DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, December 13, 1894, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Cram.
" Commissioner Phelan.
" White.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 6th instant were read and approved.
H. Maitland Kersey, Agent of the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, submitted an application for a ten years' lease of two new piers when built north of Pier, new 47, North river.
Daniel Lord, Attorney, was present on behalf of the Cunard Steamship Company (Limited), and requested a lease of two new piers next north of those applied for by the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, and upon similar terms and conditions.
On motion, both applications were referred to Commissioners White and Phelan.
M. E. Staples, Agent of the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company, appeared and requested a lease of the bulkhead, when built, between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river. He was notified to submit a written application for said lease.
Cecil Campbell Higgins, Attorney for Hopper S. & Alexander H. Mott, appeared and requested that the time for the commencement of the lease of the bulkhead between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, be fixed at February 1, 1894; he also requested a permit for the shed and tracks on said bulkhead in accordance with the terms of the agreement dated September 18, 1891.
On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, On the 18th day of September, 1891, an agreement was entered into between Hopper S. & Alexander H. Mott, and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, by the terms of which, it was agreed that a permit should be granted them to construct a shed on the bulkhead between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, upon the usual terms and conditions, and for the approach to said bulkhead by a flat rail track across the bulkhead to Twelfth avenue or other property in front of the property owned by the said Hopper S. & Alexander H. Mott.
Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Hopper S. & Alexander H. Mott to construct a shed on the bulkhead between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, extending in-shore a distance of fifty feet from said bulkhead, in accordance with the statutes in such cases made and provided, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by this Board; said shed to be erected under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief

of this Department, and to revert to and become the property of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said bulkhead, or any renewal thereof, free from all claims of every kind whatsoever.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Hopper S. & Alexander H. Mott to place a flat rail track across the bulkhead between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, to Twelfth avenue or other property in front of the property owned by said Messrs. Mott; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

Resolved, That the time for the commencement of the lease of the bulkhead between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river, to Hopper S. & Alexander H. Mott, be and hereby is fixed at February 1, 1895.

Henry C. Rogers was present in response to the order of the 28th ultimo, respecting the illegal use of the Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street.

On motion, the matter was postponed one week.

A representative of the estate of Thomas F. Nunan was present and requested an extension of time for the completion of deliveries under Class 3, Contract No. 469.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the deliveries of tools under Class 3 of Contract No. 469, Thomas F. Nunan, contractor, be and hereby is extended to December 17, 1894, provided the written consent of the sureties is filed in this office.

The application of the Cunard Steamship Company (Limited), for permission to occupy the platform north of Pier, new 40, North river, was tabled for one month.

The application of Peene Brothers for a lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 24 and 25, North river, was tabled for six months.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

Old Dominion Steamship Company—Requesting a berth at Pier, new 43, North river, during the ensuing year.

James B. Lyon and T. P. Sullivan—Offering to furnish legislative bills during the ensuing session of the Legislature.

The application of M. Goodwin for a lease of a portion of the Pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street, submitted on the 28th ultimo, was denied.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Clara Poillon—To drive about eight fender-piles in front of property owned by her, east side of Mott Haven Canal, south of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

Atlantic Dredging Company—To dredge the slip foot of East Ninth street.

H. E. Nesmith, Jr.—To drive piles at Pier 9, East river.

Thursday, December 20, 1894, at 11 o'clock A.M., and show cause why his permit should not be revoked.

5th. Reporting repairs required to the Piers foot of Fifty-second, Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh

streets, North river; and Pier 55, Pier 56, and Pier foot of Seventy-ninth street, East river: also repairs required to the pavement between Pier "A" and Pier, new 1, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted the following reports on Secretary's orders:
No. 13536. Recommending that the lessee be directed to clean and make additional repairs to the Pier foot of Little West Twelfth street. Recommendation adopted.

Nos. 13866 and 13880. Recommending that the owners and lessees be directed to make additional repairs to the Pier foot of Jane street and the bulkhead between Jane and Horatio streets, North river. Recommendation adopted.

No. 14278. Submitting plans, specifications and form of contract for repairing the Pier foot of West Fifty-fifth street. Approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary directed to advertise for estimates.

No. 13596. As to the cost of removing ferry-rack at north side of slip foot of West Twenty-third street and replacing and extending same. The Treasurer authorized to collect from the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad Company.

