Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Synopsis of Proceedings, July 15, 1912. A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Monday, May 20, 1912, at 3.30 p. m.

Present: Dr. Brannan, the President in the chair; Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe and Paulding, Trustees; and Mr. Drummond. Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused: Messrs. Robbins. Sachs and Stern.

The minutes of the meeting of April 2, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read, and approved. Bills, amounting to \$46,216.20, were approved, for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: On May 8th Dr. W. L. Howell was sent to the Minturn Hospital, suffering from

diphtheria. Miss Wadley would like to attend the meeting of the Social Service Workers in Cleveland, on June 12, and expresses her willingness to represent Bellevue Hospital at this conference if her necessary expenses, about \$50, can be met by the

Board. A request has been received from Dr. Huddleston, Director of the Tuberculosis Clinics at Gouverneur Hospital, that the boat "Westfield" be formally closed from 6 to 9 p. m., daily, and that during those hours no patients be permitted aboard, the care of the camp to be entrusted to the watchman during this time.

The installation of machinery in the new laundry is rapidly approaching completion, and it is very probable that the building can be occupied within the next few weeks. In view of the fact that the equipment represents an expenditure of about \$62,000, much of the machinery being somewhat complicated, it would seem adopted, and it was resolved not to make the minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on May 1 were presented. Action was taken upon the report as follows:

The transfer of Dr. Howell to the Minturn Hospital was approved.

It was resolved to inform Miss Wadley that the Trustees would be glad to have her represent the hospital at the conference, but that her expenses could not be paid by the City.

It was resolved to approve of the closing of the day camp "Westfield" between the hours of 6 and 9 p. m., daily.

It was resolved to ask for revenue bonds to pay the salary of a Laundry Manager at the rate of \$1,200 per annum for the remainder of the present year.

The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of changes in the help at Bellevue Hospital for the two weeks ending May 4 and 11, and as these had already been reviewed by the Committee on Officers and Employees, they were ap-

Reports of Committees. The President recommended that action be deferred upon the resolution adopted at last meeting that separate accommodations be provided for typhoid patients, and that steam sterilizers should not be installed as decided upon at last meeting. This report was adopted, and upon the further recommendation of the President, it was resolved to request the veiws of the Medical Board on the desirability of directing that physicians, nurses and others in attendance upon typhoid patients, should be vaccinated.

The special committee appointed at last meeting to consider the recommendation that a separate dispensary and dormitory

ment, but to authorize the President to confer informally with the Comptroller in regard to the acquisition of a suitable site. The committee further recommended against the construction of a portable building as an extension to the present out patient department at Harlem Hospital, and this report was adopted.

The Committee on Supplies submitted bids received for the furnishing of periodicals and journals for the pathological department for 1911 and 1912, and stated that only one firm had submitted a complete bid, namely, G. E. Stechert & Company, for \$923 for 1911 and \$929 for 1912. It was stated that the Corporation Counsel had advised against advertising for bids for books. It was resolved to accept the bids of G. E. Stechert & Company.

Mr. O'Keeffe made a report of an investigation he had made of the protest of Dr. Lubman, and it was resolved to take no further action on this protest, and to authorize Mr. O'Keeffe to communicate with Dr. Lubman.

Communications.

Accompanied by Dr. W. Gilman Thompson, Visiting Physician, Professor Graham Lusk, of Cornell University, appeared, and read a request for authority to maintain a respiration calorimeter in Bellevue Hospital on the Second Medical Division. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to approve of the plan presented, and to grant the request of Dr. Lusk.

A communication from the Mayor, dated May 14, calling attention to the fact that an Apothecary at Gouverneur Hospital had invited a man to call upon him in reference to employment and at the end of the letter had stated "must be a Christian," was presented, together with a report thereon received by the President. The report was approved, and the President and General Medical Superintendent were authorized to discipline the

Apothecary involved. A communication dated May 1 was received from the American Laundry Machinery Company, requesting an extension of time of sixty days on their contract for the installation of machinery in the new laundry building at Bellevue Hospital, and giving the reasons therefor, together with a communication from the architects, Mc-Kim, Mead & White, recommending that the request be granted. The extension of time requested was granted.

A communication dated May 14 was received from McKim, Mead & White, transmitting copies of plans and specifications for the planting of trees on 26th st and on 1st ave., in front of the old Bellevue Hospital. These were approved, and a copy ordered forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

Communications dated May 16 and 18 were received from the Department of Finance, transmitting amended standard specifications for the purchase of soap, soap powders, butter and eggs. These were referred to the General Medical Superintendent, with instructions to protest against the inspection of butter and eggs by the Mercantile Exchange.

Two resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 23 were presented as follows: (1) establishing the grade of Hospital Helper, at \$192, \$270, \$288, \$312 and \$600, and the grade of Lecturer, at \$3, \$5, \$8 and \$10 per lecture; (2) authorizing the issue of \$5,000 Revenue Bonds for the purpose of paying the salaries of twenty additional nurses for vacation re-These resolutions were ordered lief. placed on file.

A resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 30, authorizing the purchase of an automobile in the open market without public letting, was re-

ceived. A resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 13, rescinding unexpended balances in Revenue Bond funds issued prior to the present year, was received.

A communication dated May 14 was received from the President of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, stating that Dr. W. G. Thompson and Dr. J. B. Bissell had been appointed to represent the Medical Board on the joint committee to devise measures to improve the nursing in the wards of the hospital. A communication dated May 15 was also presented from the Board of Managers, stating that Mrs. William Church Osborn and Miss Harriette Rogers had been appointed to represent the training school on that committee.

A communication dated May 13 was presented from Dr. Henry J. Schreiber, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients at Gouverneur Hospital, protesting against the assignment of a salary to the physician in charge of the children's tuburcu-losis clinic at that hospital. It was resolved to take no action on this com-

nunication. of Dr. Erdwurm and Dr. Woodruff as Division was referred to the Conference Committee; the appointment of a committee to confer with the Trustees in regard to the nursing situation was noted; and as there were no other matters requiring action on the part of the Trustees, the minutes were placed on file.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital held on May 2 were presented. The resignation of Dr. John E. Breglia as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients was accepted; the nominations of Dr. Vetter and Dr. James were referred to the Conference Committee. The statement in regard to the overcrowded condition of Fordham Hospital was noted, and it was resolved to inform the Medical Board that the Trustees have already made a request to the City authorities for an appropriation with which to enlarge the hospital.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion and is in a respect that and without contains or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as conbecome interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters that description are in all respects. stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders of freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-No bid or estimate will be considered unless

as a condition precedent to the reception or con-sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
