The following opinions constitute a portion of the proceedings of the Law Department for the week ending October 11, 1873:

Section 23, of Chapter 7, of the Revised City Ordinances (Revision of 1866, page 192), provides that when proposals are issued for a contract to furnish any article of which a sample can conveniently be given, the head of the department issuing the same may require a sample within such time before the opening of the estimates as he may prescribe; and if such sample be not furnished, or do not conform to the quality required by the proposals, the bid shall be rejected. HELD, that where no requisition for a sample either accompanied or followed the issuing of the proposals, the Department could not reject the estimate of the lowest bidder upon the ground that the latter had voluntarily and subsequently to the opening of the bids presented samples not acceptable to the Department.

Where no demand for samples accompanies the proposals, the Department, for protection against the use of inferior materials, must rely upon the usual condition embodied in the specifications accompanying the proposals, that the Department may reject inferior materials and purchase at the expense of the contractor materials of the prescribed quality, or reject the work altogether and annul the contract.

Mr. Eugene T. Lynch, Secretary to the Department of Docks:

SIR:—From the interviews and correspondence which I have had with a number of the Commissioners and with yourself, and also from the written statements of Mr. Joseph H. Choate, counsel to the Onico Quarry Company, I understand the facts on which my opinion is desired in this matter to be as follows:

The Department issued the usual proposals for furnishing granite stones to build sixteen arches of a new pier, No. 1, North River.

For this contract the Onico Quarry Company made the lowest bid.

Section 23 of Chapter 7, of the Revised City Ordinances, (revision of 1866, page 192,) provides that when proposals are issued for a contract to furnish any article of which a sample can conveniently be given, the head of the Department issuing the same may require that a sample be delivered within such time before the opening of the estimates as he may prescribe; and if it be not so furnished, or do not conform to the quality required by the proposals, the estimate or bid shall be rejected.

This ordinance authorizes the Department to demand a sample; but I understand that in this case the proposals for a contract were not accompanied nor followed by any requisition for a sample of the granite to be used.

If a demand for samples had been made in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance, and in pursuance thereof a sample had been furnished not conforming to the quality of granite required by the proposals, it would have been the duty of the Department to reject the bid, as I have stated in an interview with two or more of the Commissioners of your board.

I am informed that about a year before these proposals were offered, and with no possible reference thereto, a block of granite was placed by the company in the Department of Docks as a mere advertisement of their business, and since the bids were opened two samples of granite have been exhibited by the company, which have been tested and disapproved.

After careful examination and consideration, I am satisfied that the bid of the Onico Company being the lowest, the Department is bound under the facts in this case to go on and enter into a contract with that company in accordance with the terms of the bid and in conformity with such specifications as to the quality of the material and the work as the proposals require.

The Department is protected by a condition embodied in the specifications accompanying the proposals, that if at any time the engineer appointed by the Department of Docks to take charge of the work, shall certify in writing to the Department that the work is unnecessarily delayed, or that the contractor is willfully violating any of the conditions or covenants of the contract or executing it in bad faith, the Department shall have the power to discontinue the work or any part thereof, and shall have the further power to purchase by contract or otherwise such quantity of stone as may be necessary to fulfill the contract, and charge the cost thereof to the contractor. The Department is therefore protected from the use in the work of any materials below the standard called for by the specifications.

It is clear that the company has entitled itself to the contract for the work, and that the Department has not placed itself in a position to reject their bid under the provisions of section 23, of chapter 7 of the ordinances above referred to.

Where the statutes under which a public park was laid out in the city of New York provided that upon the final confirmation of the report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, the city might immediately take possession of the lands without any suit or proceeding at law for that purpose; held, that the Department of Public Parks, through their police force, might at once forcibly remove persons persisting in the occupation of portions of the premises.

SIR:—I have carefully considered your communication relative to the proper and most speedy means of dispossessing Mr. Herbert, now occupying the hotel in the High Bridge Park; and in view of the facts stated in your letter of the 22d of September last, and of section 178, of chapter 86, of the Laws of 1813, which provides that "thereupon" (that is upon the final confirmation of the report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, appointed in proceedings to acquire title to lands necessary for the

opening of any public square, &c.), "the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, or any person or persons acting under their authority may immediately, or at any time or times thereafter, take possession of the same, or any part or parts thereof, without any suit or proceeding at law for that purpose," it is my opinion that it would be proper for the Department of Public Parks to direct a portion of their police force, sufficient for the purpose, to immediately remove Mr. Herbert and his effects from the said hotel and park.

Where under the Mechanics' Lien Law laborers and material men file liens to secure indebtedness incurred to them by contractors with the city; a department of the city government which has contracted for the erection of a building or for repairs thereon, may retain out of payments to be made to the contractor the amounts of such liens.

This Department is authorized to do not only by the general law, but usually also by a stipulation which it is customary to embrace in the various forms of contract recently prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation for the use of the various departments.

Hon. Jacob A. Westervelt, President of the Department of Docks:

SIR:—Your letter of September 23, in relation to liens filed against certain moneys, was duly received, as also that of September 26th.

This Department will take the necessary steps to protect the interests of the city.

Upon the trial, some one connected with your Department, familiar with the circumstances in both cases, will be required to prove the facts.

I am informed by Mr. Lynch, the Secretary of your Department, that about \$10,000 remain due to the contractors McIntire and Smith, of which sum \$3,200 is for "extra work."

You are advised to retain all the \$10,000, due upon the original contract, less the said \$3,200 for "extra work," which is not subject to lien. The remainder will be sufficient to cover the liens of Ripley & Co., and J. Dobbs & Co., with a margin for costs.

The retention of this sum is justified by the first paragraph of the contract, on the seventeenth page, as well as by the general laws.

SANITARY BUREAU.
 Record of the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Oct. 4, 1873.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,057, as follows: 8 public buildings, 839 tenement houses, 247 private dwellings, 176 other dwellings, 28 manufactories and workshops, 35 stores and warehouses, 94 stables, 24 slaughter houses, 12 fat houses, 3 gut cleaning establishments, 3 manure dumps, 1 market, 1 head cleaning establishment, 71 sunken and vacant lots, 57 yards, courts and areas, 72 cellars and basements, 52 waste pipes and drains, 124 privies and water-closets, 166 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 13 cisterns and cess-pools, 1 uninhabitable dwelling, 1 sausage factory, 20 other nuisances, and one visit of the Sanitary Inspector to case of contagious disease.

The number of reports received thereon from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was —

During the past week 69 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 46 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 46 houses, 46 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

107 permits have been granted for scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

Permits have been granted to consignees of 95 vessels for the discharge of cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending Oct. 4, 1873, was: sheep, 5; veal, (carcass) 12; veal, (bob) 13; lambs, 3; beef, pounds, 794; veal, pounds, 1,571; poultry, pounds, 193; fish, pounds, 4,205.

311 loads of night soil were removed by night scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.
 During the week ending Oct. 4, 1873, there were issued from this Bureau 507 burial permits for city deaths, 55 for bodies in transit, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 507 deaths, 161 marriages, 486 births, 44 still-births, 55 applications for transit permits, and 40 returns from coroners. There were 45 searches of the registers of birth, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 29 of death, were issued from this Bureau. Three cases were referred to coroners.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held September 26th, 1873, all the Commissioners present, the following action was had:
