BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Local Board Meeting.

Pursuant to call by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the members of the Local Board of Crotona, Twenty-fourth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, in the Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, on January 28, 1910, at 9 p. m.

Present—President of the Borough, Alderman Hickey and Alderman Herbst.
On motion, seconded, the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with and adopted as typewritten.

Hearings in Accordance With Advertisement in CITY RECORD of January 18, 1910. President Miller announced that he had caused to be sent out to all the property owners' associations in The Bronx, and to the local newspapers, a complete copy of all the calendars of the local boards in this Borough, informing them as to the petitions to be presented at the various meetings to be held here this evening, and that he had also caused to be presented by the Engineering Bureaus, the average cost per foot frontage of each improvement as petitioned for, and that this course would be pursued in the future, so that property owners would know approximately the cost of the proposed work, and thus be able to tell whether they desire to have the work commenced or not. Property owners will consequently be given every opportunity to be heard for or against any improvement when presented for hearing before the Local Board, and if they are not heard, it will not be the fault of this office.

The work of defining the average cost per foot frontage of sewer improvements, President Miller explained, was a more difficult proposition than in the case of other improvements. The amount of assessment for sewer construction per foot frontage would depend entirely on the action to be taken by the Board of Assessors in reference to their decision as to the area benefited.

No. 3. Replacing present high board fence surrounding the West Farms Cemetery, northwest corner of East One Hundred and Eightieth street and Bryant avenue, with a picket fence, either iron or wood.

Estimated cost for a wooden picket fence \$287.50, for an iron picket fence \$885.50. Assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$31,000.

Hon. James L. Wells appeared and stated that the fence now erected around the West Farms Presbyterian Cemetery obstructed one's view of the grounds and monument recently placed there. There was no intention on the part of Mr. Stonebridge, he said, that a new assessment be levied for the proposed change in the kind of fence. A subscription from private parties is now in the hands of a Committee and it is the intention of said Committee to do this work under an ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, if the work cannot be done in any other way.

Laid over indefinitely. No. 4. Relaying flagging on the east side of Third avenue, about 118 feet south of East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street.

Complaint of the Superintendent of Highways, dated December 14, 1909, was read, as were also reports of the Engineer of Highways, dated December 22, 1909, and January 25, 1910.

Estimated cost, \$32.50: assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment amounts to \$37,000.

Under date of January 25, 1910, the Clerk to the Superintendent of Maintenance reported that a legal search had been made and that Charles M. Rosenthal, of No. 160 Broadway, was the owner.

No one appeared in opposition to the proposed improvement. On motion, seconded, it was

Resolved, by the Local Board of Crotona, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for relaying missing flagstones on the easterly side of Third avenue, from a line about 118 feet south of the southerly line of East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, to a line about 153 feet southerly from said curb line, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to insure public safety, in accordance with the report of the Superintendent of Highways, Borough of The Bronx, dated December 14, 1909, the report of the Clerk to the Superintendent of Highways, dated January 25, 1910, and the report of the Engineer of Highways, dated January 25, 1910, which proceeding was duly advertised for a public hearing before the Local Board of Crotona, Twenty-fourth District, on the 28th day of January, 1910; and be it further

Resolved, That the cost and expense of said work be charged against the property deemed to be benefited; said work to be done under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, under the provisions of section 435, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

Adopted by the Local Board of Crotona, Twenty-fourth District, on the 28th

day of January, 1910. Alderman Hickey, Alderman Herbst and the President of the Borough of The Bronx voting in favor thereof. Negative-None.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Report for the Year Ending December 31, 1908.

New York, January 1, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir-The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to present the following report for the year just ended:

THE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE.

On the first of February the composition of the Board underwent a change, two new members, Mr. John G. O'Keeffe and Mr. John J. Barry, having been appointed to succeed Mr. Theodore E. Tack, resigned, and Mr. Myles Tierney, term expired. The Board alopted resolutions expressing its appreciation of the services rendered by the two retting members, Messrs. Tierney and Tack. As required by law, the Board reorganized and re-elected Dr. John W. Brannan as President and Mr. James K. Paulding as Secretary. The Mayor has just announced his selection of Mr. Barry, one of the new members of the Board, as Commissioner of Correction, and the Board has placed on record its regret at losing Mr. Barry, while congratulating the City upon securing his able and conscientious services in the new position to which he has been

During the closing months of the year Dr. Samuel T. Armstrong, General Medical Superintendent since July, 1905, tendered his resignation, which was accepted by the Board of Trustees. Dr. Armstrong's health had been greatly impaired by the exacting nature of the duties belonging to his position and the closeness of his attention to them and stood in need of restoration through a period of rest and quiet. He is followed in his retirement by the best wishes of the Trustees. No successor has yet

By permission of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, approved by the Mayor and the State Commission, the Trustees appointed Dr. S. S. Goldwater as expert in hospital construction at a salary of \$2,000 per annum. Dr. Goldwater's duties will be to consult with the architects in the preparation of the plans for the new buildings to be constructed, and particularly for the new laundry and surgical pavilions of Bellevue Hospital. His expert advice, based upon special study and experience, will be of great assistance in avoiding the mistakes that have characterized the erection of so many new hospitals intended by their founders to be model in arrangement and construction.

On September 21 the Board of Trustees adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners of Accounts to institute an investigation of the books of the department, and expressing the view that inasmuch as the system of bookkeeping was new, and no regular system of auditing was enforced by the City, the books should be investi-

gated every three months.

Wages of Employees.

The generosity of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment made it possible this year for the first time to pay a minimum salary of \$20 per month to all the male employees of this Department, and one of \$15 to the women. The Board of Trustees deems it advisable to increase these salaries automatically up to \$30 for the men and \$25 for the women, according to the length of time they remain in the service, thus placing a premium upon permanency in the work. Unfortunately the sum appropriated for the coming year on this account is insufficient to carry out the plan so auspiciously begun, and faithful employees will be forced either to continue at the inadequate salaries paid them in the past or seek more remunerative service elsewhere.

The Board of Aldermen having fixed the salary of Stationary Engineman at \$4.50 per day, it was necessary to ask an appropriation of Special Revenue Bonds to provide for the required increase and the sum of \$1.391 was granted in order that the increase

might take effect from July 1, uniformly with other departments.

The Budget for 1909.

A comparison of the budget adopted for 1909 with the present payroll shows that the former does not provide for the payment of salaries established by the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment during 1908 which have been in effect for the past six months. Furthermore, if the salary schedules assigned to the various hospitals be adhered to rigidly, the result will be a loss to the City. as, for instance, in the item of nursing where a specified number of graduate nurses at \$50 per month is required, although it will at times be possible to supply these places with pupil nurses at \$10 per month or post-graduate ones at \$25. The Board has therefore asked that the literal adoption of these schedules be not insisted upon, and it has proposed an alternate schedule in the General Administration list for the adoption of which it has petitioned.

Another change proposed in the new budget is the substitution of junior clerks for a number of hospital helpers, some of whom have been engaged wholly, others partially in clerical work. These helpers comprise some of the oldest employees in the hospital service who are familiarized by years of experience with the particular work they perform, much of which is entirely different from the kind of work assigned to junior clerks in other departments. To replace them all at once with young clerks from the civil service lists, besides working a great injustice upon them, would reduce the service to a hopeless confusion. The Board has accordingly asked for six months' time in which to work out a solution of the question which shall conform strictly to the requirements of the law, while involving as little injury as possible to the interests

Another provision of the budget to which the Board is compelled to demur is that requiring the expenditure of the total annual appropriation in twelve equal instalments. However applicable this may be in certain other branches of municipal government, it is manifestly unsuited to hospital management where the winter months are the crowded ones involving an increased census of patients and all other inmates and demanding in consequence the expenditure of a much larger sum of money than is required in the months of slackened activity.

An appropriation of \$65,000 in Revenue Bonds was required to meet a corresponding deficit in the 1908 supplies account plus a small one in the appropriation for alterations and repairs. This deficit was due to the unusually large census of patients in the hospitals and to the impossibility of accurate foresight into the exact requirements in connection with the new pavilions of Bellevue Hospital. It would have been still larger had there not been a surplus in the salaries appropriation available for transfer to that of supplies.

Rules Referring to Medical Service.

The rule governing the appointment of medical and surgical members of the attending staff at the several hospitals was revised to require advertisement in the medical journals of all vacancies to be filled except those on the college divisions at Bellevue. for which nominations are regularly made by the faculties of the several medical schools. Also requiring ten years' professional experience in an applicant for appointment as Visiting Physician or Surgeon; five years' experience for the position of Assistant Visiting and three years' experience for the position of Adjunct Assistant. An exception to this rule is made in the case of the advancement of men already members of the visiting staff.

The appointment of a special clerk to prepare a copy of the medical history to accompany every patient transferred was authorized. In order that such patients may always be seen by the Attending Physician on the day of their transfer, these physicians were requested to arrange their visits (where necessary) at an hour prior to 2.30 p. m. In like manner it was requested that operations of election be not performed

The following rules for the preparation of requisitions for surgical instruments, special supplies, etc., were adopted:

1. All requisitions for surgical instruments and supplies are to be made separately. All requisitions for surgical instruments and supplies shall be signed by the

Attending Surgeon on duty.

3. All requisitions for such supplies must give a catalogue number to enable to purchasing agent to determine the instrument that is wanted.

4. In case the need of the service requires an instrument made by some particular maker, it must be so designated on the requisition, and such instrument will be purchased without competitive bidding.

5. All requisitions for instruments that are needed immediately for the service will be marked "urgent," "required at once," and sent without delay for action.

6. All requisitions for surgical instruments are as far as possible to be made sufficiently in advance to permit the purchasing agent to obtain estimates, so that these can be acted upon in accordance with the rules of the Finance Department and the Board of Trustees.

Inquiry of the Corporation Counsel concerning the right of the Board to communicate the facts of diagnosis and condition of employees of the Street Cleaning, Police and other departments to medical examiners, etc., elicited the response that such facts were of a privileged character and should not be made known.

An order has been issued excluding from the wards of the hospitals all agents soliciting orders for supplies of every description.

Signs printed in English, German, Yiddish and Italian have been placed in all the dispensaries calling attention to the fact that such places are intended for the treatment of the sick poor, and that persons obtaining treatment on false representations will be prosecuted.

The Ambulance Service.

The Board received notice in December of the discontinuance after March 1, 1909, of its ambulance service by Roosevelt Hospital, and immediately took steps to ascertain the feasibility of starting an ambulance relief station on the West Side to meet the needs of this district.

Permission was obtained from the Board of Aldermen in May to purchase three new ambulances for the use, respectively, of Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, for a sum not to exceed \$2,100. Later permission was requested to purchase two power ambulances, to cost \$4,000 each, and to include the position of Automobile Enginemen in the Budget for 1909. Specifications for these ambulances (to be purchased in open market) have now been authorized.

The Red Cross Society having objected to the use of their emblem upon the ambulances, a green cross was substituted for a time, and it has now been decided to

abandon the use of an emblem altogether.

Fire Drills.

The custom of holding fire drills having fallen into some irregularity, the Trustees ordered the holding of one each week in every hospital committed to its care, the drills to be held on the lines originally laid down by Mr. Ross, the fire expert, and to include the House Staff and Nurses, as well as other employees concerned.

In this connection it was learned that the Fire Department no longer approved of the linen and cotton hose formerly used and approved for interior use by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, but insisted upon the use of rubber hose which can be easily tested. It was therefore decided to purchase only the hose approved by the Fire Department in the future.

New Positions.

It having been found impossible to secure an X-ray photographer at the authorized salary of \$1,200 per annum, the Board has asked for the establishment of the position in this Department with an attached salary of \$1,800. Much can be saved in expense to the City, even at the latter rate, and the danger attendant upon constant exposure to the rays seems to justify the higher salary asked for. Inquiry is being made whether it will be possible for one man to do the work of two hospitals. and a rule is in contemplation regulating the amount of this work to be done and establishing responsibility for it.

The temporary appointment of a draftsman to assist the Supervising Engineer has been necessary at several different times and has been authorized by the Board.

The Board has asked for the creation of the grade of Oiler in this Department, the men to be paid at the established rate of \$3.50 per day. The new machinery in Pavilions A and B at Bellevue and in the buildings about to be constructed requires handling by experts, thus rendering this request of particular importance. The grade of Stoker at \$3 per day has been established for sixteen incumbents.

The Engineers, Stokers, Electricians, Carpenters, Painters, Plasterers, Plumbers and all mechanics of the Department have been ordered placed under the supervision of the Supervising Engineer, and all requests for Engineers' supplies must be sent to him before coming to the Superintendent.

The preparation of the specifications for the annual contract purchase of supplies was greatly delayed this year, in consequence, first, of the installation of the new system of bookkeeping, and, later, of the contradictory instructions received concerning the inclusion in each contract of the so-called "rebate" provision. Permission to be obtained to buy the coal year in the open market. Fortunately, the old contractors were willing to continue selling at the last year's contract price or less. The practice of supplying rubber coats and boots, together with caps, to the ambulance drivers has been continued. All surgical supplies are to be stamped with the name of the hospital to which they are sent. A dispute having arisen with the State Prison Department concerning the purchase from them of some of the articles of equipment for Pavilions A and B. the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for adjustment.

Miscellaneous.

The lease of the dwelling house occupied by the General Medical Superintendent

has been renewed for a period of two years.

The investigation of the financial ability of those applying for treatment was formerly done by the Charity Organization Society at the request of the Trustees. At the end of April they reported that they were unable to continue the practice except at a charge of twenty-five cents a case. This was authorized for an experimental period of three months, with the result that the cases requiring investigation did not seem sufficient in number to justify the employment of a permanent investigator.

A general rule was adopted that in future applications for increases in salary shall be made through the General Medical Superintendent and presented to the

Board quarterly on January 1, April 1, July 1 and October 1.

Inspectors of the Federal Immigration Commission were granted permission to visit the wards of Bellevue to investigate the diseases of foreign-born patients there to see whether they were entitled or subject to deportation.

The Department of Commerce and Labor at Washington requested and received permission to reprint the nomenclature of diseases in use in this Department.

A firm of expert accountants, Messrs. Lybrand Brothers and Montgomery, were employed, by permission of the Civil Service Board, to make an investigation of the difference in the cost of supplies, maintenance, etc., in the several hospitals of this Department.

An exhibition of the social service and convalescent relief work conducted by Miss M. E. Wadley, the nurse in charge of this service at Bellevue, was held in connection with the annual conference of charities and corrections held at Elmira in November, attracting much favorable comment and attention to this department of the hospital's work.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

Pavilions A and B.

Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital were opened for the reception of medical patients on November 7, 1908. The maternity wards were opened in the first week in December. The entire number of beds in these pavilions, including the infants' beds and the maternity department, is 430.

In view of the urgent need of the additional accommodations provided by these new buildings, they were opened as soon as possible and without the delay of a formal opening. They have relieved the overcrowding in the wards of the old Bellevue Hospital and enabled the outlying portable pavilions to be discarded, and and permitted the old Emergency Hospital to be closed.

