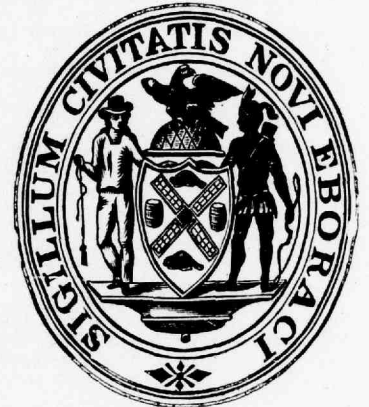

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Regulations Adopted.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held October 27, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following regulations governing the sale and care of food in New York City be and the same are hereby adopted to take effect immediately:

Regulations Governing the Handling, Storing, Offering for Sale and Selling of Food and Drink in Retail Stores.

General Regulations Governing the Conduct of All Retail Stores.

Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilation and Water Closets: Food and drink shall not be handled, stored, offered for sale or sold in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary, or in direct communication with such stable or room or with a water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop heads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open, or an opening connecting

Regulation 22. Coloring Matter or Preservatives: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibited coloring matter or preservative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners or proprietors of the establishment.

Regulation 23. Exhibition and Arrangement of Foodstuffs: All foodstuffs shall be arranged and displayed in an orderly and systematic manner so as to improve the general appearance of the store and to facilitate cleaning and inspection of same.

Regulation 24. Food Not to Be Deposited or Allowed to Remain Within Two Feet of the Surface of Any Sidewalk, Street or Floor, Etc.: No food intended for human consumption shall be deposited or allowed to remain within 2 feet of the surface of any sidewalk, street, or public place or the floor of any building where exhibited unless the same shall be contained in covered boxes or other covered receptacles so as to be protected from dogs and other animals and their excretions.

Regulation 25. Protection of Foodstuffs: All foodstuffs not protected by a fly and dust proof wrapper when displayed for sale must be covered in cases of glass, metal, wood, or close-mesh wire screening, so as to prevent contamination by dust, dirt and flies.

Regulation 26. Storing of Food to Be Prima Facie Evidence of Its Use: The presence of any food, drink, or raw material in any part of the establishment shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use for human food.

Additional Regulations Governing the Conduct of Butcher Stores.

Regulation 31. Construction of Counters, Work Benches and Pickling Vats, Etc.: All counters, work benches, pickling vats, refrigerated display cases, stationary trays and appurtenances thereof used in the handling, displaying and storing of meats and other foods shall be of a smooth, hard material and constructed and arranged so as to permit of thorough cleansing and ready access.

Regulation 32. Maintenance of Counters, Work Benches and Pickling Vats, Etc.: All counters, work benches, pickling vats, refrigerated display cases, stationary trays and appurtenances thereof used in the handling, displaying and storing of meats and other foods shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and must be scrubbed with hot water and Sal Soda, or other suitable cleansing agent at the close of each day's use.

Regulation 33. Protection of Meats, Poultry, Etc., When Displayed For Sale: All meats, poultry, game, fish, and similar products when displayed for sale shall be kept within closed refrigerated display cases, or properly covered by close-mesh wire screening so as to prevent unwarranted human handling and contamination by dust, dirt and flies. Provided, however, this regulation shall not apply to smoke meats, sausages, hams, or other similar products, which are protected by a fly and dust proof wrapper.

Additional Regulations Governing the Conduct of Fish Stores.

Regulation 35. Construction of Counters, Work Benches, Display Cases, Etc.: All counters, work benches, refrigerated display cases, stationary trays and appurtenances thereof used in the handling, displaying and storing of fish and shell fish shall be of a smooth, hard material and constructed and arranged so as to permit of thorough cleansing, and ready access, and shall be water-tight and properly drained.

Regulation 36. Maintenance of Counters, Work Benches, Display Cases, Etc.: All counters, work benches, refrigerated display cases, stationary trays and appurtenances thereof used in the handling, displaying and storing of fish and shell fish shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and must be scrubbed with hot water and Sal Soda, or other suitable cleansing agent, at the close of each day's use.

Regulation 37. Iced Fish and Shell Fish to Be Stored so as Not to Cause a Nuisance: All iced fish and shell fish stored in wooden boxes or barrels shall be kept or stored in such a manner so as not to cause a nuisance.

Regulation 38. Refrigeration: All fish shall be kept properly chilled or refrigerated at all times.

Regulation 39. Protection of Fish When Displayed for Sale: All fish and shell fish displayed for sale shall be kept within closed, refrigerated display cases or properly covered by close-mesh wire screening so as to prevent unwarranted human handling and contamination by dust, dirt and flies.

Additional Regulations Governing the Conduct of Ice-cream and Candy Stores.

Regulation 41. Construction of Soda Water Fountains and Ice-cream Refrigerators: All soda water fountains, ice-cream refrigerators and appurtenances thereof shall be constructed and placed so as to permit of thorough cleansing. All such equipment shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair and must be washed daily with hot water and Sal Soda or other suitable cleansing agent.

Regulation 42. Running Hot and Cold Water to be Provided: An adequate supply of running hot and cold water shall be provided.

Regulation 43. Sinks: All sinks used for the cleansing of utensils shall be equipped with an overflow.

Regulation 44. Protection of Utensils: All utensils used in the service and sale of ice-cream and soda water shall be protected against contamination by dust, dirt, and flies, or cleansed immediately before use.

Regulation 45. Cleansing of Containers: All containers used in the storing, transporting and distributing of ice-cream, ices, and other frozen products shall be thoroughly cleansed immediately upon emptying.

Regulation 46. Use of Rusty or Badly Worn Containers Prohibited: The use of any container for storing, transporting and distributing of ice-cream, ices, and other frozen products which is badly worn, rusty, corroded, or in such condition that it cannot be rendered clean and sanitary by washing is prohibited.

