AN ORDINANCE to amend section 21 of article 3, chapter 11, of the revised ordinance of 1869, entitled "Of hack bey coaches and cabs."

Section 1. Section 21 of the above entitled ordinance is hereby amended by striking therefrom subdivisions 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 14 and 15. Which subdivisions proposed to be expunged read as follows: read as follows:

3. For conveying a passenger to the new almshouse and returning one dollar; and for every additional passenger and returning fifty

cents.

4. For conveying one passenger to Fortieth street and remaining half an hour and returning, one dollar and a half, and for every additional passenger, fifty cents.

5. For conveying one passenger to Sixty-first street, and remaining three quarters of an hour and returning, two dollars; and for every additional passenger fifty cents.

and returning, two dollars; and for every additional passenger, fifty cents.

6. For conveying one passenger to Eightysixth street, and remaining one hour and returning, two dollars and a half; and for every additional passenger, seventy-five cents.

7. For conveying one or more passengers to Harlem and returning, with the privilege of remaining three hours, five dollars, or to the Highbridge, five doilars, with the same privilege.

8. For conveying one or more passengers to Kingsbridge and returning, with the privilege of keeping the carriage all day, five dollars.

9. For the use of a hackney coach or carriage by the day, with one or more passengers, five dollars.

14. For attending a funeral within the Lamp and Watch District, two dollars; and to the Potter's Field, three dollars; which charges shall include for the necessary detention and returning

with passengers.

15. Every driver or owner of a hackney coach, carriage, or cab, shall carry, transport, and convey, in and upon his coach, carriage, or cab, in addition to the person or persons therein. one trunk, valise, saddle-bag, carpet-bag, portmanteau, or box, if he be requested so to do, for each passenger, without charge or compensation therefor; but for every trunk or such articles as above named, more than one for each passenger, he shall be entitled to demand and receive the sum of six cents.

The government to raise the amount of money as might be agreed, and to apply it in getting the manufacturers to employ men and to manufacture for the city government such articles as are generally manufactured by them, and such as are saleable and market articles, the city government to dispose of them, and in order not to blockade our home market the articles to be sent to foreign ports, there to be sold for money or exchanged for goods such as is saleable in this market, and such as are not produced in this city. The government to appoint a commission consisting of six or eight of the best business men from the different branches of manufacturing, these commissioners to be applied to by the manufacturers for an order of such articles as they generally manufacture, These commissioners to examine and approve of the work when delivered to the city. The Commissioner of Fuoric Works is hereby directed to notify the owners or occupants of all stores, dwellings, or other buildings having vaults under the sidewalks, in front thereof, with coverings over the openings thereto, presenting a smooth surface, to remove such coverings, and substitute therefor coverings presenting a rough surface, flush with the sidewalk. erings, and substitute therefor coverings presenting a rough surface, flush with the sidewalk, affording a secure foothold for pedestrians, and of any material and manner of construction that shall be approved by the said Commissioner of Public Works. Should any such owner or occupant neglect or refuse to comply with the directions contained in such notification for a period pant neglect or refuse to comply with the directions contained in such notification for a period of more than ten days, he shall thereby incur a penalty of five dollars for every twenty-four hours in excess of said ten days, that such neglect or refusal shall continue; and it is hereby made the duty of said Commissioner of Fublic Works to cause to be reported every such case of violalation of the provisions of this ordinance to the Corporation Attorney for prosecution.

Section 2. The coveriugs for all openings to vaults under the sidewalks he eaf e constructed, shall be approved, in like manner, by the said Commissioner, and no permit for the construction of any such vault shall hereafter be given or granted by the Commissioner of Fublic Works, unless the description of coverings to be placed over the openings thereto shall be submitted to and approved by him.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