The wards are large and commodious and of cheerful appearance. Practically every known improvement in hospital construction has been incorporated in these buildings. They are as dustproof as it is possible to construct buildings, and in addition a vacuum cleaner has been installed. Large balconies are attached to each ward, on to which the beds may be rolled direct from the ward. At night light is supplied by incandescent lamps enclosed in averted shades, so that the eyes of the

patients are not exposed to the direct rays. The illumination is perfect. A clinical laboratory has been provided on each floor with a students' teaching room adjoining Coat rooms for the physicians and students are provided on each floor. Linea room are attached to each ward. A small diet kitchen and dining room are also attached to each ward. Each ward has its own bath room and toilet, which are complete in

On admission children are kept in the observation wards on the ground floor for twenty-four hours, or longer, if necessary, before being transferred to the fifth floor, which is entirely devoted to the children's service; Ward A being used for children under one year and Ward B for children from one to twelve years. The total num her of beds for infants and children is eighty-five. The sixth floor has been given over entirely to the maternity service. The other floors have been divided between three of the medical divisions, allowing three wards for each. Each ward accommodates twentyfour patients in addition to the quiet rooms and convalescent rooms.

These pavilions are the first installment of the new Bellevue Hospital and for the accommodation of patients only. A temporary office has had to be estaablished for supervision, and arrangements will have to be provided for the accommodation of some of the members of the house staff during the night. With the construction a few years hence of the administration buildings of the new hospital, these temporary

arrangements will be discontinued.

Door checks have been placed on all the doors at a cost of \$213.45. The plumbing on the fifth floor was changed and two marble slabs, two children's baths and two

infants' baths installed at an expenditure of \$1,125.

Owing to the fact that there was a sufficient balance in the appropriation for the construction of the building to provide for the furnishings and equipment, it was not necessary to ask for an additional appropriation for this purpose, but the Trustees had to request the City authorities to change the wording of the original resolution so as to allow the furnishings to be charged against the appropriation for the building.

Bids for furnishing and setting the lighting fixtures were opened at the beginning of April, but it was found that the bidders without exception had failed to comply with the specifications, and the bids were accordingly rejected. New ones were received on April 27 and the contract awarded to the Enos Company for \$3,640, a lower bid, that of the Central Chandelier Company, being rejected for failure to meet the specifications.

The contract for painting was awarded on June 2 to Hahn & O'Reilly for the sum of \$4,250, this firm being the lowest of seven bidders. On September 22 it became necessary to warn this firm that they would be held to the penalty of \$10 per diem for each day after the limit set for the completion of the work, namely, October

The work was finally completed practically within the contract time.

The Architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, having recommended on September 3 that a final certificate be given the John H. Parker Company for their work in constructing the new pavilions, the matter was referred to the Building Committee, who approved the recommendation with the condition that \$10,000 be reserved from the payment to cover any emergencies that might arise later. Finally, on October 21, the Board voted Parker his final certificate without any restrictions and formally accepted the building.

New Training School for Women Nurses.

With the exception of the installation of lighting fixtures, the building is now practically completed.

The matter of furnishing the new Home was gone into carefully by a committee of the Board of Managers, and it was decided that \$64,000 would be required. There being a balance of \$112,594 available from the construction fund, the Trustees pursued the same course as with Pavilions A and B, and requested an amendment of the resolution appropriating this fund so as to make the money available for equipment as well as construction, and this was allowed by the financial authorities. Advertisement for bids upon furniture, including its delivery, etc., was authorized by the Trustees on September 21, and these bids, when received, were referred to the Committee on Supplies for scrutiny and report. In accordance with advice received from the Corporation Counsel, several of these bids were rejected, and great care was taken that the articles should conform to the samples exhibited. In order \$15,900, a previous set of bids, of which the lowest was \$17,166, having been rejected. to accomplish this many of the articles needed had to be re-advertised for, and all have not yet been obtained.

In August, the Board received from the Architects, Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, the design and specifications for the gas and electric lighting fixtures, and at once authorized an advertisement for furnishing and hanging the same. The specifications

are now being printed.

The Architects' design for a fence and the lay-out of the grounds about the new training school were received and approved in July, advertisement for bids being authorized at that time. Later more drawings and specifications for the completion of the grounds were received and referred to the Building Committee, the first authorization of advertisement of the work being withdrawn.

The Board authorized the setting of window-guards in the windows of the basement and first floor, allowing \$305 for this purpose. Parker's estimate of \$1,980 for applying water paint to the walls and ceilings of the new building was accepted upon the advice of the Architects and the Building Committee, and a total expenditure of \$717.80 for such additional articles as a roster, bulletin board, office counter, mail boxes, key cabinets, etc., was also authorized.

The Twenty-sixth Street Tunnel.

A letter dated February 19 was received from Messrs. Cavanagh & Seymour, Contractors for the tunnel under Twenty-sixth street, connecting Pavilions A and B with the new Nurses' Training School building, asking to be relieved of their contract on account of the difficulty of obtaining money from the City and because of changed conditions since the time when their bid was offered. Their request was forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion upon the rights of the Trustees in this matter, and he replied to the effect that if the facts concerning the information said to have been accorded the Contractors at the Finance Department were true, the Trustees were at liberty to exercise their best judgment as to releasing them. Further inquiry developed the substantial truth of the matters alleged, and the Board, upon the advice of the Architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, at their meeting of March 17, absolved these Contractors from their obligations and authorized a new advertisement of the work.

New bids were received on April 16 and the contract given to the Phoenix Con-

struction Company for \$8,497.

On June 10 the Trustees received notification from the Parker Company that it would not be responsible for the damage that would result from cutting through the walls of Pavilions A and B. No damage resulted, and no action was therefore necessary on this communication.

Pathological Department and Dormitory for Men Employees.

The work has steadily progressed on this building. The exterior work is practically all finished, and the partitions have been built with the exception of those where plumbing and steam pipes have to be erected and tested. The cellar floor is practically completed. All trenches for steam pipes, etc., have been built. All window frames throughout the building have been erected. Sash for the entire building has been delivered and the work of glazing is in progress. The granite steps for the entrance on south elevation have been set. All coping on area walls has been erected, and the work of cleaning and pointing the granite is now in progress.

Bids for the installation of the plumbing and drainage systems were received on June 16, and award made to the lowest bidder, the Wells & Newton Company, for the

Plans and specifications for the equipment of the new building were forwarded by the architects in July and referred to the Building Committee for report, advertisement being authorized on August 11. The necessary permission was obtained from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to advertise the work, and bids were opened on December 22, 1908, as follows:

Thomas Cockerill & Son....

The bids have all been referred to the architects for an opinion and advice.

An estimate of \$201.50 for electrical work was accepted from the contractors. Messrs. T. Cockerill & Son, and an enowance of \$300 for iron grills omitted from the basement windows was approved, both upon the recommendation of the architects. It was also decided to place a cast-iron railing on top of the coping at the fourth story level, the cost being a trifle over \$100. Discovery was made that the light in the autopsy room could be improved by the placing of extra windows on the west side, and the contractor's estimate of \$1,500 for doing this was accepted, an allowance of \$100 being made that the light in the autopsy room could be improved by the placing of extra windows on the west side, and the contractor's estimate of \$1,500 for doing this was accepted, an allowance of \$310 being made at the same time for the omission of expanded metal in certain portions of the floor where it was found to be superfluous.

Plans for the New Hospital.

Estimates on the work of boring for the new buildings were received early in

March, and that of the lowest bidder was accepted.

The contractors for the demolition of the old Edison plant, John Leonard & Co., have failed to remove the foundations of some of the old buildings, and the architects have been instructed to obtain from them an explanation and a description of the methods they intend to employ.

Another difficulty encountered has been with the filling-in of the site for the roposed new boiler house and the construction of a temporary runway leading to the Twenty-eighth street dock. Appeal was made to the Dock Department in May to take the necessary steps. On December 22, the Trustees applied for the filling in of the portion between the bulkhead wall on the north side of Twenty-ninth street and a line about 77 feet south of the bulkhead wall, and word was received that the Dock Department would reserve the right to fill in this area. The bed of Twenty-ninth street from First avenue to the river was assigned to the Trustees by resolution of he Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on July 1.

A meeting between the architects and the Building Committee of the Board to consider the plans for the new boiler house and laundry was arranged for early in April, and on May 11 the plans for the boiler house and coaling station were presented o the full Board and referred back to the Building Committee for final examination. week later, several slight modifications having been made, application was made to the Board of Estimate for \$500,000 with which to undertake this work, while the architects were urged to proceed with the plans for the laundry with all possible speed. An issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$450,000 was approved by the Board of Estimate on July 2, and this was confirmed by the Aldermen a month later. After several months' delay, due to the printing of the specifications and the necessity of obtaining permission from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to advertise the contract, bids were finally opened on November 30 and the contract awarded on December 8 to the P. J. Carlin Construction Company for the sum of \$394,000. In the meanwhile the architects' specifications for the laundry machinery were objected to by the Corporation Counsel as not allowing sufficiently for competition among the several companies interested, and the architects were instructed to act in cooperation with the City's legal adviser in the preparation of new ones. After considerable discussion, involving further delay, it was decided to include in all buildings the necessary wiring for the installation of a watchman's clock, fire alarm, telephone and push button calls, but that the fixtures should not be installed until the administration building is erected.

A set of preliminary drawings for the surgical wing of the new hospital was received from the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, on August 26, and was referred to the committee of the Medical Board on hospital construction for their assistance and advice. Before proceeding, however, to the approval of the plans, it was, upon the urgent advice of the medical committee, decided to ask for the appointment of an expert in hospital construction to assist the architects with his trained experience.

A plan of the proposed treatment of the grounds of the new hospital with regard to the disposition of trees and shrubs was also submitted by the architects, and the immediate planting of the trees by the river front was authorized, action upon the remainder of the recommendations being deferred. The plans have been referred to an expert gardener for advice.

The contract for erecting an iron fence around Pavilions A and B and the Pathological Department was awarded on November 24 to the William Horne Company for

The Medical Service.

On recommendation of the Medical Board the appointment of an additional one-

year interne on the First Division was authorized.

A special room with special nursing for any member of the house staff who is ill and requires an operation while on duty will be arranged for hereafter by special action of the Board.

A request from the faculty of the Post-Graduate Hospital to be allowed participation in the teaching privileges at Bellevue was referred by the Trustees to the Medical Board for its advice. After considerable discussion it was decided to inform the Post-Graduate Hospital that no facilities were at present available for additional instruction and that the Trustees preferred to take the matter up in connection with the new hospital whenever that should be completed.

The appointment of paid anaesthetists to the hospital is under advisement. A proposal to divide the children's medical service between the first and fourth divisions was left unacted upon on account of the small number of children now in

It was decided to purchase fur overcoats for the use of surgeons engaged in

The Tuberculosis Service.

ambulance duty, these coats to remain the property of the Department.

Upon the recommendation of Dr. James Alexander Miller, Director of the Tuberculosis Clinics, endorsed by the Executive Committee of the Medical Board, the Board of Trustees has named four Adjunct Assistant Attending Physicians, one for each division, to the tuberculosis service at Bellevue, and has placed this entire service, which was formerly grouped with the alcoholic, prison and erysipelas services, under their charge, with Dr. Miller as Physician in Chief. Under this new arrangement it is expected to secure better treatment and increased individual attention for this class of unfortunates, while at the same time offering a greater inducement to physicians to take up a kind of work which is both exhausting and unrewarding when confined, as it was under the previous system, to the ambulatory cases coming to the hospital only for dispensary treatment. Under the new plan the same physicians will attend to both ward and out patient service, and thus be enabled to enlarge their experience, to the advantage of the patients coming under their care.

So great was the number of these patients during the early spring that two general medical wards had to be evacuated by their other patients and set apart for use as tuberculosis wards. Later in the summer the question of the proper care of these patients was referred to a special committee to take up with the heads of the Departments of Health and Public Charities, it being essential to provide more space elsewhere for their care. The salary of the Visiting Nurse in attendance upon the Out Patient Department clinic was increased to \$75 per month, it being reported to the Board that her visits to the homes of patients numbered between 400 and 500 a month. A recent census disclosed the presence of 67 patients in the tuberculosis wards of the hospital, the average length of stay of each patient being fourteen days. They are supposed to remain only until well enough to be removed to a tuberculosis hospital. but lack of accommodation in the special hospitals often requires their detention for

The Ferryboat Day Camp.

The idea of using the old Staten Island ferryboat "Southfield" as a day camp for tuberculous patients was suggested to the Trustees by Dr. Miller in a letter dated April 3. The boat had been used for this purpose last summer by the Charity Organization Society, which had abandoned the experiment through lack of funds. Dr. Miller proposed to anchor the boat to the sea wall at Bellevue, and announced that the nursing service would be provided by private funds if the Trustees would supply milk and eggs, a regular meal at midday, and the medical attendance by the same physicians on duty in the tuberculosis wards of the hospital. The Trustees voted to accept the proposal wind to make the day camp a part of the regular work of the hospital during the summer. It soon became necessary to employ three additional hospital helpers at salaries of \$20 per month each, with maintenance, and this was cheerfully allowed. Palating the boat, which was exceedingly shabby, and re-

"During the first four months, 387 patients attended the camp, and the benefit to them is apparent from the fact that distinct improvement resulted in 82 per cent. of all cases which attended regularly thirty days or more.

"We feel that the benefit to the children is especially great, and the institution of the open air school has been a most valuable and interesting adjunct."

Director for the year 1908 contains a statement as follows:

After so successful a season the Committee in charge felt unwilling to close the camp at the end of summer, particularly as the best results in such work are attainable in cold weather. To make the boat available for winter use it was estimated that \$2,200 would be required, and to cover at the same time the wages of necessary attendants it was decided to ask for an appropriation of \$5,000.

The Psychopathic Service.

The Board of Trustees received a petition from the Consulting Alienists and Neurologists of the hospital recommending the establishment in the new Bellevue of a Neuropsychiatric Department, in which cases of mental disease, alcoholism (exclusive of common drunkenness), epilepsy, hysteria and mild neuro-psychoses may be treated. The Board was favorably impressed with this suggestion, backed as it was by the names of some of the most distinguished specialists in this field of medicine, but decided first to submit the matter to the members of the Medical Board for their opinion, and this plan is still under advisement.

The installation of a system of continuous baths in the male and female psychopathic wards, at a cost not to exceed \$563, has been approved. The influence of this treatment upon excited persons has proved little short of wonderful, and it is believed that the comparatively slight expense involved will be entirely justified by

Permission was accorded an officer of the Marine Hospital Service to study

insanity in the wards under the direction of the Resident Alienist.

The rule requiring the residence of Dr. Gregory and both his assistants in the pavilion where the wards are situated has been relaxed to allow one of the assistants to reside outside the hospital when he is off duty, always providing that the other two men are present in the building.

Upon the request of the Mills School for Male Nurses, endorsed by the Resident Alienist, it was decided to allow two male nurses to take the place of the third attendant on night duty in the psychopathic ward and to substitute for two attendants on day duty. In this way the Nurses will add much to their practical training, while with this additional amount. the interests of the patients will be fully safeguarded.

A special clinic for nervous diseases has been started in the Out Patient Department, which it is hoped will be of great service to sufferers who are not sufficiently ill to justify their detention in the psychopathic ward.

A suggestion to place the alcoholic service under the care of the Resident Alienist has been referred to a joint committee of the Trustees and the Medical Board for consideration.

In order to permit of the establishment of a post-alcoholic service by Dr. Alex ander Lambert, involving a special dietary regime, the appointment of five additional Graduate Nurses was approved for a period of one month up to January 1.

