Repaired 3 chairs, 1 stool, 1 new wardrobe lock, 6 bed trays, 2 new legs, shades; used 2 new spring rollers, 2 slats, 2 catches, 12 yards shades cord, 3 chairs, 8 new rails, 2 stove bolts 2½ inches. Made seat for closet; used 2 feet pine handle in brush. Repaired chair and bed tray, bed tray and rack in bathroom, 1 chair, 1 new rail and 1 bed tray, 1 chair, 2 chairs, 2 new rails, 2 chairs, locks in operating room. Made toilet seat, 6 feet pine, key for closet. Repaired 2 locks, doors, lock and key.

Dug out 6 dead trees in rear of church building, chopped them up and carted them in wood pile. Seven men 2 days shoveling snow from walks. Two men 2 days digging trench at Main Kitchen to repair steam pipes. Two men 1 day hauling lumber from dock to cellar of Pavilion 28. Dug out 5 dead trees at east end of Pavilions A, B and C, had them chopped up and carted to wood pile. Filled in and graded yard at east end of Pavilions A, B and C with 160 cartloads of ashes from the different boiler rooms. Three men 2 days with 2 carpenters making new run for ice house. Five men 4 days packing ice in ice house. Graded and filled in at dock with 24 loads of ashes. Four men 1 day transplanting trees. Dug out 34 stumps of dead trees in the different parts of the grounds and carted same to dump. Five men 4 days trimming gas coal. Pumped 64 barrels of tar from tank at gas house. Four men two days loading carts and hauling manure from stables to different parts of the farm. Four men 2 days washing down ceilings and walls of the South Hospital, getting ready for painters. Cleaned up and kept in order the different cellars during the quarter. All ashes carted from the different boiler rooms during the quarter, and kept leveled and cleaned the different dumps. Four men trimming coal in the different yards and loading coal into carts.

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, FEBRUARY 15, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: OBTAINING SIX PER CENT. GOLD CONSOLIDATED STOCK, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is held by the public and is payable to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1890, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630. AN Act to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature.

Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
