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

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

October 16, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,164, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 947 tenement-houses, 61 private dwellings, 102 other dwellings, 15 manufactories and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 1 lime kiln, 36 slaughter-houses, 1 coal yard, 1 dam, 1 mill, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 52 sunken and vacant lots, 1 gas works, 1 lodging house, 4 swill houses, 97 yards, courts and areas, 126 cellars and basements, 232 waste-pipes and drains, 264 privies and water-closets, 47 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 21 dangerous stairways, 5 cisterns and cesspools, 4 smoky chimneys, 1 piggery, 12 other nuisances, together with 72 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 701.

During the past week 157 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the anitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 79 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the

Health Officer of the Port.

99 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 96 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and furnigated 93 houses, 93 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 551 births, 37 still-births, 250 marriages, and 609 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 16, 1880; this shows an increase of 29 births, 89 marriages, and 21 deaths, and a decrease of 21 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 12 births, and an increase of 7 still-births, 65 marriages, and 194 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 1; diarrhœal diseases, 1; bronchitis, 5; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; apoplexy, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; premature and preternatural births, 1; drowning, 4; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; scarlatina, 6; diphtheria, 10; croup, 2; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 6; inanition, 5; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; pneumonia, 3; convulsions, 4; all diseases of the bram and nervous system, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from alcoholism was the same in the two succeeding weeks. two succeeding weeks.

The ages of 136 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 189 under two years; 252 under five years, and 35 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 15 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 41.38 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 102 were in institutions, 339 in tenement houses, 153 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 124 on the first, 169 on the second, 113 on the third, 70 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 607 were stated to be residents of New York City and 2 non-residents; 60 were stated to be single, 148 married, 65 widowed, and the condition of 336 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week was as follows, viz.: City deaths, 609; still-births, 37; bodies in transitu, 24; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 58 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 551 births, 250 marriages, 37 still-births, 609 deaths, 24 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 17 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 16, 1880, was 59.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.995, the mean humidity was 78, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 828, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory,

I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 3.

An Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-ine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