Regulation 47. Use of Brass, Lead, Copper, or Other Metallic Faucet, Tank, Etc. That May Affect Liquids: No person shall use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or vessel or any pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed of or made either wholly or in part of brass, lead, copper, or other metal or metallic substance, that is or will be affected by a liquid so that dangerous, unwholesome or deleterious compounds are formed therein or thereby or such that soda water, syrups, or other liquids, or any beverage, drink or flavoring material drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.

Regulation 48. Protection of Candy When Displayed for Sale: All candies transported and displayed, stored, offered for sale or sold shall be covered with a covering of glass, wood, metal, paste-board, paper or other suitable material so as to prevent unwarranted human handling and contamination by dust, dirt and flies.

Regulation 49. Towels for Drying Dishes: All towels used for drying dishes, receptacles and utensils shall be clean.

Regulations Governing the Conduct and Maintenance and Operation of Any Building, Room or Place Where Food or Drink is Prepared, Cooked, Mixed, Baked, Exposed, Bottled, Packed, Handled, Stored, Manufactured, Offered for Sale, or Sold.

Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilation, and Water-closets: Food and drink

shall not be prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold, in any stable; room used for sleeping purposes; or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary; or in direct communication with such stable or room or with a water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of water-closet compartment and vestibule shall be provided with self-closing devices; the door of the water-closet compartment opening inward, and the door of vestibule opening outward. Water-closet fixtures and vestibule shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and in good repair.

Regulation 2. Stables: Food or drink shall not be prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold in any room located in a building where horses, cows, or other animals are stabled except when said room is separated from said stable by impenetrable walls without doors, windows, or other openings.

Regulation 3. Rubbish, Useless or Offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Regulation 4. Lighting: All rooms or places in which food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold shall be properly and adequately lighted so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected.

Regulation 5. Screening of Doors, Windows and Other Openings: All doors, windows, and other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 6. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and shall be kept well painted with a light-colored water-proof paint.

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be smooth and water-tight and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. Floors, when required, shall be properly graded and drained into one or more drains, properly trapped and sewer-connected.

Regulation 8. Counters, Shelves, Show Cases and Windows: All show or display cases or windows, counters or shelves, used in handling, keeping and displaying food and drink shall be kept clean and sanitary, free from dust, dirt and other contaminating material and in good repair.

Regulation 9. Refrigerators, Ice Boxes, Etc.: All refrigerators, ice-boxes and appurtenances thereof used for the storage of food or drink shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and the compartment used for the storage of ice shall be lined with some proper metallic substance so as to be water-tight.

Regulation 10. Drainage of Refrigerators, Ice-boxes, Etc.: Waste water from refrigerators, ice-boxes, refrigerated display cases, windows or counters, vats or tanks, or other containers, used in refrigerating and storing food and drink shall discharge into an open, water-supplied, properly trapped sewer-connected sink.

Regulation 11. Refrigeration of Perishable Foodstuffs: All perishable food and drink shall be stored and kept refrigerated in a properly constructed refrigerator.

Regulation 12. Maintenance of Machinery, Floors, Walls, Stairs, Shelves, Etc.: All machinery, floors, walls, stairs, shelves, furniture, utensils, yards, areaways, plumbing, drains and sewers in or in connection with any room or place where food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold; or in water-closets and washrooms, or rooms where raw materials are stored; or in rooms where the manufactured products are stored, shall at all times be kept in good repair, and maintained in a clean and sanitary condition, free from all kinds of vermin.

Regulation 13. Covering of Vats, Tanks and Mixing Machines: All vats, tanks and mixing machines shall be provided with suitable covers not kept covered so as to protect food and drink from contamination.

Regulation 14. Protection of Machinery, Apparatus and Pipes: All machinery, apparatus and pipes shall be properly protected so as to prevent oil, waste, dust, dirt or other foreign or offensive material from dripping, entering or otherwise contaminating food or drink.

Regulation 15. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks with an adequate supply of running hot and cold water shall be provided and wherever required, hose connection shall be installed.

Regulation 16. Appliances for Cleansing and Sterilizing Bottles, Vessels, Etc.: Suitable means or appliances shall be provided for the proper cleansing and sterilizing of all bottles, vessels or other containers used in the storing, handling, delivering or selling of food or drink.

Regulation 17. Cleanliness of Utensils: All utensils used in the preparation, service and sale of food or drink shall be properly cleaned with hot water after each day's use or run or after individual service, and must be cleaned, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after previous use thereof, so cleaned; and in such cleansing, the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

Regulation 18. Use of Rusty or Badly Worn Utensils Prohibited: The use of any utensil used in the preparation, service and sale of food or drink, which is badly worn, rusty, corroded, or in such condition that it cannot be rendered clean and sanitary by washing is prohibited.

Regulation 19. Cleansing of Bottles, Vessels and Other Containers: All bottles, vessels or other containers, used in the storing, handling, delivering or selling of food and drink, shall be properly cleaned and sterilized after being used and no such bottles, vessels or other container shall, under any circumstances, be used the second time unless it shall have been after previous use thereof so cleansed and sterilized.

Regulation 20. Protection of Foodstuffs: All food, drink or raw material used in the preparation of food or drink not protected by a fly and dustproof wrapper, must be kept covered so as to prevent contamination by dust, dirt, flies and other contaminating material.

Regulation 21. Storage of Food on Floor, Sidewalk, Etc.: No food intended for human consumption shall be deposited or allowed to remain within 2 feet of the surface of any sidewalk, street, alley or public place or the floor of any building where exhibited unless the same shall be contained in boxes or other receptacles so as to be protected from dogs and other animals and their excretions.

