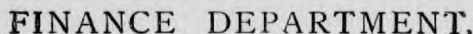

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 25, 1885:
 The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,859.
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 947.
 During the past week 570 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 98 permits.
 There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 5 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 9 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks, 221 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported 27 visits were made, and 13 disinfections and 6 fumigations were performed.
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 5.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 850, of which 0 were primary and 850 re-vaccinations.
 There were seized and condemned 8,890 pounds of meat, and 5,620 pounds of fish.
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 124; the number of analyses of same made was 2; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 186; the number of arrests was 2.
 The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 21,560 privies; 15,013 yards; 13,149 cellars; 22,738 garbage boxes; 1 grave-yard, and 101½ miles of street gutters and culverts.

The certificates of 456 births, 40 still births, 162 marriages, and 1,094 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 25, 1885. This shows a decrease of 66 births, and 13 still-births, and an increase of 12 marriages and 75 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 129 births, 17 still-births, and 61 marriages, and an increase of 206 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 3; croup, 8; erysipelas, 2; malarial fevers, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 14; alcoholism, 4; cancer, 10; phthisis pulmonalis, 9; pneumonia, 8; heart diseases, 7; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 14; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 2; scarlatina, 1; whooping cough, 6; typhus fever 1; typhoid fever, 5; puerperal diseases, 2; inanition, 7; rheumatism and gout, 3; bronchitis, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 11; direct effect of solar heat, 54; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 96; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; premature and pretermatural births, 12; suicide, 2; and drowning, 4. The number of deaths from small-pox and cerebro-spinal fever was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 175 were in institutions, 672 in tenement-houses, 217 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 18 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 20 were on the basement floor, 190 on the first, 251 on the second, 213 on the third, 153 on the fourth, 67 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 1,094 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 71 were stated to be single, 169 married, 84 widowed, and the condition of 770 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 1,094; still-births, 40; bodies in transit, 25; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 132 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 456 births, 162 marriages, 40 still-births, 1,094 deaths; 25 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 83 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 2 of marriage, and 57 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 25, 1885, was 83.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.899, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the

number of miles traveled by the wind was 909, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.35 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 1,017 deaths and still-births, or 89.68 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 36; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 417; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 125; Greenwood (undenominational), 45; Lutheran (undenominational), 179; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 24; Evergreen (undenominational), 82; Woodlawn (undenominational), 32; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 26; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 15; Washington (undenominational), 19.

The actual mortality for the week ending July 18, 1885, was 1,103; this is 236 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 198.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 40.99 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,399,335.

§ 350.
