AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, April 28, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, and Baldwin. Also, Chief Engineer Church; Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

Vice-President Dowd presided.

The minutes of the stated meeting of April 21 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1651 to 1663, which vouchers were approved by the Commissioners and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Comptroller, under date 24th inst, gave notice of the issue of warrants for vouchers not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for

New York County..... \$234 90
Westchester County..... 185 17

—which notice was ordered to be placed on file and entered upon the books of this Commission.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated April 27, 1886, transmitting the following exhibits, viz:

Exhibits F. F., being the six similar property maps of the lands required for the construction of the dams and Double Reservoir I, on the east branch of the Croton river, in the town of South East, in Putnam County, New York, said maps having been prepared by him in compliance with the request of the Aqueduct Commissioners by resolution of January 27, 1886.

Exhibits I. I., being the six similar property maps of the lands required for the construction of the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue, in the Twelfth Ward of this city, also prepared by him in part compliance with the request of the Aqueduct Commissioners by resolution of January 28, 1886.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the aforesaid communication and exhibits were referred to the Committee on Construction and Chief Engineer for examination and report.

A communication of this date, in relation to the employment of counsel, was received from Messrs. Greene, Newton & Gillmore, Examining Engineers, now investigating certain charges made against the Chief Engineer of this Commission.

The communication was read and the matter discussed by the Commissioners, and on motion of Commissioner Baldwin the Secretary was directed to notify the said engineers that if they required or desired it, counsel would be furnished them by the Aqueduct Commissioners whenever so requested.

The Secretary and Chief Engineer presented the form of an agreement and specifications for constructing an additional shaft on Section A of the New Aqueduct, prepared by them in compliance with the directions of the Commissioners at their meeting of the 21st inst., which form had been submitted to, and approved by, the Counsel to the Corporation.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer said form was adopted by the Commissioners, and the Secretary was directed to have the same engrossed for execution; and also to prepare for execution by the Commissioners, and filing with the Comptroller, the certificate required by Section 33 of the Act.

The Secretary made verbal report in relation to the lands upon Convent avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets, upon which the City has yet to acquire the right to construct the New Aqueduct; and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the matter was referred to the Committee on Construction for consideration and report.

The report of the Committee of Finance and Audit upon the claim of Joseph P. Disbrow, Esq., for damages to his property in the Twenty-fourth Ward, etc., which was laid over from the last meeting, was then taken up, and Mr. Fordham Morris, of counsel, was heard in relation thereto.

The Commissioners decided that until a full attendance of the Board could be obtained action should be deferred upon those portions of said report which relate to Mr. Disbrow's claim for the loss of occupancy of his dwelling, and the consequent increase of his expenses, and as to the compensation to be made to him for the easement upon his lands; but he being willing to accept the amount fixed by the aforesaid Committee as the cost of repairing the dwelling, it was, on motion of Commissioner Spencer,

Resolved, That the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), be and the same is hereby awarded to Joseph P. Disbrow, as compensation for the damages done to his dwelling-house by blasting in the Aqueduct tunnel through his lands in the Twenty-fourth Ward of this city, and that said amount be certified to the Comptroller for payment to said Disbrow, it being understood that his acceptance thereof is without prejudice to his rights as to other matters for which he claims compensation.

The Commissioners then adjourned.