No. 14423. As to the cost of repairs to the Pier at West Fifty-first street. The Treasurer authorized to collect from G. W. Plunkitt and Smith, lessees.

Nos. 14387, 14389, 14390, 14391, 14392, 14393, 14394, 14395, 14396 and 14397. Submitting three copies of maps of the following premises for use in condemnation proceedings, viz.: Pier, old 12; between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets; between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth streets; between Forty-first and Forty-second streets; between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets; between West Eleventh and Bank streets; between Bank and Bethune streets, North river; between Pike and Rutgers streets, East river; West street, 100 feet south of Perry street; and between One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Fifth streets, Harlem river. Transmit said maps to the Counsel to the Corporation.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been done by the force of the Department, under Secretary's orders:

No. 14259. Completed the building of lunch-room on Pier "A."

No. 14301. Repaired roof of shed on Pier, new 43, North river.

No. 14318. Repaired dock east side of Blackwell's Island, near Metropolitan Hospital.

No. 14344. Repaired and cleaned the approach to Pier at Twenty-eighth street, East river.

No. 14362. Repaired sheathing deck of Pier, new 32, East river.

No. 14378. Raised backing-log and repaired pavement on bulkhead foot of Corlears street.

No. 14384. Repaired sheathing deck of Pier at East Eighteenth street.

No. 14402. Repaired flooring entrance room Pier "A."

No. 14403. Made accommodations for landing propeller "Mermaid" at Ward's Island dock.

No. 14436. Furnished stove for Dock Master's office, Pier, new 43, North river.

No. 14438. Repaired outer end of Pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street.

No. 14439. Repaired sheathing deck of Pier foot of Fifth street, North river.

No. 14463. Repaired sheathing on Pier at Twenty-eighth street, East river.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been superintended under Secretary's orders:

No. 12623. Removal of cable-box at Pier, new 15, North river, to a place near the outer end of said pier.

No. 14026. Filling-in and grading the new-made land in front of Pier, new 57, North river.

No. 14153. Repairs on north and south sides Pier 4, North river.

No. 14172. Repairs to ferry-racks, Fulton ferry, East river.

No. 14307. Replacing broken spring piles, Pier, new 36, North river.

No. 14372. Placing watchman's shanty inner end of Pier foot of Eighteenth street, East river.

No. 14403. Dredging at landing place, Ward's Island, under Contract No. 477.

No. 14405. Placing brick on the bulkhead between West Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, by Candee & Smith.

No. 14416. Erection of coal-bins on Pier foot of Third street, East river.

No. 14421. Placing watchman's office on bulkhead near end of Pier 62, East river.

No. 14425. The construction of a temporary driveway at inshore end northerly side of Pier, new 13, North river.

No. 14432. Dredging at dumping-board foot of East Eightieth street, under Contract No. 477.

No. 14433. Dredging at dump foot of Canal street, under Contract No. 474.

No. 14434. Dredging at dumping-board foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, under Contract No. 478.

No. 14456. Placing tally-house on Pier 14, East river.

No. 14459. Sheathing easterly half Pier 12, East river.

No. 14464. Repairs outer end of ferry-rack northerly side of Pier, new 15, North river.

No. 14467. Driving and fastening fender-piles on bulkhead foot of Forty-seventh street, East river.

No. 14483. An exhibition with a hand fire extinguisher on the new-made land between Piers, new 42 and 43, North river.

The Engineer-in-Chief returned Secretary's Orders Nos. 13670, 13685 and 14359.

On motion, Thomas J. Brooks was directed to appear before the Board Thursday, December 20, 1894, at 11 o'clock A. M. and show cause why a penalty should not be imposed for piling sand on the bulkhead between Fifth and Fifty-first streets, North river.

The matter of cleaning the new-made land in front of leased piers and bulkheads was referred to the Treasurer to examine and report.



The 680 deaths represent a death-rate of 17.85, against 18.21 for the previous week and 10.86 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 186, 75, 76, 16 and 11, against 183, 47, 90, 26 and 13 for the previous week, a total of 364 against 359. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh, Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Thirteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Thirteenth, Seventeenth and Twentieth Wards, and the decrease in the Sixteenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twenty-second Ward, and the decrease in the Tenth and Sixteenth Wards. Nine of the 16 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 4 of the remaining 7 were below Fourteenth street. Six of the 11 cases of small-pox were between Fourteenth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, and the others were scattered.

