



BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, April 4, 1877.

The Board of Education held a regular session on Wednesday, April 4, at the hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock, P. M.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Cohen, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Kelly, Place, Schell, Traud, Vanderpoel, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, Wheeler, and Wilkins—20.

Absent—Commissioner Kane—1.

The minutes of the last meeting were amended and approved.

Commissioner Kane was excused for absence.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of several wards:

From the Second, Fourth, Seventh, Eighth, Tenth, Twelfth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-first Wards, asking to excuse the absence of teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

Also, from the Twelfth Ward, to pay a teacher. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Seventh and Twenty-fourth Wards, relative to repairs, etc., on school buildings. Referred to the Committee on Buildings, School Furniture, and Warming and Ventilation.

From the Twelfth Ward, asking for an appropriation of \$140 to pay for wardrobes in Grammar School No. 37. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Twentieth Ward, asking for blackboards in Primary Department, Grammar School No. 48. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

Also, for seats in Grammar School No. 33. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

Also, nominating a Teacher of Music in Evening School No. 32. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Twenty-first Ward, relative to a bill of Taylor & Dupuy, for work on pianos. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections and Qualifications.

From the Twenty-third Ward, making the award of contracts for altering and enlarging Grammar School No. 62, and asking for \$29,205.37 for said purpose. Referred to the Finance Committee.

To pay bill of S. A. Suydam for painting roofs, etc., of school buildings in the Ninth Ward, amounting to \$197. Adopted.

To appropriate \$4,545.34 to pay sundry bills of the year 1876, in excess of the amounts appropriated. Adopted.

To appropriate \$4,421 for altering and repairing Primary School No. 18 in the Ninth Ward. Adopted.

To appropriate \$140 to pay the bill of Nathaniel Johnson for furniture for Grammar School No. 45. Adopted.

To appropriate \$475 for desks for Grammar Schools Nos. 18 and 59 in the Nineteenth Ward. Adopted.

President Wood called Commissioner Beardslee to the chair, and offered a preamble and resolution relative to the finances of the Board, and the payment of teachers' salaries. Laid on the table and printed.

Commissioner Goulding offered a resolution calling on the Committee on Teachers for a report at the next meeting. Which was adopted.

Commissioner Walker asked to be excused from service on the Committee on School Furniture and Commissioner Vanderpoel was appointed in his place.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

SEALED PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THESE materials, indorsed with proper title, and addressed "SALEM H. WALES, President of the Department of Docks," will be received at this office, until 12 o'clock M.,

MONDAY, APRIL 22, 1877,

at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the head of said Department and read. The award of the contract or contracts will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

THE ENGINEER'S ESTIMATE OF THE QUANTITIES TO BE FURNISHED IS AS FOLLOWS:

Class 1.—Small Cobble and Rip-rap Stone for Bulkhead or River Wall, to be deposited in place by Contractor.

A—About 16,000 cubic yards of Small Cobble Stone.

B— " 23,000 " Rip-rap Stone.

Class 2.—Broken Stone for Concrete.

About 3,200 cubic yards of Broken Stone.

Class 3.—Sand.

About 1,800 cubic yards of Sand.

Proposals may be made for one or more of the above classes.

The above material to be furnished in accordance with specifications and to be delivered as called for by orders from the Engineer-in-Chief.

The small cobble and rip-rap stone for the bulkhead or river wall, is to be delivered and properly deposited around and between the piles, and in front of and rear of the work. The small cobble only is to be placed between the piles, and the rip-rap is to be placed in front and rear of the foundation, and is to be properly mixed with small cobble.

The broken stone and sand are to be delivered and unloaded upon the scows of the Department or upon piers or bulkheads, at any point along the North river water front, south of Fourteenth street, as shall be designated, from time to time, by the Engineer.

All material will be measured, in bulk, on board the vessels, at the place of delivery.

The foregoing are the quantities which have been estimated approximately for the construction of that part of the bulkhead or river wall proposed to be completed during the present calendar year. They form, however, no part of the contract, and persons bidding are cautioned that the Department of Docks do not hold themselves responsible that any of them shall strictly obtain in the construction of the work, and reserve the right to terminate the contract at any time after the delivery of the following quantities, to wit:

Class 1. A—5,000 cubic yards.

B—5,000 cubic yards.

Class 2. 1,500 cubic yards.

Class 3. 1,000 cubic yards.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and shall give security for the faithful performance of his contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of ten thousand dollars, in case the whole contract shall be awarded to him; or in the sum of eight

thousand dollars for the contract for small cobble and rip-rap stone only, or in the sum of two thousand dollars for the contract for broken stone only; or in the sum of five hundred dollars for the contract for sand only.

This contract is to cease and terminate on the 27th day of December, 1877, and a penalty of fifty dollars per day, as liquidated damages, will be exacted for each day that the delivery of

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE HEARD here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No notice is given to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquent.

All good citizens will aid the cause of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absences, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer or it is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
