testimonial which was unanimously adopted: "The Honorable John Bigelow, for many years a member of this Commission, by virtue of his office as President of the New York Public Library, died in this City on the nineteenth of December, 1911, in his ninety-fifth year. He became a member of the Commission upon its formation in 1898, and continued to be a member until 1910, when, on account of his age and the difficulty of attending the meetings of the

Commission at the City Hall, he designated, as permitted by law, one of the trustees

of the New York Public Library to act as his representative in the Commisson. "Mr. Bigelow was a citizen of whom the people of The City of New York were very proud. His career in journalism, in the public service of this State, in the diplomatic service of the national government, and as an author and historian, made him widely known and respected. In addition, his high ideals, his strict honor, and his fearless expression of opinion upon public questions, won for him the admiration and the confidence of his fellow-citizens; while his gentle humor and his kindness of heart gained for him the deep affection of all who had the good fortune to be brought

into personal association with him. 'Mr. Bigelow took a great and sympathetic interest in the purposes and work of the Art Commission. His years and his many important occupations prevented his taking so active a part in its labors as otherwise he undoubtedly would have done; but his atendance at the meetings of the Commission, whenever it was possible for him to be present, always gave great pleasure to his colleagues, by whom his opinions

were much valued. "In common with all those who knew him personally, and with the still larger number of those who knew him only by reputation, the members of the Art Commission deepely regret the passing away of one who stood in this community as an example of what is best and most honorable in its life; and they hereby place this record upon their minutes in testimony of the great respect and affection which they felt for him."



pany; and Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about July 26, 1884, filed with the Postmaster-General of the United States of America a certificate of acceptance of the restrictions and obligations imposed on telegraph companies by an Act of Congress of the United States, passed July 24, 1866, entitled, "An Act to aid in the construction of telegraph lines

to aid in the construction of telegraph lines and to secure to the government the use of the same for postal, military and other purposes," and by title 65 of the Revised Statutes of the United States; and

Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about April 20, 1910, assumed the name of Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, by which it is now known, pursuant to an order of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, authorizing it so to do: and

Section 1. The City hereby consents to the construction, erection, maintenance and opera-tion by the Company of the tollowing:

1. Sec. 2. The consent hereby given is in consideration of and subject to the following provisions and conditions:

First-This contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not use the said conduits or conductors for which consent is hereby granted for any other purpose than as a telegraph line in connection with the cable lines of the Postal Telegraph-Commercial Cable system, so-called. Second—The said consent to construct, main-

tain and operate said conduits and their appurtenances shall continue and extend for the period of the duration of the Company and any renewals of its chartered existence in accordance with the laws of the State of New York.

Third-Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over or through the same route, hereinbefore described, or any portion thereof.

Fourth-The consept hereby granted shall not be assigned, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the con-sent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

If the Company shall, after five (5) days' notice from either the Presiuent of the Borough of Brooklyn or the President of the Borough of Queens, or any other proper City official, neglect to so restore or maintain said pavement, then the said Presidents, or either of them, or such other proper official, shall be authorized to do so at the expense of the Company, and the cost of such restoration and maintenance shall be a proper charge against the Company. Ninth-It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken under the consent granted. Tenth-Any alteration to the sewerage of drainage systems or to any other subsurface of to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twelfth-Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the conduits are laid be changed at any time after the same have been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall at its own expense change said conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues, the Company shall take care of and protect the conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth-The wires, cables, conductors and conduits to be laid shall be employed for no other purpose than that explicitly set forth here-in, except by consent of the Board, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate the said wires, cables, conductors and conduits for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Fourteenth-In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Fifteenth-If the Company shall fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein pro-vided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, and n case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time notice by the Board as aforesaid, the City shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon.

Sixteenth-The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits to be laid, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same ,and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall us compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

The Company shall not, without the permission and consent of the lessee, enter into or use any wharves or piers or other public property affected by this contract, but which is leased by the City to any person or corpora-

Seventeenth-This consent is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the consent hereby granted shall file with the Comptroller of the City the joint and several bond of the Company and The Commercial Cable Company in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) conditioned that the Company in the terror of the company conditions of the co

comply with all orders of the Board or other local authority acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the repairs of street pavement, quality of construction of the conduits and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms conditions or upon its failure to comply with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from

said Companies or either of them.
Eighteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such other sua have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of de-

livery or mailing.

Nineteenth—The words "streets or avenues and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean "streets, ave nues, highways, boulevards, concourses, driveways, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers or public grounds or waters," the City Aqueduct or Conduit Lands within and belonging to the City and any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, encountered in the route hereinabove described, and through or in which this contract shall operate.

Sec. 3. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to authorize the Company to use the land, formerly of the Brooklyn City Water Works, now generally known as the Conduit Lands or the City Aqueduct, without the con-sent of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund first had and obtained in the manner and in accordance with the procedure for such consent required by "The Greater New York Charter." NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the in the the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the

same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or con-sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in Bidders are requested to make their bids or

estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to-gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