DEAR SIR—Referring to my application for a settlement of the amount due me for the lockers and work done upon the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, I beg leave to say that I regret the unpleasantness that occurred at one of the meetings of the Board, when statements were made by my son in the heat of the moment, without consideration and which were totally unfounded in regard to your position in the matter, and I trust you will excuse them. There was no foundation whatever for any such statement as was made. I am informed that the protest made by the Colonel of the Regiment against the acceptance of the lockers on the ground of quality has been withdrawn by him, a careful examination having been made of each lock. The condition that he insists upon, that the locks shall be so altered that there will be a master key for each set—that is, for each separate room—and that this master key shall not open the locks in any other room, I am willing to comply with for the sake of a settlement. I have an estimate of the cost of such a change, and have learned that the expense will be about \$320, and I therefore make the offer to comply with this condition to the full satisfaction of the Colonel of the Regiment, provided the Armory Board will audit and settle my bill, as presented, when the work is completed.

I request that I may have as immediate an answer as possible in order that I may have the work completed.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be hereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

THOMAS STREET—SEWER, between Hudson and Church streets. Area of assessment: Both sides of Reade, Duane and Thomas streets, from Broadway to West Broadway; west side of Broadway, from Chambers to Thomas street; both sides of Church street and West Broadway, from Chambers to Thomas street.

WASHINGTON STREET—SEWER, between North Moore and Franklin streets. Area of assessment: Both sides of Washington street, between North Moore and Franklin streets.

SIXTH WARD.

PEARL STREET—BASIN, southwest corner of Park Row. Area of assessment: Park Row, west side, from Pearl to Duane street.

SEVENTH WARD.

MADISON STREET, BASINS, northeast and northwest corners of Clinton street; also, BASIN on the northwest corner of Monroe and Jefferson streets. Area of assessment: Both sides of Clinton street, from Madison to Henry street; also block bounded by Madison and Henry streets, Clinton and Montgomery streets, and block bounded by Madison and Monroe streets, Jefferson and Rutgers streets.

MADISON STREET—BASINS, northeast and northwest corners of Pike street. Area of assessment: Block bounded by Pike and Birmingham streets, Madison and Henry streets; also south side of Henry street, commencing about 143 feet east of Pike street, to Pike street, and east side of Pike street, from Madison to Henry street.

WATER STREET—BASINS, northeast and northwest corners of Rutgers street; also basin on the northwest corner of Cherry and Pelham streets. ELEVENTH WARD.

STANTON STREET—BASINS, on the northwest and southwest corners of Goerck street. ELEVENTH AVENUE—SEWER, east side between One Hundred and Seventieth and One Hundred and Seventy-second streets. Area of assessment: East side of Eleventh avenue, between One Hundred and Seventieth and One Hundred and Seventy-second streets.

MADISON AVENUE—FENCING, east side, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets. Area of assessment: East side of Madison avenue, extending about 100 feet south of One Hundred and Seventh street.

MANHATTAN STREET—PAVING, from Twelfth avenue to the Hudson river. Area of assessment: Both sides of Manhattan street, from Twelfth avenue to the Hudson River Railroad and to the extent of half the block on Twelfth avenue, at the intersection.

MANHATTAN STREET—FLAGGING, both sides, from Columbus avenue to the Boulevard. Area of assessment: Both sides of Manhattan street, from Columbus avenue to the Boulevard.

NINETY-FIFTH STREET—FLAGGING AND CURBING SIDEWALK, south side, commencing about 150 feet west of Columbus avenue and extending westerly about 50 feet. Area of assessment: South side of Ninety-fifth street, between Columbus and Amsterdam avenues, on Ward Nos. 39 and 40 of Block 1021.

NINETY-SEVENTH STREET—PAVING, from West End avenue to Riverside Park. Area of assessment: Both sides of Ninety-seventh street, from West End avenue to Riverside Drive, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

NINETY-NINTH STREET—PAVING, from the Boulevard to West End avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of Ninety-ninth street, from Boulevard to West End avenue, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

NINETY-NINTH STREET—PAVING, between Park and Third avenues, and laying crosswalks. Area of assessment: Both sides of Ninety-ninth street, from Third avenue to Fourth avenue, and to the extent of half the block on the intersecting and terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRETH STREET—SEWER, between Park and Third avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundredth street, from Park avenue to Lexington avenue, and east side of Park avenue, from Ninety-ninth street to One Hundredth street.