Regulation 22. Storing of Foodstuffs to Be Considered Prima Facie Evidence of Its Use: The presence of food, drink or raw material in any part of the establishment shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use for human food.

Regulation 23. Raw Material: All food and raw material used in the preparation, service and sale shall be healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome and safe for human consumption.

Regulation 24. Coloring Matter or Preservatives: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibited coloring matter or preservative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners and proprietors of the establishment.

Regulation 25. Use of Brass, Lead, Copper or Other Metallic Faucet, Tank, Etc., That May Affect Liquids: No person shall use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or vessel, or any pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed of or made either wholly or in part of brass, lead, copper or other metal or metallic substance that is or will be affected by a liquid so that dangerous, unwholesome and deleterious compounds are formed therein or thereby, or such that soda water, syrups or other liquids, or any beverage, drink or flavoring material drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.

Regulation 26. Disposition of Foodstuffs Unit for Human Consumption: Food or drink, which has become unfit for human consumption, shall be kept separate and apart from other foodstuffs which are held, kept and offered for sale, properly denatured, marked "Condemned" and removed daily.

Regulation 27. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage and other waste material shall be provided. A tight-fitting cover shall be provided for each can and the can shall be kept covered. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 28. Water-Closets and Washing Facilities: A sufficient number of water-closets conveniently located shall be provided for all employees engaged in the preparation or handling of food and drink, and such water-closets shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. A washroom conveniently located shall be provided, furnished with soap, running water and fresh, clean, individual towels daily. A notice shall be conspicuously posted in water-closet compartment or washroom directing all employees to cleanse their hands before leaving and immediately before commencing work. The use of common towel is prohibited.

Regulation 29. Health of Employees: No person who has any infectious or venereal disease shall be permitted to prepare or handle food or drink or any utensils used in preparing, manufacturing or handling same.

Regulation 30. Habits of Employees: All persons preparing, manufacturing or handling food or drink shall be cleanly in their habits, and must wash their hands before beginning work and after visiting toilet.

Regulation 31. Clothing of Employees: All persons preparing, manufacturing or handling food or drink shall wear clean, washable, outer garments.

Regulation 32. Cleanliness of Employees Engaged in Mixing Ingredients: All persons immediately before engaging in the mixing of ingredients entering into the composition of food or drink or its subsequent handling, shall thoroughly wash their hands and shall thereafter keep them clean during such manufacture and handling.

Regulation 33. Housing of Animals Prohibited: No animals, excepting cats, shall be housed or kept in any room where food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Regulation 34. Construction of Apparatus, Utensils, Etc.: All apparatus, utensils and appurtenances thereof used in the preparation, manufacture, or handling of food or drink, shall be so constructed and placed that they can be thoroughly cleaned and shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 35. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously posted.

Regulation 36. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleaned and disinfected daily.

Regulations Governing the Conduct and Maintenance and Operation of Frozen Product Manufactories.

Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilation and Water-Closets: Ice cream, ices or other frozen products, shall not be exposed, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary; or in direct communication with such stable or room or with water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule.

Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open, or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal, with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of the water-closet compartment and vestibule shall be provided with self-closing devices; the door of the water-closet compartment opening inward and the door of vestibule opening outward. Water-closet fixtures and vestibules shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and in good repair.

Regulation 2. Stables: Ice cream, ices or other frozen products shall not be exposed, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold in any room located in a building where horses, cows or other animals are stabled, except when said room is separated from said stable by impenetrable walls without doors, windows or other openings.

Regulation 3. Rubbish, Useless or Offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products are exposed, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Regulation 4. Lighting: All rooms or places in which ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products are exposed, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold shall be properly and adequately lighted so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected.

Regulation 5. Screening of Doors, Windows, and Other Openings: All doors, windows, and other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 6. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and shall be kept well painted with a light colored water-proof paint.

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be of cement, properly graded to sewer-connected drains and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 8. Vehicles, Platforms and Racks: All vehicles, platforms and racks used in the preparation of ice-cream, ices or other frozen products shall be kept clean, sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 9. Refrigerators, Ice-boxes, Etc.: All refrigerators, ice-boxes, and appurtenances thereof used for the storage of food or drink shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and the compartment used for the storage of ice shall be lined with some proper metallic substance so as to be water-tight.

thereof used for the storage of food and drink shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and the compartment used for the storage of ice shall be lined with some proper metallic substance so as to be water-tight.

Regulation 10. Drainage of Refrigerators, Ice-boxes, Etc.: Waste water from refrigerators, ice-boxes, refrigerated display cases, windows, or counters, vats or tanks, or other containers, used in refrigerating and storing food and drink shall discharge into an open, water-supplied, properly-trapped, sewer-connected sink.

Regulation 11. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks with an adequate supply of running hot and cold water shall be provided and wherever required, hose connection shall be installed.

Regulation 12. Appliances for Cleansing and Sterilizing: Suitable means or appliances shall be provided for the proper cleansing and sterilizing of freezing vats or mixing cans or tanks, piping and all utensils used as containers for ices, ice-cream, or other frozen products, or their components, and all tools used in the making or direct handling of such products.

Regulation 13. Method of Cleansing and Sterilizing: All freezing vats or mixing cans or tanks, piping, and all utensils used as containers for ices, ice-cream, or other frozen products, or their components, and all tools used in the making or direct handling of ice-cream shall be properly cleaned and sterilized after use and no such apparatus, utensil or tool shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after previous use thereof, so cleaned and sterilized.

Regulation 14. Use of Rusty or Badly Worn Utensils Prohibited: The use of any utensil used in the preparation, service, and sale of food and drink, which is badly worn or rusty, corroded, or in such condition that it cannot be rendered clean and sanitary by washing is prohibited.