The Dental Clinic.

The need of a place where gratuitous treatment of the teeth should be offered has long been a crying one in New York. At the Trustees' meeting of May 26, it was voted that a beginning should be made by caring for the teeth of the children in the hospital. Tooth brushes, at a cost of \$3.50 a gross, were purchased for the patients, and three dentists' chairs were ordered placed in one of the wards on the surgical side designated for this purpose. Place was made for the former inmates of this ward in one of the medical wards vacated upon the opening of Pavilions A and B. A set of dental instruments, costing between \$250 and \$300 was purchased upon the recommendation of Dr. Herbert Wheeler, who assumed charge of the work, securing the services of dentists willing to volunteer in this pioneer move-

It is believed that the new clinic, in the inauguration of which so many difficulties have been-overcome, will rise steadily in importance to the hospital and the community. For this much of the credit will be due to the unselfish efforts of Dr.

The Nursing Service.

To provide for the increased number of Nurses whom the proper care of the patients has made necessary, an apartment has been rented at \$40 per month in the building, No. 200 East Twenty-seventh street, and furniture has been bought. This arrangement will continue, of course, only until the completion of the Nurses' Home. A one year's renewal of the lease of the Probationers' Home, at No. 212 East Twenty-sixth street, was signed, and since the evacuation of the Emergency Hospital on Twenty-sixth street, caused by the transfer of the maternity service to the new pavilions at Bellevue, this building has also been used for the accommodation of'

During the summer twenty-five Nurses daily were absent from duty on their vacations, and their places were supplied by graduate, post-graduate, and in some cases, Pupil Nurses.

The practice on the part of the attending physicians and surgeons of requesting special nurses to care for particular patients is a growing one, and while the Trustees have been liberal in granting such requests and are loath to refuse them, the expense involved is very great and the system is in need of more strict regulation.

the opportunity afforded by the evacuation of the old wards, and the Board of Aldermen responded early in November to their request for the necessary funds by voting special revenue bonds in the amount of \$10,000. In this sum is included sufficient to effect changes in the Marquand Pavilion which will convert it into an isolating ward, thus superseding the wooden pavilion on the grounds which served temporarily for this purpose.

The crowded condition of the reception office is another evil with which the admitting physicians and other officials have had to contend, and this has been much aggravated by the detention there of patients waiting to be transfeerred to the Department of Charities. To relieve this congestion the Acting Superintendent, Mr. Rickard, suggested the construction of a waiting room in the yard, near the cook house, and the Trustees have asked for an appropriation not to exceed \$1,700 for this purpose. Another valuable suggestion of Mr. Rickard's was that a Ducker portable building be placed at the gate to serve as a reception office and visitors' bureau. This would serve the double purpose of permitting a much stricter control of visitors to the hospital (rendered desirable by the large number of thefts occurring recently), and of excavating the Registrar's quarters, which would be available for a patients' bath room, where all patients could be bathed and remove their street clothing before entering the wards, thus preventing the importation of vermin into the sleeping quarters of the hospital. So promising did this plan appear to the Trustees that they have asked also for funds (\$3,000) to put it into effect, and this request has been referred by the Board of Estimate to the Comptroller for his consideration and report.

A new tile floor has been placed in the amphitheatre at a cost of less than \$400. A wagon has been purchased for the removal of bodies to the Morgue. This takes the place of the old hand-trucks, which were of ugly and suggestive appearance.

The Trustees were happy to accept the kind offer of Mrs. Grant LaFarge to sow crocuses about the lawn of the hospital.

It was found necessary to move the storeroom for provisions back to its old quarters, the damp in the cellar under the north wing proving destructive.

The old system of referring to patients by the number of the bed occupied has been abolished, and they will hereafter be known by their names, all of which are inscribed in the central office.

The matter of installing electric lights in the Mills Training School is under

consideration by the Building Committee. Upon the occupation of the new pavilions all the large portable buildings were removed from the grounds and transferred to the Department of Charities for use

upon Blackwells Island. An award of \$3,300 was made to Frank A. Hall for the supply of 500 new enameled iron beds.

Miscellaneous.

It was voted to pay Rev. Mr. Dyer, Protestant Chaplain at Bellevue, the same

salary paid the Catholic and Jewish Chaplains.

The Trustees have requested the Municipal Civil Service Commission to hold competitive examination for the position of Dietitian.

There being no room in the dormitories for some of the new employees made necessary by the opening of the new pavilions, it has been necessary to pay them \$25

On recommendation of the Supervising Engineer, the payment of wages for the additional time put in by the Engineers during a vacancy on the force and in vacation time was approved by the Board of Trustees.

Census

The total number of days' treatment given at Bellevue Hospital during 1908 has been 329,832, as compared with 318,151 in 1907, and the average daily census, 901, as compared with 872. The largest number of patients treated at one time was 1,005. in 1963, and 971 in 1907. The total number cared for was 33,942, against 33,224

There were 94,754 visits made to the Out Patient Department by 22,746 patients, against 87,436 visits by 21,328 patients in 1907.

GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

Construction Work.

Payment upon the contract of John R. Sheehan & Co. for building and alterations at Gouverneur Hospital, was stopped early in the year pending advice from the Corporation Counsel. Upon receipt of this opinion a conference was held with the contractors, sub-contractors, their sureties, and representatives of the Finance Department, and, upon recommendation of the Architect, Mr. Raymond F. Almirall. and of the Department of Finance, the Trustees authorized, on June 2, the final payment of \$41,854.50, in full settlement of the contract, this sum representing a deduction of \$11,538 from the amount claimed by Sheehan.

The immediate question after the elimination of the old contractor concerned the best method of completing the work, repairing defects, etc. So confused and chaotic was the condition left behind them by the old contractors that it was felt to be difficult, if not impossible, to find a firm willing to take up the work. Application was therefore made to the Board of Aldermen for permission to conclude the necessary work without public letting of the contract, and this was accorded at the last meeting of that Board in June. Specifications for the necessary work were received from the Architect in July, and the matter was referred to the Building Committee with power to have the work completed in the most economical manner possible. After much difficulty in finding a responsible firm willing to undertake the work, the Committee recommended the appointment of Messrs. Van Name & Co., of No. 78 Wall street, and the Board confirmed their selection. The Contractors were at first unwilling to sign the agreement because of a clause permitting the Trustees to terminate it at any time, but their consent to this was finally obtained, and at their last meeting for the year the Trustees authorized the President to sign this contract.

A communication from Mr. R. F. Almirall, the Architect, called attention to the provisions of the contract with regard to his services, and the Board instructed the Chairman of the Building Committee to confer with him regarding a revision, and in case this could not be accomplished satisfactorily, to request the services of the Corporation Counsel. This latter course had eventually to be resorted to, and the Board requested the preparation of a new contract after consultation, with the Engineers of the Finance Department. On November 18 the Board was notified that the Finance Department refused to pay the balance due Mr. Almirall upon his contract, and the matter is at present in abeyance.

The Out-Patient Department.

The most important matter affecting the welfare of Gouverneur Hospital at the present time is the overcrowded condition of the Out-Patient Department. For six years past there has been a continual increase in the attendance, until the Physicians and Surgeons are no longer able properly to care for the patients applying for treatment, nor is it possible to increase the medical staff because of the lack of space to do proper work. An extensive investigation made by the Medical Board shows the need of doing something to improve conditions in the present quarters, and the Board of Trustees has considered asking for a new building, to be devoted exclusively to the uses of the dispensary, with, perhaps, quarters for nurses on the upper floors, in the immediate vicinity of the hospital. A vacant lot adjoining the hospital on the northeast would be admirably suited to this purpose, and it is hoped that the City may acquire it. The rooms in the hospital now occupied by the Dispensary are needed for another ward, so that the internal as well as external service of the institution would be benefited by the change. Before, however, applying to the financial authorities for more land, the Trustees, hearing of the contemplated removal of the New York Dispensary, a private institution, to the neighborhood of Gouverneur, took steps to ascertain the ability and willingness of this institution to care for the overflow from the Gouverneur Dispensary. The plans of the New York Dispensary were afterward changed, however, and a communication sent to the neighboring hospitals asking them to accept dispensary patients free of charge (instead of charging them a fee of ten cents) remained equally without effect. The Trustees have therefore returned to the idea of acquiring property in the vicinity for a new dispensary building, and several possible sites are at present under investigation.

The Tuberculosis Day Camp.

The Superintendent was instructed on June 2 to make inquiries concerning the possibility of obtaining a suitable anchorage near Gouverneur Hospital for an old ferryboat to be equipped as a day camp for the sufferers from tuberculosis belonging in that vicinity. Such an anchorage was found at a distance of two blocks from the hospital, and the old ferryboat "Westfield," formerly of the Staten Island service, was assigned to the use of the Trustees, but such difficulties arose in connection with the problem of its maintenance that it was necessary to turn it over to the local auxiliary committee affiliated with the tuberculosis service of the Gouverneur Dispensary. It was found impossible, by reason of the limited kitchen facilities of the hospital, to cook meals for seventy-five persons additional every day, even if a plan could have been devised for supplying them warm two blocks away. The number of additional helpers required to carry out the plan also made it impractical, so far as the hospital was concerned. With such co-operation as it was in the power of the Trustees to supply the plan was carried out by the auxiliary committee, and was of considerable value to the neighborhood.

The following is an extract from a report received from the Auxiliary at the end of the year:

"The Auxiliary was formed in May, 1908. Through the courtesy of various City officials and with the co-operation of the Board of Trustees, the old Staten Island ferryboat 'Westfield' was opened as a day camp at the foot of Jackson street, East River, on July 20. Contributions amounting to \$800 had been collected and the camp was maintained seventy-one days at an average cost of forty cents

"It was opened at 9 a. m., and for twenty-eight days during the heated term was not officially closed until 11 p. m.; on stormy days it was closed at 5 p. m.

"The total number of patients attending was ninety-nine; all but two of these were in the Gouverneur district, or the southerly end of the Bellevue tubercular district. The average attendance daily was twenty-five.

"Inquiry among the absentees developed the fact that the sweat shops' season being in full swing, the patients who improved felt that they must go to work while work was to be had. The weekly visits to the clinic of the various patients gave the clinic doctors an opportunity of observing the medical value of the camp. According to their report the condition of the patients attending the clinic had never been so satisfactory at the close of the summer term as it was on Sep-

"The Auxiliary feels that the camp of 1908 was a successful experiment. The year 1909 having had the advantage of 1908 as an advertisement will, doubtless, see the camp more adequately used.

"Owing to the exclusion of all except patients having cards denoting attendance at the clinic, many, especially mothers with small children, were unable to attend because their children were excluded. The low average attendance was a disappointment, but the Auxiliary realizes that until it is in a position to materially assist the wage earner financially, that the patient must work while able.

The instant response to treatment, the gain in weight, and the general improvement of the patient after a very short time, proved beyond a doubt that if the patient were able to take the time needed, he could be cured in the environment in which he must reside in order to make a living.

"This matter becomes a question for charitable organizations rather than hospitals, but as it explains the reason of the low average attendance, the Auxiliary feels it should be embodied in the report."

The Medical and Nursing Services.

An additional member of the House Staff for a term of one year has been anpointed and the services of two members of the staff have been increased from twelve to eighteen months, six months of which must be spent in the Pathological Laboratory.

The appointment of an X-ray shotographer to the hospital has been decided upon as soon as the position shall be established.

Gouverneur Hospital is a difficult place to reach at night, particularly for those

members of the attending staff who live uptown. From time to time the question of providing a conveyance for the dectors summoned on hurry calls has arisen, but

there is no room for a carriage in the ambulance stable and there is no convenient livery stable in the neighborhood. For the time being the Trustees have authorized physicians summoned on emergency calls at night to hire a carriage, preferably a taxicab, and render the Board a bill for the same.

The Trustees transferred to the Charities Department the sum of \$4,716 in payment of the Nurses supplied by the City Training School. To meet a dechit of \$189.37 in the salaries account and \$2,000 in the supplies account, it was necessary to transfer moneys from the salaries account at Bellevue.

The stationing of a policeman to assist in keeping order in the overcrowded dispensary has been very desirable, but application to the Police Commissioner to assign an officer to this post has been met with a refusal, owing to the scarcity of men

Miscellaneous.

On the recommendation of the Supervising Nurse a flooring of tile has been laid in the office, the substitution being required upon sanitary grounds.

Four aseptic instrument cabinets have been purchased for the hospital. The construction of a clothes room on the first floor of the fiospital has been

decided upon

The contractor for the construction of the new coal vault was extremely dilatory in his work, and had to be reprimanded frequently by the Board of Trustees. The Board refused the second payment on his contract until he had completed the sumppit as shown on the plans. He was informed at this time that unless he completed the work as planned by the Architect other contractors would be called in to do so at his expense. On June 29 it was necessary to notify the Architect to take action to have the work completed according to the terms of the contract. The question of allowing the contractor an extension of time by reason of the difficulties he encountered is still pending.

The total number of days' treatment at Gouverneur Hospital during 1908 has been 48,764, as compared with 38,732 in 1907, and the average daily census 133. as compared with 105. The largest number of patients treated at one time was 156 in 1908 and 141 in 1907. The total number cared for was 3,760, against 3,696 in 1907.

There were 112,823 visits made to the Out Patient Department by 55,605 patients,

against 96,960 visits by 50,456 patients in 1907.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

A long dispute with the contractors for the layout of the grounds surrounding the new Harlem Hospital has resulted in their final payment after decision by the Corporation Counsel that they might be relieved of their penalty and paid in full Before authorizing this payment the Trustees invited the Architect, Mr. J. H. Freedlander, to pass upon the work, as required by the terms of the contract, and upon his recommendation the final certificate was issued. A gardener has been placed in charge of the grounds, and early in November they were reseeded and manured.

A proposition, made by Mr. D. Barta, Civil and Landscape Engineer, to prepare plans and specifications for the planting of trees and shrubs in the grounds about Harlem and Fordham Hospitals at a cost of \$50 each, was approved by the Board of Trustees, and these having been obtained, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to invite bids from various nurserymen upon the work, the lowest of which, for Harlem, was that of S. Siebrecht & Son, for \$658.07. A number of the trees and bushes were found to be dead, and the firm was notified to remove them and replace them with others before the bills would be paid. On September 27 Siebrecht asked for a partial payment, and the Board voted to grant him half the amount of his bill. This method of payment was not, however, approved by the Department of Finance, and when full payment was requested again the Board declined until such time as would show whether or not the trees and bushes were likely to survive. A suggestion from the Department of Finance that bills be rendered for such work as was acceptable to the Trustees came to nothing, as no one was able to certify as to the condition of the trees in midwinter.

The New Nurses' Home.

Working drawings and specifications for the new Nurses' Home were received from the Architect, Mr. R. F. Almirall, on March 24, and referred to the Building Committee for their inspection. It was understood that no bill should be rendered for these until the Trustees had received an appropriation to begin the work. This was refused at the time by reason of the City's burden of debt, and the Board waited until October 12 before renewing its request for the neeeded Corporate Stock. The home is much needed, rooms required for the hospital service being occupied by Nurses, while two additional furnished rooms, accommodating two Nurses each, have had to be rented outside, in addition to the house already occupied for this purpose.

New Flooring for the Balconies.

