




Homeless Living Unsheltered in NYC Continues to Decline

Phoenix	1,461,575	2,236	1 in 654
San Francisco	739,426	2,771	1 in 267

City of New York Homeless Encampments Initiative

- 13 City/State Agencies participated: Amtrak, DOB, CAU, FDNY, DOHMH, DHS, Law, Parks, NYPD, DSNY, MTA, NYC DOT & NYS DOT
- 70 encampments/ "hot spots" cleared
- 68 clients placed in transitional and/or permanent housing

Redesign of Street Outreach Services

Single point of accountability per borough

Manhattan: Goddard Riverside Community Center

Brooklyn/Queens: Common Ground Community

Bronx: Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB)

Staten Island: Project Hospitality

Subways: Bowery Residence Committee



Redesign of Street Outreach Services

- Consolidation of DOHMH and DHS street outreach contracts
- Performance-based contracts
- Evidence-based practices such as Housing First
- Citywide data collection and analysis featuring wireless handheld devices to access and input client information from the street
- Expansion of low-threshold housing options outside of shelter system targeting chronically homeless (Safe Haven and Stabilization beds)



Partnership with the MTA to Address Chronic Street Homelessness in Subways

- Create a more integrated system of outreach on the surface and in subways
- Coordinate data collection on the surface and in subways
- Create a Special Initiative targeting Penn Station, one of three highest density transit areas identified by HOPE 2007
- Provide technical assistance and access to housing and other resources in subways
- Identify additional opportunities for collaboration, including other partners and agencies
