Communications.

From Corporation Counsel—

"Hon. MICHAEL J. KENNEDY:

"Sir—I am in receipt of your communication dated July 16, 1906, which reads as follows:

"A number of large sight-seeing automobiles and automobile stages use the roads in Prospect Park and the main drive of the Ocean parkway as part of their routes. Most of these vehicles have regularly advertised tours from stated places in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn to Coney Island and other points traversing the above parkways. They charge a fixed price for the transportation of passengers for the round trip. The number has increased to such an extent that it has become a nuisance. Not only do these automobiles (some of which carry upward of thirty passengers) interfere with the use of the driveways by the general public, but on account of their weight, the same being from five to nine tons, destroy the roadways. Section 19 of the Ordinance of the Department of Parks provides as follows:

"No automobile, stage or other vehicle shall be allowed to carry passengers for hire over or upon any of the parks, parkways or drives, concourses, plazas, or circles under the control of the Department of Parks, excepting upon traffic roads and except by special permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction."

"Will you please advise me at your earliest convenience as to my powers to regulate such traffic?"

"In my opinion you are authorized, under the Ordinances of the Department of Parks, to regulate the traffic mentioned in your letter, and, if necessary, forbid the admission of such automobiles upon traffic roads under your jurisdiction.

From the Corporation Counsel (67694)—Transmitting bill for \$40.20 for fees for certification of certain leases, etc., for use in connection with proceedings for the acquisition of water front property, in favor of the Register of Deeds of New York County. Filed, voucher for the amount having been forwarded to the Finance Department for payment.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission (68187)—Transmitting blanks for the records of Messengers in the Department who were examined for promotion to Collector. Blanks filled out and returned.

From the Fire Department (68017)—Calling attention to the dangerous condition of the pier foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river. Notified that repairs will be made at once.

From the Police Department (67785)—Stating, in response to request from this Department, that they are willing to have their derrick removed from the bulkhead at the north side of Pier "A," North river, to any point this Department desires, upon the condition that the derrick is to remain the property of the Police Department. Notified that the derrick will be removed and applied to the uses of this Department.

From the President of the Borough of Brooklyn (68110)—Renewing his request for consent to the transfer to his office of Richard Gorman, Attendant. Consent granted.

From the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Manhattan (67876)—Recommending that the sewer at the foot of Seventy-fourth street, East river, be extended on its own line, which is the centre line of Seventy-fourth street, and that a new opening be made for this purpose through the bulkhead wall. The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to authorize the reinstatement of Timothy Madigan, Laborer, absent on account of illness since July 7, 1905.

By direction of the Commissioner the permit issued to the Seaboard Contracting Company for occupation of space between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, North river, was revoked, to take effect July 1, 1906, and Dockmaster notified to begin on that date the collection of wharfage at the bulkhead.

Valentine J. Spielman and Thomas J. McDonald (68171) were appointed to the position of Financial Clerk, with compensation at the rate of \$60 per month, to take effect upon assignment to work.

The salary of Charles A. Manly, Superintendent of Docks, was fixed at the rate of \$4,000 per annum, subject to the establishment of the grade at that rate by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Lot No. 1—Pier (new) 58, at or near the foot of West Sixteenth street, North river, including the lateral platform at the inshore end of said pier, extending from a point midway between Piers (new) 57 and 58 to a point midway between Piers (new) 58 and 59, at a rental of \$70,000 per annum.

Lot No. 2—Pier (new) 59, at or near the foot of West Eighteenth street, North river, together with the lateral platform extending from a point midway between Piers (new) 58 and 59 to a point midway between Piers (new) 59 and 60, at a rental of \$70,000 per annum.

Lot No. 3—Pier (new) 60, at or near the foot of West Nineteenth street, North river, together with the bulkhead extending from a point 125 feet south of the southerly side of said pier to a point 125 feet north of the southerly side of said pier, and the new made land extending inshore in front of said bulkhead a distance of 50 feet, at a rental of \$70,000 per annum.

Lot No. 4—Pier (new) 61, at or near the foot of West Twenty-first street, together with the bulkhead extending from a point 125 feet south of the southerly side of said pier to a point 125 feet north of the southerly side of said pier, and the new made land extending inshore a distance of 50 feet in front of said bulkhead, at a rental of \$70,000 per annum.