ONE HUNDRETH STREET—SEWER, between the Boulevard and Amsterdam avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundredth street, from the Boulevard to Amsterdam avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND FIRST STREET—PAVING, from Madison avenue to Park avenue, and laying crosswalks. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and First street, between Madison and Park avenues, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND FIRST STREET—SEWER, between Harlem river and First avenue. Area

of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and First street, from Harlem river to First avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRD AND ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTH STREETS—FLAGGING, both sides, from Boulevard to Riverside Drive; also flagging the west side of the Boulevard, from One Hundred and Third street to One Hundred and Fourth street. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets, from Boulevard to West End avenue, and north side of One Hundred and Third street, from West End avenue to Riverside Drive, and west side of Boulevard, from One Hundred and Third to One Hundred and Fourth street.

ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTH STREET—FENCING, south side, beginning at First avenue and extending 100 feet west; also on the west side of First avenue, beginning at One Hundred and Fourth street and extending 100 feet south. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Fourth street, extending from First avenue 100 feet westerly; also west side of First avenue, running southerly 100 feet from the corner of One Hundred and Fourth street.

ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTH STREET—FENCING, commencing 125 feet west of Columbus avenue, and extending westerly about 100 feet. Area of assessment: Ward Nos. 24, 25 and 26½ of Block 1031, on north side of One Hundred and Fourth street.

ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTH STREET—FLAGGING, south side, between Central Park, West, and Manhattan avenue. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Fourth street, extending easterly 175 feet from the corner of Manhattan avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTH STREET—FLAGGING AND CURBING, north side, between Madison and Fifth avenues. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Fifth street, between Madison and Fifth avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTH STREET—FLAGGING, north side, between Amsterdam and Columbus avenues. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Sixth street, between Amsterdam and Columbus avenues, on Ward Nos. 1, 8½, 9, 24 and 25.

ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTH STREET—FENCING, south side, between Park and Madison avenues. Area of assessment: South of One Hundred and Seventh street, commencing at Madison avenue and extending easterly about 300 feet.

ONE HUNDRED AND NINTH STREET—FENCING, north side, between Fifth and Madison avenues. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Ninth street, between Fifth and Madison avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND TENTH STREET—FENCING, south side, between Fifth and Madison avenues. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Tenth street, east of Fifth avenue, on Ward Nos. 66 and 67.

ONE HUNDRED AND ELEVENTH STREET—FLAGGING AND CURBING, south side, between Seventh and Eighth avenues. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Eleventh street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTEENTH STREET—PAVING, with asphalt, between Seventh and Eighth avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTEENTH STREET—FLAGGING AND CURBING, from Boulevard to Riverside Drive. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, from Boulevard to Riverside Drive.

ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTEENTH STREET—PAVING with asphalt, between Lenox and St. Nicholas avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, between Lenox and St. Nicholas avenues, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTIETH STREET—BASIN, southeast corner of Seventh avenue. Area of assessment: East side of Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets.

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SECOND STREET—FLAGGING AND CURBING, north side, in front of street number 171. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Twenty-second street, between Third and Lexington avenues, on Ward No. 28A of Block 473.

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-THIRD STREET—FENCING, south side, between First and Pleasant avenues. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, between First and Pleasant avenues, on Ward No. 35 of Block 152.

