the said ferry in accordance with the terms and conditions of the said lease on or before the first day of May, 1916, and that he will faithfully perform all the terms, covenants and conditions of the said lease during the said term, and in default thereof the said sum so deposited as security shall revert to and become the property of the City of New York.

"In the event that by the action of the courts or by the legally constituted authorities of Nassau County the lessee is prevented from carrying out the terms of the lease, then and in that event the Sinking Fund Commissioners may direct the return of the security deposited or waive the conditions of the bond given by said lessee.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited.