Decision was made to replace the open work floorings of the balconies with the kind of solid floorings used at Fordham and Gouverneur Hospitals. A great mistake was made in the Harlem floorings, as they permit of drippings to the balcony below. besides exposing to the view of those underneath persons on the balcony above. The estimated cost of this was \$1,900, and permission was obtained from the Board of Estimate to advertise for bids and award the contract. The actual cost was more than had been anticipated, the lowest bidder proving to be John F. Kuhn, who submitted an offer of \$2,373, which was accepted. The contractor has just submitted a statement of reasons for delay in the work and has asked for an extension of his time.

The Medical Service.

On recommendation of the Medical Board, two additional members of the House Staff (one year Internes) have been appointed. The Medical Board recommends a twenty instead of twenty-four months' service, and this is at present under consideration by the Trustees.

A room has been set apart as a reception ward for children, who are now detained here for a few days until it becomes evident that they are suffering from no contagious disease.

The number of visitors allowed to children each visiting day was reduced to two. Request of the surgeons for rubbers to be used in the operating room was granted. The Trustees gave their approval to a rule requiring a patient to be seen by a Visiting or Assistant Visiting Physician or Surgeon before leaving the hospital so far as this is practicable.

The heat of the operating room last summer was much complained of, and it is probable that an awning will be purchased for use this year.

One of the dressing rooms on the second floor has been designated for the treatment of "hot-pack" cases requiring a special temperature.

A new rule authorizing the direct transfer to Riverside and Metropolitan Hospitals of patients suffering from tuberculosis will save needless trouble and in some cases actual suffering.

An observation stand for the use of students and visiting surgeons in the operating room has been supplied.

Dressing rooms have been provided at the west end of the hall, to the great inprovement of the service. A shower bath in the Surgeons' dressing room at a cost of \$173 has been installed. Sixty dollars additional was allowed the contractors for replastering, it being found that the closets were plastered in the rough.

Improvements, Repairs, etc.

Report was made to the Trustees that the mangle in the power house was working unsatisfactorily, and investigation showed that it had been installed in a faulty manner by the sub-contractors, the American Laundry Machinery Company. The contractors were communicated with, they having given a guarantee for the satisfactory working of all machinery for a period of one year, and were instructed to give the subcontractors three days' time in which to begin to remedy the defects. The work was promptly attended to and the mangle is now satisfactory.

The fire hose in use at the hospital proved to be unsatisfactory, on test, and when bids were received for more the hose offered by the firm making the lowest bid was found to lack the endorsement of the Underwriters' Laboratories. The Superintendent was instructed to communicate with the Board of Underwriters and discover the kind recommended by them before purchasing new.

The work of the dispensary has so largely increased that the services of an Assistant Apothecary are required.

avenue entrance.

The appointment of a radiographer to work here and at Gouverneur Hospital is highly desirable. Dr. W. H. Stewart, who has been doing this work, has not been paid for it, owing to a technicality of the law, it having been found that as an employee of the Board of Health he was not entitled to draw two salaries from the City. He is, however, ready to give up his Board of Health position to accept that as radiographer.

The Trustees have decided to ask for the payment of a salary of \$450 to the Catholic Chaplain.

The Head Clerk has been made a notary public, to the great convenience of the hospital service.

There were 89,705 visits made to the Out Patient Department by 33,767 patients,

against 56,473 visits by 23,190 in 1907.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The Finance Department on May 1 recommended the payment of the \$1,000 due the John H. Parker Company on their contract. Much trouble was experienced on account of damp at the base of one of the elevator pits in the new hospital, which was the cause of considerable damage to the machinery. Difference of opinion over the cause of this existed between the architect and the builders, the former claiming that the specifications had not been adhered to as regarded damp-proofing, and the latter alleging entire compliance with the plans and specifications. Bids for repairing the work were received on July 30, and again on August 24, but were unsatisfactory to the Trustees and were rejected. They ranged all the way from \$4,800 to \$11,880. The advertisement was then withdrawn and the matter referred to the Building Committee for their attention. Finally examination by the Department Inspector of Building Construction revealed a leak in one of the water pipes causing such pressure as no damp-proofing could resist. Steps were immediately taken to repair the leak, and the damage was repaired by the hospital men.

Through saving in the nursing service the transfer of \$13,000 from the salaries account to the general uses of the Department was made possible. The saving was caused by the establishment of a post-graduate course of nursing and the employment of Post-Graduate Nurses, at \$300 per annum, in place of Graduate Nurses receiving

\$600 per annum. Reference has already been made in the report for Harlem Hospital to the contract for supplying the grounds of Fordham Hospital with trees and shrubs.

The Medical Service.

Permission was given the General Medical Superintendent early in the summer to transfer to Fordham all such patients as in his opinion might be benefited by the change. This was made possible by the low census at the time in the uptown institution. . . E.

The attention of the Medical Board was directed to the need of a supervisory committee for the Out-Patient Department, where the doctors were found to have fallen into some irregularity in their attendance.

Dr. Placek, of the House Staff, has attended in the past to the X-ray photography at this institution, and a regular Radiographer will be needed upon his retirement. At the request of the Trustees instruction has been given the Ambulance Surgeons by the Medical Board in the art of applying splints and proper dressings in the ambulance or before the case is brought to the hospital.

For the benefit of students and visiting surgeons a platform or observation stand

has been ordered in the operating room.

Miscellaneous.

It has been proposed to extend the engine house for the purpose of providing a workshop and storeroom, but the Building Committee recommended as an alternative to this the erection of a one-story building divided into three shops, and the suggestion has been referred to an architect for the preparation of plans and an estimate.

It has been voted to give the plan of dumping the hospital ashes into the depression to the north of the hospital a trial.

At the request of Rev. S. J. Krim, Roman Catholic Chaplain at the hospital, the Board agreed to allow the use of the dispensary waiting room for the saying of Mass on Sunday morning, it being agreed that the City should be placed under no expense in the matter and that the privilege of holding services at a different hour should be extended to the clergy of any other denomination desiring it. A large percentage of the inmates at Fordham Hospital are Catholics, and the hospital building is so remote from any church of this faith that the privilege was highly coveted.

The following is the report of the Secretary of the Board of Managers read at the graduating exercises:*

In moving to-day into the new Nurses' Residence and leaving the old home first occupied in 1877, the Managers of the Bellevue Training School wish to remind their friends that the management and aims of the school are in no way changed and that the interest and aid of the public is as earnestly asked for as formerly.

The City has built and equipped with the greatest generosity a handsome new residence and is expending on the training and maintenance of the nurses all that can be legitimately expected and by the terms of their contract with the City the Managers of the School will continue, as heretofore, to devote the income of their endowment fund to the School. But in addition to this it will be necessary to continue to appeal to the friends of the School for special funds to supply extra lectures, classes on physical culture or other requirements of modern training which may arise, and to enable them to fulfill the many exactions of a great and yearly expanding educational institution. Our nurses have unequalled opportunities for practical experience, but we cannot expect the City to furnish them with all the extra instruction and advantages given by private schools, and so the Managers must supplement its allowance in many ways. It is appropriate on this occasion to recall in a few words the history of our School.

First conceived of in January, 1872, by a committee of ladies on the State Board of Charities, it rapidly grew from a daring experiment in the introduction of hygiene and humanity into the nursing of the City hospitals, into an organized school, modelled on the rules laid down by Miss Nightingale and recognized as a necessary branch of the equipment of a modern hospital.

It is well known with what mistrust refined women were at first permitted to visit and then to be trained in the wards of a public hospital where Nurses were then recruited from the ranks of vagrants or prisoners, and where in America Trained Nurses were unknown, and their advisability doubted. The same experiment was, however, inaugurated in certain other cities almost simultaneously, and the little band of pioneers who conceived and carried out this great revolution in New York in the face of many difficulties and discouragements were soon rewarded by the approval and confidence of the public and of the medical profession. An arrangement was made with the City by which the school then founded, was to furnish Nurses, at first for a very limited, and then for a larger number of wards. A stipulated maintenance was paid by the City, while certain other supplementary expenses, notably the Nurses' Home, and much of the supervision was supplied by friends of the school.
In 1877, No. 426 East Twenty-sixth street was given by Mrs. William H. Osborn,

and this building for many years served as a commodious and cheerful home for the Nurses, until outgrown by the necessary increase in their number. In 1904 it became evident that with the building of the new hospital, the City

must assume financial responsibility for the school. The managers, accordingly in June, 1906, entered into a new relation with the City, signing a contract, the terms of which may be found in full, appended to this report.

We should enumerate here certain names prominent in the history of the school. First, that of Miss Louisa Lee Schuyler, who organized in 1872 the committee to report on nursing in the public hospitals of New York, and then of the following committee

who organized the school and were among its first officers.

Mrs. W. H. Osborn, Mrs. Robert Woodworth, Mrs. W. P. Griffin, Mrs. Joseph Hobson, Miss Woolsey, Miss Ellen Collins, Miss Julia Gould, Mr. H. G. Stebbins and Dr. Gill Wylie, then one of the House Surgeons, and who by his sympathy and initiative was of great aid in founding the school.

Our presidents have been: Mrs. Alexander Hamilton, Mrs. David Lane, Mrs. William Preston Griffin and Mrs. William Church Osborn, and our devoted superintendents, Miss Helen Bowden (Sister Helen), Miss E. P. Perkins, Miss Agnes Brennan, Miss Jane Delano and Miss Annie Goodrich.

We must also mention the names of Dr. James R. Wood, Dr. Austin Flint, Dr. Spittered Dr. James R. Wood, Dr. Austin Flint, Dr.

Stephen Smith and Dr. James M. Markee, members of the Medical Board who stood

by the school in moments of sore trial and helped to fight its battles.

To-day, the earnest gratitude of the managers and of the public is due to the Hon. George B. McClellan, the Mayor, who has, through the Board of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and under its able President, Dr. John W. Brannan, consummated the great work begun thirty-two years ago, equipping Bellevue with a school adequate to its needs. It seemed a chimerical proposal when Dr. Brannan first suggested to the managers the possibility of the City's providing a modern building on this present advantageous site, and they feel that the only adequate means of expressing to him their appreciation of what he has done, is to endeavor to maintain the school at an even higher level than before. This will be made possible by the greater facilities for the accommodation and instruction of the Nurses in the new residence.

This year a preparatory course designed to prepare students for admission to training schools for Nurses, is offered by the Department of Hospital Economy at the

Teacher's College of Columbia University, the only college which at present has such a Department, and it is with much gratitude that we announce that they have arranged to send their pupils to our school for their practical experience.

The managers are happy to announce that the old home, No. 426 East Twentysixth street, will be remodeled and equipped as an alumnae club house and registry office in memory of Mrs. William H. Osborn, and will be rented for a nominal sum by the Board of Managers to the Alumnae Association.

In April, 1908, the school met a great loss in the resignation of Dr. Samuel Armstrong, the Medical Superintendent of the Hospital, who had always been most efficient and helpful in his relations with the school. In February, 1909, Dr. W. H. Smith became Medical Superintendent, and has since given us courteous and able

The most important event of the past year in the hospital was the opening of the first of the new Pavilions A and B, for the medical patients; the first patients being admitted on November 7. The maternity wards were opened on the first week in December, and the increased facilities have already nearly doubled the service. The entire number of beds in these pavilions, including the infants' beds in the maternity

department, is 430. On admittance, the children are kept in the observation wards on the ground floor for twenty-four hours or longer, before being transferred to the fifth floor, which is entirely devoted to the children's service; the ward on the south side being used for children under a year, and the one on the north for children from one to twelve years. As the total number of beds is eighty-five, an unusual experience is offered in diseases

of infants and children. A dental clinic, for the benefit of the patients in the hospital, especially for the children, was opened in October, and some thirty dentists were appointed by the hospital to carry on the work: two or three Doctors and a Nurse being in attendance daily from 2 to 5. Every effort is made that the children, whose teeth require at-

tention, shall be treated before leaving the hospital. One of the minor, but important changes was the complete renovation of the amphitheatre during the summer, and the construction of a third operating room on the same floor, which has been equipped, and its constant use has necessitated the

appointment of a third graduate Nurse for the Department. The social service and convalescent relief work of the hospital has steadily increased. It has been organized with a Bureau, which directs committees in charge of different branches of the work, and is administered by an Executive Committee, composed of hospital and training school officials and members from committees. Each committee has a Head Nurse in charge, and is responsible for funds and cases in its own Department. The office of the Social Service Bureau is administered by a paid Executive Secretary, who represents the Executive Committee. The General Superintendent of Training Schools has the appointment of all Nurses employed by the Bureau. The three committees so far officially recognized by the Bureau are the Women's Auxiliary to the Bellevue Tuberculosis Clinic, the Convalescent Relief Committee and the Free Synagague Committee.

Last May the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor asked per mission to demonstrate the value of the convalescent relief work in connection with the babies, both in the wards and in the dispensary, by placing one of the association Nurses in charge. Miss Grace Franklin, a graduate of the New York City Hospital whom they appointed, obtained such good results that Bellevue undertook the work, and in September appointed Miss Sarah Shaw, a graduate of the class of 1896, to carry it on. The association very kindly allowed Miss Shaw to spend some weeks with them, familiarizing herself with their methods, before she regularly assumed the

On May 25, the "Southfield," an abandoned ferryboat was opened as a day camp for tuberculosis patients, and even throughout the winter has had from fifty to seventy patients daily. Miss Alice Kurtz, a graduate of the Mount Sinai Training School, was placed in charge, and on her resignation, January 1, 1909, Miss Ruth Clark, a graduate of the Presbyterian Hospital, succeeded her, with Miss Elizabeth Wilkenson, a Bellevue graduate of the class of 1900, as Assistant.

Miss Maria Kellam, of the class of 1901, was appointed on May 25, to carry on the convalescent relief work of the tuberculosis patients in the hospital. Miss Kellam resigned in June, and was succeeded by Mrs. Mary Carter of the class of 1898

It being necessary to increase the force in the tuberculosis dispensary, Miss Adelia Massepust, of the class of 1907, was appointed in October, 1908.

The continued increase in the work of the social service office, necessitating another Assistant, Miss Sarah Shaw was transferred from the relief work with the babies to this position, and Miss Arthur, who had been for some months in charge of the children's ward, received her appointment.

Miss Wadley, the Nurse in charge of the social service and convalescent work. was given a leave of absence in November to attend an extensive exhibit of convalescent relief work, which was prepared in her office, for the Elmira Conference of Charities. In April Miss Wadley was appointed Executive Secretary to the Social Service Bureau

A post-graduate course of six weeks is now offered in this Department, and several applications have been received. Two Nurses who were to carry on the social service work in other hospitals have spent some time in Bellevue, Miss Izzard, who was to establish the convalescent relief work at Roosevelt, and Miss Kiel, who was to take up the work in connection with the tuberculosis department at St. Luke's Hospital.

Changes in the Administrative Staff.

On the resignation of Miss Frances Stone, Superintendent of Nurses at Fordham October 1, 1908, Miss Frances Detwiler, the First Assistant at Bellevue, was appointed to succeed her.

At Harlem Miss Edith McCoy resigned on October 1 to be married, and Miss Julia Stimson, a graduate of the New York Hospital, was appointed in her stead, with - Miss Lillian Goodfellow as Assistant.

Miss Georgia Ely, Second Assistant at Bellevue, resigned to take the Assistant's position at the Touro Infirmary in New Orleans, and when a few months later she received the appointment of Superintendent of Nurses in the same institution Miss Elizaboth Shellabarger resigned from the Administrative Staff to go with her.