Regulation 15. Coloring Matter or Preservatives: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibited coloring matter or preservative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners and proprietors of the establishment.

Regulation 16. Raw Material: All raw material used in the manufacture of ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, shall be healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome and safe for human consumption.

Regulation 17. Storing of Foodstuffs to Be Considered Prima Facie Evidence of Their Use: The presence of any ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products in any part of the establishment shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use for human food.

Regulation 18. Storage of Food on Floor: No food intended for human consumption shall be deposited or allowed to remain within 2 feet of the surface of any sidewalk, street, alley, or public place or the floor of any building where exhibited unless the same shall be contained in boxes or other receptacles so as to be protected from dogs and other animals and their excretions.

Regulation 19. Return of Old, Soft or Melted Ice-cream Prohibited: No old, soft, melted, salted or broken packages of ices, ice-cream, or other frozen products, returned to the manufacturer for any cause whatsoever, shall under any circumstances be melted, refrozen or again used in the manufacture of any such product.

Regulation 20. Use of Brass, Lead, Copper, or Other Metallic Faucet, Tank, Etc., That May Affect Liquids: No person shall use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or vessel, or any pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed of or made either wholly or in part of brass, lead, copper, or other metal or metallic substance that is or will be affected by a liquid so that dangerous, unwholesome and deleterious compounds are formed therein or thereby, or such that soda water, syrups, or other liquids, or any beverage, drink, or flavoring material drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.

Regulation 21. Milk, Cream and Condensed Milk Used in the Manufacture of Ice-cream: No milk, cream or condensed milk, or combination or mixture thereof, shall be used in the manufacture or preparation of ices, ice-cream, or other frozen products which does not comply with the provisions of the Sanitary Code.

Regulation 22. Filing of Milk and Cream Tags: Immediately after contents of containers for milk, cream, condensed milk, or a combination or mixture thereof, are emptied, the tag thereon shall be removed and kept on file for a period of two months thereafter for the inspection of the Department of Health.

Regulation 23. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage and other waste material shall be provided. A tight fitting cover shall be provided for each can, and the can shall be kept covered. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 24. Water-closets and Washing Facilities: A sufficient number of water-closets conveniently located shall be provided for all employees engaged in the handling and manufacturing of ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, and such water-closets shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. A wash room conveniently located shall be provided, furnished with soap, running water and fresh, clean, individual towels daily. A notice shall be conspicuously posted in water-closet compartment or washroom directing all employees to cleanse their hands before leaving and immediately before commencing work. The use of common towels is prohibited.

Regulation 25. Lockers for Employees: Sufficient lockers of metallic construction shall be provided on premises for street clothing of employees engaged in the handling and manufacturing of ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products; such lockers, however, shall not be located in any room where ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, are manufactured or handled.

Regulation 26. Health of Employees: No person who has any infectious or venereal disease shall be permitted to prepare or handle any ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, or any utensils used in preparing, manufacturing or handling same.

Regulation 27. Habits of Employees: All persons preparing, manufacturing, or handling ice-cream, ices, or other frozen products, shall be cleanly in their habits, and must wash their hands before beginning work and after visiting toilet.

Regulation 28. Clothing of Employees: All persons preparing, manufacturing or handling ice-cream, ices or other frozen products shall wear clean, washable, outer garments.

Regulation 29. Cleanliness of Employees Engaged in Mixing Ingredients: All persons immediately before engaging in the mixing of ingredients entering into the composition of frozen products or its subsequent freezing or handling shall thoroughly wash their hands and shall thereafter keep them clean during such manufacture and handling.

Regulation 30. Employees Designated to Cut and Wrap Brick Ice-cream: Employees shall not touch the product with their hands at any time; provided, however, employees especially designated to cut and wrap brick ice-cream and to

fill fancy molds, which work necessitates some handling of the product, shall be scrupulously clean and wear clean, washable clothing and caps.

Regulation 31. Smoking and Use of Tobacco Prohibited: Employees shall not smoke or chew tobacco while at work.

Regulation 32. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously posted.

Regulation 33. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleaned and disinfected daily.

Regulation 34. Refrigeration of Perishable Foodstuffs: All ice cream, ices and other frozen products, stored for sale, shall be stored and kept refrigerated in a properly constructed refrigerator.

Regulation 35. Housing of Animals Prohibited: No animals, excepting cats, shall be housed, or kept in any room where ice cream, ices or other frozen products are exposed, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Regulations Governing the Preparation, Storing, Offering for Sale and Selling of Food and Drink in Kitchens, Serving and Dining Rooms of Hotels, Restaurants, Boarding Houses, Cafes, Lunch Rooms, Saloons, Grill Rooms and Buffets, or Other Public Places.

Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilations and Water-Closets: Food and drink shall not be prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary, or in direct communication with such stable or room or with a water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to an external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open, or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of water-closet compartment and vestibule shall be provided with self-closing devices; the door of the water-closet compartment opening inward and the door of vestibule opening outward. Water-closet fixtures and vestibule shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and in good repair.

Regulation 2. Stables: Food or drink shall not be prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold in the building where horses, cows or other animals are stabled except when said room is separated from said stable by impenetrable walls without doors, windows or other openings.

Regulation 3. Rubbish, Useless or Offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Regulation 4. Lighting: All rooms or places in which food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold, shall be properly and adequately lighted, so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected.

Regulation 5. Screening of Doors, Windows and Other Openings: All doors, windows and other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 6. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and shall be of light colored finish.

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be smooth and water-tight and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair and shall be scrubbed or flushed with water twice weekly.

