AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Munutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, February 17, 1886, at 3 o'clock, P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works; Commis-sioners Spencer, Dowd and Baldwin. Also Chief Engineer Church; and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works. The minutes of stated meeting of February 10, were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers 1477 to 1499; and on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the said vouchers were approved by the Commissioners and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment. Commissioner Spencer, as Chairman of the Committee on Construction, offered the following resolution :

Commissioner Spencer, as Charman of the Committee on Construction, onered the following resolution : Resolved, That that part of the New Croton Aqueduct, from the easterly side of the Harlem river, commencing at about Station 1490-463 of the survey of the route of said Aqueduct, and extending across and beneath the Harlem river to Tenth avenue ; thence southwardly to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street; comprising Sections 12, 13 and 14 of said Aqueduct; and also the extension of said Aqueduct from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street southwardly to the central Park, either by conduit or pipe-line, is hereby designated "Engineering Division No. 7," and the Chief-Engineer is directed to place the work upon said division in charge of Division Engineer, Edward Wegman, Jr., who has been doing the preliminary work upon said division, in pursuance of the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, approved by the Commissioners, December 3, 1884. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

APPROVED PAPERS.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows : Section 1. All power and authority possessed or exercised by or vested in the "Bureau of Permits" on the 29th day of January, 1886, in granting or issuing permits or licenses for dogs, gutter-bridges or hoistways, and all power and authority possessed or exercised by or vested in the Mayor of said city on said day to grant or issue licenses, except in cases where, by the statute of this State, such licenses are required to be granted or issued by the said Mayor, are hereby vested in a bureau of licenses. Said clerks and subordinates shall be appointed by and shall be removable at the pleasure of the said Mayor, and subject to the appropriation for said bureau shall respectively, receive such compensation as shall, from time to time, be fixed and stabilished by said Mayor. Sec. 3. The power and authority hereby vested in the said Bureau of Licenses shall be exercised by them subject to the control and direction of the said Mayor. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 2, 1886.

The public has already manifested a just sense of the magnitude of the loss it has sustained. He possessed the power and the wisdom that coupled science with the daily avocations of men; the philosophy that encompassed mankind; the religion that excluded none from its peaceful fold. He was tireless in the pursuit of truth; humble in the practice of every virtue, and stern and unyielding in the dispensation of their incorrable laws, sensitive and tender as a child, yet his simplicity of manner and public life; a guide to the most experienced in the affairs of state, a counsellor to the most wise; a shining example to the most upright and conscientious. A philosopher, a statesman, a sage, the characteristies of them all were solbended in him that he was the most versatile and brilliant public man of the age in which he lived. His death is an irreparable loss to his country, and par-ticularly so to the great Democratic party, that in the gravest emergences was guided and controlled by his coursel and advice, and of which he was an acknowledged leader. Resolved, That in the general gloom and poignant grief for the death of theratio Seymour, his surviving family should not be overlooked, and we hereby tender to them in their sore bereavement our most sincere commiseration. Resolved, That the foregoing preamble and resolutions be entered at length in the minutes, and that a copy thereot be suitably engrossed, be verified by the corporate seal of the city, attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and affection of the people and government of this city for his memory. Resolved, That, as an additional mark of our respect for the memory of Horatio Seymour, this Board do now adjourr.