Miss Alice Townsend, who for some months was Night Superintendent, resigned in August to take the position of Superintendent of the Training School at the Manhattan State Hospital, and Miss Loretta Hamlin was appointed in her stead.

Miss Winifred Noon and Miss Adelaide Irving, of the class of 1907, were appointed

on the Administrative Staff in September. Miss Jessica Vient, formerly Night Superintendent, was placed in charge of Pavilions A and B, to receive and place the equipment, and still remains there as Supervisor. Mrs. Martha Scott, of the class of 1903, was appointed Night Superintendent. Miss Mabel Bishop, of the class of 1905, was placed in charge of the Children's

Department, on the transfer of Mrs. Carter to the Relief work with the babies. Miss Edna Cutler, the Hospital Dietitian, resigned October 7, and her place has since been filled satisfactorily by her former Assistant, Miss Jeanette Hynes. Miss · Hynes is a graduate of the Hudson State Hospital and has also taken a post-graduate course at Bellevue.

Miss Frances Stone, formerly Superintendent of Nurses at Fordham Hospital, returned to Bellevue to open the new Nurses' Residence, and Miss Martha Horrigan, of the class of 1881, is temporarily assisting her, and will later be in charge at night.

The graduating class numbers twenty-seven. One thousand and sixty-nine letters of inquiry for admission to the School have

been received during the year. Seventy-three Probationers have entered and twenty-nine have been accepted.

Six hundred and seven inquiries for post-graduate courses have been received. One hundred and eighty-six Nurses have entered for these courses, varying from

three to nine months. Ninety-two certificates have been awarded: Bellevue twenty, Harlem forty and

Fordham thirty-two.

These pupils have come from many different States and from Canada. England. Denmark, Sweden and Scotland.

A six months' course in general administrative work has been established at Fordham, for which six Nurses have entered, four of whom have received certificates, giving an experience of two months in the Housekeeping Department and in the offices of the Training School and Hospital.

Miss Georgia Rowan, who completed this course in February, has received the ap-

pointment of Assistant Superintendent of Nurses at Fordham.

The delay in the occupancy of the new Residence and the increased number of Nurses demanded by the new Pavilion made it necessary to arrange for accommodations outside of the present Nurses' Home. The upper floor of the Emergency Hospital, which was vacant owing to the service having been transferred to the new building, was taken for this purpose, and a very comfortable dormitory equipped.

The Edith Summer Home opened in July and closed on September 3, and was in charge of Miss Horrigan. It was well filled during the entire season, thirty-two graduates and four of our pupils availing themselves of its privileges.

Seven Graduate Nurses have been cared for in the Lazarus Pavilion.

We are again indebted to Dr. Carlisle and to Dr. Coakley for their unfailing interest in the welfare of the pupils.

To our excellent lecture course has been added a most interesting series on the

'Diseases of Infants and Children," by Dr. Malcolm Goodridge.

At the completion of Dr. Rimer's lectures on "Sanitation and Hygiene" Dr. Doty gave the Nurses an interesting trip to the Quarantine Station. This is an unusual opportunity which is highly valued.

We must in closing express our deep appreciation of the devotion of our General Superintendent and the Superintendents and Assistants who have been as ever unremitting in their service to the School and Hospital.

REPORT OF THE PSYCHOPATHIC WARDS FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1908.

To the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals:

Gentlemen—The annual report of the Psychopathic Wards of Bellevue Hospital for the twelve months ending December 31, 1908, is herewith respectfully submitted.

Movement of Population.

During the past year the total number of admissions to the Psychopathic Wards were 3,212, of whom 1,673 were men and 1,539 women patients. At the beginning of the year there were 36 patients, 17 men and 19 women, in the wards.

These patients were distributed in the following manner: 1,288 men and 1,235 women, nearly 78 per cent. of the total admissions, were committed to the various State Hospitals, chiefly to Manhattan and Central Islip. There were committed to private sanatoria 48 patients, 30 men and 18 women. These, however, include only those patients who were committed directly from the Psychopathic Wards to private sanatoria. A number of others, in addition, were discharged to the custody of friends and relatives, by whom they were subsequently taken to private institutions. There were transferred to the Medical and Surgical Wards of the hospital 53 patients, 26 men and 27 women, as it was found that their mental condition resulted from some medical or surgical disease which required care in these wards. The Department of Public Charities received 84 patients, 39 men and 45 women. These patients were largely those who showed mental impairment due to old age, epilepsy, or were originally weakminded. Such are not regarded as proper patients for admission by the State Hospitals, and were therefore sent to institutions provided for them by the Department of Public Charities.

During the year 381 patients, 214 men and 167 women, were discharged to the custody of relatives and friends. Many of these patients had so improved under treatment that it was deemed advisable to discharge them, inasmuch as their friends were in a position to adequately provide for them at home. Some were taken home in spite of our advice to the contrary. Others had to be discharged because they could not be committed legally to a State Hospital, although they required further treatment, which we were unable to give, owing to limited accommodations. The number of deaths were 19, 8 men and 11 women. Eighty-nine patients, 58 men and 31 women, completely recovered and were so discharged. There were 22 patients, 8 men and 14 women, who presented no mental disorder whatever. On December 31, 1908, there remained in the wards 29 patients, 19 men and 10 women.

Increase in the Number of Admissions.

A great deal has been said of late, both in this country and abroad, about the general increase in insanity. The report of the State Charities Aid Association for the year 1908 shows an increase over the previous year of 1,414 cases admitted in New York State, which includes those committed to State hospitals and private sanatoria as well as to hospitals for the criminal insane. The average annual increase for the past ten years was only 741, approximately one-half of what it was the last year.

In looking over the admissions to the psychopathic wards since the creation of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals in 1902, it will be seen that there has been a steady increase in the yearly admissions with the exception of 1905, when the admissions were a trifle less than in 1904. The total number of admissions in 1902 was 2,363; in 1903, 2,488; in 1904, 2,639; in 1905, 2,590; in 1906, 2,757; in 1907, 3,147; during the present year, 3,212. Thus the total increase in the number of admissions of 1908 over those of 1902 was 849 patients, or 26.5 per cent. This increase of 26.5 per cent. in the number of admissions in six years might be said to be indicative of the increased prevalence of insanity, which is greater than the natural growth in population (Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx) for the corresponding years, which, according to the statistics of the Department of Health, is 20.5 per cent.

This disparity in the increased number of admissions over the growth of population, however, instead of showing the increased prevalence of insanity, can be explained, I think, by the greater confidence of the public in hospitals for the insane. In our daily work we are glad to see the gradual waning of the ancient prejudice against hospitals for the insane. At the present time friends and relatives are beginning to pring patients to the hospital, not when they are compelled to do so as a last resort, but for treatment, even when the patients are quiet and tractable and could safely be cared for at home. The fact that the proportion of patients committed to State hospitals has been greater than the increased number of admissions to the psychopathic wards clearly indicates this. The number of patients committed to State hospitals from the psychopathic wards in 1902 was 1,555, or 65 per cent. of our total admissions, whereas in 1908 there were committed to State hospitals 2,523, or 78.5 per cent. of our

In this connection, the inadequacy of our accommodations should be pointed out again. The building we are now using was erected in 1898, when undoubtedly it was thought to be ample for the purpose. Since then, however, there has been a great increase in the number of patients, more than one-third of the annual admissions at that time. Now we accommodate nearly 1,000 patients more yearly than previous to 1900. Even if our accommodations are taxed to their utmost capacity continuously, we are compelled to keep patients under observation for less than five days. Moreover, owing to the spasmodic and unequal rate of daily admissions, we are frequently overcrowded and compelled to use extra beds on the floor of the wards. Again, the number of Nurses and Medical Staff remains the same as in 1902, although, as has already been pointed out, the work done is one-third greater than formerly. Thus we are overcrowded, overworked, and are scarcely able to give that amount of attention which work of this serious character requires.

If the rate of increase continues in the future, as there is every reason to believe it will, it will very shortly become a physical impossibility to care for the patients with our present building accommodations.

Clinic for Out-Patients.

Although the clinic and dispensary for the out-door patients as an adjunct to the psychopathic wards was inaugurated in the beginning of 1908, it was not in full operation until the latter part of the year owing to the fact that the increased work in the psychopathic wards scarcely permitted us to devote the requisite amount of time to it. The dispensary grew so rapidly that it became necessary to have additional physicians in attendance for the out-door patients. Two physicians, Dr. Charles G. Brink and Dr. A. A. Brill, who have had wide experience in this particular line of work, were appointed as assistants in the Department of Mental and Nervous Diseases in the out-patient clinic. These gentlemen served for some time before they were officially appointed by your Honorable Board, and I take this opportunity to thank them for their assistance which was so necessary and pressing at the time.

The number of patients treated at the out-door clinic was 95-50 men and 45 women. These patients made 272 visits to the dispensary. It should be stated in passing that the clinic is open only one afternoon a week for two hours. Of that number of patients treated 18 made complete recovery and 14 patients showed marked improvement. Six patients who originally came to the dispensary for treatment were suffering from severe forms of mental disease and were referred to the psychopathic wards, and subsequently committed to State hospitals. Twenty-seven patients were referred from the psychopathic wards to the dispensary. They included mild psychoses and borderland conditions, which, after examination, were found to be obviously not proper cases for commitment, but required further care and treatment which could not be given at the psychopathic wards because of lack of accommodations; therefore they were referred to the out-patient department.

The clinic for the out-patients as an adjunct to the psychopathic wards has great possibilities in accomplishing good in the treatment of mental and nervous diseases. One of the most crying needs, at the present time, in the treatment of such disorders, to my mind, is to be able to bring these patients under proper treatment as early as possible. This out-patient service is one of the most effective steps in this direction. Because mental and nervous diseases are insidious and gradual in their onset, and because, in the beginning, most of the symptoms are more or less subjective in their character, such patients do not seek relief until their malady has made considerable headway, requiring, therefore, prolonged and protracted treatment. This condition of affairs is largely responsible for the erroneous but prevalent idea among the laiety that nervous diseases are chronic, and more or less incurable and for which little or nothing can be done. The fact is, however, that if these patients are brought under supervision and treatment very early they frequently respond to treatment as readily as do other physical diseases.

It is pleasing to be able to note, notwithstanding our limited facilities and the short period the clinic has been organized, that we have been able to treat successfully more than eighteen patients whose condition was such that if they had presented themselves at the psychopathic wards instead of at the clinic we should have been compelled to commit them to State hospitals. It was possible, however, to treat them at the clinic and to permit them to attend their daily vocations and support themselves and those dependent on them, as well as to save them from the unnecessary stigma of

having been inmates in institutions for the insane.

However, the most important and far-reaching service of this out-patient department lies in the line of prevention and prophylaxis. The tendency and goal of modern medicine is in the direction of the prevention of disease rather than its cure, and I think the time has come to do prophylactic work by educating the public in this branch of medicine just as has been done in the recent crusade against tuberculosis. Such educational work has robbed this disease of its terrors, so that "consumption" is not now regarded as a uniformly fatal disease, and its victims are happily decreasing.

The most fruitful source of mental and nervous disorders is disregard of the rules of "mental hygiene," concerning which the public is entirely in the dark and to which physicians rarely attach any significance. As in the case of tuberculosis, very little can be accomplished by simply diagnosticating the disease and giving advice, unless the patients are also taught and educated how to avoid the conditions which still exist and which have contributed to their disorder. It is a well-known fact that the mind can deteriorate by persistent morbid and unhygienic habits of thought, and by reason of influences and surroundings which are not conducive to rectifying this unhealthy mode of thinking. A mistaken idea held by a neurotic patient, with home surroundings which unintentionally perhaps accentuate the condition, will be the foundation, frequently, for a very grave mental disorder. Therefore, in doing preventive work in the treatment of mental and nervous diseases, it is not enough to merely consider individuals and their mental makeup, but the treatment must also include the regulation of their mental life in the home and business surroundings. The correction of trivial misunderstandings in the family life and the home attitude towards the patient and his illness, or a complete removal of the patient from his former surroundings, if necessary, may frequently be sufficient to prevent a serious mental and nervous breakdown in a neuropathic individual. That this is not merely a theory has been amply demonstrated by Dejerine in Paris and by Putnam and Cabot in the Massachusetts General Hospital, where work along these lines has given profitable results. We have endeavored, to some extent, to do preventative and prophylactic work through the assistance of the Social Service Department of the hospital, and the energy and cooperation of its chief, Miss Wadley, has contributed greatly to its successful results. There is an almost unlimited field for profitable work along these lines, but it requires a tremendous amount of time and a corps of skillful workers. Miss Wadley and her associates are already overwhelmed with the work of the other departments, so that but a limited amount of attention, of necessity, can be devoted to the Psychiatric Department. It would be of great benefit if an assistant could be added to Miss Wadley's staff of workers who could devote her entire time to this department.

"Disposition of Habitual Drunkards."

It is to be regretted that the bill for the establishment of a farm colony for inebriates failed to pass the last Legislature. Public opinion, however, and the charitable organizations especially are aroused to such a degree that it is not necessary to again point out the absolute need of an institution of this character, and it is only a question of time when the State will be forced to make proper provisions for persons of this

One important point, however, should be borne in mind in the establishing of a farm colony for inebriates, and that is that the aim should be to give it the atmosphere of a hospital rather than a penal institution. An alcoholic habitue can never be reclaimed by imprisonment or confinement in surroundings which diminish his already lessened self-respect. The most effective remedy or means which can save an inebriate unless mental deterioration has already progressed is to surround him with uplifting influences which inspire hope and courage. The farm colony, therefore, should be mainly like a hospital in character, with added educational, moral and religious influences rather than a corrective, penal institution.

Accidents and Injuries and Patients with Criminal Tendencies.

I regret that during the year there were two suicides which occurred within a short period of each other and were aromptly reported to your Honorable Board and investigated. Neither of these patients had shown suicidal tendencies on admission. This further emphasizes the necessity for eternal vigilance to prevent such accidents



in a service of this character, where more than 27 per cent. of the patients manifest criminal tendencies, and who are not brought here, as a rule, until they are too dangerous to be kept at home.

There were 171 patients who made unsuccessful attempts at self-destruction prior to their admission, and in 235 cases there was a history of repeated threats to commit

The number of patients who had attempted homicide was 47, and in 254 cases it was said that they had made threats of homicide. One hundred and seventy-five patients had committed assaults of various kinds.

Clinical Reports.

The clinical work in a service like this is obviously more or less unsatisfactory. In the first place, our chief work at the present time consists in examining and distributing these patients to appropriate institutions as quickly as practicable. Until we have ample accommodations and facilities for treatment, as planned in the new Bellevue Hospital, these patients must be kept moving, and with a capacity of only 50 beds and 3.200 yearly admissions, it is impossible to keep them under observation for more than three or four days. Another serious difficulty is that many patients are admitted without any history, as is natural in a cosmopolitan city like New York, and there are no relatives or friends from whom any information concerning their diseases can be learned. We have endeavored to overcome this difficulty somewhat by expediting the commitment of certain patients, thereby affording room for others, whose condition required more extended observation.

1.—Infective, Exhaustive and Toxic Psychoses.

This group naturally comprises a comparatively large proportion of the admissions in a general hospital of this character, the number for the year being 163 patients, 61 men and 102 women, or 5 per cent, of the total admissions,

It includes delirious states accompanying toxic and infective disorders, and mental disturbances caused by prolonged exhausting physical diseases.