Regulation 8. Counters, Shelves, Show Cases and Windows: All show or display cases or windows, counters or shelves, used in handling, keeping and displaying food and drink, shall be kept clean and sanitary, free from dust, dirt and other contaminating material and in good repair.

Regulation 9. Refrigerators, Ice Boxes, Etc.: All refrigerators, ice boxes and appurtenances thereof used for the storage of food or drink shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and the compartment used for the storage of ice shall be lined with some proper metallic substance so as to be water-tight.

Regulation 10. Drainage of Refrigerators, Ice Boxes, Etc.: Waste water from refrigerators, ice boxes, refrigerated display cases, windows or counters, vats or tanks, or other containers, used in refrigerating and storing food or drink shall discharge into an open, water-supplied, properly-trapped, sewer-connected sink.

Regulation 11. Refrigeration of Perishable Foodstuffs: All perishable food or drink shall be stored and kept refrigerated in a properly constructed refrigerator.

Regulation 12. Lighting and Ventilation of Kitchens: All kitchens shall be provided with proper and adequate windows, or with artificial light and mechanical means of ventilation, so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected and ventilated.

Regulation 13. Ventilation of Stoves, Ovens and Ashpits: All stoves, ovens and ashpits shall be provided with ventilating hoods and pipes or with other mechanical means to so ventilate same as to render harmless to persons working therein any steam, gases, vapors, excessive heat or any impurities that may be generated or released by or in the process of making, preparing, baking and cooking food.

Regulation 14. Wooden Platforms: All wooden platforms used in kitchens and not entering into the permanent construction of building shall be thoroughly scrubbed daily with hot water and Sal Soda, or other suitable cleansing agent.

Regulation 15. Construction of Apparatus, Utensils and Appurtenances: All apparatus, utensils and appurtenances thereof used in the preparation and handling of food or drink shall be so constructed and placed that they can be thoroughly cleaned and shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 16. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks with an adequate supply of running hot and cold water shall be provided.

Regulation 17. Cleanliness of Utensils: All utensils used in the preparation, service and sale of food or drink shall be properly cleaned with hot water after being used, and no utensil shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after previous use thereof, so cleaned, and in such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

Regulation 18. Use of Rusted or Badly Worn Utensils Prohibited: The use of any utensil used in the preparation, service and sale of food or drink, which is badly worn, rusted, corroded, or in such condition that it cannot be rendered clean and sanitary by washing, is prohibited.

Regulation 19. Protection of Foodstuffs: All foodstuffs not protected by a fly and dustproof wrapper must be covered in cases of glass, metal, wood, or close mesh wire screening, so as to prevent contamination by dust, dirt and flies.

Regulation 20. Storage of Food on Floor, Sidewalk, Etc.: No food intended for human consumption shall be deposited or allowed to remain within 2 feet of the surface of any side-

walk, street, alley or public place, or on the floor of any building where exhibited, unless the same shall be contained in boxes or other receptacles so as to be protected from dogs and other animals and their excretions.

Regulation 21. Covering of Food and Drink: Food and drink shall be kept covered so as to prevent contamination from dust, dirt, flies and other contaminating material.

Regulation 22. Storing of Foods in Metal Containers: All foods that are preserved or canned in metal containers shall be removed therefrom immediately upon being opened so as to prevent contamination thereof.

Regulation 23. Raw Material: All food, drink and raw material used in the preparation, service and sale shall be healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome and safe for human consumption.

Regulation 24. Storing of Foodstuffs to Be Considered Prima Facie Evidence of Its Use: The presence of any food, drink or raw material in any part of the establishment shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use for human food.

Regulation 25. Coloring Matter of Preservatives: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibited coloring matter or preservative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners and proprietors of the establishment.

Regulation 26. Disposition of Food and Drink Unfit for Human Consumption: Food or drink which has become unfit for human consumption shall be kept separate and apart from other foodstuffs which are held, kept and offered for sale, properly denatured, marked "Condemned" and removed daily.

Regulation 27. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized, iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage and other waste material shall be provided. A tight-fitting cover shall be provided for each can and the can shall be kept covered. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 28. Use of Brass, Lead, Copper or Other Metallic Faucet, Tank, Etc., That May Affect Liquids: No person shall use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or vessel, or any pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed of or made, either wholly or in part of brass, lead, copper or other metal or metallic substance that is or will be affected by a liquid so that dangerous, unwholesome and deleterious compounds are formed therein or thereby, or such that soda water, syrups or other liquids, or any beverage, drink, or flavoring material drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.

Regulation 29. Water-closets and Washing Facilities: A sufficient number of water-closets conveniently located shall be provided for all employees engaged in the preparation or handling of food or drink, and such water-closets shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. A wash room conveniently located shall be provided, furnished with soap, running water and fresh, clean, individual towels daily. A notice shall be conspicuously posted in water-closets compartment or washroom directing all employees to cleanse their hands before leaving and immediately before commencing work. The use of common towel is prohibited.

Regulation 30. Lockers: Sufficient lockers of metallic construction and conveniently located shall be provided on premises for street clothing of employees engaged in the preparation or handling of food or drink; such lockers, however, shall not be located in any room where food or drink is manufactured, prepared, cooked, baked or bottled.

Regulation 31. Health of Employees: No person who has any infectious or venereal disease shall be permitted to prepare or handle food or drink or any utensils used in the preparation or handling of same.

Regulation 32. Habits of Employees: All persons preparing or handling food or drink shall be cleanly in their habits, and must wash their hands before beginning work and after visiting toilet.

Regulation 33. Clothing of Employees: All persons preparing or handling food or drink shall wear clean, washable, outer garments.

Regulation 34. Cleanliness of Employees Engaged in Mixing Ingredients: All persons immediately engaged in the mixing of ingredients entering into the composition of food or drink, or its subsequent handling, shall thoroughly wash their hands and shall thereafter keep them clean during such manufacture and handling.

