Sanitation Commissioner Kathryn Garcia and Brooklyn Borough President Eric Adams unveil new haulster to clear snow from smaller streets in Brooklyn Community Board 14

New York City Department of Sanitation Commissioner Kathryn Garcia and Brooklyn Borough President Eric Adams will unveil the new haulster designed to salt, plow, and clear snow from smaller tertiary streets in Brooklyn Community Board 14, which is comprised of Midwood and Flatbush neighborhoods.

The new haulster purchased by Brooklyn Borough President Adams joins Sanitation's fleet of nearly 80 other haulsters used throughout the city during snowstorms. In the event of an impending snowstorm, haulsters and the larger salt spreaders are Sanitation's first line of defense and are deployed when snow accumulates a trace to two inches. Each haulster holds approximately 3.4 tons of salt, 40 gallons of calcium chloride which enhances the melting capability of the salt, and can carry a plow about 8.5 feet wide. The Brooklyn Community Board 14 haulster cost about \$164,000.