In considering them from an etiological standpoint the following sub-groups may

Pulmonary Tuberculosis (7 men, 9 women)—There were 16 patients whose mental disturbances were apparently due to general exhaustion and infection during the course of pulmonary tuberculosis. For the most part, the mental pictures in these cases was that of an acute hallucinatory state, with a moderate moter restlessness. Only two of them were in the advanced state of tuberculosis. Two showed pronounced de pression and dullness which are prolonged and persistent. In three cases there was a history of hereditary taint in the immediate family. One gave a history of a previous attack of "mental trouble." Among the indirect or predisposing causes, worry, illegitimare childbirth, and recent surgical operations were noted. One case showed some traits of a manic-depressive psychosis. Among the men, alcohol was found to be a possible contributory factor in five cases.

Puerperal Conditions (31 cases)—Infection and exhaustion incident to childbirth and the puerperal state were regarded as being the direct cause of mental disturbance in 31 patients. Three patients were suffering from septic conditions, two of whom recovered. There was a history of direct heredity in five cases. Two were moderately alcoholic. The time of onset of the psychosis varied from three days to two months after childbirth; 11 were primiparae; of the multiparae one showed malarial infection, another gave "forceps delivery" as an etiological factor. One gave a history of having had mental disease four years previously.

It should be stated that these cases represent only those in which psychic symptoms were directly caused by the puerperal conditions and do not include the other psychoses where childbirth was an exciting or contributory factor.

The clinical manifestations in these cases were characterized in a general way by teat, apprehension, disorientation, fleeting hallucinations and a sem-delirious state the motor restlessness being in direct proportion to the extent of the toxic symptoms.

Pregnancy and Lactation (3 cases)—These patients developed their psychoses as a result of general exhaustion during the course of pregnancy or lactation; one of them, who came from a distinctly neurotic family, showed many traits of the depressed phase of a manic-depressive psychosis; another gave a history of having had a mild, mental disorder with each of several pregnancies.

It may be said in a general way that alcohol plays some part as a causative facfor in psychoses during pregnancy, parturition and lactation. There seems to be a false belief on the part of the poorer classes that a pregnant woman or one in labor as well as a nursing mother requires stimulation in the form of beer or other alcoholic beverages, just as it is a common belief among the working classes that a laborer needs some stimulants in order to do his work properly.

Angemia (? men 4 women) These nations seemed to a direct result of the impoverished condition of the blood. The psychosis was characterized in a general way by mild, hallucinatory delirium. One case followed pronounced loss of blood incident to an abortion; one followed poisoning by illuminating gas, and the third was associated with a chronic disease of the liver.

Rheumatism (1 man, 4 women)—In the man there was a previous history of prolonged alcoholic excesses. One of the women was suffering from puerperal infection in addition to the rheumatic disorder; in another, the administration of salicy-

lates seemed to be the cause of the psychosis. Uraemia (5 women)—The mental symtoms in these cases were due to uraemic poisoning. One accompanied eclampsia, two were complicated by endocarditis, and pleurisy, and another showed advanced arterio sclerosis, and resembled, in many respects, a case of general paralysis

Pneumonia (2 men, 3 women)—One patient was admitted during the stage of initial delirium, and upon the development of the pneumonia process, was transferred to the medical wards. One became delirious during the period of resolution, but the delirium was so prolonged and persistent that commitment became necessary. In one of the men, there was a previous history of alcoholism, and his mental state resembled somewhat that of the manic-depressive psychosis. The three cases among the women patients were in the nature of post-febrile delirium. One was complicated by alcoholism.

Cardiac Disease (3 men, 2 women)—These cases were so-called cardiac delirium and were all associated with non-compensating heart lesions. Clinically, they were characterized by complaints of praecordial distress, fleeting hallucinations and misinterpretation of their environment. The patients were at times able to correct their ideas temporarily, especially when the praccordial distress was relieved. When associated with nephritis, the psychic symptoms seemed to be more profound and lasting.

Scarlet Fever (1 woman)—In this patient the psychic symptoms started as an infectious delirium, but as a result of extreme exhaustion it gradually developed into a pronounced type of collapse delirium.

Malaria (3 men, 1 woman)—One of the men, on his arrival from Panama, exhibited the clinical symptoms of the aestivo-autumnal type of malaria; his blood showed the organisms in great numbers; his mental state was one of deep and prolonged debirium. Two patients responded promptly to treatment; two others, in whom the discase was severe, developed a condition of profound confusion and stupor, requiring to be committed.

Malignant Growth (3 women)—Among these there were carcinoma of the rectum, of the liver and of the uterus, with advanced cachexia; the mental symptoms were in the nature of confusion, fleeting hallucinations and mild depression.

Erysipelas (1 woman)—This patient, two weeks after the attack of erysipelas, suddenly developed a marked apprehensive hallucinatory state, with extreme motor restlessness.

Diabetes Mellitus (1 woman)—The onset of mental trouble in this patient was one and one-half years after the development of diabetes. The main symptoms were mental dulness and dejection, with hazy grasp of the surroundings. The patier t further complained of heaviness and fullness in the head and had made several suicidal

Post-operative (1 man, 5 women)—Major surgical operations, such as appendectomy, cholocystotomy, ovariotomy, etc., were the antecedents of these mental conditions. The time of onset of the psychoses varied from three days to two weeks after the operation. There was a history of heredity in but one case. Clinically they were

neurotic stock, grief over the loss of his eyesight, in addition to the disease which caused his blindness, was undoubtedly the direct cause of the psychosis. In the other two patients the administration of attention for the disease of the eye seemed to have

caused a mild, hallucinatory delirium, which was of unusually long duration.

Exophthalmic Goitre (1 woman)—This patient showed pronounced uneasiness and anxiety. She had many introspective false ideas, and ideas of unworthiness, resembling in many ways the melancholia of involution. The mental state developed seven years after the appearance of the goitre.

Influenza (2), typhoid fever (3), emphysema (1), fracture of the spine (1), ecthyma (1), abscess of the breast (1), abscess of the liver (1) and confinement in prison (1) were considered as the main causes in the development of mental disturbance in these patients. In the last case, a man who was transferred from the penitentiary, the psychosis showed a distinct paranoid trend, the basis of which was apparently the environment of the patient during his incarceration.

General Exhaustion (31 men, 25 women)—Under this heading are grouped cases in which there appears to be no definite form of physical disease causing the exhaustive. symptoms. A general physical breakdown is considered as being the etiological factor in the development of the psychoses.

These patients had been in poor physical condition from three days to one month before the definite mental symptoms developed. Two, however, were of longer duration, one being six months and another two years. Two patients presented symptoms akin to dementia praecox, such as mannerisms, constrained attitudes, negativism, etc., but as the toxic and exhaustive symptoms predominated, they were placed previsionally in this group. Two others showed sluggish pupils, lively knee jerks, tremulous speech and, to some extent, the mental symptoms of general paralysis. It is quite difficult at times to differentiate such cases from general paresis without extended observation. In two patients fright was given as the immediate cause of the psychosis, but it was evident that the lowered vitality incident to the general exhaustion was the most potent factor in the causation of the mental disorder. Four patients gave a history of previous attacks of mental disturbance; one had suffered from a severe fall two weeks prior to the onset of his malady, and three were moderately alcoholic.

Five patients in this group showed marked arterio-sclerosis, which apparently contributed to the development of the exhaustive symptoms. The ages of these patients ranged from 45 to 66 years. Patients suffering from arterio-sclerosis seem to have a peculiar lack of resistance to mental disturbances of this kind. Any slight degree of alcoholism, traumatism, especially to the head, hot weather, combined perhaps with some nephritic trouble, from which most of these patients suffer, seems readily to cause confusion, anxiety and restlessness of a transitory character.

II.—Intoxication Psychoses.

Alcoholic psychoses in all their varieties were represented in the year's admissions in 407 patients, 241 men and 166 women, or 12.7 per cent. of the total admissions. Of this number nearly two-thirds required commitment. The remainder recovered sufficiently under treatment and were discharged. Nearly all nationalities were represented. Among the native born there were 46 per cent, men and 69 per cent, women; of those born in Ireland, there were 34 per cent. men and 33 per cent. women; of those born in Germany, there were 18 per cent, men and 2 per cent, women; there were 1.5 per cent. Hebrews among the men and none among the women. Among the men, laborers and clerks predominated; mechanics, lawyers, waiters, merchants were all represented; domestics and servants were in the majority among the women. There were also actresses, artists, students and scientists, etc. Hereditary taint was noted in 15 patients, 3 men and 3 women were originally weak-minded. About one-fourth of the total number gave a history of previous attacks of a psychosis due to alcoholism. Thirteen patients in this group showed distinct manic-depressive traits, which disappeared in a short while under treatment for alcoholism. In eight patients, all women past 40 years of age, the clinical picture was one of involution melancholia. Fear, anxiety, restlessness, as a rule without hallucinations, but with distinct ideas of unworthiness, sinfulness, and in some cases negativistic delusions, etc., constituted such a typical picture of that disease that it was almost impossible to differentiate them until the toxic symptoms disappeared and the patient recovered.

The different varieties appeared in the following proportions: Acute Hallucinatory Delusional States (160 cases; 94 men and 66 women)-This formed the largest group among the intoxication psychoses, and they varied from slight delirium to well-defined, systematized delusional states.

Chronic Alcoholic Deterioration (108 cases; 81 men and 27 women)-Nearly onethird of these cases were in an advanced state of deterioration, about 5 per cent, of whom were committed to state hospitals.

Alcoholic Paranoia (11 cases; 7 men and 4 women)—These patients exhibited the characteristic delusional states of this disorder, that of jealousy and marital infidelity Some of these patients are very plausible and cunning, and owing to the peculiar charcter of their delusions, as well as to the intermittent nature of the severer symptom of their malady, it is frequently very difficult to convince judges, juries and friends, with the exception of the unfortunate victim, the wife, that these patients are dan-

gerously ill. Confusional States (22 cases; 15 men and 7 women)—In these cases, the mental picture was dominated by profound confusion and stupor, the psyshosensory disturbances (hallucinations, illusions), being apparently absent or playing very little part. All these patients were past middle life, in whom marked arteriosclerotic changes were present.

Korsakow's Psychoses (25 men and 46 women)—The age of onset was from 35 upward in the men, and 25 in the women. One man was over 66 years of age. There were forty-six cases among the women and twenty-five among the men, almost twice as many women as men. This disparity may be explained by the inactive life led by the women, and their tendency to secret tippling. A history of drinking before breakfast was obtained in many of the women. The duration in all was from a few days to a year, the longest duration being given as three years. Pupillary abnormalities were present in eleven cases, the knee reflexes were increased in seven. Nystagmus was noted in three cases. Patients which present this combination of physical symptoms frequently require careful investigation to differentiate the disease from general paralysis. In two men, there was a history of delirum tremens just prior to their admission. Alcoholism could be excluded in one of the patients who showed Korsakow's Syndrome, and the nature of the poison which caused the condition could not be ascertained.

Several patients who suffered from "wet-brain"—dull, heavy, semi-delirious mental states with meningeal symptoms—on admission, developed Korsakow's Syndrome later and required committment.

Delirium Tremens-There were twenty-three patients who suffered from delirium tremens, who were sent to the Psychopathic Wards direct from the courts. Most of these recovered during their stay and were discharged. Eighteen of this number were classified as ordinary drunkards or rounders.

Psychoses Due to Drugs (6 men, 6 women)—Among the drugs causing these conditions were cocaine, chlorodyne, bromidia, cannabis indica, morphine, tea and coffee. There were three patients who were the victims of chronic bromidia poisoning, and for the most part showed low, muttering delirium, profound confusion and disorientation, two of them having unequal pupils. The patients suffering from cannabis indica poisoning showed a pleasant mood and slight confusion, auditory hallucinations which were of a pleasing character. The chlorodyne case exhibited a happy, somewhat confused state, with stumbling speech and exaggerated knee jerks. Two patients who had taken tea to excess were extremely tense, apprehensive, uneasy and reacted to terrifying hallucinations.

III.—General Paralysis.

There were admitted during the year 317 cases of general paralysis, a percentage of 11.1 of the total admissions to the Psychopathic Wards. There were 278 men and 39 women, the ratio of women to men being 1 to 7.2. This proportion, for some unknown reason is rather higher this year, the ratio during the past three years, viz.: 1905, 1906 and 1907, being 1 to 4.9, 1 to 3.3 and 1 to 4.5, respectively. The different types according to the clinical pictures presented at the time of the admission to the hospital were as follows:

Elated type, with marked euphoria and expansive delusions, 66 men and 10 women. Depressed type, with persecutory delusions, anxiety and suicidal tendencies, 17 men and 2 women.

all in the nature of collapse delirium.

Blindness (3 men)—The time of onset of mental symptoms after the development of blindness varied from three days to several months. In one patient, who was of a lithe cases of general paralysis. There were 31 men and 3 women who were in a

state of profound confusion on admission; 2 patients, 1 man and 1 woman, showed extreme excitement. Seven men were in a condition of pronounced paretic delirum; 8 male patients showed symptoms of a neurasthenic type. Two patients, I man and I woman, exhibited the so-called classical type of megalomania.

Tabetic type, 9 cases, 8 men and 1 woman. There were two cases, 1 man.and woman, whose delusions showed limited systematization with a distinct paranoid trend. Syphilis as an etiological factor in these cases was as follows: There were 31 cases, 29 men and 2 women, in whom a positive history of syphilis was obtained. In 19 cases, 15 men and 4 women, the existence of syphilitic infection was extremely probable. In 30 cases, 21 men and 9 women, there was a history of sterility. In 53 cases, the history was incomplete, so that no definite information could be gained regarding syphilitic infection. In 6 patients, by whom a head injury was given as the cause of the disease, careful investigation disclosed a positive history of syphilis in 4 of these cases. In 5 cases, 2 men and 3 women, it was impossible to get any history of syphilis after a thorough investigation. In recapitulation, then, in 50 per cent. of all the cases, the existence of syphilitic infection was positive or probable. These statistics appear to be somewhat low, but the nature of the institution and the character of the patients will explain the relatively low percentage in which a precedent history of syphilis was obtainable. With our limited facilities and lack of assistants, routine in 2 cases senile delirium was present. lumbar puncture examination and the carrying out of the Wasserman serum reaction are impossible.

Ages—The youngest patient was a boy, 16 years old. We could not obtain any positive history of syphilis in the parents. It was found, however, that his father was a man of dissolute habits who had probably had syphilis, and furthermore, there were some physical stigmata, which pointed to the existence of congenital syphilis

The majority of the patients were between the ages of 35 and 45. The oldest patient was 65 years old, and there were four patients whose ages ranged from 55 to 65. In 26 per cent, of the women, and 5.5 per cent, of the men, there was hereditary taint. Among these there was a history of insanity more frequently on the maternal side than on the paternal, the proportion being 1 to 6. There was one case of conjugal paresis, the wife having contracted specific disease from her husband.

IV.-Dementia Praecox.

There were 562 cases which were classified under this group, and, in addition, in 50 cases, a provisional diagnosis of dementia praecox was made. Excluding those cases for which the provisional diagnosis of the disease was made, the proportion of cases of dementia praecox to the total number of admissions was 19.8 per cent.