Regulation 35. Towels and Cloths Used by Waiters: All towels and cloths used by waiters, chefs, and other employees, shall be clean and sanitary and such towels and cloths shall not be used for drying or wiping plates, glasses, or other utensils, or permitted to come in contact with any foodstuff.

Regulation 36. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously posted.

Regulation 37. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleaned and disinfected daily.

Regulation 38. Housing of Animals Prohibited: No animals, excepting cats, shall be housed or kept in any room where food or drink is prepared, cooked, mixed, baked, exposed, bottled, packed, handled, stored, manufactured, offered for sale or sold.

Regulations Governing the Breaking Out of Eggs for Edible Purposes.

Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilations and Water-closets: Eggs shall not be broken from shell for edible purposes in any stable; room used for sleeping purposes; or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty, or insanitary, or in direct communication with such stable or room or with a water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of water-closet compartment and vestibule shall be provided with self-closing devices; the door of the water-closet compartment opening inward, and the door of vestibule opening outward. Water-closet fixtures and vestibule shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and in good repair.

Regulation 2. Stables: Eggs shall not be broken from shell for edible purposes in any room located in building where horses, cows, or other animals are stabled, except when said room is separated from said stable by impenetrable walls without doors, windows or other openings.

Regulation 3: Rubbish, Useless or Offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where eggs are broken from shell for edible purposes.

Regulation 4. Lighting: All rooms in which eggs are broken from shell for edible purposes shall be properly and adequately lighted so that all parts may be readily inspected.

Regulation 5. Screening of Doors, Windows, and Other Openings: All doors, windows, and other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 6. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and shall be of light colored finish.

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be smooth and water-tight and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair and shall be scrubbed or flushed with water twice weekly.

other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 6. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of smooth, hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair, and shall be of light colored finish.

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be smooth and water-tight and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. Floors, where required, shall be properly graded and drained to one or more drains properly trapped and sewer-connected and shall be scrubbed, flushed and deodorized at the close of business each day.

Regulation 8. Construction of Benches, Tables, Etc.: All benches, tables used in the breaking out of eggs for food purposes shall be of smooth, hard material and constructed so that they can be kept clean and sanitary.

Regulation 9. Cleaning of Floors, Walls and Utensils: All floors, walls, and utensils must be thoroughly cleaned and washed at the close of the day's work.

Regulation 10. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks, with an adequate supply of running hot and cold water, shall be provided.

Regulation 11. Cleanliness of Utensils: All utensils used in the breaking out of eggs for edible purposes shall be properly cleaned with hot water after being used and no utensil shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after previous use thereof, so cleaned, and in such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

Regulation 12. Use of Rusted or Badly Worn Utensils Prohibited: The use of any utensil used in the breaking out of eggs for edible purposes, which is badly worn, rusted, corroded, or in such condition that it cannot be rendered clean and sanitary by washing is prohibited.

Regulation 13. Construction of Apparatus, Utensils and Appurtenances: All apparatus, utensils and appurtenances thereof, used in the breaking out of eggs for edible purposes, shall be so constructed and placed that they can be readily cleaned and shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 14. Apparatus for Cooling Eggs to Be Provided: Proper apparatus for immediately cooling the eggs to a temperature of less than 45° F. shall be installed in all establishments where eggs are broken out for food purposes.

Regulation 15. Temperature of Eggs: Eggs broken from shell intended for food purposes shall be deemed adulterated if the temperature of the eggs is above 45° F.

Regulation 16. Light Leakers: Eggs which are commercially known as "Light Leakers" and where the contents are sweet and clean may be broken out for food purposes provided said eggs have been kept in a clean and sanitary manner, approved by the Department of Health and properly protected from dust, dirt and other contaminating matter.

Regulation 17. "Spots" or "Spot Eggs": No person shall break out for food purposes eggs which are known as "spots" or "spot eggs." The term "spots" and "spot eggs" when used herein means all eggs that are partially hatched, broken yolked, blood ringed, or veined; and all unsound eggs, including those affected by moulds or which are partly decomposed, or have become sour.

Regulation 18. Covering of Eggs Broken from Shell: No receptacles containing eggs broken from shells shall be allowed to remain uncovered in any room or place where eggs are broken out for food purposes.

Regulation 19. Denaturing of "Spots" or "Spot Eggs": During the process of breaking out or candling of eggs for food purposes all eggs found to be "spots" or "spot eggs" shall be immediately denatured. The term "denatured" when used herein refers to the treatment of eggs with a substance approved by the Department of Health, the presence of which on the eggs prevents their use for human food.

Regulation 20. Receptacles for "Spots" and "Spot Eggs": Suitable receptacles for "spots" and "spot eggs" shall be provided in the candling and breaking out room. Such receptacles shall at all times contain a sufficient quantity of the denaturant approved by the Department of Health, and shall be stencilled with 2" block letters, "Spot eggs denatured with _____," followed by the name of the denaturant.

Regulation 21. Marking of Containers: Each container or receptacle used for bringing eggs broken from shells intended for food purposes into the City of New York or holding, delivering, offering for sale or selling same shall be plainly and indelibly marked with the date and place where eggs were broken from shell and the name of person, firm, or corporation offering for sale, selling or delivering same.

Regulation 22. Preservatives, Coloring Matter: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibitive coloring matter or preservative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners and proprietors of the establishment.

Regulation 23. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage and other waste material shall be provided. A tight fitting cover shall be provided for each can. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 24. Health of Employees: No person who has any infectious or venereal disease shall be permitted to prepare or handle food or drink or any utensils used in preparing, manufacturing or handling same.