Lot No. 5—Pier (new) 62, at or near the foot of West Twenty-second street, North river (except the northerly side of said pier occupied by the ferry slips, ferry structures, etc., of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey), together with the bulkhead commencing at the inshore end of the property leased by The City of New York to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey on the prolongation of the southerly side of West Twenty-second street and extending along the said prolongation of the southerly side of West Twenty-second street in an easterly direction, 181.96 feet, and thence extending southerly along the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place a distance of 169 feet, more or less, to a point midway between Piers (new) 61 and 62, North river; together with the new made land extending inshore in front of said bulkhead a distance of 50 feet at a rental of \$37,500 per annum.

(b) To the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, of the following described property:

Lot No. 1—Pier (new) 57, at or near the foot of West Fifteenth street, North river, including the lateral platform at the inshore end of said pier, extending from a point midway between Piers (new) 56 and 57 to a point midway between Piers (new) 57 and 58, North river, at a rental of \$70,000 per annum.

(c) To the Cunard Steamship Company, Limited, of the following described property:

Lot No. 1—Pier (new) 56, at or near the foot of West Fourteenth street, North river, including the lateral platform at the inshore end of said pier extending from a point 150 feet south of the southerly side of said Pier (new) 56 to a point 125 feet north of the northerly side of said pier, at a rental of \$70,000 per annum.

Lot No. 2—Pier (new) 54, at or near the foot of West Thirteenth street, North river, including the lateral platform at the inshore end of said pier, extending from a point 125 feet south of the southerly side of said pier to a point 150 feet north of the northerly side of said pier, at a rental of \$70,000 per annum.

Lot No. 3—The inner 497 feet of Pier (new) 53, at or near the foot of Little West Twelfth street, including the platform at the inshore end of said pier extending from the southerly side of said pier to a point 125 feet south of the southerly side of Pier (new) 54, North river, at a rental of \$22,466.36 per annum.

Lot No. 4—The outer 328 feet of Pier (new) 53, at or near the foot of Little West Twelfth street, North river, except the "L" on the southerly side of the outer end of said pier. As the outer 328 feet of said pier is at present leased to T. G. & W. R. Patten until April 1, 1911, the lease of said 328 feet of the outer end of said pier to the Cunard Steamship Company shall not commence nor shall any rental be due from said company for the same until the expiration or sooner termination of said lease to T. G. & W. R. Patten. Upon the expiration or sooner termination of said Patten lease, rental from the Cunard Steamship Company for the entire length of Pier (new) 53, North river, including the platform at the inshore end thereof shall be due at the rate of \$37,500 per annum. The lease of said Pier (new) 53 shall terminate at the same time as that of Pier (new) 54, North river.

All of the above described property as shown on a plan approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897, and April 29, 1904.

The City of New York shall erect sheds upon the piers, platforms, bulkheads and new made land above described in accordance with a design to be approved by the lessees, said sheds to contain the various appliances necessary for the conduct of the business of said lessees, substantially in accordance with those now in use upon piers occupied by the said lessees under leases from The City of New York, and the right to use and occupy said sheds during the term of the lease by the lessee shall be included in the lease of the premises above described.

Rentals under the leases shall commence from the date when each lot, as above described, or portion thereof, shall be certified as being ready for occupancy, by the Commissioner of Docks, and the leases of the property now occupied by the said lessees surrendered to the City with the sheds and fixtures appurtenant to same; all as may hereafter be directed by said Commissioner of Docks; the leases to continue for a term of ten years (except in the case of Pier (new) 53 North river, when the term shall be as hereinbefore provided); the lessee to have the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each; rental for the first term to be that specified above in connection with each particular lot, and the rental for each renewal term to be 10 per cent. advance on the rental for the preceding term.

The City to do the necessary dredging to maintain a proper depth of water in the slips adjacent to said wharf property.

The lessee to make all necessary repairs to the property during the term of the lease, and to do such painting to the structures erected thereon as may be necessary to preserve the same in good repair and condition.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

Pending a vote on Mr. Marshall's original motion, Mr. Harding moved that the application be laid over for one week, and this being agreed to further action was deferred.

Appeal 31 of 1906, New Building 831 of 1906, premises north side of One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, 14 feet west of East river, The Bronx; William Longton, appellant.

Mode of construction unlawful.

That the said structure will be temporary, will be used about three years, and will be used only as a shop and storage place for iron; also that same is to be located in a remote place and factory district.

To allow the frame construction of said shop as shown on plans.

That the said structure will be only temporary, and will be well put together and covered with corrugated iron.

Mr. T. J. Kelly appeared before the Board.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