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-EIGHTH STREET—FLAGGING, south side, between Seventh and Eighth avenues. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, on Ward Nos. 47 and 48.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTIETH STREET—SEWER, between Eighth and St. Nicholas avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, extending from Eighth avenue about 125 feet westerly.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIRST STREET—SEWER, between Amsterdam and Convent avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, between Amsterdam and Convent avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-THIRD AND ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FOURTH STREETS—BASINS, northeast and southeast corners of Lenox avenue. Area of assessment: East side of Lenox avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-third to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, and north side of One Hundred and Thirty-third street, extending about 145 feet east of Lenox avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FOURTH STREET—BASIN, northwest corner of Lenox avenue. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from Lenox to Seventh avenue, and east side of Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-fourth to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIFTH STREET—FENCING, north and south sides, between Lenox and Seventh avenues. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Lenox and Seventh avenues, on Ward Nos. 10 to 14, both inclusive, of Block 722.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SIXTH STREET—REGULATING, GRADING, CURBING AND FLAGGING, between Amsterdam and Convent avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between Amsterdam and Convent avenues, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SIXTH STREET—BASIN, northeast corner of Seventh avenue. Area of assessment: East side of Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SIXTH STREET—BASINS, northwest and southwest corners of Madison avenue, and on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and Madison avenue. Area of assessment: Blocks bounded by One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, Fifth and Madison avenues, excepting the north side of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Fifth and Madison avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SEVENTH STREET—FLAGGING AND CURBING, south side, between Lenox and Seventh avenues. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, between Lenox and Seventh avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-THIRD STREET—REGULATING, GRADING, CURBING AND FLAGGING, from Boulevard to Hudson River Railroad. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Forty-third street, from Boulevard to Hudson River Railroad.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-SIXTH STREET—SEWER, between Seventh and Eighth avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-SEVENTH STREET—REGULATING, GRADING, CURBING and FLAGGING, from a point 500 feet west of the Boulevard to the Hudson River Railroad tracks. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, from the Boulevard to the Hudson River Railroad tracks.

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTIETH STREET—SEWER, between Eleventh and Amsterdam avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Sixtieth street, between Eleventh and Amsterdam avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SIXTH STREET—REGULATING, GRADING, CURBING and FLAGGING, between Tenth and Edgecombe avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, between Tenth and Edgecombe avenues, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SEVENTH STREET—OUTLET SEWER for Sewerage District No. 25. Area of assessment: Property bounded by One Hundred and Sixty-second and One Hundred and Seventy-third streets, Kingsbridge road and Harlem river, including south side of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Edgecombe road and Kingsbridge road; also, both sides of Jumel terrace, from Sylvan place to One Hundred and Sixty-second street; also, west side of Kingsbridge road, from One Hundred and Sixty-second to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

ST. NICHOLAS AVENUE AND ST. NICHOLAS PLACE—CROSSWALKS at the north and south sides of One Hundred and Fifty-second street. SECOND AVENUE—FLAGGING and CURBING, east side, between One Hundred and Twenty-third and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets. Area of assessment: East side of Second avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-third and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets.

FOURTEENTH WARD.

MOTT STREET—BASINS, northeast and northwest corners of Spring street. Area of assessment: Both sides of Mott street, from Spring street to Prince street.

MOTT STREET—BASIN, northwest corner of Broome street; also BASIN on the northeast corner of Prince and Crosby streets. BROADWAY—FLAGGING in front of Street No. 751. Area of assessment: Street No. 751, known as Ward No. 1886.

GREENE STREET—SEWER, between West Third and West Fourth streets. Area of assessment: Both sides of Greene street, between West Third and West Fourth streets.

NINETEENTH WARD.

"A" AVENUE—CROSSWALKS, at Seventy-third street. Area of assessment: Extending half the block from the southerly intersection of Avenue A and Seventy-third street.

FIFTIETH STREET—CROSSWALKS, east and west sides of Beekman place. Area of assessment: Extending half the block from the easterly and westerly intersections of Fiftieth street and Beekman place.

FIFTY-SIXTH STREET—FLAGGING, in front of Street Nos. 239 to 245. Area of assessment: Ward Nos. 17, 18, 19 and 20, on Block 260.

SIXTY-SECOND STREET—SEWER, between First avenue and Avenue A. Area of assessment: Both sides of Sixty-second street, from Avenue A to First avenue.

SEVENTY-NINTH STREET—BASIN, northwest corner of Avenue B. Area of assessment: Block bounded by Seventy-ninth and Eightieth streets, Avenues A and B.

TWENTIETH WARD.

BROADWAY—FLAGGING, in front of Nos. 1345 and 1347. Area of assessment: Lot Nos. 42 and 43 on Block 811, Section 3.

TWENTY-EIGHTH STREET—FLAGGING, in front of Nos. 136 and 138 West Twenty-eighth street. Area of assessment: Lot Nos. 60 and 61, on Block 803, Section 3.