Hebephrenic form were noted in 281 cases, 171 men and 110 women, nearly 50 per cent, of the total number of dementia praecox cases.

Katatonic form occurred in 41 cases, 20 men and 21 women, or 7.2 per cent. Paranoid form was diagnosticated in 151 cases, 85 men and 66 women, or 26.6

per cent. As is well known in this disease, the various types are ill-defined and merge one into another. In 73 cases the exact grouping could not be determined, owing to the short period during which they were under observation. In 16 cases, the disease had progressed to a terminal stage of deterioration.

Heredity-In 12 of the dementia praecox cases, the father had been insane and in 10 there was a history of insanity in the father's family. Nineteen cases gave a history of the mother having been insane, and in 13 cases the mother's family had suffered from mental disease. In 209 cases there was a history of insanity in sisters and brothers and their families. Excluding 78 cases in which the history was incomplete, the percentage of heredity in dementia praecox was 54.3 per cent.

Age-The age of onset in 221 cases of women patients was distributed as follows: Between 15 and 20 years, 48 cases; 20 and 25 years, 62 cases; 25 and 30 years, 57 cases; 30 and 35 years, 37 cases; 35 and 40 years, 22 cases; 40 and 45 years, 6 cases; and one case between the ages of 45 and 50 years. The larger number is thus seen to occur between the ages of 25 and 30 in the third decade of life.

V.-Manic-Depressive Psychoses.

The number of patients who presented this symptom complex during the year was 619: 233 men and 386 women. The maniacal phase of this disorder occurred in 426 patients: 188 men and 238 women. The depressive phase in 142 patients: 37 men and 105 women. In 51 patients, 8 men and 43 women, a condition of mixed states was met with. In 46 male and 108 female patients the psychoses appeared for the first time; in 24 men and 80 women, for the second time; in 10 men and 39 women, for the third time; in 8 men and 17 women, for the fourth time, and in 13 female patients a fifth time. In 38 cases the history was incomplete, and the question whether there were previous attacks could not be determined. The heredity may be summarized as follows: Paternal, 13; paternal collateral, 14; maternal, 25; maternal collateral, 19; collateral (brothers and sisters), 32, and in three cases the history showed that the children had suffered from manic-depressive attacks. If the 80 patients in whom the question of heredity could not be definitely determined be excluded, the manic-depressive cases show hereditary taint in 29.6 per cent. of the cases.

In addition to these, a provisional diagnosis of manic-depressive and allied conditions was made in 45 cases: 17 men and 28 women. In this group of allied manic-depressive states are included, among other atypical forms, cases of very short duration, almost transitory conditions. Among these especially may be mentioned patients suffering from atypical intoxication, or pathological drunkenness, who, in addition to their toxic symptoms, presented a characteristic symdrome of the manic-depressive psychosis, such as typical flight of ideas, irritability, loquaciousness and motor restlessness. In these cases the manic-depressive symptoms persisted after the ordinary signs of intoxication had disappeared, and eventually disappeared within 24 hours and the patient entirely cleared up. It is very difficult to decide whether these cases are to be considered as manic-depressive complicated with alcohol, or are to be regarded as the reaction of a manic-depressive personality to alcohol. A number of cases, however, showed, on their readmission, the same train of symptoms when no us in our work. alcohol had been taken. There were two cases in which the disease had developed immediately after a trauma. One patient especially, a boy 13 years old, is of interest. He had fallen from a roof and fractured his elbow. He showed alternate attacks of depression and excitement lasting from a week to ten days for a period of two months, at the end of which time he made a complete recovery.

VI.—Hysterical Psychoses.

During the year, 40 patients were admitted, 12 men and 28 women, who were suffering from hysterical psychoses. Nearly two-thirds of these cases were of a minor and transitory type, and responded to treatment so that they were discharged recovered from the ward. However, in 12 cases, 4 men and 8 women, the condition was so severe that it became necessary to commit them to an institution for care and treatment. Among them there was a patient who had shown somnambulistic tendencies; another, a chronic alcoholic, presenting in addition many hysterical symptoms; one patient had the so-called hysterical delirium, with vivid hallucinations, especially of sight, with episodes of emotional outbreaks. One case of hysterical stupor which also was complicated by pulmonary tuberculosis; one patient with "grande hysterie" with complete motor and psychical phenomena.

The manifestations of this disease in the women may be grouped as follows: 9 patients showed episodes of emotional outbreak of short duration, with sexual ideas, coincident with menstrual disorders; 4 cases had hallucinatory dream states: 5 in addition to a hallucinatory dream state presented motor manifestations of various kinds; one patient had choreic motor phenomena; another profound depression and marked suicidal tendencies. This patient had made genuine attempts at suicide on several occasions. Another patient showed hysterical aphonia with left-sided paralysis and anaesthesia. She had had a previous attack seven years ago. This condition cleared up within ten days and the patient made a complete recovery.

VII.-Epileptic Psychoses.

The number of epileptics whose mental condition was such that required treatment

in an institution was 49: 30 men and 19 women.

Of this number, 25 cases exhibited the characteristic mental deterioration. In 10 patients the mental condition was one of delusional state, while in 12 cases a condition of profound confusion was observed. There were two patients in whom the disease manifested itself as periodic alcoholic debauch-so-called epileptic dipsomania.

VIII.—Paranoia and Paranoid States.

The diagnosis of paranoia was made in 7 cases, 2 men and 5 women, during the year. The term paranoia here is used strictly in the Kraepelinian sense. One of these patients conducted his own trial before a petit jury with the assistance of his attorney, and although it was acknowledged by his lawyer and the court that he was insane, he was promptly discharged by the jury. He has been arrested since for annoying Mrs. Taft in Washington, D. C.

The number of cases of paranoid states were 104: 37 men and 67 women. This is an arbitrary group, and occupies an intermediary position between the paranoid form of dementia praecox on the one hand and Kraepelin's paranoia on the other.

IX.—Senile Psychoses.

There were 175 cases whose mental disorders were considered as being due to senility and senile decay. In 96 cases confusion was the most predominant element; 10 cases showed anxiety and agitation resembling involution melancholia; in 14 patients the depression was the most striking symptom, while in 16 patients a delusional state with a paranoid trend was noted. In 37 patients a condition of senile imbecility, and

X.-Involution Melancholia.

Considerable doubt has of late been expressed by some investigators as to the clinical entity of this group. It is claimed that involution melancholia is a variety (mixed phase) of manic-depressive psychosis.

While it is undoubtedly true that some cases of manic-depressive psychosis, with anxiety, agitation, etc., closely resemble involution melancholia, and are incorrectly classified as such, nevertheless it seems somewhat unwarranted, in view of the clinical facts, to wholly doubt the existence of this group, without further careful and extended

There were 82 cases, 28 men and 54 women, which were regarded as suffering from involution melancholia; 19 patients, all men, showed comparatively little anxiety and restlessness. In 11 patients, 5 men and 6 women, a history of alcoholism was obtained, which apparently accentuated the mental picture.

XI.—Psychoses Accompanying Coarse Brain Lesion.

There were 15 patients whose mental trouble was due to syphilis of the cerebrospinal nervous system; one case due to tabes dorsalis and another due to disseminated sclerosis.

Six patients, 4 men and 2 women, who had been suffering from brain tumors, were referred to the psychopathic wards upon the appearance of the psychic symptoms. There were 12 patients who were suffering from psychoses accompanying progressive arterio-sclerosis. Eleven patients were suffering from mental deterioration consecutive to apoplectic attacks.

XII .- Dementia, Cause Unknown.

Under this somewhat provisional classification, which is merely one of convenience, were placed 8 men and 24 women. The object of this group was to place together a certain number of cases which showed varying degrees of mental reduction; the antecedent disease or psychosis which caused the mental deterioration, owing to incomplete or unsatisfactory investigation, could not be definitely ascertained.

XIII.—Constitutional Inferiority, Imbecility and Idiocy.

Under this heading were classified 12 men and 16 women. They represented varying degrees of weak-mindedness and lack of mental development. It was noted in several instances that cases of imbecility and idiocy developed well marked manicdepressive psychosis, which made them unsuitable patients to be cared for in custodial institutions. These cases were placed under manic-depressive group.

XIV.—Constitutional Psychopathic States.

There were 16 men and 7 women whose previous history and existing clinical symptoms seemed to justify this classification. For the most part, although they showed no actual mental reduction, nevertheless their constitutional make-up was such as to place them out of harmony with their environment; they were victims of impulsions, compulsive ideas, tics, phobias, etc.

XV.-Variety of Psychosis Not Ascertained.

It is not surprising that under this heading there were placed 45 men and 62 women. The insufficient length of time for observation and the inability to obtain previous history in these cases often made a definite or even a provisional diagnosis mpossible

XVI.—Patients Who Presented No Mental Disorder.

There were 22 patients during the year, 8 men and 14 women, committed by the courts to the psychopathic wards for examination as to their mental condition, who did not present any signs of mental trouble whatever. Two of these cases were sent from the Courts of General Sessions, where they were on trial for criminal offences. After an observation of five days, they were returned to court with reports that they were not suffering from psychosis.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF LABORATORIES.

To the Board of Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals:

Gentlemen-I have the honor to submit the annual report of the Pathological

Department for the year ending December 31, 1908.

The Department has examined and reported upon 1,809 specimens, which were sent to the laboratory by the visiting staffs of Bellevue Hospital, and has performed 350 necropsies. The work of the Department has been aided in the examination and preparation of these specimens by its staff of voluntary assistants, namely, Drs. Frank Erdwurm, Charles K. Stillman, D. C. Martin, and Dr. Francis Lowell Burnett for a few months during the summer.

Dr. Alwin M. Pappenheimer, Pathologist, through the courtesy of your Honorable Board, was granted a leave of absence for a year, without salary, from January 1, 1908. The vacancy created by his absence was for a time filled by Dr. Gordon Lindsay, by virtue of a special non-competitive examination. As a result of the final examination, Dr. Bowman Corning Crowell succeeded Dr. Lindsay until Dr. Pappenheimer's return, when he assumed the duties of an additional Pathologist, receiving the same salary of

I take this opportunity of thanking your Honorable Board for the creation of the position of a third salaried Pathologist, according to the recommendation made in last year's report.

While abroad, Dr. Pappenheimer published a paper entitled "Ueber juvenile, familiare Muskelatrophie," the work being done in the Pathological Institute in the University of Leipzig, under the direction of Prof. Marschand; another paper entitled "Ueber Geschwulste des Corpus Pineale," in the pathological laboratory of the University of Engineer under the direction of Prof. Apple is about to be arbitrated. versity of Freiburg, under the direction of Prof. Aschoff, is about to be published. His experience abroad has been of the greatest benefit, not only to himself, but to the laboratory. Dr. Pappenheimer returned and resumed the duties of his position on August 17, 1908.

It is a matter of extreme regret that a system of pathological internes has not been instituted. It is only by this means that a successful cooperation between the laboratory and the various services of the hospital can be obtained. It would seem, however, that it is hopeless to expect that such a system be inaugurated until the new pathological building is opened, and until additional quarters can be found for the housing of the pathological internes.

The resignation of Dr. G. Reese Satterlee as Pathologist to Gouverneur Hospital was received last fall, much to my regret. Dr. Satterlee, with the help of Dr. Kingsley, of the house staff, had succeeded in the task of putting the laboratory on a practi-

cal and efficient running basis.

Dr A. McDonald Bell has been successful in equipping the laboratory and taking care of the pathological work of Fordham Hospital. Dr. Bell recommends the appointment of a pathological interne who shall assist him in his work. The Director would recommend that the system of rotation recently inaugurated in Harlem Hospital, in which each member of the staff serves for a number of months as pathological interne, be also established at Fordham.

The clinical and pathological laboratories of Harlem Hospital are equipped, and are under the able management of Dr. Frederick B. Humphreys. It is to be regretted that the opportunities furnished by the establishment of these laboratories has not

been taken advantage of to as great extent as one would desire.

It will be recalled that the Pathologists attached to the three Allied Hospitals receive no salary, and until these positions become salaried, the hospital cannot expect the men in charge to devote much time to their laboratory work.

It was recommended last year, in the report of the General Medical Superintendent, that the salaries of the Pathologists attached to Bellevue Hospital be increased from \$1,500 to \$2,100 per annum. Unfortunately, though approved by the Trustees, no favorable action upon this recommendation was taken by the City authorities. The salary of \$1,500 they now receive is not adequate compensation, in view of the training and experience required for these places, and from the fact that they devote their whole time to their work, and have no other sources of income. This policy is to be deplored from the Hospital point of view, as it cannot be expected that these men will continue in their present duties any length of time. Their loss could not be filled from the Civil Service lists. The Director would therefore again urgently recommend that steps be taken, in the near future, to have the salaries of the two first appointees increased from \$1,500 to \$2,100.

In my last report, I recommended the acquisition of a working library. In view of the extremely crowded condition of the laboratory, I think it would be wiser not

to take any steps in this direction for the current year.

The new pathological building is being rapidly pushed to completion, and it is expected that the contract for the equipment will soon be given out. The specifications for the laboratory apparatus, etc., which will be required in the new pathological department, I expect to be ready some time during the course of the ensuing year. The Director wishes to call the attention of your Honorable Board to the difficulty of making out such specifications under the City regulations of giving out the contracts

It is hoped that there will be no great delay in the building of the power house plant, for the new pathological building cannot be opened until the power house is

The various papers which have been published in the current medical journals by the members of the pathological department are about to be incorporated in the new volume of medical and surgical reports of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The increase in the expenditures of the laboratory over last year is due to the purchase of much needed apparatus on contract, amounting to \$643.04. The increased amount of supplies from the General Drug Department may be accounted for from the fact that the laboratory obtained its chemicals almost exclusively from that place, and not, as heretofore, on the hospital requisitions.

In closing, I desire to thank your Honorable Board for its constant support and sympathy in the management of the laboratory.

Extract from the Charter of The City of New York Establishing the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.]

CHAPTER XII.

TITLE 2.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Board of Trustees, Jurisdiction, Powers and Duties.

Section 692. On the first day of February, nineteen hundred and two, the jurisdiction of the department of public charities of the city of New York over Bellevue hospital and the Fordham, Harlem and Gouverneur hospitals and the emergency hospital in East Twenty-sixth street in the city of New York, shall cease, and the care, management and control of such hospitals shall be vested in a board of trustees, which shall on said date succeed to all rights, duties and powers heretofore vested in said department of public charities so far as concerns said hospitals. Said board of trustees shall consist of seven residents of the city of New York, together with the commissioner of public charities, ex-officio. It shall be known as the "Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals." In the month of January, nineteen hundred and two, the mayor of the city of New York shall appoint one resident of the city of New York to serve as such trustee for the term of one year, one for the term of two years, one for the term of three years, one for the term of four years, one for the term of five years, one for the term of six years and one for the term of seven years, from the first day of February, nineteen hundred and two. In the month of January, and on or before the twentieth day thereof, prior to the expiration of the term of office of any trustee, the mayor shall appoint his successor for the full term of seven years. The mayor shall fill any vacancy in the board caused by the death of a trustee, his resignation, removal from the city or otherwise, by the appointment of a trustee to hold office for the unexpired term. Every person appointed to serve as such trustee shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed by the constitution of the State.