Regulation 25. Habits of Employees: All persons breaking out eggs for edible purposes shall be cleanly in their habits and must wash their hands before beginning work and after visiting toilet.

Regulation 26. Washing Facilities for Employees: Soap, running water, and fresh, clean, individual towels shall be provided for each employee, and the same shall be readily accessible to these employees. Use of common towel is prohibited.

Regulation 27. Clothing of Employees: All persons breaking out eggs for edible purposes shall wear clean, washable, outer garments.

Regulation 28. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously posted.

Regulation 29. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleaned and disinfected daily.

Regulations Governing the Breaking Out of Eggs for Inedible Purposes.

Regulation 1. Lighting: All rooms in which eggs are broken from shell for inedible purposes shall be properly and adequately lighted so that all parts may be readily inspected.

Regulation 2. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair and shall be of light colored finish.

Regulation 3. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be cement, properly graded to sewer-connected drains and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. Floors shall be

scrubbed, flushed and deodorized at the close of business each day.

Regulation 4. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks with an adequate supply of running water shall be provided and wherever required hose connection shall be installed.

Regulation 5. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage, egg shells and other waste material shall be provided. A tight fitting cover shall be provided for each can. All garbage, egg shells and other waste material shall be removed from premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 6. Denaturing of "Spots" or "Spot Eggs": "Spots" or "Spot Eggs" broken from shell must be immediately placed in a clean covered metal receptacle containing a suitable denaturant. The term "Spots" and "Spot Eggs" when used herein means all eggs that are properly hatched, broken yolked, blood ringed, or veined and all unsound eggs including those affected by moulds or which are partly decomposed or have become sour.

Regulation 7. Record to Be Kept of "Spots" or "Spot Eggs": Every person engaged in the business of breaking out for inedible purposes eggs known as "Spots" or "Spot Eggs" shall keep a record of the date, place, and persons from whom received.

Regulation 8. Eggs Designed for Use Other Than Edible Purposes: No person shall receive, keep, hold, offer for sale or sell in the City of New York any eggs broken from shell designed for use other than edible purposes unless same shall have been denatured with some denaturant approved by the Department of Health. The term "denaturant" when used herein refers to the treatment of eggs with a substance approved by the Department of Health, the presence of which on the eggs prevents their use for human food.

Regulation 9. Marking All Receptacles Containing Eggs for Use Other Than Edible Purposes: Cans or receptacles containing eggs broken from the shells designed for use other than edible purposes shall be plainly and indelibly marked with the words "For Manufacturing Purposes, Denatured With _____" to be followed by the name of the denaturant.

Regulations Governing the Handling, Storing, Candling, Offering for Sale and Selling of Eggs for Edible Purposes.

Regulation 1. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilations and Water-Closets: Eggs shall not be handled, stored, candled, offered for sale or sold in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes, or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary, or in direct communication with such stable or room or with a water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open, or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal, with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of water-closet compartment and vestibule shall be provided with self-closing devices; the door of the water-closet compartment opening inward and the door of the vestibule opening outward. Water-closet fixtures and vestibule shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and in good repair.

Regulation 2. Rubbish, Useless or Offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where eggs are handled, stored, candled, offered for sale or sold.

Regulation 3. Lighting: All rooms in which eggs are handled, stored, candled, offered for sale or sold, shall be provided with adequate light, so that all parts may be readily inspected when required.

Regulation 4. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, hard material and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 5. Construction of Floors: Floors shall be smooth and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 6. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks, with an adequate supply of running hot and cold water, shall be provided.

Regulation 7. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron, or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage, egg shells and other waste material, shall be provided. A tight-fitting cover shall be provided for each can. All garbage, egg shells and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 8. Marking of Case Eggs: All cases of eggs handled, stored, offered for sale or sold shall be legibly stencilled, "These eggs have (or have not) been candled."

Regulation 9. Sale of Eggs at "Case Count" or "At Mark": Where eggs are sold at "case count" or "at mark" and the loss is 50% or more, all the eggs shall be candled and the resultant loss shall be denatured and destroyed in accordance with the regulations.

Regulation 10. Denaturing of "Spots" or "Spot Eggs": During the process of candling eggs for food purposes, all eggs found to be "spots" or "spot eggs" shall be immediately denatured. The term "denatured" when used herein refers to the treatment of eggs with a substance approved by the Department of Health, the presence of which on the eggs prevents their use for human food.

Regulation 11. Suitable Receptacles for "Spots" or "Spot Eggs" to Be Provided: Suitable receptacles for "spots" and "spot eggs" shall be provided in the candling room. Such receptacles shall at all times contain a sufficient quantity of a denaturant approved by the Department of Health and shall be stencilled with 2" block letters, "Spot eggs denatured with _____," followed by the name of the denaturant.

Regulation 12. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously posted.

Regulation 13. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleaned and disinfected daily.

Regulation 14. Evidence of Use: The presence of any eggs in any part of the establishment shall be deemed prima facie evidence of their use for human food.

Regulations Governing the Conduct and Maintenance and Operation of Sausage Manufacturing Establishments Used for Smoking and Preserving Meats.

Any meat or meat products sold under the name of sausage or sausage meat shall correspond to the following definition:

Definition: For the purpose of these regulations sausage or sausage meat shall be held to be a comminuted meat from cattle or swine or a mixture of such meat, either fresh, salted, pickled, or smoked with or without added salt and spices and with or without the addition of edible animal fats, blood and sugar.

Regulation 1. Animal Tissues Used as Containers: Such as Casings or Stomachs: All animal tissues used as containers, such as casings or stomachs, must be clean and sound and impart to the contents no other substance than salt.