THIRTIETH STREET—SEWER, IMPROVEMENTS at Eleventh avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of Thirtieth street, from Tenth to Eleventh avenue; both sides of Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, from Ninth to Eleventh avenue; both sides of Thirty-third street, commencing about 350 feet westerly from Ninth avenue to Eleventh avenue; south side of Thirty-fourth street, extending about 300 feet easterly from Tenth avenue; west side of Ninth avenue, from Thirty-first to Thirty-second street; both sides of Tenth avenue and Eleventh avenue, from Thirtieth to Thirty-fourth street, and west side of Eleventh avenue, extending about 50 feet south of Thirtieth street.

TWENTY-SECOND WARD.

EIGHTY-FIFTH STREET—BASIN, southeast corner of Amsterdam avenue. Area of assessment: South side of Eighty-fifth street, between Columbus and Amsterdam avenues.

ELEVENTH AVENUE—FLAGGING and CURBING, west side, between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets. Area of assessment: West side of Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets.

FORTY-SECOND STREET—PAVING, between Eleventh avenue and the Hudson river, so far as the same is within the limits of grants of land under water. SIXTY-THIRD STREET—FLAGGING and CURBING, south side, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues. Area of assessment: South side of Sixty-third street, between Tenth (Amsterdam) and Eleventh avenues.

SEVENTY-FOURTH STREET—SEWER, between Riverside Drive and West End avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of Seventy-fourth street, between Riverside Drive and West End avenue.

SEVENTY-FIFTH STREET—PAVING, with asphalt, between West End avenue and Riverside Drive. Area of assessment: Both sides of Seventy-fifth street, between West End avenue and Riverside Drive, and to the extent of half the block on the intersecting or terminating avenues.

TWELFTH AVENUE—SEWER, east side, between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, and improvement to sewer in Fifty-fifth street, between Eleventh and

Twelfth avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of Fifty-fifth street, from Ninth to Twelfth avenue; east side of Twelfth avenue, from Fifty-fifth to Fifty-sixth street; south side of Fifty-sixth street, from Ninth to Tenth avenue; north side of Fifty-fourth street, from Tenth to Eleventh avenue; both sides of Eleventh avenue, from Fifty-fourth to Fifty-sixth street; both sides of Tenth avenue, from Fifty-fourth to Fifty-sixth street; west side of Ninth avenue, from Fifty-fifth to Fifty-sixth street.

WEST END AVENUE—FENCING, west side, between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets. Area of assessment: West side of West End avenue, between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets.

WEST END AVENUE—FLAGGING and CURBING, west side of West End avenue, from Sixty-ninth to Seventy-first street, and on the east side of West End avenue, from Sixty-ninth to Seventieth street, and on the north side of Seventieth street, from West End avenue to wall, and on the south side of Seventieth street, commencing at West End avenue and extending about 175 feet. Area of assessment: West side of West End avenue, between Sixty-ninth and Seventy-first streets; east side of West End avenue, between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets, and both sides of Seventieth street, extending about 100 feet west of West End avenue.

TWENTY-THIRD WARD.

CHISHOLM STREET—REGULATING, GRADING, CURBING and FLAGGING, from Jennings street to Stebbins avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of Chisholm street, from Jennings street to Stebbins avenue, and to the extent of half the block on the intersecting street and the terminating street and avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FOURTH STREET—PAVING, CURBING, FLAGGING and LAYING CROSSWALKS, between Alexander and Brook avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Alexander and Brook avenues, and to the extent of half the block on the intersecting and terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-NINTH STREET—PAVING, between Brook and St. Ann's avenues. Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between Brook and St. Ann's avenues, and to the extent of half the block on the terminating avenues.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FOURTH STREET—BASIN, north side, opposite Rider avenue. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, from Railroad avenue, East, to Morris avenue, and west side of Morris avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-fourth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FOURTH STREET—BASIN, south side, opposite Spencer place. Area of assessment: South side of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, from the line of the New York and Harlem Railroad to Mott avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FOURTH STREET—BASIN, northwest corner of Spence place. Area of assessment: North side of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, from Mott avenue to Spencer place; west side of Spencer place, from One Hundred and Forty-fourth to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and south side of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from Spencer place to Mott avenue.

ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-SIXTH STREET—REGULATING, GRADING, CURBING, FLAGGING and LAYING CROSSWALKS between Third avenue and Railroad avenue, East.