2. For the purpose of making the appointments aforesaid, the said mayor shall call upon the president or other executive head of each of the following organizations, to wit: The United Hebrew Charities of The City of New York, the Particular Council of New York of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in New York, and the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, to present a list of not less than twice the number of persons to be appointed members of said board of trustees to fill a vacancy or otherwise. Notice in writing of the dates on which appointments, including the first, to said board of trustees are proposed to be made shall be given by the mayor to each of said residents or other executive heads at least ten days prior thereto, and such list of names shall be so presented within three days after the receipt of such notice. Said presidents or other executive heads may each submit, ore of them may present, such a list of names. Appointments to said board of trustees may, in the discretion of the mayor, be made from such list or

3. No trustee shall be subject to removal under the provisions of section ninetytive of this act, but any trustee may be removed by the mayor upon proof either of official misconduct or neglect of duty or of conduct which tends to discredit his office or for mental or physical inability to perform his duties, but before such removal he shall receive due and timely notice in writing of the charges and a copy thereof, and shall be entitled to a hearing on like notice before the mayor and to the assistance of counsel on said hearing. No trustee shall receive pecuniary compensation for his services or be interested directly or indirectly in the furnishing or performing of work, labor, services, materials or supplies of any kind to or for said hospitals by contract or otherwise. No trustee shall hold any office of emolument under the city, county, State or national government, except the offices of notary public or commissioner of deeds, or offices in the National Guard.

4. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York shall within thirty days after the passage of this act prepare a plan for the separation from the department of public charities of the said Bellevue hospital, and the Fordham, Harlem, Gouverneur and emergency hospitals. Such plan shall apportion to each of said hospitals the lands, buildings, fixtures, furniture and other appurtenances and property, and the books, records, vouchers and other papers hitherto used in connection with or for the purposes of said hospitals, and provide in detail for the transfer thereof to said board of trustees of Bellevue and Allied hospitals on the first day of February, nineteen hundred and two. It shall further apportion to each of said hospitals, the employees and subordinates of every grade in the service of the department of public charities who shall be in service in and about the said hospitals exclusively on said date. To enable said commissioners to prepare such plan, they shall have access to all of the books and papers which are the property of the city of New York in the custody of said department of public charities, and to visit said hospitals, and to require at any and all times the attendance before them of the commissioner of public charities and any of his employees and subordinates.

5. Said board of trustees shall organize within ten days after said trustees are appointed. It shall annually choose from its members, at a regular meeting to be held in the month of February, a president and a secretary for the term of one year. It shall establish rules and regulations for the administration and government of said hospitals. It shall administer the moneys appropriated for said hospitals, subject to the general provisions of this act relative to the audit and payment of claims. Said board shall have power to appoint and at pleasure remove such superintendents, medical officers, subordinate officers and other employees as may be necessary for the efficient management and conduct of said hospitals, subject to the civil service laws and the rules and regulations of the municipal civil service commission. The board of trustees shall keep accurate and detailed accounts in a form approved by the Comptroller of all moneys received and expended by it, the sources from which they are received and the purposes for which they are expended. It shall during the month of January in each year transmit to the mayor a report as to the condition of the hospitals under its care and the management thereof during the year ending the preceding thirtyfirst day of December.

6. The medical board of Bellevue hospital and allied hospitals shall be composed of the attending and consulting physicians and surgeons of said hospitals on the first day of February, nineteen hundred and two. They and such successors as the board of trustees may appoint shall serve without pecuniary compensation, and shall hold office so long as they shall perform their duties in a manner satisfactory to the

of New York. The said board of trustees shall, on nomination of the said medical board, appoint medical and surgical house officers to the said hospitals, all of whom shall serve without pecuniary compensation.

7. Any person injured or taken sick in the streets or in any public square or place within the city of New York, who may not be safely removed to his or her home. may be sent to and shall be received by the said hospitals for temporary care and treatment, irrespective of his or her place of residence. The said board of trustees shall provide and maintain suitable rooms or wards for the reception, medical examination and temporary care of persons alleged to be insane.

8. The said board of trustees may permit the reception and treatment in said hospitals of persons who do not reside in the city of New York, provided that every person so receiving treatment shall be required to pay such sum for board and attendance as may be fixed by said board of trustees, and provided that no such person shall be received to the exclusion of patients who reside in said city. The said board of trustees shall collect and pay over all such moneys to the chamberlain once every month, and the amount so collected shall be paid into the general fund. The said board of trustees shall, upon making such payments to the chamberlain, report the same to the Comptroller of the city of New York.

9. The board of estimate and apportionment and the board of aldermen shall in each year appropriate such sum as in their judgment may be necessary for the support and maintenance of said hospitals. It shall be the duty of the board of trustees thereof to send to the board of estimate and apportionment, on or before the first day of September in each year, an estimate in writing of the sum needed for the cusuing year in the same manner and general form as the heads of departments and other boards of the city of New York are required to furnish.

10. Whenever any sick person in Bellevue or other hospitals hereinbefore mentioned shall, in the judgment of the board of trustees, cease to be a proper case for treatment therein, said board may cause such person to be transferred to the care, custody and control of the commissioner of public charities, who shall forthwith receive and care for such person. In case any sick person under treatment in any of said hospitals shall die while under the care of the board of trustees, the latter, by their properly designated officer or employee, may call upon the commissioner of public charities forthwith to receive and remove the body of such person, and it shall thereupon be the duty of such commissioner forthwith to receive and remove the same for burial or other proper disposition. The cost and expense of such reception, removal, burial or other proper disposition shall be borne and paid by the department of public charities.

11. In order that suitable trained nurses for the sick in Bellevue and other hospitals may be provided, the board of trustees of Bellevue and allied hospitals shall have power, subject to the approval of the mayor of the city of New York as to terms and conditions, to enter into a contract or contracts with the Bellevue training school for nurses for the occupation and use of any building or buildings as a training school for nurses, for the purpose of continuing, improving and increasing its service in supplying to Bellevue and other hospitals trained nurses for the sick in said hospitals.

BOARD OF CITY MAGISTRATES-FIRST DIVISION.

Thirty-sixth Annual Report for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The number of prisoners arraigned in the Magistrates' Courts of the First Division, including those brought before the Justices of Special Sessions sitting as Magistrates either in the Children's Court or in the Court of Special Sessions, was, in the year 1909, 158,999. The number arraigned as above in 1908 was 186,780, and

Arraignments where Magistrates have summary jurisdiction, classed under the following heads, show arraignments for: Disorderly conduct.....

Violation of corporation ordinances..... Sanitary Code.....

Added to these totals are arraignments for vagrancy, violation of Sabbath law, insanity and disorderly persons, which make a grand total of 107,763.

Of these arraignments, 85,465 were held and 61,778 were discharged. During the year 1,164 males and 465 females were entrusted to the supervision of the Probation Officers attached to the various Courts and Magistrates, a total of This shows a decrease of 183 during the year 1909 as compared with the year 1908. This decrease, as was shown in this report for the year 1908, is probably still due to the same causes as mentioned last year, namely, the lack of a final determination by the Court of last resort on all questions dealing with probation.

In this connection, the following figures, while incomplete, show in a measure what has been accomplished: \$13,399 have been paid through the Department of Charities to wives who complained against their husbands, and 139 families, through

the efforts of the Probation Officers, have been reconciled. The total arraignments in 1909, numbering 147,505, would naturally lead the reader to exaggerate the number of criminals in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. From this total should be deducted all arraignments for intoxication, insanity, violation of corporation ordinances and disorderly persons. At worst, the offenders charged with these delinquincies are rather quasi-criminals than criminals

in the true sense, those charged with insanity coming into neither category. These four charges total 24,505, so that the figures which give more accurately the number of persons charged with crime should be 123,002 rather than 147,505. as herein shown. Of necesity, no account can be made of the habitual offenders who may be arraigned in various Courts under varying aliases, and who often escape punishment, as first offenders, unless recognized by the presiding Magistrate or by

The tables herewith appended show in detail the full reports of all business transacted in the nine Courts of the First Division:

The report of the Charter Revision Commission and the report of the Commission to Inquire into the Procedure of the Courts of Minor Criminal Jurisdiction are about to be presented, and the conclusions from a full inquiry into the procedure and jurisdiction of the Magistrates are awaited with much interest and with the hope that certain changes may be made whereby the efficiency of the Courts may be increased. The hearty co-operation of this Board, as promised in its last report, has been given to both of these Commissions, and great results for the public good are

anticipated. To several successive Grand Juries and to their interested and effective foremen and committee men, the thanks of this Board and the thanks of the entire community are due, in that at last the dreadful conditions which have so long existed at the Essex Market Court are about to be remedied. A new court house is to be built, and this pest hole, for nearly fifty years a menace to its occupants, will be a thing of the

To coming Grand Juries the conditions at Jefferson Market Court are referred conditions which could hardly be worse. To instance, the pens for prisoners, especially for women, where the guilty and the innocent, the pure and the impure, the drunk and the sober, are indiscriminately mingled like so many sheep; the court room as an example of poor ventilation, to which annoyance is added the deafening noise of the

elevated railroad, is par excellence a thing sui generis.

The procedure inaugurated by several of the Magistrates, whereby the Clerks who draw the complaints are segregated with the officers, complainants and defendants in an adjoining room, should have universal commendation were the conditions of the court rooms adequate. To make the procedure truly effective, the interior of nearly all the court houses would need great changes, and these changes it is sincerely hoped may be made in the near future.

There should be a new court in the territory now embraced within the jurisdiction of the Third and Fourth Courts, in which there were arraigned during this year 36,234 prisoners. These two courts cover the densely populated east side from Catharine slip to Seventy-ninth street.

The transfer of the Eighth Court from Westchester to a point somewhere near One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Broadway, to cover the Thirty-sixth and Fortieth Precincts, which could be enlarged, would relieve the Harlem and West Side courts and be the means of preventing an enormous waste of time and money by the public and by the Police in attending court far from their residences or police stations, and it must be remembered that the Harlem Court covers the northerly end of Manhattan, from practically Seventy-ninth street to Kingsbridge.

The report last year contained suggestions in regard to the regulation of automobiles and the licensing and regulation of chauffeurs. The men engaged in the occupation of chauffeurs are for the most part of high intelligence, and are fully cognizant of their duties and obligations. For those who are oblivious of both, legislation

Last year's suggestions have had the approval of the Automobile Club of America, through its president, and generally of the press, and now the Governor of the State

in his message says: "The operation of motor vehicles should be prohibited save by those who, upon proper examination, * * * are found to be duly qualified. * * * The licenses should be subject to suspension and revocation. * * * It should be a crime in itself, with severe penalty, for anyone to seek to escape after an accident, to which his act has contributed."

To quote from the report of 1908:

"Within the current year the necessity for further legislation regarding the licensing and conduct of chauffeurs driving automobiles have been much discussed. Many of the evils complained of would be remedied by a systematic plan whereby the identity of the chauffeur would be made clear at all times, and also by an examination as to

his skill and technical knowledge. "As to the identification-No chauffeur should be allowed to drive an automobile without carrying on his person or in his car a license issued by a duly established bureau in the office of the Secretary of State. This license should show specifically all identification marks on the chauffeur, and should further bear his photograph of recent date. A duplicate of the license should be filed with the Secretary of State. Whenever a chauffeur is arraigned before a Magistrate, an endorsement by the Magistrate should be made on the license, and if the defendant is convicted, a further endorsement should be also made. A transcript of these endorsements should forthwith be forwarded to the Secretary of State and endorsed on the duplicate license on file in Albany. Should the license of a chauffeur be lost or destroyed, a duplicate original, so marked, should be issued by the Secretary of State, together with all endorsements, and pending such reissue, the chauffeur should not be allowed to drive a car. Failure to carry the license at all times should be severely punished. In this way the record of the chauffeur will always be available, and it will always testify for or against him when arraigned for violation of any law or regulation. Duly appointed boards of examiners in cities to be hereafter designated, should certify to the skill of chauffeurs in the management of their cars; and such certification should be a prerequisite to the issuance of a license. The expenses of the bureau in the Secretary of State's office and of the boards of examiners, would be more than covered by the payments of reasonable yearly fees by applicants for licenses, and ultimately these fees would be a source of considerable revenue to the State."

In this city, within limits to be closely defined, the speed of all automobiles can be regulated by a device which, at small cost, can readily be attached to the motor vehicle. This statement is made on the authority of a well known expert, who is prepared to take out a patent (and present it to the City free of cost), for a device which will involve an electrical contact to the ground, thus short-circuiting the electrical current that actuates the spark plugs in the motor whenever the car passes a as it is in theory, the question of speeding in this city will be solved. The subject | Monday in January, as required by law.

The number of persons arraigned for burglary and for felonious assault is. of automobiles should not be left without a word in regard to the detestable nuisance caused by their smoke in the city streets. The nuisance is controlled in the parks by an ordinance, but no law covers the nuisance which turns our main avenue into a foggy thoroughfare recalling some February days in London.

In view of the fact that members of our Board have repeatedly become disabled through illness, it is advisable that proper legislation be secured whereby, in case of prolonged illness, application may be made to the Mayor for the temporary appointment of a substitute Magistrate. Such an appointment should only be made after the illness of the Magistrate has lasted during a determined period, and when from the certificates of duly qualified doctors it is ascertained that the illness will probably last for some considerable time. This plan would need to be worked out, but it would relieve the Magistrates who are now doing as much work as it is possible for them to do, and it would at the same time break in a new man, whose subsequent appointment to fill a vacancy would have at least the sanction of experience.

In this connection proper legislation should be had for the creation of the office of Vice-President of this Board. At present, should the President become seriously ill and unable to perform his duties, the payrolls of all the employees of the Magistrates' Courts, among other things, would be held up and considerable hardship ensue.

The Police Court summons, it is believed, has had the careful consideration of the Commission which has given so much time and labor to the inquiry as to the procedure in criminal courts of minor jurisdiction. That their deliberations will establish the summons on a basis more stable and more widespread cannot be doubted, and this most merciful and most effective process will then have a renewed authority

A year has passed since the last report was made. Some of our Clerks have resigned, physically incapable of continuing their labors; one has died in harness. To repeat the subject relating to Clerks as stated last year cannot be amiss:

"The duties of the Clerks are onerous, and the accuracy and legality of their work is in daily evidence, as the informations drawn by them in the bustle and confusion which often surrounds them, repeatedly and successfully stand the test of the scrutiny of even the Court of Appeals. For the men who have faithfully performed their duties, some provision should be made in the way of pension when they become incapacitated by reason of age or infirmity. The salary of our Clerks is two thousand dollars annually; and it must be conceded that but a small saving at best can be made out of this salary. It must be remembered also that all these Clerks are appointed from the Civil Service lists, and have given and do give to their work the best years of their



The devices and materials included in the list of electrical fittings as issued by the Underwriters' National Electric Association under date of October, 1909, are

hereby authorized for use in this City. A third paragraph has been added to Rule 4-b, to read as follows:

Under special authorization, in writing, given in advance, incandescent lamps may be used for the purpose of resistances in series with other devices when mounted in porcelain receptacles upon non-combustible supports and so arranged that they cannot have impressed upon them a voltage greater than that for which they are rated.

A further amendment has been made to Rule 31-A, by adding to the general

note the following sentence:
The term "theatre" shall mean also any moving picture machine establishment, whether provided with a stage or not.

The rule numbers refer to the National Electrical Code, and the changes herein announced are to take effect immediately.