Regulation 2. Rooms, Insanitary Conditions, Ventilation and Water-closets: Food shall not be prepared or stored in any stable, room used for sleeping purposes; or in any room or place which is dark, damp, poorly ventilated, dirty or insanitary; or in direct communication with such stable or room, or with water-closet compartment, except when such water-closet compartment is enclosed by a suitable and properly lighted vestibule. Every such water-closet compartment, except when provided with mechanical means of ventilation, shall have a window at least 1 foot by 3 feet between stop beads, opening to external air, and the entire window shall be made so as to readily open or an opening connecting with the external air measuring at least 144 square inches for each water-closet or urinal, with an increase of 72 square inches for each additional water-closet or urinal. The doors of water-closet compartment and vestibule shall be provided with self-closing devices, the door of the water-closet compartment opening inward, and the door of the vestibule opening outward. Water-closet fixtures and vestibule shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and in good repair.

Regulation 3. Rubbish, Useless or Offensive Material: No accumulation of rubbish, useless, or offensive material shall be permitted in any room or place where food is prepared or stored.

Regulation 4. Lighting: All rooms or places in which food is prepared or stored shall be properly and adequately lighted so that all parts thereof may be readily inspected.

Regulation 5. Screening of Doors, Windows and Other Openings: All doors, windows, and other openings shall be properly screened from May 1st to October 31st. Screen doors shall be provided with self-closing devices.

Regulation 6. Construction of Walls and Ceilings: Walls and ceilings shall be of a smooth, cement, enamel tile, enamel brick or other smooth, hard, substance that can be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 7. Construction of Floors: Floors of meat canning rooms, curing cellars, boning rooms, meat chopping rooms, where water is used in connection with the operation, shall be of cement, properly graded to sewer-connected drains and must be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair.

Regulation 8. Construction of Tables and Equipment: The tables and other equipment used in the meat canning rooms, curing cellars, boning rooms, meat chopping rooms or other rooms must be made of smooth, hard material and be so constructed that they can be kept clean and sanitary. When the tops of tables are made of wood (which must be hard wood) they must be constructed so that they can be easily taken apart to admit of cleaning at the end of each day's work.

Regulation 9. Rooms Where Artificial Illumination is Required: Rooms in which artificial illumination is required or any portion of which is below the level of the ground shall not be used for the preparation of meats unless a permit shall be separately issued therefor by the Board of Health. Such room or rooms shall be adequately ventilated.

Regulation 10. Sinks and Water Supply: Suitable sinks with an adequate supply of running hot and cold water shall be provided and wherever required hose connections shall be installed.

Regulation 11. Cleansing of Apparatus, Utensils, Etc.: All apparatus, containers, and utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned and rinsed with boiling water or sterilized with live steam after each day's use.

Regulation 12. Garbage Receptacles: Suitable, water-tight, properly covered, galvanized iron or other sanitary metal cans for receiving and holding without leakage all garbage and other waste material, shall be provided. A tight fitting cover shall be provided for each can, and the can shall be kept covered. All garbage and other waste material shall be removed from the premises daily and shall not be allowed to become a nuisance.

Regulation 13. Meat Not to be Placed on Floor: Meat shall not be placed directly on the floor, but must be placed on a rack or in a suitable container. All racks upon which meat is laid or hung shall be made of a smooth, hard material and constructed so that they can be removed for cleaning. Floor racks must be at least 6" from floor.

Regulation 14. Construction of Pickling Vats: Pickling vats must be constructed of cement or other smooth, hard substance so that they can be kept clean, inoffensive and sanitary. Wooden vats must be elevated at least 6" from the floor.

Regulation 15. Water and Ice Used: All water and ice used on premises shall be clean and uncontaminated.

Regulation 16. Meat Falling on Floor to be Condemned: All meats that fall on floor shall be immediately condemned and tanked.

Regulation 17. Use of Lungs and Cow's Udders Prohibited: The use of lungs and cow's udders for use in making sausage or other meat food product is prohibited.

Regulation 18. All Equipment Such as Presses and Coolers to be Covered: All equipments such as presses and coolers must be covered when not in use.

Regulation 19. Working Over of Sausages: The working over of sausages is prohibited.

Regulation 20. Use of Coloring Matter Prohibited: The use of coloring matter is prohibited.

Regulation 21. Use of Preservatives Prohibited: Only salt, sugar, saltpetre (except Chili saltpetre), pure spices, vinegar and wood smoke may be used as preservatives.

Regulation 22. Repeated Use of Brine: The repeated use of brine is prohibited unless it be sterilized after each use.

Regulation 23. Keeping of Preservatives, Coloring Matter: The presence in any part of an establishment of any prohibitive coloring matter or preservative shall be deemed prima facie evidence of its use and the presence of any such material may be sufficient cause for the prosecution of the owners or proprietors of the establishment.

Regulation 24. Rats, Mice and Vermin: The premises shall be kept free from rats, mice, and other vermin at all times.

Regulation 25. Water-closets and Washing Facilities: A sufficient number of water-closets conveniently located shall be provided for all employees, and such water-closets shall be kept clean and sanitary and in good repair. A wash room conveniently located shall be provided, furnished with soap, running water and fresh, clean, individual towels daily. A notice shall be conspicuously posted in water-closet compartment or washroom directing all employees to cleanse their hands before leaving and immediately before commencing work. The use of common towel is prohibited.

Regulation 26. Lockers for Clothing of Employees: Sufficient lockers of metallic construction shall be provided on premises for street clothing of employees. Such lockers, however, shall not be located in any room where food is manufactured or prepared.

Regulation 27. Spitting Signs: Placards prohibiting spitting on floors shall be conspicuously posted.

Regulation 28. Cuspidors: A sufficient number of cuspidors shall be provided and shall be cleansed and disinfected daily.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all

house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of the City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
